For many New Yorkers, their home is their greatest financial asset. Unfortunately, scammers seek out financially vulnerable homeowners to fraudulently take ownership of their property.

According to the New York Attorney General's Office,

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COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AND WORKER PROTECTION deed theft occurs when someone takes the title to someone's home without the homeowner's knowledge or approval. Two of the most common ways scammers steal deeds are forgery, where the scammers fake the homeowner's signature on a deed and files it with the County Clerk, and fraud, where the homeowner signs the deed over to the scammer without realizing what they are really signing. In the past five years, the City has received almost 3,000 deed theft complaints, 45 percent of which occurred in Brooklyn, and primarily in communities of color and among older adults. Deed theft can be particularly catastrophic for retirees or those who are on fixed incomes, often leaving them without the resources to secure alternate housing and increasing their risks of homelessness in New York City's high-priced housing market. Deed theft also disrupts generational wealth transfer, which is particularly impactful in communities of color where families may rely on passing down property to achieve economic mobility. Stripping families of these assets perpetrates economic disparities.

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Today, we're voting on two bills that seek to ensure homeowners know how to protect their

COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AND WORKER PROTECTION assets and are better able to identify deed theft scams. Proposed Intro. 888-A, sponsored by Council Member Hudson, would require that when a purchaser submits an offer to buy certain residential property that the owner has not listed for sale, is not actively selling, or did not intend to sell, the purchaser must disclose in writing in a clear and conspicuous manner the estimated market value of such property. Proposed Intro. 901-A, sponsored by Council Member Riley, would require the Office of the Homeowner Advocate to consult with the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection to provide support and counseling to homeowners and their heirs to protect their assets, which could include financial planning, mortgage counseling, and scam prevention. Council Member Hudson will now make a statement about her bill.

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COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Thank you so much,
Chair Menin, for giving me the opportunity to discuss
my bill, Intro. 888. As our city's housing crisis
deepens, longtime homeowners, particularly in rapidly
gentrifying neighborhoods, are being targeted by
predatory real estate practices. These schemes
disproportionately impact black and brown communities

and older adults. Unsolicited housing offers, often
dangling quick cash, exploit asset-rich and cash-poor
people, especially older adults on fixed incomes.
These homeowners are pressured into selling far below
market value, ultimately losing their most valuable
asset, their home. Intro. 888 takes a critical step
to protect homeowners from these bad actors. The bill
would require purchasers making unsolicited offers or
certain residential properties to disclose, in
writing, the estimated market value of the home. This
ensures homeowners have the necessary information to
make informed decisions. Violators of this law would
face civil penalties and property owners would have
the right to take legal action. This is a simple,
common-sense measure to safeguard longtime homeowners
from exploitation. I urge my Colleagues to take this
meaningful action to protect New Yorkers from
fraudulent real estate schemes and help ensure they
can remain in their homes and communities by voting
yes on Intro. 888. Thank you.
