At this time going forward, no one is to approach the dais. I repeat, no one is to approach the dais.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON HUDSON: Thank you. [GAVEL]
Good morning, everyone. I'm Council Member Crystal
Hudson, Chair of the Committee on Aging, and my
pronouns are she/her.

Today, the Committee is voting on the following legislation, which I've sponsored, Proposed Introduction Number 1025-A in relation to the provision of information regarding employment, discrimination, and older adult workforce programs; and Proposed Introduction Number 1053-A in relation

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2 to a study and report on the feasibility of creating 3 older adult information points.

We are joined today by Council Members Banks, Lee, Mealy, and Schulman.

Last week, I was proud to announce Age in Place 2.0. After working with groups like AARP, Live On New York, the Asian American Federation, members of the New York City Council, and other key stakeholders to identify issues facing older adults and brainstorm solutions, we advanced the Age in Place legislative package last session. We successfully passed seven of ten bills in that package, including laws to expand right to counsel to all older adults, require universal design in all City-funded housing, expand access to telemedicine and telehealth devices, and expand culturally appropriate programming at older adult centers.

With Age in Place 2.0, we're fighting for even more. Stronger interagency coordination to support older adults across issue areas, greater meal options, more tech support to adapt to technological developments, and policies to lay the groundwork for universal elder care across the five boroughs. The bills we are voting on today, Introductions 1025 and

2 1053, are critical components of Age in Place 2.0. 3 Intro 1025 would ensure that older adults receive 4 information and resources regarding employment and 5 volunteer opportunities as well as workforce program opportunities through NYC Aging. When older New 6 7 Yorkers want or need to work or when they simply want 8 to give back to their communities, we should provide them with the information and resources necessary to achieve their goals. Meanwhile, Intro. 1053 would 10 11 require NYC Aging to conduct a feasibility study regarding the creation of older adult information 12 13 points. Older adult information points would serve as 14 physical locations where older adults can receive 15 information concerning NYC Aging services and programming. We should strive to meet our older 16 17 adults where they are in the community, but we should 18 also think creatively about integrating the vital 19 services the City provides into everyday routines. 20 Older adult information points would allow older 21 adults in their surrounding circles to, for example, 2.2 learn about benefits administered through NYC Aging 2.3 on their way to the grocery store or coming home from a medical appointment. This legislation is an 24 exciting step towards expanding NYC Aging's footprint 25

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and reaching folks beyond the current network of
older adult centers and naturally occurring
retirement communities. I will keep fighting to
ensure that every older adult can age in place with
dignity, and the bills we are voting today as part of
the Age in Place 2.0 package will help move our city
in that direction.

A huge thank you to the advocates for their thought partnership on these initiatives. Thank you to the Members of the Aging Committee who have joined us today, and I'd also like to thank my Staff, Casie Addison and Andrew Wright, and Aging Committee Staff, Christopher Pepe, Chloë Rivera, Julia Haramis, and Saiyemul Hameed.
