SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Sound check for the Committee on Immigration. Today's date is December 19, 2024, being recorded by Danny Huang of the Council Chambers.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Quiet down, please.

Good morning, and welcome to today's New York City

Council vote for the Committee on Immigration.

At this time, we ask that you silence all electronic devices, and at no time should you approach the dais.

Chair Avilés, we're ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON AVILÉS: [GAVEL] This meeting is coming to order. Good morning, everyone. I am Council Member Alexa Avilés, Chair of the Committee on Immigration. I'd like to begin by thanking my Committee Colleagues who have joined us here today. We have Council Member Shekar Krishnan, Majority Leader Amanda Farías, Council Member Carmen De La Rosa, Council Member Crystal Hudson, Council Member Rita Joseph, and Council Member Eric Bottcher. Thank you, Colleagues.

Today, the Committee will be voting on Resolutions 468 and 576. Resolution 468, sponsored by Council Member Crystal Hudson, calls on the New York

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State Legislature to pass the Empire State Licensing

Act, which would provide all New Yorkers access to

professional, occupational, commercial, or business

licenses, permits, certificates, or related

registrations, regardless of an applicant's

immigration status. This bill was previously heard on

Resolution 576, sponsored by Majority

Leader Amanda Farías, calls on the New York State

Legislature to introduce and pass legislation

amending the tax law to authorize the City of New

York to offer tax credits for businesses to

incentivize the creation of workforce development and

training programs for newly arrived immigrants. This

bill was previously heard on October 15, 2024.

These bills, which I've co-sponsored, calls for changes that will benefit our immigrant communities and help address the labor shortages challenging our city's economy. Immigrants continue to significantly contribute to some of the state's fastest-growing industries, including industries that are struggling with workforce shortages. There are growing demands not only for labor, but for the workers with bilingual skills, especially in fields

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such as education and healthcare. Amending licensing requirements to ensure that individuals with experience and knowledge of an industry can access relevant registration requirements and can open up numerous occupations to more workers. Incentivizing businesses to develop workforce training programs through tax credits can help bridge businesses' needs for workers and workers' needs for workforce development. Addressing barriers to employment allows immigrants to access jobs that meet their expertise and interests and allows them to work in New York City with dignity as they add to the fabric of our city. The State actions called for in these Resolutions can help immigrant workers earn higher wages and increase job security, ultimately benefiting the New York economy through more robust tax revenues.

Thank you to the Committee Staff for their work on this hearing, including Nicole Catá, Rebecca Barilla, Carolina Gill, Florentine Kabore, and to my Staff, Chief-of-Staff Edward Cerna, Legislative and Budget Director Christina Bottego, our Legislative Fellow Cate Byrne, and our Communications Director Winnie Marion, and everyone

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who is working in the background to ensure that this hearing runs smoothly.

I will now turn it over to Council Member Hudson to make a brief statement on her bill.

COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Thank you so much,
Chair Avilés, for your remarks and also for giving me
the opportunity to speak on Resolution 468 today.

In light of the current political climate, many New Yorkers fear what the new year will bring for themselves and their families. Immigrants are not just part of the fabric of this city, they are the needle and the thread. New York must do everything in its power to protect all of its residents, and Resolution 468 urges the New York State Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign the Empire State Licensing Act. This legislation ensures that all New Yorkers, regardless of their citizenship or immigration status, have access to professional, occupational, commercial, and business licenses, permits, certificates, and related registrations. By passing this Resolution, we will send a clear message that New York is a sanctuary of opportunity and inclusivity where everyone can

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contribute to the prosperity and strength of ourcity. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON AVILÉS: Thank you so much, Council Member.

Now we'll turn it over to Majority Leader Farías to make a brief statement about her bill.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you so much, Chair Avilés. Reso. 576 urges the New York State Legislature to pass legislation that would authorize New York City to offer tax credits to businesses that create workforce development programs specifically for newly arrived immigrants. These tax credits would help businesses offset the additional costs of providing training in languages other than English, and it would incentivize them to invest in immigrant workers, preparing them for jobs in growing sectors like construction and manufacturing. Our city is rapidly developing. Housing, industry, and infrastructure are expanding at an unprecedented rate, but with many older generations of workers in these sectors nearing retirement, we need to ensure that newly arrived immigrants are prepared to take their place. This is about creating opportunities for immigrants to thrive while addressing the labor
