Summary of Legislation: This legislation creates a new Office of Residential Displacement Remediation within New York City Emergency Management. This new office would provide information to individuals displaced by residential fires about available city and non-city governmental services, coordinate the responses and inspections of relevant agencies during such events, and monitor inspection and vacate order compliance among agencies. They would also maintain an online case management portal with pertinent information and status updates for inspections by relevant agencies, vacate orders, and inquiries. Finally, they would be required to update the representative community board, borough president, and council member when a vacate order is issued.

Effective Date: 180 days after enactment

The legislation would impose resource needs on several agencies, including NYCEM, HPD, and DOB—though the specifics of the projected impact are not currently quantifiable based on the legislation as written. Additional information is needed on the specific requirements of agency coordination and compliance monitoring responsibilities. Note that though it is not currently quantifiable, the fiscal impact to NYCEM would be significant as the agency would have to create a new office that requires staff and administrative support. Additionally, NYCEM and other agencies would require new staff to undertake case management duties and to ensure the compliance of agency actions. Furthermore, there would be IT costs associated with creating and maintaining the online case management portal.
