Today, we'll be voting on Proposed

Introduction 895-A, sponsored by Council Member Julie

Menin and myself. This bill would require schools and

certain child care programs to stock epinephrine

devices. These epinephrine devices or EpiPens are a

lifeline. According to the Allergy and Asthma

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Network, 25 percent of severe allergic reactions in school occur without a prior diagnosis. These children and their parents would not know they need an EpiPen until it's too late. Meanwhile, the cost of two generic EpiPens can range from 100 to 500 dollars without insurance, so those children who have a prior diagnosis may find the cost of life-saving treatments prohibitively expensive. This bill solves both problems. It ensures that any child suffering a severe and life-threatening allergic reaction has access to the care they need at school or at a school-based child care facility. Whether they are unable to acquire the treatment due to cost or they simply don't know they need it, ensuring schools and child care programs stock EpiPens is a critical stopgap. It ensures that even in worst-case scenarios, our children's lives are protected.

I want to thank my Colleagues, especially my co-sponsor Julie Menin, Legislative Staff, and the advocates for their tireless work in moving this bill forward.
