16	I want to start by addressing what we've all been
17	forced to confront these last six months, the immense
18	harm coming from the Trump administration in
19	Washington D.C., whether it is how ICE is spreading
20	fear and undermining safety in our city and cities
21	across the nation, or the bills in the Trump-led
22	Congress that are threatening hardworking New Yorkers
23	and Americans. There's been a consistent attempt by
24	Trump to distract us, but we need to be clear about
25	what we're facing. Trump and his allies in Congress
l	

1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 20 2 are currently advancing budget cuts that will hurt 3 our families. They are proposing to take healthcare 4 away from 1.5 million New Yorkers by cutting Medicaid, and are even discussing additional cuts to 5 Medicare for our older adults. Their "Big Ugly Bill" 6 7 would steal critical food aid off of the plates of over one million New Yorkers, taking food out of the 8 9 mouths of over 360,000 children. This is all happening as hardworking people in our city and 10 11 country are struggling with the cost of living. Yet, 12 Trump's reckless decisions are making basic goods 13 more expensive and slowing our economy. Trump's 14 administration doesn't care about Americans or public 15 safety; they've even harmed 9/11 survivors. Recently, the same Department of Justice that attacked our 16 17 city, terminated \$811 million in grants for crime 18 victim services, funding for the police, and other 19 key programs that keep people across the country and 20 our own city safe. Let's be clear, our own federal 21 government is attacking the everyday people of our 2.2 country. Trump is taking away our food, our health, 23 and our safety. This isn't what we, or our neighbors across the country, expect from our federal 24 government, and it's certainly not what any of us 25

1NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING212deserves. It's not what our elders deserve, it's not3what crime victims deserve, and it's not what our4children deserve, and certainly it's not public5service, because it's not serving any American or any6of us.

June 19th is Juneteenth, which commemorates the day in 1865 when people who were enslaved in NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING
 Galveston, Texas, finally received news of their
 emancipation.

June is Black Music Appreciation Month, when we honor the widespread contributions of Black musicians, whether it's gospel music, jazz, soul, house, or Hip-hop, Black musicians have created entire cultures and industries celebrated throughout the world.

June is also Caribbean American Heritage Month, when we celebrate our Caribbean American communities for their many contributions to our city and country. Throughout June, we are also observing Gun Violence Awareness Month to acknowledge the crisis of gun violence. As a Council, we're committed to making

16 our city safer and bringing an end to gun violence.

And June is Pride Month, and this Council is always committed to uplifting and supporting LGBTQIA+ New Yorkers. Happy Pride!

Since their inception in 1988, the Vollies have responded to our community's emergencies 8 9 and trained generations of volunteer emergency medical services members from Bed-Stuy and nearby 10 11 Brooklyn neighborhoods. Due to these efforts, Vollies 12 have decreased ambulance response time in Bed-Stuy 13 from an average of 30 minutes to an average of four 14 minutes today. I'm proud to support the Home Rule to 15 authorize the conveyance of 727 Greene Avenue, in 16 Brooklyn, from the City to the Bedford-Stuyvesant 17 Volunteer Ambulance Corps, at no cost. This will 18 allow The Vollies to have a stable, permanent home to 19 ensure they can remain in Bed-Stuy for years to come, 20 even in the midst of gentrification. 21 I urge all my colleagues to vote 'yes' on 2.2 Reconsidered SLR 16, and I also want to acknowledge 23 that the Bed-Stuy Vollies are here with us this afternoon. Thank you 24 25 (PAUSE)

Intro 573-A, I don't think that New Yorkers should have to purchase a single-use 8 9 bottle of water, because there's no public option available. This intro increases the number of durable 10 11 and permanent drinking fountains at park entrances citywide. They have to be within 100 feet of an 12 13 entrance.

We have great water in New York, thanks to DEP and others, but it's one thing to have the resource and another to have access to the resource.

17 My interest in this topic of free access to 18 drinking water started with Richard Murphy, who was 19 Commissioner of Youth Services during the Dinkins 20 administration, which I was proud to serve in. One of his big, practical ideas was giving every public 21 school student a refillable water bottle. And I still 2.2 23 want to do that. The problem was, and still is, that we need water fountains to fill them. People want 24 them. During the Participative Budgeting Cycle in our 25

NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 1 36 office, West Siders voted to allocate \$375,000 for 2 3 new water fountains in Riverside Park. We only get three for that, goodness knows they are expensive. 4 But we need this legislation to provide equity. 5 During a Park discussion at the City Council, we met 6 7 with some of the people who run the conservancies. It turned out that in one particular park, all the water 8 9 fountains are either dripping with small drips or do not work. 10

We need this bill to ensure that we have the 11 ability to increase the number of permanent drinking 12 13 fountains at park entrances. Thank you very much. 14 And I want to thank, by the way, Council Member 15 Krishnan, and also the people who worked on it for my office, Shulamit Puder, and Cynthia Hornig, as well 16 17 as the people from the Speaker's Office mentioned by 18 the Speaker. Thank you very much.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Now recognizing Council Member Rivera, followed by Council Member Hanif, and Majority Whip Brooks-Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: I am pleased to support two Article V Tax Exemptions, which we are voting on today, one in Kips Bay and one in the Lower East Side. Together, these exemptions will preserve 396

1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 37 2 apartments, uh, affordable homes available for people 3 making 50% of the area median income or less through 4 the project-based Section Mark-up-to-Market program. 5 These Article V Tax Exemptions will support families and seniors in stable housing and provide 6 7 for the property owners to make necessary upgrades for accessibility and improved quality of life. 8 9 Why these two are particularly important to me is that one is for our elderly community, and 10 11 particularly those with disabilities, called the 12 Renwick Gardens on East 29th Street. The other is a 172 project-based Section 8 building called 210 13 14 Stanton Street, where I spent the first approximately 15 30 years of my life. 16 These preservation opportunities are one of the 17 tools we have to address our housing shortage, and of 18 the multiple tax exemptions I have passed, knowing my 19 childhood home will be around and improved means a 20 lot. 21 I urge everyone to vote yes. 13 Nothing we do can bring these New Yorkers back, but
14 I'm glad that we are taking real steps to save lives
15 moving forward.

16 If passed, this bill will require the Department 17 of Corrections to do the following: Administer Narcan 18 training to all uniform staff, make training 19 available to incarcerated people, stock Narcan in all 20 housing units, verify that Narcan is properly stocked 21 on a weekly basis, provide annual reporting on training and the administration of Narcan, and make 2.2 23 opioid overdose kits available to those being discharged from jail into the community. 24

16 I'm not opposed to casinos, I have one that is 17 great in my district and has been a great corporate 18 neighbor. But Ballies has not been that. From the 19 very start, they have not operated in good faith. 20 They haven't made real attempts to sit down with the 21 local Council Member to address her community's very 2.2 real concerns, or to even respond to her very 23 reasonable requests. Now they're asking for your approval to take away park land so they can build 24 their casino on it. They're trying to justify this by 25

 taking away public land from a community and giving
 it to a private corporation is not a member deference
 Issue, what is it?

6 Let's remember, this was not going to happen

The votes to pass this Home Rule simply weren't 10 11 there. 16 So this is why today we are voting on our 17 Resolution 896, which will recognize June 25th as the 18 75th Anniversary of the Korean War and recognize this 19 day annually as Korean War Remembrance Day in New 20 York City.

The Korean War is a devastating memory that still affects many American veterans, Korean natives, and immigrants. Two and a half million people lost their lives, and many had their livelihoods taken away. Negotiations ended the war in 1954, but tensions 1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 46 2 continued to exist between the two Koreas. So this 3 Remembrance Day is honoring those who served and sacrificed their lives for the well-being of our 4 country, and the innocent lives that were tragically 5 lost in this conflict. If it weren't for U.S. 6 7 intervention, I probably wouldn't be sitting here 8 with you today.

9 We continue to hold hope that this Resolution 10 will ease further tensions and establish a lasting 11 peace. As a Korean immigrant, I know firsthand the 12 significance of never forgetting, so that we can 13 continue to put in the work for the future of our 14 lives, as well as that of our children.

I give and I give my deepest condolences to everyone who has lost a loved one to this fight. I thank everyone who has served in the Korean War, and I thank all veterans for risking their lives for the sake of our nation's protection.

I would like to thank my colleagues for supporting this resolution, as well as Senior Legislative Policy Analyst Regina Paul, for assisting and writing this resolution, and Committee on Veterans' Chair, Bob Holden, for his support. This isn't just a bad proposal; it's been a 10 11 disgraceful process. The people of District 13 have been ignored from the very beginning. Instead of 12 13 working with me, the person chosen to represent this 14 community, the sponsors of this deal actively worked 15 around me. And let's call it what it is, outside interference. And that's absolutely unacceptable. 16

17 I was not elected to serve the Mayor, lobbyists, 18 unions, or developers. I was elected to serve my 19 constituents, and they've made it clear: they do not want this casino in our district. 20

21 This proposal brings no investment, no infrastructure, and no respect for the people who 2.2 23 actually live in the district. It does everything from outside interests and nothing for my 24 neighborhood. Let's be honest, this was never about 25

18 This action will bring up to 4,000 new homes to 19 the site, one of the most significant expansions of 20 Manhattan's housing stock in a generation. In a city where the housing crisis is displacing residents in 21 every neighborhood, of every borough, this kind of 2.2 23 housing production is exactly what we need. We cannot fight displacement and bring down rents if we are not 24 building significantly more housing. 25

21	have the backs of our unions, our organizers, and our

8 In March, Ábrego García was deported to El 9 Salvador's infamous mega prison, despite a 2019 court 10 order barring his deportation due to a legitimized 11 risk of persecution.

Trump's racist, xenophobic immigration 12 13 enforcement has one defining feature and that is 14 skipping due process. When our country ignores due 15 process, it threatens us all. The Constitution is 16 clear that no person shall be deprived of life, 17 liberty, or property without due process of law. It 18 doesn't qualify these rights based on where you were 19 born, your immigration status, the color of your 20 skin, what language you speak, or your political 21 beliefs. This right is non-negotiable and one of the 2.2 only things keeping our country from sliding into a 23 dangerous space. It is the only thing protecting any of us from being arbitrarily thrown in prison or 24 deported. 25

2	So when we fight our for our immigrant
3	communities, we are fighting for ourselves. That's

Amidst the GOP's attacks on family-building care like IVF, it's critical that New Yorkers know what

Thanks to our 3 partners in Albany, many services are available for free or low cost to families covered by private 4 insurance or Medicaid. That's why I worked with groups like Planned 8 9 Parenthood, the Center for Reproductive Rights, and the American Society for Reproductive Medicine on 10 11 this legislation.

12 I'm also proud to be introducing Introduction 304 to improve bicycle safety alongside 13 14 Transportation Chair Brooks-Powers, and Council 15 Members Brewer and Restler. I love the City Bike System, it's a vital part of our transportation 16 17 network but we need to ensure users ride safely, 18 especially first-time riders and those using E-bikes. 19 This bill would require city bike users to review the rules of the road before their first ride and would 20 mandate that traffic safety information be clearly 21 2.2 displayed both on the app and at docking stations. 23 I want to thank the Good Neighbors of Park Slope

24 in my district for their partnership in shaping this

Thank you MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Now recognizing Council 4 Member Mealy, followed by Minority Leader Ariola, 5 then Council Member Menin. 6 7 COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: (NO RESPONSE) MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Recognizing Minority 8 9 Leader Ariola. MINORITY LEADER ARIOLA: Thank you, Majority 10 11 Leader. 12 Today, I'm introducing a Local Law to amend the administrative code of the city of New York, in 13 14 relation to after action reports following emergency 15 declarations. When our city and state issue a state of 16 17 emergency, our city must be held accountable and be 18 required to produce an after action report detailing 19 the emergency response and suggestions to better 20 respond in future emergencies of the same nature. We went through the unimaginable with the COVID-21 19 pandemic, and we have never seen any details about 2.2 23 how decisions were made and why they were made. We have no detailed agency reports as to what 24 discussions were had regarding city workers who did 25

1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 85 2 not want to take a brand new vaccine, and what the 3 protocol was for reasonable accommodation requests that were being granted and denied. 4 New Yorkers deserve answers, and the City and 5 the Mayor need to be more transparent about actions 6 7 they take that are affecting lives. That is why I'm 8 urging you all to sign on to Intro 1300. Thank you 9 for the time. MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Now recognizing Council 10 11 Member Menin, followed by Council Member Stevens, and 12 Council Member Dinowitz. 13 COUNCIL MEMBER MENIN: Thank you. 14 Today, I'm introducing two bills to reform the 15 City's broken procurement practices that have lacked 16 vital checks and balances. An example of this broken 17 process is the Administration's recent \$432 million 18 emergency no-bid contract with DocGo for asylum 19 seekers that resulted in chronic food waste, 20 unlicensed security guards, and ultimately an investigation by the state Attorneys General. 21 My first bill, Introduction 1309, co-sponsored 2.2 23 with Council Member Won, requires that emergency contracts be limited to 30 days unless renewed by the 24 comptroller and corporation counsel. In addition, 25

NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING
 contracts would have to be sent within 15 days of
 execution to the comptroller for review.

4 Emergencies, by their very definition, are supposed to be short in duration. Our emergency 5 procurement process should reflect that and not allow 6 7 what was done during COVID, where, under Mayor de Blasio, over \$7 billion was spent on no-bid 8 9 contracts, where no-bid contracts were extended over a hundred times- or during this administration, what 10 11 happened with the asylum seeker crisis, and that is 12 honestly why over \$4 billion a year was spent per 13 year on the asylum seeker crisis, because of these no-bid contracts. 14

15 My second bill, Introduction 1310, addresses a loophole that allows some property owners to use 16 17 opaque subcontractors and make additional profits for 18 themselves. For example, David Leviton, (phonetic) a 19 landlord whose buildings are contracted by the City, 20 with not-for-profits to provide facilities for homeless shelters, has previously required not-for-21 profits to also subcontract with his own maintenance 2.2 23 and extermination companies. That is basically generating additional revenue for himself at the hand 24 of taxpayers without any oversight by the City. 25

NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 1 87 2 I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting 3 these two bills, which will finally provide proper 4 oversight and put an end to the prolonged emergency 5 no-bid contracting process. (TIMER) Thank you MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Now recognizing Council 6 7 Member Stevens, followed by Council Member Dinowitz, then Council Member Morano. 8 9 COUNCIL MEMBER STEVENS: Good afternoon, today I'm introducing Resolution 935, calling upon the City of 10 11 New York to recognize institutional and systemic racism and generations of harm embedded in today's 12 child protective services (CPS). This legislation is 13 14 a demand for acknowledging and accountability, as it 15 is time for us to have uncomfortable conversations, as the truth is necessary when it comes to bringing 16 change to address institutional and systematic 17 racism. 18 19 We cannot continue to ignore the undeniable data 20 that Black and Latino children make up nearly 90% of those ACS cases, despite no evidence that those 21 2.2 families face greater challenges than others. The 23 system, rooted in a long and painful history of anti-Blackness and state sanctions and family separation, 24 has inflicted generations of harm under the guise of 25

1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 2 protection. It is time we name this harm, recognize 3 the trauma, and commit ourselves to fundamental 4 transformation and a system change that often punishes poverty and criminalizes care. 5

I urge my colleagues to sign on today as we 6 7 dismantle a system that no longer serves our families and communities as a whole. It is our responsibility 8 9 as electives to reimagine what *true* safety, healing, and equality look like for our city. Thank you. 10

That 13 14 may sound technical or even reasonable, but it's a 15 disaster in practice. If you look at California, 16 there have been multiple elections where the general 17 election featured two Democrats and no Republican, or 18 two Republicans and no Democrats. And in cases where 19 sometimes it's two Republicans fighting to represent 20 a Democratic district or two Democrats fighting to represent a Republican district -- in one case, 60% of 21 voters in a district didn't have a candidate from 2.2 23 their party to vote for in the final round. That's not a democracy, it's a coin toss at a rigged casino. 24 We already have a better model right here in New 25

 York, which, in my view, is the way we currently run
 special elections: one round, nonpartisan. It's fair,
 it's simple, and every voter gets a real say.

5 There are still two public hearings left, one on Staten Island and one in Manhattan, and I urge all of 6 7 my colleagues to consider testifying or submitting written comments. Because if we sleepwalk into the 8 9 top two, the only ones who will be truly represented 10 are political consultants who may benefit from this 11 sort of system. Thank you, and again, happy 12 preemptive Flag Day.
