SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: This is a microphone check, microphone check for the Committee on Governmental Operations, State, and Federal Legislations here in HR 1 on November 25th, 2025, by Pat Kurzyna. Check, check.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning. Welcome to the Committee on Governmental Operations, State, and Federal Legislations here in HR 1. Thank you very much.

Chair, you may begin.

CHAIRPERSON RESTLER: [GAVEL] Wonderful.

Good morning. My name is Lincoln Restler, I have the privilege, this might, no, one more time, of at least one more time Chairing the Committee on Governmental Operations, State and Federal Legislation. I am Co-Chairing this hearing with the adorable \_\_\_\_. We are joined by our Majority Leader, Amanda Farías, Council Member David Carr of Brooklyn, Council Member Frank Morano, Council Member Shahana Hanif, Council Member Gale Brewer, and we do not yet have Jim Gennaro online, but Jim's coming.

Today we'll be voting on two great bills,

Intro. 441-A sponsored by Council Member Althea

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2 Stevens, and Intro. 1075-A sponsored by our Majority 3 Leader.

Intro. 441-A would require the Department of Education to provide voter registration forms and voting information to high school seniors. This bill also requires DOE to report annually on efforts to distribute voter registration forms and information in schools. This bill is a really critical step towards increasing civic engagement for our young adults and reducing barriers to voter registration. I really appreciate Council Member Stevens' always focusing on our young people and her deep commitment to empowering the next generation.

Intro. 1075-A would require the Borough
Presidents to work with the Civic Engagement
Commission and DCAS to provide annual training on the
Council's legislative process and rules of
parliamentary procedure for community boards. It will
also require the Mayor to designate an agency to
provide the same legislative training to precinct
community councils, community education councils,
business improvement districts. I appreciate very
much the Majority Leader bringing this issue forward
and I think thoughtfully working through the

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2 legislation to make it an even better bill for final
3 passage.

With that, I'd like to turn it over to our Majority Leader, and I'd like to recognize my Colleague, Council Member Inna Vernikov of Brooklyn.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you so much, Chair Restler, and thank you to the Members of the Committee for the opportunity to speak on Intro. 1075.

I bring this important piece of

legislation before you today to address a critical

gap in how New York City prepares and supports the

civic bodies that anchor public participation across

our neighborhoods. Every month long before an issue

reaches the Council Chambers, the leadership and

members of our community boards, precinct council,

and business improvement districts, and community

education councils gather with the public across the

five boroughs. These meetings bring residents,

parents, small business owners, volunteers, and long
term community members into direct conversation about

the issues shaping their daily lives. They are often

the very first point of contact between New Yorkers

and the systems that govern them. Yet despite the

expectations placed on these civic bodies, we have 2 yet to equip them with the unified training needed to 3 4 navigate the legislative process, public participation, or parliamentary procedure. That gap 5 impacts how effectively these groups are able to 6 7 serve their communities, how consistently meetings 8 function, and how early and accurately neighborhood concerns can be elevated into the policymaking process. My bill, Intro. 1075, the Civic Education 10 11 and Engagement Act, creates the first uniform 12 training standard for these civic bodies. It requires 13 that community boards, precinct councils, BIDs, and the community education councils all receive the same 14 15 clear, accurate instruction in how our legislative 16 process works, how public participation fits into it, 17 and how parliamentary procedure should structure 18 their meetings. Under this bill, borough presidents 19 and the Civic Engagement Commission will develop 20 standardized materials for community boards while the 21 mayor designates the appropriate agencies to train 2.2 PCCs, BIDs, and CECs. Beginning in 2026, this 2.3 training will be required annually so that every civic leader starts with the same foundation and 24 25 stays current year-to-year. We have seen what happens

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when that foundation is missing. In my District, I have already had to intervene to help a civic body that underwent severe administrative and operational turbulence because members were left to interpret complex responsibilities without consistent quidance. A preventable procedural gap created confusion, fear, and instability, and it threatened to leave an entire community without a functioning civic institution. That is exactly the kind of disruption this bill is designed to prevent. When a civic body falters, it is the neighborhood that pays the price. Businesses lose support, public services become uncertain, and the residents lose the forum where their concerns should be heard and addressed. Intro. 1075 strengthens that structure these bodies rely on so they can serve communities with confidence, clarity, and consistency.

For these reasons, I respectfully urge the Committee to advance the Civic Education and Engagement Act, and it provides the tools our civic institutions need to function as they were intended, as stable, informed, reliable partners in the democratic process, and as trusted conduits between the public and their government. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON RESTLER: Thank you so much,

Majority Leader.

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We have Council Member Gennaro online and Council Member Schulman with us as well.

And I just want to say as we kind of approach the end of this term, I'm really grateful to each of the Members of this Committee and other Members of the Council who have sponsored such great legislation that we've been able to move through this Committee. And bills like Council Member Stevens' and Council Member Farías' are like great bills that I think make our city better, and especially the Majority Leader's legislation will make these volunteer bodies more effective, more informed, and I'm really, I'm just appreciative of the bill and appreciative we were able to get this through the Council.

So with that, I encourage the Clerk to call the roll.
