- Int 0001-2004** A Local Law to amend the New York city charter, in relation to amending the New York City Pro-Voter Law by mandating annual training for agencies, verbal assistance for the public and agency transmission of registration forms.
- Int 0496-2004** A Local Law to amend the administrative code of the city of New York, in relation to the composition of the Voter Assistance Commission.
- Int 0560-2005** A Local Law to amend the administrative code of the city of New York, in relation to the board of elections notifying city residents who voted by affidavit or paper ballot as to whether or not their vote was tallied, and if not, provide a reason.
- Int 0630-2005** A Local Law to amend the administrative code of the city of New York, in relation to creating civil penalties and a private right of action for false or fraudulent claims.
- Res 0019-2004** Resolution calling upon the New York State Legislature to amend the State Election Law to extend the right to vote to individuals who are currently serving parole.
- Res 0045-2004** Resolution urging the New York State Legislature to amend the election law in relation to adding the term “domestic partner” to the list of family members one may accompany outside of the election district and be eligible to receive an absentee ballot.

Res 0859-2005 Resolution urging the United States Congress to pass the Count Every Vote Act of 2005, introduced in the Senate by Senator Hillary Rodham Clinton and in the House by Representative Stephanie Tubbs Jones, a comprehensive package of pro-democracy, pro-voter legislation that contains the Civic Participation Act of 2005, a measure to restore voting rights in Federal elections to ex-offenders who have completed their sentences.
