SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning. This is a Committee vote on the Committee of Governmental Operations, State and Federal Legislation.

At this time, we are ready to begin, Chair.

CHAIRPERSON RESTLER: Good morning. My name is Lincoln Restler, and I'm the Chair of the Committee on Governmental Operations, State and Federal Legislation.

I'd like to start off by thanking the terrific Members of our Committee who are joining us for today's vote, and all the members of the public who are here. I'd like to recognize Council Member Shahana Hanif, Council Member David Carr, Council Member Lynn Schulman, Council Member Gale Brewer, Council Member Jennifer Gutiérrez and, on Zoom, I believe we do have Council Member Jim Gennaro. Thank you for joining us all.

Today, we'll be voting on Speaker

Adrienne Adams' bill, Intro. 908-A, a bill that would

give the Council Advice and Consent Powers over 20

Agency Commissioners. In addition, we will be voting on seven State Legislative Resolutions, also known as Home Rules or SLRs, in support of various State legislation.

The updated version of Intro. 908-A bill subjects the Chair of the City Planning Commission to advice and consent just like all other members of the City Planning Commission who have been subject to advice and consent since 1989 and, upon further review of State law, the positions of Commissioner for Emergency Management and Veterans Affairs were removed from this bill. In big cities across the country, like Chicago, Los Angeles, Houston, Phoenix, in our New York State government, in the federal government, appointments are overwhelmingly subject to advice and consent and confirmation by their respective legislators. New York City is the anomaly. The Speaker's bill will establish checks and balances and help ensure that more experienced, more competent, more ethical leaders are serving in these critically important positions, like Parks, Sanitation, and DCAS. The idea of advice and consent goes back to what we learn in grade school. It's

about checks and balances and the simple idea of making sure that each branch of government has oversight over the other. A public hearing would be held by the Council to require the Mayor's appointees to demonstrate, both to this Body and to the public, that they are deeply knowledgeable about their agency and equipped to serve in these critically important leadership positions. If the Mayor is nominating qualified professionals to head these 20 agencies, then he or she should have no problem getting consent and approval from the Council. New Yorkers deserve to have the best and the brightest in these key roles in city government. Advice and consent of the Council will help make that happen. I cannot recall a previous Mayoral Administration giving testimony at a Council hearing and then refusing to take questions. This Administration has also made disingenuous arguments about the substance and spirit of the bill that I would like to correct on the record. Firstly, this legislation will give the Council just 30 days, 30 days, to review the background of a nominee, hold a public hearing, and vote, or the nominee is automatically confirmed. I found the comparison of this City Council to Tammany Hall to be extra rich

coming from this Administration. This legislation would require more intense vetting, more public scrutiny, more transparency, and indeed prevent political patronage appointments from ever happening.

I'd also like to highlight two of the Home Rule Messages that we're passing today that will improve our street safety and cleanliness. One is a Home Rule Message in support of legislation proposed by State Senator Andrew Gounardes and Assembly Member Jeffrey Dinowitz to extend and expand New York City's red light camera program. This legislation would quadruple the number of intersections where trafficcontrolled signal photo violation monitoring systems may be installed and operated from 150 intersections to 600, establishing our New York City program as the largest in the nation. Over the past 30 years of this program's existence in New York City, there has been a 73 percent decline in average daily violations per camera, meaning drivers are safer and run less red lights. In 2023 alone, 29 people were killed in redlight-running crashes, the highest number ever recorded. Installing more red light cameras will quite simply save lives.
