## COMMITTEE ON FIRE AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

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SERGEANT LEVY: Testing, testing, this is a sound test for the New York City Council Committee on Fire and Emergency Management — recorded in the City Hall Chambers on April 10, 2025 by Sergeant Ben Levy.

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Good morning, good morning, welcome to the New York City Council vote on the Committee on Fire and Emergency Management. At this time, please silence all electronic devices and do not approach the dais. I repeat, do not approach the dais.

Chair, you may begin.

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CHAIRPERSON ARIOLA: Good morning, I am Minority Leader and Chair of Fire and Emergency Management, Council Member Joann Ariola. We are here today to vote on Introduction 807-A, sponsored by Council Member and Majority Whip Brooks-Powers.

Introduction 807-A would require New York City
Emergency Management (NYCEM) to develop guidance for
safe evacuation before flash flood emergencies,
including information on when and how to safely
evacuate the locations to seek refuge during these
emergencies. NYCEM would also disseminate localized
emergency preparedness materials in locations that
are prone to flash floods, in order to increase

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public awareness as to the appropriate responses by

members of the public to flash flood risks and to

increase registration to Notify NYC. Such efforts

would involve in person outreach as well as mass

mailings to targeted locations selected within the

consideration of the history of flash flood events;

and the prevalence of subgrade dwellings.

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As we have seen time and time again, we as a city must be prepared for and address severe weather emergencies that produce flash flooding particularly in vulnerable areas. I believe that this legislation works towards a better approach to the horrific consequences and human toll that flash flooding can yield. It has recently been reported that the New York City region could face tens of thousands of homes being lost to flooding in the coming years, compounding the continued burdens on families and homeowners as well as exacerbate our city's housing crisis.

A study conducted by the nonprofit Regional Plan Association estimates that as many as 82,000 housing units in the city, Long Island, and Westchester County could be lost by 2040 with a number of potentially ballooning to 160,000 by 2070. It is our
