And we are mourning the death of Edgar Ordonez and NYPD recruit who sadly passed away at Rodman's Neck in Council Member Marmorato's district, just five days before his graduation from the academy and whose funeral was held this morning. Our hearts are filled with love for those who have lost loved ones during this very difficult time.

Yesterday marked the 10th anniversary of the killing of Eric Garner at the hands of police officers on Staten Island. This week I'm thinking about his mother, Gwen Carr, who I have come to know and love, and the entire family as well. Even though they have suffered even more loss over the years, they've spent the last decade fighting for accountability. The tragedy of Eric Garner's death sparked a movement across the city and the entire

country to demand a more just and equitable world, one where all communities are safe, which is what everyone deserves. It brought to light realities that many in our communities have long experienced and the need for greater transparency and accountability. And policing as key to true public safety. Eric Garner's legacy lives on in our struggles for accountability and justice, and on this 10th anniversary of his murder, we honor his memory and recommit to the work needed to secure safety for all New Yorkers.

July is Disability Pride Month, a time when we celebrate the history, contributions, and experiences of New Yorkers with disabilities. This month commemorates the signing of the Americans with Disabilities Act, historic legislation that promotes inclusivity and accessibility. Our Council has prioritized legislation and investments to support New Yorkers with disabilities, and we will continue to strengthen and expand these efforts.

historic landmark in Council Member Sanchez's district. The Old Croton Aqueduct Walk is a public walkway on top of the Old Croton Aqueduct, an engineering marvel built in 1842, which brought the first direct water supply to New York City. Upon its completion the 41-mile long aqueduct carried 45 million gallons of water daily to the City from a reservoir in Croton, New York. On April 27, 1940 after completing a substantial renovation, the Parks Department opened the Aqueduct Walk as an official public park and continues to maintain and upgrade the park to this day.

2118 Avenue U rezoning will facilitate the construction of a new four-story mixed used building; it will include approximately 10 housing units, including three affordable units and ground floor commercial retail space in Council Member Vernikov's district.

58-75 Queens Midtown Expressway Rezoning will facilitate the enlargement of a pre-existing development in Council Member Won's district.

27-24 College Point Boulevard Commercial Overlay
College Point Boulevard commercial overlay will
facilitate the development of a one-story commercial

COUNCIL MEMBER UNG: Thank you, Madam Speaker and Majority Leader. I'm proud to introduce legislation that will address the alarming increase in the number of squatters illegally occupying vacant homes across New York City. This is not just a nuisance, it's an infringement of the rights of property owners.

However, under current laws, property owners are often forced into a lengthy and costly legal battle in Housing Court to evict those illegal tenants.

During this time the squatters are allowed to remain in the homes, creating an untenable situation for those who legally own these properties.

Intro 997 will create a home vacancy program managed by the NYPD and offer a much needed layer protection. Property owners or their tenants will be able to register a home if they plan to be away for more than 21 days. This registry will serve as official notice that no one should be occupying the property during the specified period. This simple yet

effective measure will prevent the squatters from claiming to have a legal right to be in the property, thus eliminating the need for property owners to endure the time consuming, expensive process of pursuing legal action in Housing Court. By preempting such claims, we can ensure that homeowners are safequarded against violations of property rights. I want to thank my co-sponsor on Intro 997, Minority Leader Joseph Borelli, who understands that whether you're a democrat, republican, conservative or progressive New Yorkers have the right to secure and retain their property. Home ownership is a cornerstone of the American dream; this legislation is not about just about property rights, it's about justice and fairness for homeowners. I urge my fellow

Our right to protest is the underpinning of a democracy, and any effort to silence descent is fundamentally in opposition to our collective ideals.

Today I am proud to introduce Intro 992 aimed at enhancing transparency, accountability, and community involvement in our efforts to prevent gun violence

and promote overall safety in our neighborhoods. This
is so important to me. This bill will require that
the Mayor's Office for Neighborhood Safety and the
Prevention of Gun Violence publish detailed
information about service provider organizations
under the Crisis Management System. It ensures that
the criteria used for selecting these providers are
clearly explained and accessible to the public.
Additionally this legislation requires timely not
notifications to relevant council members, community
boards, and local NYPD precincts whenever a service
provider is selected or their contract is not
renewed. This will ensure that all stakeholders are
informed and can effectively collaborate with these
organizations. Finally, the bill calls for an annual
report on the progress made towards the goal set by
the Office and each service provider. This will help
us track our achievements, identify areas for
improvement, and maintain the highest standards of
accountability. I firmly believe that Inro 992
represents a crucial (TIMER CHIMES) step in our
ongoing commitment for making our city safer and
supporting the organization (CROSS-TALK)

justice, and he is sorely missed.

I am proud to be introducing Introduction 994 2 3 today. It has been hot this summer, like crazy hot. 4 And we need to do something about the fact that heat is number one climate killer. We need new regulatory and enforcement models that can actually ensure that 6 people are safe in the face of climate change. Here 8 in New York City 350 are dying each and every year from heat-related illnesses, and the majority of these people are dying in their homes. And not in a 10 11 single one of those homes can you find an air 12 conditioner. These are preventable deaths. Just a few 13 weeks ago on June 21st, 51 New Yorkers found 14 themselves in emergency rooms due to heat-related 15 illnesses. It is getting worse each and every year, 16 and just like we ask landlords to provide heat in the winter, we need our landlord to provide cooling in 17 the summer. And that is what Intro 994 would 18 19 accomplish. This is a real solution to combat the 20 realities of climate change, and it is a piece of 21 legislation that is urgent. So, I hope that you will 2.2 join me in cosponsoring this legislation. I want to 2.3 Council Member Nurse, Council Member Joseph, Council Member Hudson, Council Member Ossé, and Council 24 Member Krishnan for already signing up as cosponsors, 25
