Majority Leader, and good afternoon, everyone.

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I want to begin by acknowledging the deaths of two New Yorkers who died on the job in recent weeks, Juan Carlos Montoya Hernández and Burim Havolli. All workers deserve to be and feel safe in their workplace, and my thoughts are with their colleagues, families, and loved ones during this difficult time.

I also want to acknowledge the lives of several New Yorkers who died this month in fatal fires:

On November 9th, we lost an 88-year-old man in his home in the Bronx.

On the 12th, a 74-year-old woman died in her longtime home in Yorkville.

On the 13th, an 89-year-old, Robert Germain, died in his home in Auburndale.

On the 15th, another fire took the life of a New Yorker and injured two firefighters on Roosevelt Island—that same evening, an 86-year-old woman died in her home at NYCHA's Queensbridge South Houses.

On November 18th, 90-year-old Allison Johnson died in her home in Morrisania.

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And on November 23rd, 95-year-old Joyce Buncom died in her home in St. Albans, while her 68year-old daughter, Paula, and her six-year-old greatgranddaughter, Aylan, remain in critical condition. I am truly heartbroken by the death of these seniors and New Yorkers. All of us should be safe in our homes, and our prayers are with their families, loved ones, and communities now navigating their immense losses.

I want to remind all New Yorkers to:

- Review their fire safety plans.
- Know where the exits are in your building, and please keep them clear.
- Especially as we enter the colder winter months, remember to keep space heaters at least three feet away from combustible material.
- Never use extension cords for large appliances like heaters because they can overheat.

Property owners are legally required to provide heat and hot water to tenants. If they're unresponsive, please register a complaint by calling 311.

As we celebrate Thanksgiving this week, I hope everyone has a happy and safe holiday spent with

Introduction of 441-A, the Young Adult Voter
Registration Act, legislation that ensures young
people are not only seen but empowered as full
participants in our democracy. This bill requires the
Department of Education to provide every high school
senior with a code, voter registration form, voting
material, and accessibility information throughout
the school year, not just at graduation, but
throughout the school year. It sounds simple, but it
is very transformative, because what we're really
doing is moving the barriers that have kept too many
young people, especially Black and brown young people
in low-income communities, on the sidelines of civic

And colleagues, I want us to be honest in this moment we're living in. Across the country, we've witnessed a coordinated effort to chip away at voting rights, to silence certain communities, and to

to protect New Yorkers in two critical ways. First,

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with the passage of Intro 1297, we restore the full strength of the Gender-Motivated Violence Act. After a court ruling put hundreds of survivor cases in jeopardy, we had a responsibility to act. This legislation reopens the look-back window and makes clear that institutions that enable abuse must be held accountable. Survivors should never lose their chance of justice because of a loophole.

We are also passing Intro 1049, which addresses a quiet but harmful practice at gas stations across the city. Large pre-authorization holds, sometimes over \$100, can drain a family's account for days. For those using benefit cards, these holds can mean losing assistance they cannot replace.

This bill requires clear disclosure, so New Yorkers are not caught off guard. These bills address very different challenges, but they share a common purpose: protecting the people we serve and ensuring fairness for every New Yorker. I urge my colleagues' support, and I'm proud to see both measures move forward today. Thank you.

Intro 163 addresses a problem that is both widespread and solvable. The bill requires the mayor or the mayor's designee to establish official guidelines for the accessibility of any printed document created by an agency or related to an agency, program, or activity. The guidelines must include standards for formatting, visual design, and readability, and, where practicable, any printed documents an agency creates for public dissemination must comply with these guidelines.

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2 These guidelines are not complicated, but 3 they're powerful. They ensure consistent readability, appropriate font sizes, limits on overly stylized 4 5 Serif fonts, clear contrast standards, logical formatting, and layouts that don't get lost when 6 7 printed on different devices or at different scales. 8 In plain terms, they guarantee that documents produced by the City of New York are easy to read, easy to follow, and accessible to people who need 10 11 them. When a parent can't read a school notice, when 12 a senior can't decipher a housing application, when a constituent can't understand a health alert, those 13 14 are not small inconveniences. They are barriers to 15 participation in our city and barriers to safety. 16 Intro 163 is about removing those barriers. It's 17 about respecting the reality of how New Yorkers 18 engage with government and meeting them where they 19 are.

information and no reliable place to turn. This

legislation changes that.

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Intro 1004-A requires the Mayor's Office for People with Disabilities to maintain a clear, accessible citywide list of wheelchair repair providers, including contact information, hours, insurance accepted, and ways to connect with the services that help people locate the repair. It is a simple tool, but one that can prevent days of delay and unnecessary hardship. I take this issue personally. Before I became a council member, I owned and operated a DME (Durable Medical Equipment) business and sold wheelchairs. I saw firsthand how a broken part can disrupt a person's entire life and how families often struggle to find help quickly. This bill is about giving people straightforward information so they can stay mobile, safe, and independent.

I want to thank the Speaker, of course, my colleagues, and all the legislative team body that came and helped with this entire thing, and all the advocates, and of course, my staff. But this isn't a bill for celebrities.

This is a bill for the thousands of New Yorkers whose names you'll never see on Page 6, seniors with no family, adults with disabilities, individuals who get swept into guardianships that can strip away their rights, their finances, and at times even their dignity, all with far too little transparency or oversight.

This Commission is the first step towards fixing that. Before we change the system, we need to understand exactly how it works and, more importantly, how it doesn't. Here in New York City, this Commission will study current practices, identify gaps and abuses, gather real data, and work with families, advocates, and experts to recommend concrete reforms. Justice Brandeis famously said, "Sunlight is the best disinfectant". In this case, sunlight may also (TIMER) be the best guardian. Thank you.
