SARGEANT HOPE: Thank you. Good morning, welcome to today's New York City Council's virtual vote on General Welfare. At this time, would all panelists please turn on your videos. Thank you. To minimize disruption, please place all electronic devices to vibrate or silent mode. Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON STEPHEN LEVIN: Thank you

Sargeant. Good morning everybody uhm and welcome to
this vote on the City Council's Committee on General

Welfare. Today, the Committee will be voting on two
bills concerning the City's Rental Assistance Program
and income discrimination. Proposed Intro 1339-A

sponsored by Council Member Diana Ayala would provide
written to those potentially eligible for City Rental
Assistance Programs and inform them of their rights
and resources available related to source of income

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discrimination. Proposed Intro 2080-A which I am sponsoring would allow online access to rental assistance program status so that client's can know where their case stands rather than navigating through the bureaucracy of having to call HRA. Bills we are voting on today will make the process of obtaining rental assistance more user friendly and ensure that clients know their rights. Rental assistance vouchers are the primary tools that we have in the City to ensure that people are able to move out of shelter and in to housing. Vouchers can also assist New Yorkers at risk of losing their housing and voiding eviction and entry into shelter. However, the confusing bureaucracy of securing government benefits as well as voucher holders not knowing theirs rights when landlords illegally deny them housing based on source of income discrimination are barriers to securing housing. I believe this is a legislation included in today's vote will make strides to promote equity in housing by removing some of the barriers to keeping people from destroying or maintaining their apartments. Also these Bills will bring us a step closer to passing Intro 146 which would raise the voucher levels to fair market rent as

| set by the HUD standard so that individuals and |
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| families are able to quickly exit the shelter system |
| into housing or avoid entry into the system |
| altogether and I want to thank all the co-sponsors of |
| Intro 146 as well. I want to thank all the advocates |
| and members of the public and those with lived |
| experience who have testified in favor of these Bills |
| that we are voting on today and at this time I would |
