2	SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: This is a microphone
3	check on the Committee on Environmental Protection,
4	recorded by James Marino, located in the Chambers on
5	12-5-2024.
6	SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning. Welcome
7	to the City Council vote on the Committee on
8	Environmental Protection, Resiliency and Waterfronts.
9	At this time, please silence all
10	electronics and do not approach the dais. I repeat,
11	please do not approach the dais.
12	Chair, you may begin.
13	CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Thank you, Sergeant.
14	[GAVEL] Good morning, I'm Council Member Jim Gennaro,
15	Chair of the Committee on Environmental Protection,
16	Resiliency and Waterfronts.
17	Today, we will vote on two bills that I
18	sponsored, Proposed Intro. 814-A in relation to
19	addressing sewer backups, and Proposed Intro. 815-A
20	in relation to creation of a flood risk area map for
21	both coastal flooding and pluvial flooding. Pluvial
22	flooding means caused by rainfall. This Committee
23	first considered these bills on April 26 of this
24	year.
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COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION, RESILIENCY AND WATERFRONTS

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Sewer backups occur when heavy rainfall 2 3 or physical blockages prevent normal conveyance of 4 stormwater or wastewater through the sewer system. This can result in raw sewage flowing into homes, 5 leading to costly damages and potentially 6 7 facilitating the spread of disease. Although no New Yorker should have to endure sewer backups, DEP 8 9 received approximately 12,000 complaints of sewer backups in FY23. The Department regularly conducts 10 11 field investigations in response to these complaints, but the outcome of the investigations may not always 12 be shared with the impacted residents. We don't like 13 that. Proposed Intro. 814-A would help to mitigate 14 15 sewer backups by requiring DEP to regularly update 16 its plan to address such backups and to share the 17 results of sewer backup field investigations with the 18 homeowners. The bill would require that DEP update 19 its plan to prevent sewer backups every five years 20 and identify areas where sewer backups cause 21 significant damages. Additionally, the bill would require DEP to alert impacted residents when it 2.2 23 determines that a sewer backup was not caused by a condition in the City-owned sewer system and 24 therefore may have originated from some other source. 25

COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION, RESILIENCY AND WATERFRONTS 1 Many neighborhoods across the city have flooding from 2 3 rainfall, coastal storm surge, and high tide. These 4 factors often co-occur to create compounding damages. In the most extreme cases, such flooding causes 5 severe damage to life and property. When Hurricane 6 7 Sandy struck in 2012, it flooded 17 percent of the city's landmass, causing an estimated 19 billion in 8 9 damages and resulting in the deaths of 52 New Yorkers. When Hurricane Ida inundated the city with 9 10 inches of rain in 2021, it caused pluvial flooding 11 that killed at least 10 New Yorkers living in 12 13 unregulated basement apartments with inadequate flood 14 protection. 15 Proposed Intro. 815-A would require DEP 16 to adopt a flood area risk map for both pluvial and 17 coastal flooding. The Department would be required to 18 update the map by 2028 and within one year of the 19 Federal Emergency Management Agency publishing new 20 flood insurance rate maps. The flood area risk map 21 would also consider the impacts of sea level rise as 2.2 projected by the New York City Panel on Climate 23 Change. Proposed Introductions 1127-A and 1128-A, which were referred to the Committee on Housing and 24 Buildings and will be voted on at today's Stated 25

COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION, RESILIENCY AND WATERFRONTS 1 Meeting, would use the flood risk map created by this 2 3 bill to prohibit subgrade and ground floor ADUs in 4 certain flood-prone neighborhoods. I would like to thank the Committee staff, Legislative Counsels 5 Austin Malone and Natasha Bynum. We welcome Natasha. 6 7 This is her first hearing. Good for Natasha. [GAVEL] 8 I don't know what the bang and the gavel does, but it 9 just seemed celebratory, and so we've got the two Committee Counsels, Policy Analysts Ricky Chawla and 10 11 Andrew Bourne, Financial Analyst Tanveer Singh, and my Legislative Director, Josh Gachette. I want to 12 thank them for all their hard work on these two 13 14 bills. 15 First, I would like to recognize the Council Members who have joined us. We're joined by 16 17 Council Members Holden, Salamanca, Restler, Avilés, 18 Marmorato, and Nurse. Thank you very much for being 19 with us at this vote. 20 Now, I will ask the Clerk to call the 21 roll. 2.2 COMMITTEE CLERK WILLIAM MARTIN: Good 23 morning. Still morning.
