redlight cameras at just one percent of intersections. We will now quadruple the redlight camera program in New York City; this is an evidence based, effective approach to reducing crashes on our streets that cause death and serious injury.

SLR 13 is an innovative and effective new approach from the Department of Sanitation that will place cameras on street sweepers automating enforcement and actually holding bad actors accountable who are not moving their cars during alternate side parking - modeled after the MTA program of putting cameras on buses to keep cars out of bus lanes. We are going to actually make our streets safer, make our streets cleaner, get more garbage off our streets, have less rats in our communities without having to... and putting less pressure on the enforcement workers, so that they can spend their time doing other things. These are really terrific bills, and I hope that Albany takes swift and quick action.

Now we'll move on to our Stated Agenda.

First we'll vote on the following Land Use items:

City of Yes Zoning for Economic Opportunity or

 ${\tt ZEO.}$  The Council has modified the New York City

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Department of City Planning's DCP proposed citywide zoning text amendment to update the City's outdated commercial zoning regulations. The Council made modifications to 14 of its 18 proposals to address concerns raised about them during the public review process by including limitations and safeguards that help strike the right balance between expanding opportunities for local businesses, creating jobs, protecting neighborhoods, and quality of life for all New Yorkers. This text amendment also includes the Council's priority of preserving manufacturing districts and enhancing the development of the Industrial Sector which provides good paying jobs and can prepare our city for a clean energy economy and future.

The Council also secured commitments for the City to address the environmental and health impacts of Last Mile facilities and trucking including to advance a zoning reform that would require a special permit to operate the facilities, support for legislation to regulate emissions associated with their operations, and continued development of a program supporting waterborne freight as an alternative to truck traffic.

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2 Other non-zoning commitments secured by the 3 Council include a budget commitment to hire new DOB 4 staff positions to launch proactive enforcement, four new employees and an afterhours team for the Office of Nightlife to ensure establishments comply with 6 7 laws and rules and boost in enforcement against unlicensed d smoke shops. I want to thank all of the 8 council members who have worked tirelessly on the modifications to the citywide text amendment and got 10 it to the finish line, including Council Member 11 12 Rafael Salamanca, Council Member Riley, Council Member Gutiérrez, and Council Member Avilas. 13

I also want to thank our entire Planning and Land
Use Division led by Perris Straughter for your
technical expertise (APPLAUSE) and your dedication to
this council. They have spent countless hours
visiting community boards and neighborhoods, talking
to our constituents, and hearing their concerns
including many, many late nights and working all
hours of the day. I especially want to once again
thank Perris Straughter, Brian Paul, Chelsea Kelly,
Ann McCoy, William Vidal, Arthur Huh, Andrew Lasseter
-- who has the nerve... who is departing the Council
after 5 years of service! Andrew, we thank you for

2 all of your hard work and wish you the very best in 3 your next chapter. (APPLAUSE)

2 of the New York city fire department employed as fire

protection inspectors.

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SLR 13 in relation to owner liability for failure of an operator to comply with street cleaning parking rules; to amend the public officers law, in relation to access to records prepared pursuant to street cleaning parking rules.

obstacles they face the designated agency or office
would report to the council the results of the survey
and provide recommended policies and Investments to
support the economic well-being and success of

Introduction 85-A, also sponsored by Council
Member Rivera, would require a designated mayoral
office or city agency to develop a health survey of
migrants' long-term health needs, chronic conditions,
and health care access needs. The designated agency
or office would report to the Council the results of
the survey and provide recommendations to identify
and anticipate the health needs of migrants residing
in New York City. Thank you to our staff members
Nicole Kata and Rebecca Barilla.

Next we will be voting on a package of legislation to improve work places and promotional opportunities in the municipal workforce.

In April, the Council released its 2024 Pay
Disparities Report, which found that persistent
gender and racial wage gaps in the municipal
workforce are largely the result of women of color
being paid less given their concentration in job

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titles that consistently provide lower wages. These bills seek to address these gender and racial wage gaps by increasing access to opportunities.

Resolution 306-A, sponsored by Council Member

Carmen De La Rosa, calling on the Department of

Citywide Administrative Services or DCAS to grant

additional points on promotional exams to examinees

who have completed the agency's Executive Development

and Management and Supervision trainings, or to

examinees who have earned a degree or certificate

from the City University of New York, or a similarly

accredited institution. Thank you to our staff member

Introduction 767-A, sponsored by Council Member Crystal Hudson, would require DCAS to create a Workplace Culture Survey to be completed by municipal employees every other year on an anonymous and voluntary basis. The survey would ask employees about their opinions on their agency's workplace culture, management practices, likelihood of departing the agency, and other equity related concerns. This bill would require the Commissioner of DCAS to submit a report on findings from the survey responses. This bill would also clarify that agencies' annual reports

on their efforts to remedy pay disparities and occupational segregation should include both internal and external outreach. We thank our staff members Rie Ogasawara and Elizabeth Arzt.

Introduction 809-A, sponsored by Council Member Carmen De La Rosa, would require DCAS to publish a report on its website every other year regarding DCAS's determination of promotional exam applicant eligibility. In particular, the bill would require the commissioner to report on the factors considered when making determinations to fill municipal vacancies from pools of direct line employees or to expand eligibility to collateral line employees or comparable position employees. Thank you once again to our staff members Rie Ogasawara, Elizabeth Arzt, and Nicholas Connel.

And Introduction 743-A, sponsored by Council

Member Carmen De La Rosa, would require municipal

agencies in coordination with DCAS to offer career

counseling to eligible municipal employees and advise

them of career advancement processes and

opportunities. This bill would also require agencies

to conduct outreach to eligible employees regarding

career counseling services and for DCAS to create

written materials to provide guidance. Furthermore,

this bill would require DCAS to submit a report

4 regarding municipal employees utilization of career

5 counseling services and summarize the feedback the

agency has received. We thank again our staffers Rie

Ogasawara and Elizabeth Artz.

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Finally, we will be voting on Introduction 908-A, my bill, to require Council advice and consent as part of the appointment process for 20 City agency commissioners adding to those already required to undergo this step. There's been a lot of public conversation about this legislation, and I want to be clear that advice and consent is not a new concept -including for this very legislative body. Several positions have required advice and cons consent of the Council for decades. Since the beginning of this administration in 2022, the Council has approved more than 35 of its nominees for appointment without issue. Advice and consent was established by the founders of our democracy as a safeguard to protect the public interest in the appointment of top government positions from the interest of individuals. It is used in many of the nation's largest municipalities, our state governments

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including our own and the federal government. Advice and consent works, and we already have a process in place that this legislation currently builds on. Contrary to what some have claimed, this legislation does not usurp the Mayor's power to appoint commissioners and top city officials -- and at no point would the Council be able to choose its own nominees to lead agencies. Introduction 908-A adds transparency and democratic accountability by requiring a confirmation process that, again, already happens with dozens of positions. Advice and consent moves the appointment process out of the shadows, allowing greater transparency and public engagement. It's good government and can be beneficial for nominees by providing an opportunity for them to demonstrate their qualifications, hear about the range of issues they will confront, and build positive relationships with the Council and the public they are serving.

I'd also like to address the questions that have been raised about timing and whether this bill would slow down the process based on the schedule of a few council members or leave an agency without leadership. That's just not true. The process

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contains guard rails to ensure Council action within 30 days of receiving an appointment. If there is a vacancy, the first deputy or a designate of the Mayor, would serve in an acting capacity, which, once again, is the current process. The City's Law Department currently has a highly qualified acting corporation counsel who knows the Department as well as anyone. The current FDNY commissioner served as an acting commissioner until she was appointed in October of 2022. We're talking about adding 20 city agency commissioners out of more than 80 such commissioner-level positions. That's a fraction of the positions that could be subjected to advice and consent, so this is rather incremental.

The reality is that the Administration does not make all of its appointments at the same time, or even within the same week, or the same month. The Council has the flexibility to work in accordance with the scheduled need for appointments just as we have already done.

Ultimately, advice and consent promotes a good governance by ensuring a focus on qualifications and identifying any conflicts of interest or ethical issues on the front end to be resolved -- which often

happens now. It incentivizes the nomination of qualified appointees who are accountable to New Yorkers and the public interest, not political

loyalty or patronage.

Advice and consent is a safeguard against a

Tammany Hall-like environment where commissioner

positions are doled out simply because of their

political allegiance to one person or another or to

pursue some other interest beyond the public's -- as

Susan Lerner from the Common Cause outlined in her

testimony on this bill.

We want to strengthen our city government, strengthen our representative democracy, and ensure that our city agencies are led by dedicated and highly qualified public servants to fulfill their responsibilities to every New Yorker. That is what this bill is about, and that is why we are advancing it today. We'd like to thank our staff members David Seitzer, Jayasri Ganapathy, and Erica Cohen.

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## NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING

I'd like us to take a moment of silence in recognition of the 80th anniversary of D-Day and those that served for us.

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MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you.

We will now move into the Discussion of General Orders, and I'd like to recognize Council Member Gennaro, followed by Brewer, then Nurse.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARO: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader, thank you for that moment of silence about D-Day.

I wish to be associated with the remarks of Speaker Adams on Intro 908-A. She hit all the points. I perhaps have a... I just want to give a little bit of history on this. I go back to the Council when it was under the thumb of the Board of Estimate when the legislative leader was the called the vice chair, and we've moved into a new era. And for the many years that I've been with the Council, uh, you know, various speakers have sought to advance the influence of the Body so that we could better do our jobs along excellence, which is what this does. It is human nature as a mayor to try to ,you know, a lot of factors go into making appointments, certainly any

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mayor would value loyalty; a mayor would value some kind of outreach to a certain constituency; many, many factors go into it. But, at the end of the day, the person who is going... any person who leads an agency has to be able... has to have competence, has to be able to do that, that has to be number one. And any mayor making an appointment that is going to be subject to advice and consent, uh, would certainly lead the mayor to knowing that the appointment was going to be subject to all kinds of daylight, uh would , you know, move the Mayor to act along lines of excellence in that department. This concept goes all the way back to the Federalist Papers. I used to teach American State and Local Government at Queens College for many years. I entirely support this, and I would kind of be remiss if I didn't make reference to the response of the Administration and high ranking surrogates who have hurled insults and invoking Tammany Hall, talking about our work ethic, when all we're trying to do, all the Speaker is trying to do, (TIMER CHIMES) all this body is trying to do is move the Council forward along lines of excellence with regard to our oversight duties. Thank you very much.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Council Member Brewer,
followed by Council Member Nurse, then Council Member
Rivera.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much.

I do also want to support the Speaker on 908-A advice and consent. What [Council Member Gennaro] said is articulate and correct as far as I'm concerned.

I do want to mention that, because I have some national exposure with the League of Cities, I spoke to members of the city council in Los Angeles and in Chicago -- no problems whatsoever.

In Los Angeles, they do as we suggested, uh, 99 percent of the nominations from the mayor are accepted. But, they do, as we do, an extra effort in terms of background checks. In one situation where there was a harbor commissioner nominated, they found out that his wife was a longshore woman in Los Angeles and moved her to Long Beach. And in the discussions of a new fire commissioner -- in Spanish -- he used words that are not appropriate, and his nomination was discontinued.

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So, it's an issue where you have extra, uh, I would say support for public scrutiny, and you will end up with the best.

In Chicago, 51 members, just like here, the member who was nominated to go to the to the committee and then to the full board, all of the nominations for commissioner are extended to this process except inspector general and procurement officer — they're contractual. But, not just a percentage, everyone goes through the process and it has been successful. In one case, it was delayed because there was concern by the Council on a MBWE background in terms of what somebody had done as a nominee. It was discussed with the members of the city council, and 30 days later it was passed. Not a problem.

I want to just mention City of Yes Zoning for Economic Opportunity. I will vote yes for it. I know there's a lot of work that has gone into it, but I still think there are some concerns about vacancy. I still worry that you cannot, in my opinion, no matter how many floors are in (INAUDIBLE) (TIMER CHIMES) put commercial over residential. I worry about that, and I also worry that we'll have enough staff to do some

NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING of the night life. Uh, people tend to need (INAUDIBLE)... (CROSS-TALK)

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MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Council Member, your time has expired...

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: (INAUDIBLE) All right. I will just mention dark stores are not last-miles. I do not want them included, thank you very much.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: I'd like to recognize

Council Member Nurse, followed Council Member Rivera.

COUNCIL MEMBER NURSE: Thank you, Majority Leader.

Good afternoon, colleagues, I just want to also express support for Intro 908-A led by Speaker Adams.

As someone who really cares about good governance, for me this bill addresses what I think is a fundamental flaw in our local government, which I think is a concentration of executive power. And despite being the largest municipality in the country, this system allows our country's largest city to be heavily governed by a single personality. When that executive wills it, they can hamper and undermine the cooperation required for the City Council to effectively deliver results for New Yorkers. I think democracy requires collaboration, and more than ever, I think we need a functioning

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laws, and these are these responsibilities are quite enormous and affect the lives of millions. And I think it's therefore more than reasonable for New

York City to join other municipalities in requiring

thousands of staff, they are executing our city's

work extremely hard every day to serve our city, but

they are in charge of huge sums of money; they manage

greater democratic input on mayoral appointees.

So, I think advice and consent will advance better public officials, but also limit the common threads of fraud, corruption, and political favoritism that have plaqued our city for generations. So, I will proudly be voting for this legislation, which I know will make this city and government more effective, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you. Next up Council Member Rivera, followed by Council Member Cabán.

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COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you so much, Madame Majority Leader. I also want to express my support for Intro 908. I thought the Speaker summed up our position as a body very eloquently, and it is time.

I would also like to speak briefly on three of my proposals before the Council today and ask for everyone's support. I want to thank Speaker Adams and Chair Avilas for their support, groups like Aid for Life and the New York Immigration Coalition for their partnership in crafting these bills into colleagues and organizations who have submitted testimony in support. (BACKGROUND NOISE) We're in an era of global displacement, and the number of individuals and families seeking asylum in the United States has risen significantly in recent years. We are seeing that firsthand here in New York City. With more than 65,000 individuals seeking asylum currently in the care of the City, elected leadership must be more proactive in providing opportunities for people to transition out of the shelter system and into more permanent living situations. Today I request support on Intros 84 and 85 that will lay the groundwork for a more effective humanitarian response going forward. In speaking with community organizers, I've learned

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that we must accumulate data to understand how the City has supported work permit applications, entrepreneurship, workforce development initiatives, and access to healthcare in order to identify the gaps in our efforts. And these bills would require that the Administration conduct workforce and healthcare related surveys for asylum seekers.

Additionally, I request support for Resolution 340 calling on the US Citizenship and Immigration Services, the USCIS, to eliminate filing fees for Humanitarian Benefit applications and subsequent Employment Authorization applications. It is so important that we remove financial barriers that could force individuals to enter an underground economy that increases their risk of labor exploitation or harm. Our immigrant communities are an important part of our city's legacy, and these bills are a thoughtful investment in a better future for all families. Thank you to the staff for helping to make this happen (TIMER CHIMES) and to all the advocates for their assistance and support, thank you.

As was mentioned by Council Member Brewer, a different national organization, but as a member of Local Progress, a membership organization of progressive municipal electeds across the country, I too reached out to colleagues in different cities, and it's very clear that New York City is a bit of an outlier in terms of just how executive heavy the powers lie in our municipal and state governments. But, obviously we're talking municipal here, and ,you know, this is important for the reasons that my colleague said, It isn't about one mayor, it isn't about a current mayor, it is about good government today, tomorrow, and for decades in the future. Although, I will say that this particular mayor gives us the best example

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of why advice and consent is so important. Because we've seen a series and a pattern of patronage of folks that don't necessarily have the kind of experience, that not just we would like to see, but our constituents are demanding to see in a lot of these positions. So, really proud to support it, and

COUNCIL MEMBER AVILAS: Thank you so much.

I want to thank Speaker Adams, my colleagues, as well as the Planning and Land Use Division for diligent efforts to work on modifications to address concerns regarding the City of Yes proposals. I am particularly proud to have supported measures that curtail proposals which would have placed commercial uses in conflict with homeowners and tenants alike. However, the feedback I have received from my constituents indicates that these modifications, while a step in the right direction, do not go far enough. My concerns remain centered on the potential for increased conflicts between residential and commercial spaces, particularly in areas in my district where noise complaints and other undesirable uses are already a constant battle. In addition, we

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still lack a firm commitment from the Administration to retroactively resolve some of these issues that may be impacted by some of these text amendment proposals. Therefore, I vote age on all, except LUs 55, 56, and the accompanying resolutions, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER MARMORATO: I vote age on all with the exception of LUs 55, 56, and the accompanying resolutions, for which I am a no.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Permission granted.

COUNCIL MEMBER MARTE: Zoning is one of the most powerful tools to ensure what gets built in this city, it is for our communities and not at the expense of them. This principle informed my critique of the City of Yes for Economic Opportunity. How we modernize our zoning code, and what we incentivize in our commercial spaces should answer the decade long commercial vacancy crisis and work towards a more livable and affordable city. Thankfully we've worked in the City Council to make some essential modifications to the Mayor's proposal to strengthen

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protection for quality of life for residents that
live in commercial areas and help our small
businesses thrive. One of the most critical changes
we advocated for was ensuring that new businesses
that want to open up in NYCHA campuses serve the
community needs instead of targeting them. We also
make sure that tenants who live in mixed commercial
and residential buildings are protected from
displacement by stopping residential to commercial
conversions. We distinguish between your neighborhood
bar that might have a karaoke night and a 300-person
music venue. We expanded noise and air quality
requirements to more businesses who work out of these
mixed use buildings. We've reigned in production
uses, so your neighborhood storefronts can continue
to provide goods and services you might actually want
on your block. We advocated for these changes to
protect our communities because they were only
accepted because our community spoke up for
themselves. I want to thank the community boards,
advocates, activists, small business groups,
resident associations, and everyone who faced this
text amendment head-on all 1,100 pages of it
who spoke up for the future of their community. I'm

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happy to see the progress we've made over the past six months, and as we move forward to the housing opportunity, I look forward to seeing the same passion for my constituents as we've seen thus far. I will make sure that you are heard loud and clear.

And finally, I want to thank Council Land Use Brian, William, Perris, and the whole team, uh, that made this possible, thank you, and I vote aye on all.

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I'm honored to speak on my resolution, Resolution 157, that marks today, June 6th, as D-Day Remembrance Day. I can't think of a more fitting way to remember this anniversary than voting on this resolution today. Eighty years ago, the D-Day operation of June 6, 1944 brought together the land, air, and sea forces of the allied armies in what became known as the largest amphibious invasion in military history. This successful operation ultimately led to the end of World War II and the liberation of Europe from Nazi Germany. As former president Barack Obama said in 2014, "Victory on D-Day dealt a significant blow to an ideology fueled by hatred." I honestly can't think of a better way to honor the legacy, courage, and sacrifice of our armed forces in having June 6 annually recognized as D-Day Remembrance Day in the city of New York. I urge my colleagues to join me in

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2 COUNCIL MEMBER RILEY: Thank you, Majority Leader.

I am proud to introduce two pieces of legislation today, one vital to sustain in our city's housing market for homeowners and lawful tenants, and the second to monitoring and reporting on afterschool programs in New York City. Alongside Council Member Zhuang, we are introducing legislation that amplifies advocacy to address citywide issues affecting homeowners.

Resolution 458 calling on the New York State

Legislature to pass S.8995/A.9897, proposed by

Senator Spanton, which would exclude squatters from

tenant protections, extend the period for tenancy

rights from 30 days to 60 days of possession, and add

squatting to the definition of criminal trespass in

the third degree.

With support from colleagues, this legislation is a pivotal step toward clarifying New York State squatting laws and fortifying housing stability for more New Yorkers.

Equally important, we must turn our attention to enhancing our network of support, development, and essential services for our students that extend beyond their academic learning with their school

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2 curriculum. Afterschool Program is crucial for our

3 students, especially those in underserved

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4 communities, as it provides expanded academic

5 support, enrichment activities, and a safe

6 environment helping to bridge the opportunity gap and

7 promote overall well-being and success.

My bill, Introduction 955, which I cosponsored with Council Member Hanks, will require the DOE and DYCD to provide the publicly post annual reports on afterschool programs including location, available, seats, enrollment, student demographic data, and attendance for each afterschool program offered in the previous school year. I hope my colleagues could support me in this effort.

And I just want to shoutout my foster youth child who is with me today, and she's with her baby, thank you, everyone.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you. I want to remind everyone in the Chamber that business is still being conducted, and we need silence.

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Your perspective is essential, and your participation in local government is critical.

I want to give a special shoutout to my foster shadow person, who was Narita (sp?), who was amazing, and who does not want to be a council member, but wants to be a chief of staff, because she knows where the real work is happening. So, shoutout to her. And a special shoutout to Chyna (sp?), who was my colleague's young person today, who came in with a list of legislation and ideas that she is going to make sure I push forward -- me and my colleagues -push forward, because she came in ready and part of the conversation. I also want to say that right after Stated, BLAC and myself will be hosting a conversation with the young people. So, please come to the Committee Room and have a conversation and say hello to the young people, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: I would like to recognize Council Member Brewer, followed by Council Member Avilas.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much.

I want to also say a shoutout to young people, and I certainly want to thank Sean (sp?) who was here, Sean, stand up, stand up. He's here, foster

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care BMCC student and also part of ASAP, which is my favorite program at CUNY, thank you very much, Sean for being here today.

I also want to congratulate Alfredo Avila (sp?) who is an intern this summer. He is a recent graduate of John Jay High School, and he's heading to Cornell University in the fall. Alfredo, please stand up, and Keenan (sp?) Freid who is a rising junior at the University of Rochester. and I hope as time goes on, I was the one that initiated the bill to get young people, 16 years old, on community boards. I hope everybody nominates people who are 16 to be on community boards. And I would like to see, as time goes on, it has to go to the State also 16 year olds being able to vote in municipal elections. Thank you very much.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Council Member Avilas, followed Council Member Mealy.

COUNCIL MEMBER AVILAS: Thank you, Majority Leader.

So, a shoutout to Council Member Stevens and her organizing of today's Shadow Day. And also a special shoutout to my shadow person, Maria, who is doing

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great work, and I'm so happy to have her with us today.

Today we're introducing another bill aimed at increasing transparency from the EDC. Intro 937 builds on the work we've been doing -- in conjunction with the community of Red Hook -- over the past year since the announcement of the massive cruise liner operation in our small community overburden with traffic and pollution. It calls on the EDC to publish the data related to shore power plug-in, which as of the summer, is mandated. If a cruise ship did not plug in, why didn't it plug in? This data will give us critical information about the state of our infrastructure or just plain old non-compliance. I urge you all to sign on to this as we look forward to meeting the target set forth in the CLCPA, thank you so much, colleagues.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you. Seeing no other members signed up to speak that are in... Okay, recognizing Council Member Brooks-Powers.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you.

I'm proud to introduce a bill today that will make life easier for drivers and riders of commuter vans in New York City -- Introduction 939. Outer

borough residents rely on commuter vans to plug
critical gaps in transit desert communities. Our
commuter vans and their drivers have long provided
reliable affordable options to communities like
Southeast Queens which lack access to the City's core
transit network. Last year, this body passed a
resolution to support legislation that would allow
commuter vans to accept hails from prospective
passengers on the street, a practice which is
currently banned. I am pleased to now introduce this
legislation within the Council to allow street-hails
for commuter vans. This will not only protect drivers
but also ensure easier access for riders. For too
long, outer borough communities of color and low-
income communities have not received their fair share
of the City's investment and attention in
transportation. This bill will play a small role in
helping outer borough residents get better access to
critical transportation. I look forward to continuing
to work in the Committee on Transportation and
Infrastructure and with my colleagues to address
these key concerns for Transit desert communities. I
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urge my colleagues to support this bill, thank you.
