Resolution Number 193, sponsored by Council

annually in the City of New York to recognize,

people and their contributions to school and
community life.

Resolution Number 508, also sponsored by Council Member Williams, which would designate October 10th

annually as Casey Benjamin Day in the city of New York and celebrate the genius of his music and his unique contributions to a variety of music genres.

Resolution number 518, sponsored by Council Member Selvena Brooks-Powers, our majority whip, which would declare October as Jamaican Heritage Month in New York City.

And a Preconsidered Resolution, sponsored by

which would celebrate the New York Liberty's winning

championship and declaring October 20th as New York

By designating October 10th as Casey Benjamin Day, we are not only honoring his memory, but also celebrating his lifelong contributions to music and to the cultural fabric of our city.

Today, I'm proud to stand before you as a daughter of Jamaican immigrants and request your support for Resolution 518, which formally designates October as Jamaican Heritage Month in New York City.

Jamaicans are a vital part of our city's fabric, especially in Southeast Queens where the influence of Jamaican culture through music, art, and innovation has had a profound impact on the community. Their contributions go far beyond the arts, touching areas like science, education, and entrepreneurship, making New York City stronger and more vibrant.

With Jamaicans representing 5.5% of the city's foreign born population and 2% of the total population particularly concentrated in Southeast Queens, Brooklyn, and the Bronx, the cultural and economic contributions of this community cannot be overstated.
