COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you very much Chair Van Bramer, and I want to especially acknowledge your essential role in this legislation. You have shepherded this through the process. You have paid such close attention, and this has been so clear how important this is to you. And your care and circumspect approach to this has been greatly appreciated on my end. And I--I think that this is not -- we would not have this legislation coming out of the Council if it wasn't for your leadership. and I really want to thank you so much for--for all the time and effort that you've dedicated to this and that of your staff, committee staff Aminta and Khloe and Lyle who have done an incredible job, and have been so attentive -- so attentive. Matt and Cody thank you so much for--for your dedication to this. especially want to thank my Chief of Staff Rami Metal. Rami came to me with--with this idea probably about two years ago or close to two years ago at this point.

And this was something that I knew was going to be--was going to really radiate out. It was going to make a lot of people take notice, and was going to really send some shockwaves throughout the city. And it's--it's an incredibly important piece of legislation in my opinion because in New York City we have--culture is the lifeblood of New York City. It is the great resource that we have in our communities. It speaks to our history. It speaks to our present and our future. It is, you know, without our cultural heritage, without the -- the culture of community, the culture of neighborhood, New York would--would not be what it is. It would be a Disnefied city, and that's not what we want. We want New York to retain that distinctive character. want New York to maintain its richness. And that all has to do with how our culture is supported in our communities. How we--how we approach that precious resource, how we support it and--and ultimately how we give back to it. How we feed it. How we ensure that children growing up in New York City today have access to the culture of their grandparents. That is so essential. So essential to our identity as a city, and to our communities for many generations.

It's part of 5 this administration's vision, and that it--it is informed by the communities at large. It is informed 6 by robust community outreach process, the Citizens Advisory Committee. That it—that it has buy in from 8 9 all corners of New York City. And that's--and that's--and I think that that's going to leave a 10 lasting impact. So again, Chair Van Bramer, thank 11 12 you so much for the opportunity. Thank you for shepherding this legislation through. This really 13 14 wouldn't have happened without your leadership. So 15 thank you very much, and I encourage my colleagues to 16 vote aye. CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: Thank you very 17 18 much, Council Member Levin and your team, and again 19 we are about to vote on an historic piece of legislation. Incredibly, New York City is one of the 20 few major cities in the United States of America that 21 22 does not have a comprehensive cultural plan. And to 23 date, there is no measure of what is considered an acceptable level of resources when it comes to the 24

arts, and cultural services and how we measure the

4	skyrocketing rents and the challenges of affordable

8	yes on Intro 419-A, the Cultural Plan for the City of
9	New York, and ask Billy Martin to call the roll.

And putting all cultures 20 on a level playing field in terms of their importance 21 22 and relevance to New York City. So, I really applaud 23 you both. I'm very excited about this legislation. And it's so nice coming in as a--as a first term 24

member to see this type of legislation already in the
