Today, we are voting on Preconsidered

Resolution 1058-A by the Speaker and Majority Leader

Farías titled "A Resolution to Amend the Rules of the

Council to Improve Clarity, Consistency with Council

Practices and Precedent." The Committee held a public

hearing on this resolution on September 22nd at which

one member of the public testified.

We also will be voting on a Preconsidered Resolution to make changes to Chairs and Memberships of certain Committees.

Before we vote, I would like to recognize Speaker Adrienne Adams to speak on the resolution.

SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you. First time up here in this lovely room.

Good morning, everyone, and thank you, Chair Powers, for your introduction.

Today, we are voting on an amended resolution to update the Rules of the Council. These amendments are not an overhaul and have been the subject of discussions with Council Members and external stakeholders for over three years with input gathered and incorporated. The vast majority of the

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS revisions clean up and reorganize the rules so that everyone can understand and use them. The Rules of the Council at their most basic level establish what Council Members, Staff, and the public can expect with respect to their rights and responsibilities in the conduct of the Council's business. In doing so, rules should promote civility, collegiality, democracy, transparency, accountability, and efficiency. For rules to be useful, they should be organized in a way that is easy to read, understand, and reference. They should also bring together the various laws that govern the operations of the Council in a readable and accessible format. The current rules do not meet these standards. They are disorganized and difficult to reference, with rules governing the procedure for Stated Meetings spread across 11 chapters. The most significant change in the new rules is that they have been reorganized so that related topics are now in the same chapter or the same rule. To that end, procedures that govern Committee meetings and hearings are consolidated in Chapter 7. Procedures that govern Stated Meetings are consolidated in Chapter 8. Procedures that apply to both are consolidated in Chapter 9.

The existing rules also do not adequately bring together the regulations we need to conduct our daily business. Amendments spell out for the public, Members, Committee Chairs, and the Sergeant-at-Arms what decorum means and the means by which it can be enforced while respecting the First Amendment. Given the marked uptick in decorum issues and harassment experienced by Staff and Members in recent years, these changes are of critical importance.

The new rules also specify Council
Members' obligations under the Conflicts of Interest
Law when voting on or sponsoring legislation. They
incorporate the notice and fiscal impact statement
requirements added to the Charter in the 2024 General
Election. They clarify the public notice requirements
of the Open Meetings Law.

While the majority of changes to the Rules are updates to clarify, modernize, and reorganize them for clarity and practical implementation, the fraction that are substantive have been the subject of significant discussion and engagement with Members and other stakeholders. We've taken nearly four years from the first discussion about amending the Rules to the vote we are taking

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS today. During that time, the Office of General Counsel consulted with every Division of the Council to solicit proposals. Good government groups were consulted multiple times over the course of this process. Every Council Member has been given opportunities to review and comment on multiple drafts, and several have offered feedback. These proposals have been modified based on these discussions and the incorporation of this input. Based on these years of work, we've arrived at the Resolution we're voting on today. The Daily News has asserted that a Council should not seek to change its rules at the end of a term but rather at the beginning of a new term. I could not disagree more. Considering updates to rules at the end of a term, especially with an outgoing Speaker, allows for the experience of the Body to shape any changes. It also allows for the functioning and well-being of the institution rather than political interests and the interests of a Speaker to dominate these decisions. I believe it is our duty to improve this institution, even as some of us are coming to the end of our terms. That is how I have led. We make these

changes knowing that the next Council can make any
