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I would like to acknowledge my colleagues who are here today, Council Member Kevin Riley and Council Member Cabán. I would also like to thank my - and Council Member Vernikov - I would also like to thank my own staff, Daniel Heredia, and Michaela Blemur, as well as our committee staff; committee counsel, Sahar Moazami, committee counsel, Rachel Conte; Cristy Dwyer, Senior Legislative Policy Analyst for their work on this hearing.

I would also now like to turn it over to Council Member Cabán to provide opening remarks.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Thank you very, very much, Chair... I yeah... I just... feeling a lot of feelings this morning. I'm super, super proud today

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2 to be passing a resolution, or to have it heard so

3 that later today it can be passed, a resolution that

4 honors the late, great Cecilia Gentili. She was a

5 fearless leader, a trans icon, an author, an actress,

a pioneering advocate for the dignity and freedom of

sex workers and so much more - like, I could go on.

She wasn't merely an ally in other liberation fights. She was a coconspirator who put her body on the line for anyone facing exploitation, discrimination, or persecution.

And Cecilia was a very formative figure in my life, a super special, impactful person. She held such an important role in the social spaces and community that I move through and since she's passed away, there have been all of these opportunities to meet lots of new people, and I've discovered that she held the same kind of space and presence in their lives and their communities, and that I find really, really incredible and amazing.

Even though Cecilia is no longer with us, her impact lives on and it's magnified by every person who knew her. Her energy was infectious. She was profoundly funny and sharp, brilliant. She was open and honest about her struggles with substance use.

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She said exactly what needed to be said every single time, no matter where she was and no matter who you were, and I really, really miss her.

So I want to close by saying, rise in power,

Cecilia, may your memory be a joyous, bawdy,

hilarious, visionary, fearless revolution, and may

our city's new Cecilia Gentili Day serve as a

testament to that revolution, and thank you.

Thank you, Chair.

I now call the first panel, Río Sofia.

16 CHAIRPERSON LOUIS: You may begin.

RÍO SOFIA: Thank you, Chair, and good morning, City Council.

My name is Río Sofia, I am a Co-Executive

Director at Queer Art, where Cecilia Gentili was

proudly a board member, and I'm also proud to call

myself, Cecilia Gentili's daughter - Not her only

daughter, one of hundreds and hundreds of people who

her... whose lives were made possible by her work.

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I met Cecilia at Apicha Clinic, where she grew
Apicha from a program that served 27 trans people in
the city to over 500. And, yeah, Cecilia has done so,
so much for the city. She was a co-founder of Decrim
NY where she fought tirelessly for the
decriminalization of sex work, and also was a
formative person who in the repeal of the "Walking
While Trans" ban. She, at when she was working at
GMHC, she, uhm, was instrumental in passing GENDA
(Gender Expression Non-Discrimination Act) to ensure
legal protections for trans people.

She also founded the COIN Clinic (Cecilia's Occupational Inclusion Network), which is one of the only clinics in the country, if not the only clinic in the country, that primarily serves sex workers, and make sure that they have the health care that they need.

And, you know, I think that as we gather here for this incredible day to celebrate and make sure that we're always celebrating Cecilia's birthday in New York, I, you know, I want to think about how for Cecilia - she received so many awards in her life, so many that she just kept them in a cardboard box in her closet. And, she, at one point, she was like, if

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2 there aren't material things that come with these
3 accolades, these recognitions, I don't want them.

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So I want us to remember every January 31st that what Cecilia was fighting for was not about recognition, it was about trans liberation, liberation for immigrants, for sex workers, and I want us to carry forth that legacy.

And so I want to thank everyone (TIMER CHIMES) who worked really hard on this, congratulations.

CHAIRPERSON LOUIS: Thank you. Thank you to all who came today to share your thoughts and experiences.
