One-LIC Neighborhood Plan in Council

Member Julie Won's district is the fifth neighborhood rezoning to be approved by the Council over the last two years and the largest in over two decades. It will rezone approximately 54 blocks in Long Island City, Queens, to facilitate the creation of 15,000 new homes, including 4,350 affordable homes through the mapping of MIH, and the development of publicly owned sites. The plan will also deliver 3.8 million square feet of commercial, community facility, and light industrial space. Through the Council's direct negotiating role in the Land Use process, the One-LIC Neighborhood Plan will be accompanied by historic community investments for the Long Island City Neighborhood, including major funding to create new public schools, support local public housing developments, open spaces, and waterfront esplanade

2 access, transportation improvements, and new and

3 renovated parks.

I want to thank Council Member Won for her leadership, and the members of the public who participated in the many months of planning workshops and meetings to make their voices heard, our Planning and Land Use team, and the Department of City Planning for their collective work on this historic plan.

78-01 Queens Boulevard Rezoning will facilitate the development of a new 13-story mixed-use development with approximately 314 homes, 79 of which will be permanently affordable under MIH Option One, and ground-floor commercial and community facility space in Council Member Shekar Krishnan's district. The Council will be modifying this application to remove neighboring active industrial businesses from the rezoning area.

Introduction 1193-A, sponsored by Council Member Yusef Salaam, would require home improvement contractors to disclose to owners which, if any, permits are required to perform their work. It would also require the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection and the Department of Buildings to conduct outreach and education campaigns to raise awareness of these new requirements and a list of contractors who have performed work without the required permits. Introduction 1123-B, sponsored by Council Member Crystal Hudson, would establish rules for a containerization program authorizing the Department of Sanitation to impose an annual fee for costs related to the installation and maintenance of onstreet containers for trash, recycling, and organic waste. The fee would be capped at \$55 per unit and only be imposed on buildings with 10 or more units that have received an on-street container from DSNY.

We will now move into Discussion of General Orders, and I would like to first recognize Council Member Carr, followed by Council Member Brewer, then Council Member Salaam.

COUNCIL MEMBER CARR: Thank you, Majority Leader.

I just wanted to speak a little bit about the two pieces of legislation we're voting on today that are prime-sponsored in my name. I'll start with introduction 1250-A, which is, I think, a basic transparency bill. Community boards, borough boards, and other advisory boards have to post their bylaws online and any subsequent changes. I think it's a basic expectation that members of the public and new members of these institutions should have the same level of knowledge about the rules that govern those bodies as those who have been there for a long time. We have many Community Board members who have served for decades, and I think this puts everyone on an even level playing field. And I thank Chair Restler

and the Speaker for their support of this particular legislation, as well as Jayasri Ganapathy, and our new Committee Counsel, for their support of this legislation and for helping us through to the finish line.

I also want to talk about Intro 740-A, which is going to finally close a major loophole in the veterans' benefits that we afford New Yorkers. Cold War veterans have been left out of our property tax exemption system for far too long. We're the only locality in the state that has yet to opt in, and that changes today. We always say thank you to our vets on Veterans' Day. And this is a really meaningful way to say thank you to those who are willing to give up their lives in the service of our country. And I want to thank our chairs, Justin Brannan, for his support, our chair, Bob Holden of the Veterans Committee, long-time champion of this legislation, and my predecessor in Staten Island in holding this bill, Joe Borelli, for his work in introducing it in 2018, and the entire Common Sense Caucus, for whom this has long been an issue of importance, and our colleagues on BNT (phonetic), and of course, the Speaker for making it a priority in

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Now recognizing Council Member Salaam, followed by Council Member Hudson, then Council Member Krishnan.

COUNCIL MEMBER SALAAM: Thank you, Madam Speaker, and thank you, Majority Leader.

Colleagues, today I urge you to support Intro 1193-A. This bill protects New York homeowners from being misled or harmed by contractors who perform work without proper permits. It ensures that before any work begins, contractors must clearly disclose which permits are required, who is responsible for obtaining them, and how residents can verify that information through City databases. And beyond enforcement, it requires our agencies to conduct public education and outreach, providing multilingual materials and accessible tools, so that New Yorkers can make informed decisions before they sign any contract.

This legislation is also about durability, sustainability, and long-term

affordability. When work is done by licensed professionals and inspected properly, it lasts longer, it meets environmental standards, and it lowers maintenance costs in the long run. Safer, sustainable homes mean stronger neighborhoods. And that's what this bill delivers. These common-sense, pro-safety, and pro-accountability measures have earned the supermajority support in the Council. So I want to thank all the council members who've signed on to support this bill. And I also want to recognize my Director of Budget and Legislative Affairs—he wears two hats—Mufazzal Hossain, whose dedication and expertise brought this bill to life. Together, we are ensuring that New Yorkers' homes are not only safe today, but built to last for tomorrow. I urge my colleagues to vote yes on Intro 1193-A. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Now recognizing Council Member Hudson, followed by Council Member Krishnan, then Council Member Won.

COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Thank you so much, Majority Leader.

For far too long, New Yorkers have had to see and smell mountains of trash bags that fill our streets and sidewalks on trash day, and to put up

with the rats that come with them. Intro 1123, also known as the Removing Animals from the Trash or Rat Act, takes a critical step in modernizing our city's outdated waste management system, which will result in cleaner streets throughout the city. This bill allows the Department of Sanitation to place stationery on-street containers for residential waste across the five boroughs. It expands on the successful pilots in Manhattan Community District 9 and Brooklyn Community District 2 and brings the program citywide with an option for medium-sized buildings to use on-street containers or wheelie bins and a requirement for large buildings to containerize their waste using the on-street bins. I'm especially proud that through negotiations on this bill, we secured carve-outs for low and middle-income homeowners and strong worker protections, including training for building superintendents and porters. Containerization is a proven strategy to reduce rodent populations and improve public health. And by combining this sort of containerization with the City's composting program, we're creating cleaner neighborhoods that are far less hospitable to rats.

COUNCIL MEMBER KRISHNAN: Thank you, Majority Leader.

Doing nothing in a housing crisis is not an option. Jackson Heights and Elmhurst, and across Queens, we have seen rents rising to historic highs

while wages for working families have remained stagnant, forcing too many long time residents to the brink of displacement.

When we build housing, we have to do so in a way that meets the needs of our community. The deal we are voting on today demonstrates that development can be done differently, anchored in affordability, community partnership, and accountability.

I'm so proud that we are passing the historic 7801 Queens Boulevard Rezoning project. It shows how development in New York City can serve the public good, and I wanted to share just a few key highlights of the project and why I'm so proud of it.

The project we are providing for Elmhurst today will guarantee affordable housing with 314 total apartments, approximately 79 permanently affordable and affordable to Elmhurst at 55% of the AMI. On top of that, it matters the community spaces we bring in when we bring in housing too, and here we have a historic win of a 15,000 square foot community space that includes the first ever community swimming pool for our district. It will offer, through Commonpoint, free and low-cost swim lessons,

lifeguard training, locker rooms, classrooms, and multipurpose community rooms. We're grateful to Commonpoint for managing this facility because they also have their social services and workforce development hub right down the street.

As the chair of the Parks Committee, open space is also incredibly important to me. With this project, we have 5,000 square feet of publicly accessible open space, the first of its kind on Queens Boulevard, and it's also going to be done with union labor for the building, with 32 BJ involved.

From day one, I've made clear that any rezoning in our district must deliver real affordability and protect our working class immigrant families with community spaces that strengthen our community. That's why I'm proud we are approving a project today in Elmhurst that transforms what is a bank parking lot right now into desperately needed affordable housing, a community pool, and much needed space.

Thank you to Apex, Commonpoint, Council,
Land Use, (TIMER), and my staff, Chanel Martinez and
Greg Clark, for seeing this project to the finish

Today, I am voting yes on the One Long
Island City Neighborhood Plan. And I encourage all of
my colleagues to also vote yes, because this project
brings us one step closer to a connected and
integrated Long Island City.

Over the last three decades, the City has allowed for developers to dictate what is built in our neighborhood, bringing fiscal barriers and a critical issues that have separated my neighborhood into Hunters Point, Court Square, and Queensbridge Houses. But over the past two years, thousands of my neighbors have come together to envision a different future. We've lived through four failed projects, but through this fifth one and through our advocacy, persistent community engagement, and disciplined negotiations, we have secured a historic investment of nearly \$2 billion to Long Island City to fund a

connected waterfront, the restoration of
Queensbridge, Baby Park, and expanded public space
underneath the Queensboro Bridge as well as the
ramps, over 1,300 new school seats, sewage and
plumbing infrastructure, significant NYCHA
investments of over \$200 million for Queensbrige
Houses and so much more—all of that is long overdue.

Finally, through this project, we will become One Long Island City to integrate current and future residents in all corners of this neighborhood.

We started this process two years ago, conducting extensive public engagement that included 21 large public events, two surveys, 1,400 mailers, presentations to community boards, multiple hearings, as well as thousands of public comments and testimonies. We also canvassed 8,000 doors at Queensbridge Houses over the course of several months, including voices from all residents. Now we are happy to announce that this project will bring a total of 14,700 units of new housing as well as 4,350 units of affordable housing, making it the largest neighborhood rezoning in city history, as well as affordable housing expansion in the last two decades of New York City. I'm thrilled that my bill, Intro 1308, is being voted on today. This omnibus legislation represents a comprehensive effort to modernize the City's small business licensing framework to meet the needs of our 21st century economy. It removes many outdated laws, and it updates others to address longstanding consumer concerns, ensuring that our regulatory system works better for both small businesses and the public at large.

This bill eliminates fees for duplicate licenses and removes surety bond requirements for certain license types. It consolidates electronic

These updates will reduce unnecessary red tape, streamline compliance, and allow small businesses to operate more efficiently without burdensome fees or duplicative processes. At the same time, the bill strengthens consumer protections by improving the ability of the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection to receive and address complaints across many, many licensing categories.

Intro 1308 simplifies small business requirements, it enhances accountability, and it ensures fair, effective oversight that benefits consumers, small businesses, and the agency alike.

I want to thank Speaker Adrienne Adams for her great leadership in advancing this legislation and always protecting the needs of small businesses, as well as bill drafters Nick Widzowski and Sarah Swaine for their tremendous work. And I want to thank my team, Jonathan Szott, Brandon Jordan, Mercedes Anderson, and Jacob Lobel, for their efforts. Thank you.

I firstly just want to take a moment to congratulate Council Members Won and Williams on these two rezonings, the two largest rezonings that the City has passed in decades, which will add nearly 30,000 units of housing to Queens. These are remarkable accomplishments, and they were not easy. And I just think you both deserve an enormous amount of credit for getting them over the finish line.

I am really grateful that we have the opportunity to vote today on Intro 79, which will add more lighting to sidewalks across New York City. I think we would all agree that it's scary to walk down a dark street, and yet too many of the streets, commercial corridors in our communities, are dark. And we'd push the Department of Transportation to brighten them up, and nothing happens, or they'll study it, which takes a year, and then maybe two years after that, they might add some lighting. But frankly, it's inadequate. This legislation requires DOT to get its act together and install new lighting on mixed-use corridors for 300 blocks every single year. COUNCIL MEMBER MORANO: As we meet here the day after Veterans Day, it could not be more fitting that this council is poised to pass a long overdue measure to honor a generation of men and women who stood quard during one of the most perilous periods in modern history, the Cold War. For nearly half a century, American service members served in silence and vigilance. They didn't come home to parades or fanfare. I think it 16 provides real property tax relief for Cold War 17 veterans and their surviving spouses. So today I'm proud to introduce two bills that take important steps towards making New York City's housing lottery system fairer, more efficient, transparent, and accessible for the New Yorkers who rely on it most.

The first is Introduction 1463. It requires HBD to build a centralized webpage within Housing Connect that allows approved community-based organizations to assist residents directly through the Housing Portal. With the residents' consent, these trusted nonprofits, which we fund in the New York City Council, will be able to help applicants complete forms, check their progress, upload missing documents, and receive alerts about available units that meet their criteria.

The second is Introduction 1464, which requires HPD with HRA to create a secure mechanism within the Housing Connect Portal that allows public assistance recipients, at their request, to transmit their eligibility documents directly from HRA to their housing application. This will reduce redundant paperwork, prevent delays, and help families using public benefits move more quickly and efficiently through the affordable housing process. The goal is
