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SERGEANT AT ARMS: Good morning, and welcome to today's New York City Council Committee Hearing for the Committee on Housing and Buildings. At this time, please silence all cell phones and electronic devices to minimize disruption throughout the hearing. Thank you for your cooperation Chair, we are ready to begin.

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10 CHAIRPERSON SANCHEZ: Thank you, Sergeant. Good 11 morning. I'm Councilmember Pierina Sanchez, Chair of 12 the Committee on Housing and Buildings, joined today 13 by my colleagues, Councilmember Hudson, Councilmember 14 Carr, Councilmember Avilés, Councilmember Restler, 15 Councilmember Dinowitz, and Councilmember Shaun 16 Abreu.

Today, we are voting on proposed Intro number 6A in relation to tenant education and outreach on residential vacate orders due to damaged caused by fires by Councilmember Avilés.

Displacement following a fire or structural problem in your home is one of the most disruptive experiences a family can have. Imagine: Running for your life, barely remembering to grab your shoes, probably insufficient clothing, and certainly not

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2	your wallet, or identifying information, only to
3	stand or sit on a sidewalk for hours, looking up, not
4	being sure what is next. This happens in our city
5	about 2,000 times per year. In New York City, we
6	thankfully have some processes designed to help New
7	Yorkers through these destabilizing times; gratitude,
8	of course, to our first responders who risk their
9	lives to pull us out of fires and emergency
10	conditions; the American Red Cross, who has a
11	contract with the housing Department of Housing
12	Preservation and Development, they visit fires and
13	other emergency sites to help residents with
14	emergency shelters and provisions in certain
15	circumstances; and our agencies, from Emergency
16	Management to The Department of Buildings, Housing
17	Preservation, and Fire again, who each play different
18	roles to ensure our buildings are safe and that there
19	is some degree of interagency coordination.
20	Yet for all that we have in New York City, we can
21	and we must do better. On dozens of occasions in my
22	own three years in office, I have visited fire sites
23	and I know my colleagues have as well, discovering
24	myriad issues, buildings that the Department of
25	Buildings or HPD did not issue a vacate order when

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2 they were supposed to, ARC was not notified and 3 residents were left in limbo.

And the displacement can be and often are longlasting. In the first four months of fiscal year 2024, the average length of stay for single adults in emergency housing shelters was 592 days (almost 2 years), the average length of stay for adult families was 464 days, and the average length of stay for families with children was 337 days.

11 Today, we are voting on proposed Intro number 6A, sponsored by Councilmember Avilés, which would 12 require HPD in consultation with DOB and FDNY to 13 14 develop procedures to ensure that occupants of 15 multiple dwellings are informed of the processes for 16 the issuance of residential vacate orders following 17 fires, and provide those residents with resources on 18 how to cope.

I am happy to work with my colleague in passing this important legislation, and urge all of my colleagues to vote Aye today along with my bill that is being heard in the Fire Committee, Intro 89, which will also increase the access to information about fires so that more individuals, more New Yorkers can have support following this destabilizing event. 1 COMMITTEE ON HOUSING AND BUILDINGS

2 Together, these bills are part of a joint effort to 3 make information more accessible to The Council and 4 to the public when there is a fire.

5 I will now call on Councilmember Avilés to speak6 on her legislation.

7 COUNCILMEMBER AVILÉS: Good morning, Thank you so much Chair Sanchez, and thank you to my colleagues 8 9 for all their work on this bill. And I just want to say-- thank the residents, and the important of 10 11 providing accessible information during emergency moments for our residents is so critical in language-12 13 accessible ways. Unfortunately, we do have a lot of 14 work to do to make sure that there is also 15 accountability. We have seen so many fires were 16 landlords have kind of not done -- not kept their end 17 of the bargain. This will help city agencies make 18 sure they are very explicit with the rights for 19 tenants, and give resources to tenants around where 20 they can access resources.

So, I want to thank everyone, including HPD staff who has been working on this, and I look forward to--Am I voting now? Not yet. Thank you. CHAIRPERSON SANCHEZ: Thank you so much, Councilmember Avilés, and congratulations.

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2	And with that, I will now ask the clerk to call
3	the roll.

17	COMMITTEE CLERK: Hudson?
18	COUNCILMEMBER HUDSON: Aye, and congratulations,
19	Councilmember Avilés.
20	COMMITTEE CLERK: Restler?
21	COUNCILMEMBER RESTLER: Aye, and I also want to
22	congratulate Councilmember Avilés on another great
23	bill. It's like every day that we're doing another
24	great Alexa bill.
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2	COMMITTEE CLERK: With a vote of 6 in the
3	affirmative, 0 in the negative, and no abstentions,
4	the item has been adopted by the committee.
5	CHAIRPERSON SANCHEZ: I'd like to thank of all my
6	colleagues for attending today's hearing, and members
7	of the public. And with that, this vote is closed.
