Reverend Karpen is a senior pastor, as you said, of St. Paul and St. Andrew, and has served this progressive congregation since 1984. He is a member

of Board #7, comprising of the Upper West Side of
Manhattan and co-chairs its Preservation Committee.

He currently serves on the New York Conference Board
of Ordained Ministry and on the Board of Directors of
West Side Campaign Against Hunger - this amazing
anti-hunger program trying to keep people fed in the
basement of the church. It has been there for many
years. It is not only feeding hundreds, and hundreds,
and hundreds of people every day, but also has social
workers with computers for accessing benefits. It's a
unique enterprise. He holds degrees from Cornell
University and Union Theological Seminary; his
doctorate is in Jewish and Christian Ethics, and has
taught at many universities including Columbia.

Reverand Karpen is passionate about interfaith work, ministry with the poor and the marginalized, and the possibility of an inclusive church that welcomes migrants every Monday morning. Over 200 families show up for information, clothing, legal assistance, and food. He has in basement also, the clubhouse that we are trying to save, Mr. Mayor, so that it is not closed. And as part of the church, there is also B'nai Jeshurun, which is a synagogue, and they are partners in the building. So, is he an

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Today's Land Use Call-ups are adopted by a vote of 49 in the affirmative and zero in the negative.

We will now have Communication from Speaker Adrienne E. Adams.

SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you, Majority Leader, and good afternoon, everyone.

Yesterday was the final day of our Executive
Budget Hearings for Fiscal Year 2025. I want to thank
all council members and staff for their hard work
throughout this budget process thus far. A special
thanks to Finance Chair, Justin Brannan, for his
leadership and our entire Finance Division for their
commitment throughout these weeks of hearings.

To the members of the public who offered testimony, thank you for your engagement and for sharing your voice throughout this process.

To deliver for our communities and the people who call home (sic), the budget must fund the services that support New Yorkers and our city. We need to get back to the basics of what makes our city work for families and communities, and not take away or deny resources from 3-K and early education, cultural institutions, affordable housing, libraries, schools,

parks, mental health care, programs that reduce recidivism and provide safety, senior services, and other essential services.

The Council's Preliminary Budget response put forward a plan for smart investments that meet our current needs and lay the foundation for our future. While the Mayor's Executive Budget took some steps to reverse a fraction of the Administration's cuts, it left far too many cuts in place and inadvertently funded vital programs. This must be addressed in the Adopted Budget.

This week the Council unveiled our latest economic and tax forecast that shows consistent revenue projections which continue to outpace OMB's (Office of Management and Budget) by \$1.1 billion for fiscal years 2024 and 2025. The updated forecast provides clarity that the City can in fact restore cuts to protect essential services and invest in the needs of New Yorkers. We cannot withhold the programs and services that New Yorkers need when the resources exist to avoid that outcome.

The City Council will continue to represent the needs and voices of our constituents at the

negotiating table, working to ensure our communities receive the investments they deserve.

May 19th was the birthday of Malcolm X, a revolutionary civil rights leader who fought to advance the rights and equity of our communities.

Saturday is Guyana Independence Day; I'm proud that my district, the Great 28, is home to a vibrant Guyanese Community. If you haven't been to Little Guyana yet, encourage you to visit, try some of our local cuisine, and celebrate Guyana's Independence Day.

This week is National EMS Week when we celebrate our frontline emergency response workers and the important work they do every day to help keep us healthy and safe. And I want to personally thank all of our EMS workers for their dedication to our communities, including my own daughter, Aliya, who proudly serves our city as an FDNY paramedic.

May 28th is Menstrual Hygiene Day during which we raise public awareness about the challenges to accessing menstrual products and period friendly facilities to end the stigma around menstruation.

On Monday, we will observe Memorial Day to honor and commemorate service members who paid the ultimate

sacrifice in service to our country. Our city is grateful for their commitment, dedication, and sacrifice. My own father, father-in-law, and husband all served in the Air Force. And I know many of you have loved ones who served our country, so Memorial Day is very important to me, my family, many of your families, and other New Yorkers as well. I hope everyone has a meaningful Memorial Day.

As we approach the month of June, there are several other holidays that I'd like to recognize.

June is Black Music Appreciation Month, when we honor the widespread contributions of Black musicians, whether it's gospel music, jazz, soul, house, or hip hop, Black musicians have created entire cultures and industries celebrated throughout the world.

June is also Caribbean American Heritage Month when we celebrate our Caribbean American communities for their many contributions to our city and country.

And throughout June, we will be observing Gun Violence Awareness Month to acknowledge the crisis of gun violence. As a Council, we are committed to making our city safer and bringing an end to gun violence.

A Preconsidered Resolution, sponsored by Council Member Justin Brannan, to establish that the discount percentage for early payment of real estate taxes be set at one-half of one percent per annum for Fiscal Year 2025.

A Preconceived Resolution, sponsored by Council
Member Justin Brannan, authorizing a 40-year Article
XI tax exemption for the preservation of four rent
stabilized buildings in Council Member Hudson's
district.

A revenue budget modification recognizing \$619 million in new revenues implementing changes reflected in the April 2024 financial plan. This revenue will add \$619 million to pay for partial budget restorations for the Department Of Cultural Affairs, rental assistance, foster care services, pupil transportation, CUNY STEM program, and other initiatives.

And a Transportation resolution approving new designation and changes of certain organizations receiving funding in the Expense Budget.

Introduction 97-C, sponsored by Council Member

Introduction 231-A, sponsored by Council Member Crystal Hudson, would increase the frequency of parking structure inspections from a six-year inspection cycle as mandated by Local Law 126 of 2024 to a 4-year inspection cycle. It would also require that follow-up assessments be conducted within two years after a parking structure is deemed safe with repair or monitoring. We thank our staff member Austin Malone.

Introduction 170-A, sponsored by Majority Leader Amanda Farías, would double the standard civil penalties for certain DOB enforced violations when issued to the owner of a parking structure. This measure can promote improved compliance and result and better maintenance of the safety of parking garages. We thank, once again, our staff member Austin Maloney.

Finally, Introduction 135-A, sponsored by
Majority Whip, Selvena Brooks-Powers, would require
the Department of Buildings, or DOB, to conduct a
loadbearing capacity study for parking garages. DOB

The goal of this bill is to keep the Council and public informed about the project for as long as it continues. I must say that I've been dismayed by the lack of true transparency by the Port Authority through its failure to appear before this city council, as well as the New York State Senate, refusing to appear before any legislative body is a dangerous posture to take as an agency. Currently the Port Authority determines when meetings occur, what agenda will be included, and has not always been consistent with submitting timely reports to EDC as set out in its lease. In the spirit of transparency, it is important the city of New York ensures the components within the lease, is fulfilled, and members of the Southeast Queens communities truly benefit from this development.

COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Thank you so much.

I'd like to speak briefly about Land Use 83 or LU 83, which will provide an Article XI exemption for existing affordable housing properties in Clinton Hill, including the Tri-Block House on Ashland Place, and Saint Felix Street and the Green Claremont Houses located at 80 Green Avenue. I'm proud that this project will maintain deep affordability for residents while simultaneously financing a significant rehabilitation of these properties specifically 80 Green Avenue as a housing development for older adults who earn less than 50 percent of the area median income, many of whom are longtime Black and Latinx residents, and 58 units across both developments will be set aside for homeless tenants-30 percent of the entire project. In a rapidly gentrifying area like Clinton Hill, where the area median income for white residents is \$163,000 compared to \$53,105 for Black residents, we need to build and preserve deeply affordable housing at low AMIs, so those who built our communities can continue to reside and contribute to them. This project will

ensure these units remain affordable for at least the next 40 years, if not longer, and will not displace a single resident. Simply put, we need these types of projects to preserve existing deeply affordable housing, especially for our older adults who live on fixed incomes and rarely see a sufficient increase in Social Security or other forms of assistance to pay for rapidly rising costs. My team has held multiple community meetings with residents to ensure they understood what the changes meant and how construction would impact them. We then flyered the entire building of nearly a 100 units with a packet of information, in both English and Spanish, on the proposed changes with contact information for the developer and our office to answer any further questions. This approach takes a bit more work, but I'm confident that this proposed tax exemption will yield exactly what the residents need and deserve, thank you.

SPEAKER ADAMS: All bills have been referred to committees as indicated on today's Agenda.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you, there are no resolutions on today's calendar, so we will now move into General Discussion. I would like to first recognize Council Member Louis, followed by Council Member Marmorato.

COUNCIL MEMBER LOUIS: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader and good afternoon, colleagues.

On the morning of January 19th, a devastating tragedy struck in my district. New parents, Alex and Bessie Kuravsky, experienced the most unimaginable loss of their 11-month-old son Binyomin Zachariah, who was found unconscious after being burned alive in a room filled with steam from a faulty radiator in their apartment. Despite best efforts to save him, Binyomin was pronounced dead due to steam inhalation and thermal burns. This tragedy echoes a similar incident from seven years ago in the Bronx, where two toddlers, Scylee Vayoh and Ibanez Ambrose, similarly lost their lives to scalding heat from a defective

radiator. These incidents are not isolated, but are indicative of a broader issue in our city's aging housing stock that demands immediate action to prevent loss of more innocent lives. In response to these horrific events, I am introducing Introduction 925, a Local Law requiring the inspection of steam radiators in multiple dwellings. This bill mandates that the owners of multiple dwellings conduct annual inspections of all steam radiators in their units and common areas. This protocol will identify and rectify any issues before they pose a threat to the safety of tenants, residents, and families. Everyone deserves to live in safe living conditions, and it is our responsibility to enforce standards that protect the most vulnerable among us. I want to thank Council Member Sanchez and Council Member for their support through this process. I urge my colleagues to support Introduction 925 and to honor the memory of Binyomin Zacharian, and ensure that no family endures such tragedy again. Thank you.

Today I am pleased to introduce Introduction 935, along with Council Members Brewer and Hanif. This bill would require the distribution of a voluntary survey to individuals and families leaving the shelters and migrant reticketing centers. The survey will collect information on the immediate destinations of individuals leaving our city shelters or leaving the city entirely. Over 120,000 people are living in the city of New York's shelters, including at least 10,000 in my own district. The Mayor's Office estimates that half of asylum seekers who have come through the City's shelter system have left for alternative accommodations, yet we do not know where people are going. We do not know if people are leaving shelters or just end up living in the streets. We have also heard from school principles

that students are simply going missing from the school system, and we have no information about their current circumstances.

Introduction 935 would require the City to collect this data to ensure people that leave shelter are not disappearing Into thin air with nowhere to go, but are entering stable housing and stable schools. S please I urge my colleagues to sign on to Introduction 935, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Now I'd like to recognize Council Member Nurse, followed by Council Member Brewer, then Council Member De La Rosa.

COUNCIL MEMBER NURSE: Thank you, Majority Leader. With the summer around the corner, it's important to highlight one of the biggest climate impacts in New York City, which is extreme heat. We know that some communities are impacted more than others, including my district, which is one of the neighborhoods across the City with a high heat vulnerability index. We need to be more proactive and aggressive with heat preparedness, more equitable in investments in parks and our city forests, and more innovative with strategies to mitigate urban heat island effect in the communities that need it most.

2 Today, I, along with Council Member Brooks-3 Powers, introduced a bill that would require the 4 Department of Transportation to conduct a pilot 5 project on the use of cool pavement on city streets pavement and pavement coatings designed to keep area 6 temperatures cooler than traditional asphalt, and thus, combat the urban heat island effect. This 8 should not be an extremely costly program, and other cities are already exploring these strategies. New 10 11 York City should not be so far behind on tackling the 12 urgent issues of extreme heat. I invite you all to cosponsor this legislation, and I'm happy to discuss 13 14 it with you, thank you.

These 23 landed

near the southern tip of the Dutch Colony right near the *now* Staten Island Terminal. And, of course, 370 years later, New York is home to many wonderful Jewish community members - more than any other place in the world.

I want to say that every year, we have gathered at Peter Minuit Plaza, which has a dedicated monument that was put there in 1955. We will continue to do that. So, this is a really important resolution, it comes during Jewish American Heritage Month, celebrated each May to recognize the contribution of Jews to American life and culture. I hope you sign on, thank you very much.
