SPEAKER ADAMS: The Council's work to deliver a budget that invests in New Yorkers and our communities is only possible because of your dedication and service as true public servants. I know it required long days and nights, and we really, really appreciate all of you so much. Thank you all.

As a government, one of the most important responsibilities we have to the people we represent in every borough and community is to deliver a City budget that reflects their needs and priorities. We know what's possible when New Yorkers can access opportunity: children are healthier, parents can advance in their careers, and our communities are safer. That's why year after year, we have focused on deepening our investments in affordable housing, strengthening our early childhood education system and public schools, and fighting for the institutions that support our neighbors, like our libraries, parks, and older adult centers. While too much of our collective efforts in past years have been spent on

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restoring budget cuts, our persistence and subsequent wins have led to progress in this year's budget.

I have repeatedly insisted on our need to move away from a budget of restoration to one that strengthens investments in New Yorkers. This year, we are making big strides towards that goal. Together, we secured baseline funding for 3K and Pre-K, as well as investments for preschool special education. We also won new funding to expand childcare for our youngest, from zero to two years old, because this is how we empower families to afford and remain in our city. And because libraries are the pillars of our communities, we are expanding seven-day library service to more neighborhoods and branches across the entire city.

This year, we're also expanding eligibility for Fair Fares once again to reach New Yorkers with incomes up to 150% of the federal poverty level.

This budget also reflects the Council's persistent efforts to push the city towards investing in mental health and public safety solutions at a greater scale so that we can close Rikers and connect more people to mental health care.

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And after years of fighting, we have finally secured baseline funding to add to a Justice-Involved Supportive Housing RFP that has sat dormant at the Department of Health for far too long.

For our older adults, we secured significant funding that was lost in previous years, as well as increased home-delivered meal rates so that our seniors do not go hungry.

The budget also protects the many New Yorkers and services that have come under attack from the most harmful aspects of the Trump administration's agenda. When New Yorkers' civil rights are at risk and families are being separated, the City must step up and defend them. We are prioritizing crime victims when the federal government is abandoning them. We're doubling down on the benefits and values of cultural diversity, and we are increasing food assistance at a time when Trump and his allies in Congress are threatening to diminish help for hard-working Americans.

The successes in this year's budget are the product of multi-year efforts built upon a foundation of relentless advocacy by New Yorkers across our city. While there is more work ahead, this shows that

The Coney Development, modifications to the City Map that will enable a proposed entertainment complex in the Coney Island Amusement District to apply for a State Gaming Facility License. If awarded by the State, the proposed development would include a casino, hotel, convention center, retail spaces, a food hall event, and a rooftop space, as well as a 1,500-space parking lot in Council Member Justin

Grace Houses will facilitate the development of a five-story, mixed-use building and a seven-story residential building, creating a combined 153 affordable rental units and a community facility space for the Grace Baptist Church in Council Member Nurse's district.

Hallett's Point SCA sighting will facilitate the construction of a new approximately 547 to 754-seat K through 8 School in Council Member Cabán's district.

A Preconsidered Resolution, sponsored by

Council Member Justin, would approve the expenditure

of payments in lieu of taxes to fund the development

of infrastructure over the Western Rail Yards in

support of the development of housing.

Preconsidered Resolution, sponsored by Council Member Justin Brannan, approves the new designation and changes in the designation of certain organizations to receive funding in the expense budget.

Preconsidered Resolution, sponsored by Council Member Justin Brannan, would establish a new 40-year

2 Article XI Tax Exemption for one lot in Council

3 Member Shaun Abreu's district.

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Preconsidered Resolution, sponsored by Council Member Justin Brannan, would establish a new 30-year extended partial Article X Tax Exemption for lots in Council Member Abreu's district.

Introduction 1296-A, sponsored by Council Member Carlina Rivera, would expand the allowable

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color of sidewalk shed parapet panels to include approved or alternative artwork through the City Canvas program. This change would make city buildings eligible to utilize capital funding to participate in the program. Thank you to our staff members, Austin

Introduction 1281-A, sponsored by Council

Member Eric Dinowitz, would postpone the natural gas

alarm requirement of Local Law 157 of 2016 to no

earlier than January 1, 2027. Thank you to our staff

members, Francis O'Rourke, Austin Malone, Jose Conde,

Andrew Bourne, and Dirk Spencer.

Introduction 9-B, sponsored by Council Member
Nantasha Williams, would require the Department of
Transportation to establish overnight parking areas
in industrial business zones for commercial vehicles.
The bill would also require DOT to conduct outreach
to commercial entities in the area, as well as truck
drivers operating in the city, to inform them of
these new areas. Thank you to our staff members Mark
Chen and Samuel Breitbart.

Introduction 3-A, sponsored by Shaun Abreu, would specify that the Department of Sanitation is the agency responsible for the removal of all

derelict vehicles from the street. Under state law, a vehicle is derelict if it is abandoned, does not have a license plate, and has a wholesale value of \$1,250 or less. Thank you to our staff member, Morgan Barrett.

Introduction 857-B, sponsored by Council Member Rafael Salamanca, would require the Department of Sanitation to, within 24 hours of receiving a report of an abandoned vehicle, determine whether the vehicle qualifies as a derelict vehicle under state law, If DSNY cannot ascertain the vehicle identification number of any vehicle it determines to be derelict, it would be required to remove the vehicle from the street within 72 hours of it being reported as abandoned. Thank you to our staff members Mark Chen, Elliot Heisler, and Morgan Barrett.

Introduction 643-A, sponsored by Council Member Kevin Riley, would require that information be posted on the Park Department's website on how to access the Department of Education's indoor basketball courts when the weather does not allow for the use of outdoor basketball courts. The bill would also require DPR and DOE to conduct a study on how to improve overall access to indoor basketball courts.

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Introduction 566-b, sponsored by Council Member Gale Brewer, would require the DOE, in consultation with the Parks Department, to create an annual report on how to expand public access to school playgrounds. The plan would need to prioritize playgrounds that are located in environmental justice areas and include, for the upcoming year, a list of at least 15 school playgrounds that could be open to the public on weekends and after school hours. Thank you to our staff members Kris Satori and Patrick Mulvihill.

Introduction 205-A, sponsored by Council Member Shahana Hanif, would require the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection to conduct outreach about common fraudulent schemes committed by providers of Immigration Legal services and how to avoid them. The bill would also require DCWP to report annually on its outreach and education efforts, as well as complaints and inspections related to providers of immigration assistance services. Thank you to our staff members Rachel Cordero, Natalie Meltzer, and Sarah Swaine.

Introduction 980-A, sponsored by Council Member
Julie Won, would increase civil penalties for
immigration assistance service providers that do not

comply with applicable regulations. The bill would also clarify that immigration assistance service providers who advertise services must post or include with the ad a legally required notice of the services they are not authorized to provide. Introduction 47-B, sponsored by Council Member Shaker Krishnan, would remove all misdemeanor criminal penalties for general vendors and mobile food vendors. Vendors who operate without a license could be subject to a violation and a fine or a civil penalty. Vendors who violate any other street vending laws would be subject to a civil penalty.

Introduction 30-B, sponsored by Council Member Oswald Feliz, would establish safety requirements for powered bicycles when used by contracted delivery workers, including meeting local standards for the sale of such devices, which includes certification by an accredited testing laboratory. Responsibility for compliance with these provisions would fall on the on the delivery service. Thank you to our staff members, Rachel Cordero, Natalie Meltzer, and Sarah Swaine.

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Thank you very much for your attention. Now, I turn it back over to our Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you, Speaker Adams.

We will now move into Discussion of General Orders, and I'd like to first recognize Majority Whip Brooks-Powers, followed by Council Members Won, and then Riley.

MAJORITY WHIP BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you.

From the moment the fiscal Year 26 Preliminary Budget was released, we knew this would be another challenging year with rising costs, ongoing fiscal pressure, and deep uncertainty around federal support. But being fiscally responsible doesn't mean walking away from New Yorkers; it means protecting the essential services they depend on.

This year's budget delivers meaningful progress for working families across New York City. I'm especially proud that we secured \$25 million to expand the Fair Fares Program, raising eligibility to 150% of the federal poverty level, a critical step that will make public transit more affordable and accessible for thousands of struggling New Yorkers.

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As a mother, I know firsthand how vital affordable childcare is to families. That's why I'm proud this budget includes \$25 million to expand full-day, full-year early childhood education and extended day programs, investments that working parents desperately need.

We also secured \$1 billion in housing capital to build and preserve affordable homes with expanded pathways to home ownership and preservation programs that are especially important in South East Queens. And we've invested \$2 billion in infrastructure, including long-overdue upgrades to sewer, stormwater systems, and public spaces. In my district, I'm proud that this budget includes \$300,000 to move forward with the Far Rockaway Trauma Center, a life-saving facility our community has long fought for. I thank all of my colleagues and the Administration for their support in this endeavor. And I'm encouraged by the inclusion of a new initiative to combat gender-based violence, a meaningful investment in safety, dignity, and justice for survivors across our city.

While this budget reflects progress, we know the work must continue, including urgent repairs to

2 critical infrastructure such as our roads, health

3 facilities, and firehouses.

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Finally, I'm disclosing—do you want me to disclose now? Finally, I'm disclosing on the record of the Council proceedings that the (TIMER) Queen's Alumni chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Incorporated is funded by in the budget we are adopting, and I am associated with that organization; and that the YMCA is funded in the budget we are adopted, and my family and I are associated with that entity; the New York City Department of Education, Edge School of the Arts and Community Youth Care Services Incorporated are funded in the budget we are adopting, and my child is associated with those entities.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you so much, Majority Whip.

I just want to give a flag for members to refrain from naming your disclosures until you vote, so that you can save yourselves some time.

I will now recognize Council Member Kevin Riley, followed by Council Member Brewer, then Council Member Feliz.

COUNCIL MEMBER RILEY: Thank you...

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: My apologies, Council Member Won first, followed by Council Member Riley.

COUNCIL MEMBER WON: Thank you, Majority Leader.

Today we're voting on my bill, Intro 980-A, which increases existing penalties to deter bad actors from misleading immigrants who are seeking a pathway to citizenship in the United States. These violations include "notarios" who were unauthorized to practice law or who threaten to report their customers to Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

These violations will double penalties from existing ranges of \$3,750 from \$5,000 to \$7,500 to \$10,000 for the first violation and successive violations from the existing \$9,000 to \$10,000 to \$18,000 to \$20,000—so double the penalties.

I proposed this law in direct response to several constituents who visited my office as they were victims of predatory immigration service providers and were scammed out of thousands of dollars.

In Intro 980-A, we will crack down on unlicensed scammers, preying on the vulnerable, and increase transparency for all clients, greatly

2 enhancing the security of our immigrant communities.

3 And with this bill, I will ensure that immigrants are

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4 given the help that they were promised during these

5 | alarming times.

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I urge all my colleagues to vote in support of 980-A, ensuring our new migrant neighbors have a clear pathway to citizenship. Thank you so much.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Recognizing Council
Member Riley, followed by Council Member Brewer, then

COUNCIL MEMBER RILEY: Thank you, Majority Leader.

The Indoor Hoops Act was inspired directly by the voices of our youth and community basketball leagues, who told me loud and clear that when the weather is bad, they're forced to sit the game out with nowhere safe to play or stay engaged.

In neighborhoods like mine in the Bronx and across our city, basketball is more than just a game—It's mentorship, it's safety, it's structure— and too many communities have faced real barriers to indoor recreational access.

This bill requires NYC Parks to make information about indoor courts public and

2 accessible. It also directs a study on improving
3 access by simplifying the permit process, expanding

4 public school usage during school closures, and

5 partnering with the DOE.

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I want to thank my colleagues who co-sponsored this legislation. With your support, we are listening to our communities and responding with action. I ask my colleagues to vote for the Indoor Hoops Act for the future of our young people. It is vital that no matter the weather, no matter the neighborhood, this council and our city are committed to opening doors, creating safe spaces, and investing in their growth. Thank you, Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Recognizing Council

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much.

I'm speaking about 566-B, which is a law that would mandate that there be more schoolyards open to the public. We all know that children need outdoor recreation, it is good for their mental, physical, and social well-being.

In New York City, there are 945 school buildings with an outdoor yard; 288 of them, or about

30%, are open to the public outside of school hours.

And that would include trust with the public land and those that are jointly operated by DOE and Parks. And they are packed with families all the time when they're open.

My bill would grow that number by at least 15 schoolyards per year, prioritizing low-income communities with the least access to outdoor open space.

This particular bill is supported by a lot of organizations, and they include: the New York League of Conservation Voters, Randalls Island Park
Alliance, Riverside Park Conservancy, Open Plans,
Trust for Public Land, Wellness in the Schools, New
York City H2O, RPA, Transportation Alternatives, and
New York Restoration Project, New Yorkers for Parks,
Local Nature Hub (sic) (*Lab), the IBO, and thanks
BetaNYC for the map. And hope they all pass. There
are 25 co-sponsors of this law. Thank you very much.

The threats posed by unsafe E-bikes continue to grow. This year, we've already had 116 fires through the end of June. This is actually the most amount of fires that we've ever had due to E-bikes.

The threats related to E-bikes, uh, defective E-bikes continues to grow, and have shown time and time again that this is an issue that will not resolve itself on its own. Last week, for example, in the Bronx, we had another 5-alarm fire that injured 15 people, including a firefighter, a threat that continues to grow.

Since day one, as we all know, we've given this issue unequivocal attention. We passed legislation, and we have made some progress. Compared to last year and the year before, we've seen less deaths, less injuries—less deaths, less injuries, but the amount of fires is still high, much higher than any other

2 year, which shows that the problem has not been fully

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resolved.

We're in a fire safety crisis, and we need to make sure that delivery workers who work hard have access to safe equipment, so that while supporting

our city and their families, they're not going to

These fires are dangerous, they're destructive,

they escalate fast, and they're difficult to

extinguish. And we've had too many of these fires.

This is a crisis that can and must be resolved, and

everyone must help, including and especially the

delivery companies, which have their biggest market

right here in the city of New York.

have to put their lives at risk.

By requiring that the safety bikes be provided by the companies, we're going to make sure that only the safety bikes are used. Workers will no longer have to risk their lives while working hard to support our city and make a living.

So, I just want to thank everyone who helped make this possible, including and especially Speaker Adams and your entire team. Thank you so much.

We've had 160 fires this year already, the most ever, and we're going to continue to give this issue

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COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader.

I'm proud to vote in support of the Fiscal Year 2026 Budget. Budgets are moral documents, and this one makes clear that we're choosing to invest in the people of New York City. We secured key investments that reflect the day-to-day realities of workingclass neighborhoods like mine-funding for supplemental cleaning organizations like ACE and CEO that keep our streets livable and dignified, and support for community composting and public education, as we move forward towards a more sustainable and more just city. And we protected and expanded the core services our communities rely on every day— libraries, afterschool programs, and childcare. These aren't luxuries, they're lifelines.

I've heard from families across my district that the lack of afterschool options and limited access to childcare have forced them to make

impossible decisions. This budget begins to change that, with historic funding for afterschool and a pilot for universal childcare that reflects what our families need and deserve.

We also secured funding for immigrant legal services, because in communities like ours, where immigrants are deeply woven into the fabric of our daily life, this is personal.

And of course, none of this would have been possible without the leadership of our Speaker,
Adrienne Adams. On this final budget of her speakership, I want to offer my heartfelt thanks for her steadfast commitment to equity, not just in words but in action. When a 100-year-old swimming pool in my district had been languishing for decades, despite a vibrant school community and a neighboring NYCHA development that had long relied on it, Speaker Adams made it a priority. She understood that access to swimming isn't a luxury—it's safety, it's equity, and especially in communities like mine where those opportunities have too often been denied. She didn't just talk, she showed up and got it done. Her

On a day when Senate Republicans are passing a horrific budget bill that adds 10,000 ICE officers to the federal government, further criminalizing immigrants across America, we in New York City are protecting our immigrant communities. That's why I'm proud that we are passing historic legislation today with Intro 47-B, which will decriminalize street vending in the city.

Street vendors are our city's smallest businesses; they provide us with coffee on our way to work, tacos on a quick lunch break, and ice cream on a hot summer day. However, because of a broken vending system, street vendors could face jail time for simply trying to support their families. No vendor—no person— should face jail time in criminal charges for simply trying to feed and support their family and pay for childcare.

With the federal government's horrific immigration policies, the consequences of vending violations have become even more stark for a workforce with street of vendors that is 96% immigrant, and it is clear the disastrous immigration consequences that criminal charges can have as well.

It is more important than ever that we protect our immigrant communities, most affected by the criminalization of street vending across our city.

Intro 47-B is a common-sense measure that was agreed upon by a diverse set of stakeholders, including enforcement agencies, street vendors, and business advocates. The bill supports a clear, fair, and regulated vending system that is organized and enforceable. It removes criminal liability for vendors, ensuring that our city's smallest business owners do not face criminal charges or jail time simply for trying to earn money to support their families.

The passing of Intro 47 represents just the first step in many that the City Council is actively considering to create a clear, fair, comprehensive, well-regulated, and enforceable vending system that our city definitely needs, especially at this moment.

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I want to again thank Speaker Adams, my colleagues who are champions of the street vendor reform package, Council Members Sanchez and De La Rosa, Majority Leader Farías, and Public Advocate Williams, (TIMER), and my other colleagues who have signed on in support.

And I want to give a special shout-out to the team at the Street Vendor Project for their tireless advocacy to reform our city's broken vending system, as well as to our...

Today we're voting on Intro 857-B. It requires the Department of Sanitation to tow vehicles that are identified as encumbering our city streets within 24

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2 to 72 hours of notification by city agencies,

Community boards, elected officials, or 311 claims.

This legislation is not just about tidying up our curbs. It's about reclaiming public space, ensuring safety, and restoring fairness in how our streets are used. Every day, abandoned and inoperable vehicles clog our neighborhoods. They block bike lanes, bus stops, fire hydrants, and curbed spaces desperately needed for everything from commercial deliveries to parking for residents. These abandoned vehicles turn out streets into graveyards for zombie cars and are a source of constant frustration for all of our constituents.

This legislation sets a clear, reasonable time frame for action. It empowers the Department of Sanitation to act swiftly, but fairly. It brings much-needed accountability to a system that too often lets inaction persist.

Clean, safe, and accessible streets are not a luxury. They're a basic necessity in a city of over eight million people. Let's not allow the bad actors who abandon vehicles to hold entire blocks hostage.

I would like to thank my colleagues who have already signed on as co-sponsors for this common-

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sense legislation. With intro 857-B, we are putting our public space back to public use.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Now recognizing Council Member Williams, followed by Council Member Dinowitz.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank you.

I celebrate the budget we passed today, but for three years under this mayor, we have had to fight for restorations instead of more investments.

Something has to change. We need real reform that rebalances power and gives the Council the tools to do its job and to protect our communities from political games. There is still much more important work ahead, supporting the Commission on Human Rights, the Commission on Racial Equity, and standing with working-class homeowners.

While the budget provides essential funding to city agencies, legislation like Intro 99 ensures those resources are used effectively by establishing clear guidelines and requiring community engagement around commercial truck parking.

For years, our residents have raised concerns about trucks parked overnight on residential blocks, blocking sidewalks, narrowing streets, and creating safety hazards, especially for children and seniors.

This isn't just a Southeast Queens problem; it impacts neighborhoods across the city.

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Speaker Adams and Majority Whip Selvina BrooksPowers, who also represent parts of Southeast Queens,
have heard these concerns firsthand. That's why a few
months ago, I stood with Majority Whip Brooks-Powers,
local leaders, and community members at the
(INAUDIBLE) Truck Parking Rally calling for safer,
fairer, and more effective overnight truck parking
policies, especially since Southeast Queens was
excluded from the City's initial pilot despite being
heavily affected.

Intro 99-B creates designated overnight truck parking areas in industrial business zones and requires the Department of Transportation to engage community boards, council members, businesses, and truck drivers.

Passing budgets and advancing legislation like

Intro 99-B are important steps towards a more

accountable and responsive city government. I want to

Today, the Council will be voting on my bill Introduction 1281-A, which amends Local Law 157 of 2016.

This local law required that natural gas detectors be in residential buildings, a law passed in response to deadly gas explosions in 2015, including one at JFK High School campus, which is where I actually worked.

Local Law 157 is an important law requiring gas detectors that are vital for public safety, but right now, the law's mandate is impossible to meet. The reality is that devices required by the bill are not available, even for New Yorkers who ordered these devices months ago. Faulty devices coupled with supply chain issues have ensured that most cannot meet the standards set by Local Law 157. This includes those who managed to order the device while it was available but have had their orders delayed.

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New Yorkers will be unfairly fined for something that is out of their control.

Introduction 1281 would postpone the natural gas alarm requirement and would instead provide that natural gas alarms to be required no earlier than January 1st, 2027. DOB would also be required to submit to the Mayor and the Council, by July 1st, 2026, a determination on whether the Department has been able to identify four distinct manufacturers of battery-powered natural gas alarms. If such a termination finds an insufficient number of alarms, DOB could extend the compliance date to January 1st, 2029.

As it has now been almost two months since the compliance deadline, it is urgent that we pass the bill today so New Yorkers will not be punished for failing to meet impossible requirements. This law ensures we uphold critical safety standards without unfairly burdening New Yorkers.

I want to thank Speaker Adams, Chair Sanchez, and my staff, including Adam Staropoli and Council Members Bottcher and Holden, for their partnership on this, and I urge all of my colleagues to sign on and vote 'yes'. Thank you.

And just in terms of 566-B, the school yards, thanking Cynthia, Shulamit Puder, and the amazing staff from the Parks Committee, Kris Satori, Patrick Mulvihill, Michael Sherman, and Ann Driscoll.

And I also want to mention that in terms of the amazing challenge that we have for federal budget cuts, as we heard earlier from Chair Brannan and the Speaker, hopefully the rainy day fund, and that kind of funding will help us prevent any major impacts on New York City. However, the fact that the federal government is able to make these cuts is atrocious, and we have to fight them every bit of the way. Thank you very much.

Time and time again, this Council faced a largely restorative budget. It was our grit that

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enabled us to commit to clawing back austerity

measures, resulting in seven-day library services—a

New Yorkers made their voices loud and clear and continue to do so. We need an affordable city. Affordability looks like universal childcare for working families driven out of our city by cost burden. Affordability looks like billions invested in preserving and developing truly affordable housing through City for All. Affordability looks like food access, equitable transportation, investments in CUNY and public schools, maternal health and mental health, and prioritizing immigrant services that protect vulnerable communities who make up the fabric of our city.

While there are still gaps, the Council will continue to fight to address these gaps. This \$115.9 billion is a response to New Yorkers that we hear you, we see you, and we are fighting to make our city a more affordable and safe place for all.

I'd like to take a point of privilege to also thank my Deputy Chief of Staff, Kiana Diaz, who welcomed her first child into the world yesterday.

I'm deeply grateful to the everyday New Yorkers whose advocacy helped deliver a better and more equitable budget for us all.

We got very, very critical wins, \$53 million for intensive mobile treatment teams; \$4.5 million for peer specialists, thanks to Council Member Linda Lee for that; \$3 million for lifesaving syringe redemption services, thanks to Deputy Speaker \$2.5 million for crisis respite centers; and Ayala, a first of its kind, \$1 million pilot for EMS Wellness and Peer Support program to support the

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And while the Mayor has spent the last three years causing chaos, sowing corruption, and really having contempt for this Council (TIMER) holding programs hostage, I'm just grateful that we've been able to fight back together and come together to a pretty resounding consensus this year. So, thank you to my Speaker, my colleagues, and everyone else.

Thank you, Majority Leader. I vote aye. I don't have any disclosures. I vote no on LU 297 and Reso 981.

CLERK: Council Member Ossé?

COUNCIL MEMBER OSSÉ: Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Permission granted.

COUNCIL MEMBER OSSÉ: I commend Speaker Adams,

Finance Chair Brannan, and the entire Finance team,

and BMT for their expert navigation on this budget

process, protecting funding for critical programs and
institutions.

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The Council has done its best each year to negotiate a budget that works for the people of New York, but each year we have had the same foil, the second worst mayor of my lifetime, Mayor Eric Adams.

This Mayor uses a budget as a political tool to reward his friends and punish his opponents. This would be bad enough if he didn't try to punish the working families who just happened to live in his opponents' district in our city.

This is a mayor who has spent four years putting politics over people. We all suffered the consequences of his self-serving style, and enough is enough. I cannot wait for next year when the Council no longer needs to play defense against a Mayor's relentless assaults on hard-working New Yorkers, on vulnerable New Yorkers, on all of us.

In the meantime, I vote age on the best budget this Council could get. But the days of us scrambling for scraps will soon be over, and our city will once again be able to dream.

COUNCIL MEMBER POWERS: This, for many of us, is our final budget, our eighth budget. I think (INAUDIBLE) is doing nine here. And I think this is one that we got right.

I congratulate the Speaker and her whole team, our senior leadership for four years of sticking in the fight and making sure that New Yorkers got budgets that actually reflected our values, not capitulating to another side of an administration that did not believe in libraries or cultural funding or 3K or many other programs, and delivering a budget this year that many of us have talked about

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crisis by making record affordable housing

Association of the City of New York, better known as the Center for Fiction, and the Brooklyn Heights Association are funded in this budget, and my mom serves on the board of both organizations; they are great organizations.

I would like to vote age on all with the exception of LU 297, for which I abstain.

This budget reflects some real wins for New Yorkers, and I want to thank Speaker Adams and our Finance Chair, Justin Brannan for going to bat for our communities again and again and again.

And I'd like to thank their wonderful team, our wonderful team, Jeremy, Faiza, Mandela, Richard Tanisha, the whole Finance Division. You all do a phenomenal job.

In an election year, Mayor Adams has agreed to restore many of his most egregious cuts to early childhood education and libraries and more. Thanks to our council leadership, we pushed for investments that reflect the values of our city and our communities. We're standing up to the Trump administration by dramatically expanding immigrant legal services. We're tackling the affordability

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investments stemming from City for All —I'd like to shout out our Housing Chair, Pierina Sanchez—and investing in working families by providing 60,000 additional childcare vouchers for working families, thanks to an increased investment in the state and city budget. And we're taking a bold step to invest in the future by piloting a new, free childcare model for zero to two-year-olds. I look forward to working with our next Mayor, Zohran Mamdani, to expand this program in the very near future.

As pending federal cuts loom, we know that they will be absolutely devastating for working people and vulnerable populations in our city. We're talking about a 17 million Americans losing their health care, a \$15 billion hole in the state budget as a result of the Republican reconciliation bill that's moving through the Senate now.

I'm glad that this budget will force more transparency from City Hall and OMB on the impacts of federal funding cuts, and we need to continue to push for a real plan and adequate reserves to weather this pending storm.

I also want to acknowledge that I couldn't be as effective as I am without my Budget Director and Chief of Staff, Katie Loeb. She's been with me since 2017, and she is smart, sincere, and a public servant whom I love and respect very much. Thank you, Katie, and thank you to the Finance Team. It's been a wild ride.

It's been the honor of a lifetime to serve in this body, to support the communities that raised me, to stand with my neighbors and colleagues in fighting for New York, where all families can build a good life for themselves.

It's certainly been a challenging eight years of troubling administrations, a global pandemic that I Chaired Hospitals and our Census Task force through economic instability, all while leading a city that

is never short on opinions, but always in agreement that we are the best city in the world and remain undefeated in how we celebrate that.

I think you can see that pride in the budget that we're passing today. This budget puts working families first and addresses our city's most pressing challenges.

I want to thank Speaker Adams for always negotiating investments that are necessary, timely, and rooted in compassion. I want to thank you, Council Member Justin Brennan, Jeremy John, Faiza Ali, and everyone in the Finance Division for your attention in working so hard to deliver a robust budget that brings muchneeded funding to our great city.

New Yorkers are feeling the immense pressure of the rising cost of living in this city. At a time when so many are facing homelessness, struggling with affordability, and bracing for a potential federal budget cut out of D.C., it is critical that we as a city step up and help ease that burden. I'm honored to stand with a city government that is funding food programs, launching a free childcare program, and putting programs in place that provide legal services and support for our most vulnerable, including immigrants, older adults, and children, as part of our \$116 billion budget.

Thank you for going above and thank you for going beyond.

On that, I vote aye on all.

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: I'm disclosing on the record of the Council proceedings that CUNY is funded in the budget that we are adopting, and my sibling is associated with that entity.

Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Permission granted.

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: Thank you, Majority

24 Leader.

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First Speaker Adams and colleagues, thank you for securing critical services in this budget. For three years, this Council has fought to restore what should never have been cut: funding for CUNY, childcare, education, and libraries.

I'm proud of the wins we secured this year: \$75 million in legal assistance for immigrants, \$16 million in Crisis to Care, investments for mental health, substance use and treatment, and public safety that is rooted in community.

Speaking as a mom, a mom of a zero-to-two-yearold and a six-month-old, \$10 million for the childcare pilot brings us closer to universal childcare than ever in the city. Very proud.

We also have \$4 billion, billion with a B, in City for All investments reflected in this budget the other billion came from the state. And there's new funding for supportive housing.

But let's be clear, the budget process as a whole is broken, and we need reform that empowers the Council to protect New Yorkers more and not just play defense.

Second, I want to congratulate Council Member Krishnan. By eliminating misdemeanor criminal

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penalties for vending, Intro 47 allows vendors to continue providing for their families without fear. But there is more work to be done, particularly for unlicensed vendors. This is why it is critical to pass the full Street Vending Reform Package: Intros 431, 24, 408, 1251. This can still be the council that reforms the vending system to one that is fair and effective, where vendors and brick and mortars coexist, and where access to opportunity is made available to all of our city's small businesses. I look forward to moving the remaining bills in this package.

Thank you, Speaker, and thank you, Chair
Brannan. I will truly miss you. I also want to thank
Tanisha, Richard, and the entire Finance Division, as
well as all the OGs, who, as Althea mentioned, have
been instrumental in guiding us new members over the
last two cycles. Thank you for everything that you
have done for us, Jeremy, Faiza, and the whole team.

I also want to do a special shoutout to Carla Dominguez, my Legislative Fellow (TIMER), who's just a boss. Speaker, you keep giving us excellent Fellows, and we don't let them go. Thank you, Carla, thank you, Gerard, and thank you to my whole team.

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With that, I vote age on all, except for Land Use 297 and its accompanying Resolution, for which I vote no.

COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Permission granted.

COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: I'm disclosing on record Council proceedings that the Office of the Mayor of the City of New York is funded in the budget we are adopting, and my sibling is associated with that entity.

I want to thank and congratulate the Speaker and her staff, with a special shoutout to Jeremy and Faiza, and the Finance staff, who've been amazing, led by Richard Lee, and answered all the complicated questions that staff had.

I want to give an extremely special shoutout to my Chief of Staff, Jonathan Boucher, and my Budget Legislative Director, Kevin McAleer, who really kept it together and were instrumental in some of the successes we've had in the district.

When I started out in politics, a wise lyrical mentor said to me, "Even when facing a budget

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deficit, you can't cut; you have to invest." And invest is what this council did with education, immigration, and housing as three major examples.

I have worked on many budgets both as a city council staffer and council member, and don't recall any being as robust and inclusive as the budget we are passing today.

For FY26, the Council was able to baseline nearly \$700 million in funding, beyond anyone's expectations, for libraries, public schools, CUNY, older adults, gender-based violence, culture and the arts, housing, HIV/AIDS, composting, parks, sanitation, and so much more. These baselined items will now become a permanent part of the budget in future years.

While there are many details you will hear about in the days to come, I want to especially point out the over one-billion, with a B, dollar investment in education from Pre-K to 3K, with funds carved out for preschool special education students, all the way up to our public higher education institutions.

I am proud of the efforts we have made in this budget, and look forward to continuing to work with

COUNCIL MEMBER VERNIKOV: Thank you.

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Today we vote for a budget that, like all budgets, is imperfect. Yet, like in the past, my commitment to public safety, community needs, and enhancing quality of life for my constituents compels me to vote yes, despite much we do not approve of.

However, I am unequivocal on Land Use item 297, Coney Island de-mapping action for proposed casino development in Coney Island. This de-mapping makes the casino application and proposed development more likely to take place. Therefore, I must vote against it, as over the past many months, and at this point years, it has become clear that the majority in the community do not want a casino in Coney Island. For those at least 20,000 residents who signed the petition clearly saying no to the Coney, I have heard you, agree with you and I will keep fighting for you.

Today's setbacks do not mean that the battle is lost. Economic development needs to take place throughout the area, but this is not it. It should not come at the expense of public safety, infrastructure, and our quality of life.

COUNCIL MEMBER WON: The Learning Experience is funded in the budget we are adopting, and my child is associated with that entity.

Thank you so much to Speaker Adams, colleagues on the Negotiation Team, Chair Brannan, and all of the Finance staff.

We have so much to celebrate this year, with all the new additions and the fact that we're nearing \$116 billion in this budget. Some of the highlight that we have heard about from many of our colleagues, \$10 million to launch a new childcare program for 2K; \$2.5 million for the AAPI curriculum; \$2 million to bring back seven-day library services, about 10 additional branches; \$74.7 for immigration legal services; \$10.2 million additional parks, staff, and more.

As Chair of Contracts, I want to celebrate the funding allocated to the Mayor's Office of Contract Services, the agency that plays a vital role in ensuring that all funded items are paid out to those delivering essential services, especially our nonprofit providers.

So, this year, since adoption, the total is going to be over \$12 million to boost the Contracts

I can be proud to vote on this budget, because it really does address the initiatives that mean the most to my district and the district of the council members and the Minority Caucus that I represent like roadways, schools, parks, sanitation, education, public safety, CBOs like ACE and CEO, because of the draconian cuts to litter basket and lot cleaning by the Mayor's Office, I really appreciate that.

CUNY Citizenship Now, which operates out of my office
every Monday and does a great job helping people

Congratulations, Frank, on your first budget.

People just shake when they see them coming, as well as my Budget Director, Ciara Grace Donley.

Majority Leader, I want to thank you for your leadership, as well as the Majority Whip. I know she's not here, but we work very well together.

On that note, I look forward to talking to the people who will be leaving us. Whether we agreed or not, we learned from each other along the way, and that's how I feel. And minds were changed along the way, and I think that's great.

Too often, Black boys are seen only through struggle, but they are leaders, creators, and joyful. I know, as I was once a boy a very long time ago. This resolution is about showing them that this city sees their

It was inspired by the young men of One Strong Brotherhood who are here today: Khadim, Osman, Musa, Solomon, James, Shamar, Kingsford, Isaiah, Ishmael, and Abukar (*Names spelled phonetically), who created a platform where Black boys can be curious, expressive, and proud. From Pilates to voting, they've redefined the narrative and really are inspiring change.

The second resolution I'm introducing is 968, which supports the Center for Fatherhood legislation from S.5528/A.9811 by Senator Jamal T. Bailey and Assemblyman Landon Dais.

I urge my colleagues to support these bills to uplift boys and fathers of color to strengthen our families and communities. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Recognizing Council Member Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much.

Two things: Reso 963 talks about the issue of Penny the Chihuahua and the individual dogs that have bitten the Chihuahua. This has created a lot of havoc. I had no idea that biting one dog and another is not legal. So, it is mostly focused on Albany, but

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you, community.

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MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Recognizing Council

COUNCIL MEMBER NARCISSE: Thank you, Madam Chair.

The bill I have in front of me is 1331, which pertains to the jail population. So, please read up on it. We need to know statistics and what is going on in our jails in New York City.

What I have learned today in this Chamber is that things can be difficult, people can be difficult, but life is a full circle. We could not be on the same page for many things, but today is a beautiful day for New York City. We got on the same page for the New York City budget. It's not perfect, but it's a beautiful budget for the beautiful people of New York City.

Life is a journey. If you are from New York

City, it's like a train: people come and go. It's

also like a book — you turn many pages, learn, and

keep turning the pages. Sometimes, you need to get a

new book.

But today I want to say thank you to my Chief of Staff, who is leaving our office. I love her; she has been amazing. She is smart, strong, and, how can

I say it? She embodies all the beautiful things—
she's a hardworking human being. I am forced to say
goodbye, but I know she is going to do amazing things
wherever she goes. So, I want to say, Saye Joseph,
thank you for your leadership, and thank you for
being the person you are. Congratulations. Whatever
you do in life, you are going to be amazing. Thank
you.

ALL: (APPLAUSE)

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COUNCIL MEMBER NARCISSE: I say congratulations, because people make (INAUDIBLE) in life. And it can be beautiful no matter what happens. So, I appreciate you, and thank you all for the budget. I love you, Madam Speaker, thank you!

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Okay, seeing no one else signed up to speak, I now formally declare that the Executive Expense Revenue Contract Budget, the Executive Capital Budget, and the Community Development Program for Fiscal Year 2026 have been hereby adopted as modified, in accordance with the Charter of the city of New York, as of 5:59 p.m. on this 30th day of June, 2025.
