MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Today's Land Use Call-ups are adopted by a vote of 38 in the affirmative and 1 in the negative.

We will now have Communications from Speaker Adrienne E. Adams.

SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you very much, Madam Majority Leader, and good afternoon, everyone.

I want to begin by discussing the dire need for leadership right now. The events of these past few weeks in our city have been troubling. The recent resignation of four deputy mayors who managed practically all of our city's agencies is a development we cannot afford. That is why I called for Mayor Adams to step aside. The stakes are too high for us to have a diminished mayoral administration. We need an administration that can sound the alarm about what is at stake and work with the city's partners to protect New Yorkers.

The federal budget proposal passed by the Trumpcontrolled congress this week is another action that 3 by defunding healthcare, food assistance, and other

would hurt families in our city and across the nation

4 lifesaving programs. It would shutter hospitals and

5 health clinics, hurting the health and safety of

6 people across our city and country by deeply cutting

7 Medicaid that provides health care to more than 70

8 million Americans; up to 36 million Americans could

9 lose their health care; over 41 million Americans

10 depend on SNAP food assistance that this proposed

11 | federal budget seeks to cut.

These are actions that would be an attack on families and make life less affordable. This all comes as the proportion of New Yorkers living in poverty is almost double the national average and has been increasing. One in four children is living in poverty, and this federal budget is slashing resources for working families all to pay for tax cuts for the wealthiest. As the richest person in the world, who no one elected attacks services for working families.

Most of these tax cuts would go to the wealthiest 10% of the nation, half of which would go to the top 1% earning over \$700,000 a year.

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This budget proposal only follows other actions 2 3 by the Trump administration to hurt all Americans and 4 New Yorkers. They have cut the public health workforce at a time when we are grappling with spikes in the flu, norovirus, a bird flu outbreak, and the 6 spread of other diseases. They have attempted to wreak havoc on our public transit system by 8 interfering in a congestion pricing plan that was already approved by the federal government with no 10 11 plan. It will leave New Yorkers to pick up the pieces 12 from the removal of budgeted resources for our public 13 transit system. They even went as far as cutting 14 funds and staff for the federal health program that 15 supports survivors of the 9/11 attacks. Donald Trump 16 and Elon Musk only reversed course after tremendous 17 outcry, but uncertainty still remains.

This is further proof that we must raise our collective voices to defend our values and the people of this city and country. The new administration is destabilizing our city and a nation at a time when families can least afford it.

Trump's agenda to sow chaos and fear is not only making our communities less safe, it's also hurting our small businesses, workers, and local economy.

2 Again, none of this is making life more affordable 3 for working people.

We must be prepared to defend the institutions and programs that protect our families, communities, and this city. There is a lot of work ahead of us, but this council is committed to fighting for New Yorkers and their needs.

We are mourning the death of six New Yorkers who died in fatal fires over the past several weeks including incidents in the districts of Council Members Paladino, Zhuang, Hudson, and Salaam. Each death represents a significant loss to our families, communities, and city in our hearts are with their loved ones.

On February 18, our city tragically lost two dedicated sanitation workers on the same day. Michael Biusu, who worked on Staten Island, served our city since 2000.

Nelvern Samuel, who joined the Department of
Sanitation as an enforcement agent over a decade ago,
served as a sanitation worker in Queens. Our hearts
are with their families and loved ones and the entire
DSNY family during this difficult time. Our city is

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2 mourning their loss, but we will never forget their 3 immense contributions and public service.

Next I want to take a moment to honor the memory of Li Bengjun (phonetic), a revered figure in the judo world who passed away last week at the age of 101 here in New York. A dedicated teacher and mentor, he shaped generations of athletes and Olympians. Our thoughts are with his family, friends, and students.

Today is Dominican Independence Day. New York

City is proud to be home to a dynamic Dominican

community. It is critical that we honor the many

contributions of our vibrant Dominican community to

our city and beyond. Last night we hosted a Dominican

Republic Independence Day celebration right here in

Council Chambers, and we thank the council members

who hosted this annual celebration.

March 1st is Independence Movement Day, an important day for our Korean American community in commemoration of the March 1st Movement For Liberation and Independence. Please join our Korean American community in celebrating this important day.

March is almost here, everyone, and that means we're celebrating Women's History Month. I am always proud to lead our historic women majority Council

NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 23 which has demonstrated to the city and the world what strong women's leadership looks like. Women are the cornerstone of society and the backbone of our families. When women are healthy, safe, and have access to opportunities, we all succeed.

I look forward to continuing our progress
together to advance solutions to support women across
this city and beyond happy Women's History Month.

March is also Greek American History Month and
Irish American History Month. We look forward to
celebrating the contributions of our Greek and Irish
communities here in New York City and around the
world.

Before we continue, please join me in wishing a happy birthday today to Council Member Yusef Salaam; (APPLAUSE) and a happy early birthday to our Majority Whip, Sylvia Brooks-Powers. (APPLAUSE)

Finally, colleagues, please do join me on Tuesday
March 4th at noon for my final State of The City
Address as the Speaker of the New York City Council.
We'll be at the beautiful Jazz at Lincoln Center, and
I hope to see all of you there.

Now, let's move onto our Stated Agenda.

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2 First, we'll vote on the following Land Use 3 items:

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441 & 467 Prospect Avenue Rezoning, also known as the Arrow Linen proposal. This proposal will facilitate the development of two new residential buildings in Council Member Hanif's district.

With the Council's modifications, the two buildings will each be 10 stories tall and include 250 housing units, 100 of which will be permanently affordable. The project includes access to subsidized space for a childcare center and a domestic violence service provider.

Next, we will vote on the following Finance Items:

A Preconsidered Resolution, sponsored by Council Member Justin Brannan, establishing a new 40-year Article XI Tax Exemption for three lots in Council Member Steven's district.

A Preconsidered Resolution, also sponsored by Council Member Justin Brannan, establishing a new 40-year Article XI Tax Exemption for one lot in Council Member Gutiérrez's district.

We will also vote on the Council's Fiscal 2026

Proposed Operating Budget: \$84.7 million for Personal

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2 Services and \$30.3 million for Other than Personal

3 | Services or OTPS.

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Today we will also vote on the following pieces of legislation:

A Preconsidered Resolution, sponsored by Council Member Lynn Schulman, calling on the New York State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign A.2605/S.4801, relating to restoring the state aid reimbursement rate to no less than 35% for identified core public health services provided by a municipality in New York City. We thank our staff members Christopher Pepe, Sara Sucher, and Joshua Newman.

Introduction 794-A, sponsored by Council Member Althea Stevens, would require that appointments or recommendations for youth board members be made with best efforts to ensure that appointees have demonstrated relevant experience in the area of youth welfare. Additionally, this bill would require that to the extent practicable at least three members of the Youth Board between the ages of 16 to 24 to ensure actual youth representation on the board. We thanks our staff member Christina Yellamaty.

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Introduction 1101-A, sponsored by Council Member
Yusef Salaam, would require the NYPD to publish
information on its website to help the public
understand what constitutes identity theft and how to
report it. The department would also be required to
train officers on responding to and investigating
reports of suspected identity theft. Thank you to our
staff members Josh Kingsley and Chad Benjamin.

Resolution 561, sponsored by Council Member

Crystal Hudson, New York State Legislature to

introduce and pass, and the Governor to sign,

legislation to create a statewide public guardianship

system to address current inequities and deficits and

safeguard vulnerable New Yorkers in need of

protective arrangements.

Introduction 1092-A, also sponsored by Council
Member Crystal Hudson, would require the Department
for the Aging in consultation with the New York City
Office of Technology and Innovation and the
Department of Consumer and Worker Protection to
develop printed and digital informational materials
to educate older adults about internet scams, phone
scams, phishing scams, financial literacy, and end of
life preparation. In addition to posting a digital

3 be required to distribute the materials to homebound

distribute official NYC waste bins to owners of
eligible buildings, which include those with up to
two dwelling units where the building owner is
enrolled in a New York Star or enhanced star tax
benefit program. This bill would also require DSNY to
establish a program to reimburse owners of eligible
buildings who purchased official NYC waste bin on or
before August 1, 2026.

Introduction 498-A, sponsored by Council Member Shaun Abreu, would require DSNY to collect organic waste from community gardens upon request. Community gardens would be able to make such requests through an online application portal.

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Thank you to our staff members Morganne Barrett, Ricky Chawla, and Dirk Spencer.

Introduction 1061-A, sponsored by Council Member Farah Louis, would amend the Department of Corrections' semi annual reports on alleged incidents and investigations of sexual harassment and abuse to require a unique identification number for each alleged incident. It would also require DOC to provide a justification for not reporting any substantiated allegations to a district attorney's office.

Thank you to our staff members Natalie Meltzer, Josh Kingsley, and Jeremy Whiteman.

Introduction 565-A, sponsored by Council Member Gale Brewer, would require the Campaign Finance Board in consultation with the Board of Elections and Office to End Domestic and Gender-Based Violence to develop guidance on the procedures under the New York State Election Law for making a voter record confidential and for voting by special ballot.

The bill would also require ENDGBV to distribute that guidance to Family Justice Centers and to provide survivors with information on how to get assistance in preparing and submitting written

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statements to the Board of Elections to make their
voter records confidential or establish their

eligibility to vote by special ballot.

Introduction 9-B, sponsored by Deputy Speaker
Ayala, would require the Administration for
Children's Services to provide information about
legal services for parents or guardians after ACS
makes contact with them for the first time at the
onset of an ACS child protective investigation or an
ACS child protective response.

Thank you all for your attention, I turn it back over into your capable hands, Madam Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you so much, Speaker Adams.

We will now move into Discussion of General Orders. I would like to recognize Council Member Louis, followed by Council Member Brewer, then Council Member Hudson.

COUNCIL MEMBER LOUIS: Thank you, Madam Major Majority Leader, and good afternoon colleagues.

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Today the City Council will vote on Introduction 1061, a critical piece of legislation to bring long overdue accountability to our correctional system and address the persistent crisis of sexual abuse at Rikers Island.

For far too long, those in custody, particularly women and LGBTO+ individuals have endured harassment, assault and abuse with no accountability.

More than 700 incarcerated women sued the City last year, under the Adult Survivors Act, exposing a pattern of systemic sexual violence by jail staff, wardens, and even medical personnel. Yet our current system has failed to ensure transparency or justice.

Introduction 1061 directly confronts this failure. It mandates the Department of Correction to assign unique identifiers for each incident and victim, clarify reporting procedures, and provide justifications when substantiated cases are not referred to district attorneys.

These measures will close longstanding gaps in oversight and demand accountability where there has been no silence (sic). An audit by the City Council's Data Team has shown that the Department's reporting

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2 practices are deeply flawed, riddled with vague terminology and lacking transparency.

This bill ensures that no allegation of sexual abuse is ignored.

I thank Speaker Adams for prioritizing this legislation, and I urge my colleagues to vote yes on Introduction 1061 one today. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Recognizing Council Member Brewer, followed by Council Member Hudson, then Council Member Stevens.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much.

Introduction 0565-2024 is called the Voter Confidentiality for Domestic Violence Survivors Bill, and this legislation builds upon the critical 2021 law, signed by Governor Hochul, passed by the Legislature, which enables survivors of domestic violence to request confidential voter registration directly with the Board of Elections bypassing the court process.

In the past, when people who had been, uh, are survivors of domestic violence, they wanted to vote, they had to go to through court, and you know darn well that's not gonna happen.

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So while this State Law represented a significant step forward, many survivors remain unaware of how to access these protections. This law requires city agencies, particularly those serving survivors through the Family Justice Centers, and there are quite a few that do that, to provide clear guidance and resources on how survivors can ensure their voter registration remains confidential and how they can vote by special ballot.

I assume most people know that if you are a survivor, you are likely to be in a safe house. You are likely to have an order of protection. But the worst thing is to have your attacker, the person who has been your main opponent and has hurt you in the past, find your address. They are likely to return. So the idea here is to not have that happen.

I certainly wanna thank Cynthia Hornig from our office, the people mentioned by the Speaker in the Speaker's Office, and then groups like Crime Victim Treatment Center, Common Cause, League of Women Voters, Muslim Community Network, Sanctuary for Families, Voices of Women Organizing, New Destiny, Safe Horizon, and the Campaign Finance Board.

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The bottom line is we want people to vote, but we don't want them to get killed for doing so. Thank you very much.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Recognizing Council Member Hudson, followed by Council Member Stevens, then Council Member Salaam.

COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Thank you so much, Majority Leader, and good afternoon.

Today, I would like to briefly discuss Introduction 1092, which the Council is voting on today.

Introduction 1092 is the seventh bill in my Age In Place 2.0 package to pass the Council.

This bill expands education on elder fraud and financial literacy for older adults throughout the city, and establishes requirements for the Department of Aging to develop printed and digital informational materials to educate older adults on internet scams, phone scams, and phishing scams, as well as provide quarterly guidance to Older Adult Centers about emerging scams.

Additionally, Introduction 1092 would require the Department to develop printed informational materials to educate older adults about financial literacy and

end of life preparation.

Introduction 1092 will ensure our older adult population has access to the resources they need to recognize potential scams, report fraudulent activity, and protect their financial well-being.

In 2023, older adults reported losing \$1.9 billion to financial fraud and scams, but the Federal Trade Commission believes the real number could be as high as \$61.5 billion.

By equipping older New Yorkers with knowledge, we empower them to make informed decisions and to seek help when needed. As the older adult population continues to rise and technology continues to advance rapidly, we must do everything in our power to establish the necessary safeguards to protect the well-being of all older New Yorkers. I urge my colleagues to vote aye. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Recognizing Council Member Stevens.

COUNCIL MEMBER STEVENS: Today, we take a critical step forward by voting on the passage of bill Introduction 794, which would require the New York City Charter to formally establish a youth board.

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This legislation mandates the appointment and recommendation board members prioritize individuals that demonstrate experience in youth development.

Most importantly, it ensures that at least three members of the board are between the ages of 16 and 24, giving young people direct voice in shaping the policies that affect their lives.

For far too often, decisions about young people are made without youth in the room. I've seen this firsthand throughout my years in youth development and even more upon entering city council.

Policies, program, and budget aimed at people cannot be truly affected if they are not crafted without their input. If we are serious about investing in next generation, we must do more than just talking about their future. We must include them in shaping it. Their voices are not just viable, they are essential to building a more just and equitable forward thinking city.

As representatives, we are responsible not just to lead, but to create a system that uplifts and empower those who will one day take our place, perhaps sooner than we think.

Ensuring youth representation is not just the right thing to do, it is necessary for a stronger and more inclusive New York.

As chair of Children And Youth, I am proud to champion this effort alongside my colleagues. Our commitment to uplifting young New Yorkers will fill a gap between city leadership and the voices that need to be heard, ensuring that every decision made truly reflects all the needs of our residents.

Let's stand together to make this clear. New York
City youth deserve a seat at the table today,
tomorrow, and always. Thank you.

And I urge all, uh, I encourage all my colleagues to vote aye. Thank you.

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3 importantly, how to report it. In addition, this bill

Introduction 1126-A ensures that homeowners and buildings with up to two dwelling units who are enrolled in the New York State Star or Enhanced Star Tax Relief Program receive official New York City waste bins at no cost. Additionally, for those who purchased these bins before August 1, 2026, a reimbursement program will be established. This is about fairness, accessibility, and making sure that we are not burdening our residents as we work towards a cleaner city.

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Today I'm excited to speak in support of the Arrow Linen Rezoning in my district.

Through a community driven process, we were able to secure important changes that strengthened affordability and addressed concerns about building height.

Initially, the proposal called for two 13-story buildings at 25% affordability under the R71 Zoning. However, through the City of Yes Initiative, we successfully negotiated a more fitting R7A Plan, lowering the height to 10-stories and 250 units with no unit loss.

In addition, we increased the affordability to 40% ensuring that 100 units will be offered at below market rates.

We also secured a separate R6-B Zoning for the area within the U-shape between the two Arrow Linen buildings, addressing concerns about potential future speculation, and ensuring the inclusion of mandatory inclusionary housing affordability.

In addition, we finalized a comprehensive community benefits agreement which will be managed by

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the Fifth Avenue Committee. This agreement includes the creation of a childcare center and a subsidized domestic violence survivor space operated by Sakhi for South Asian Survivors.

It also establishes a Construction Task Force and ensures the implementation of essential resiliency and flood mitigation infrastructure.

Furthermore, we reached an agreement with 32BJ to ensure that this project will generate good local union jobs.

I want to express my gratitude to every constituent who shared their thoughts through the public review process. Thanks to Housing Not High Rises, Community Board 7, the Windsor Terrace community for your advocacy. The project is much stronger because of your engagement.

So that results in nine up to \$90 million being taken from the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene for community health services that affect every district.

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I want to thank the Speaker for being an unwavering champion on this, and there's legislation in the State now to get that money back to us, and we've been fighting this since I've been in the council and chair of the Health Committee, and I urge my colleagues to please vote yes. Thank you.

Council Member Robert Holden has a bill,
Introduction 606, which would require every bicycle
with electric assist, electric scooter, and other
legal motorized vehicle that is otherwise not
required to be registered with the DMV, to be
registered with the DOT, and receive an identifying
number which would be displayed on a visible plate
affixed to the vehicle.

Council Member Marmorato has introduced

Introduction 1002. This bill would require all
schools to stock airway clearance devices, a

lifesaving device that would be a tool for school
personnel to use while waiting for first responders
to arrive.

Council Member Susan Zhuang put forth

Introduction 907, which would require the Police

Department in collaboration with the Department of

Housing Preservation and Development, Department of

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Information Technology and Telecommunications, and any other relevant agency to use a quarterly report on locations in which persons are squatting in this city.

Council Member David Carr has introduced

Introduction 1166, which would amend the existing

community notification requirement to require the

Department of Homeless Services to notify elected

officials and community boards for affected areas

when an emergency homeless shelter contract is

renewed.

Our veterans are extremely important to our caucus and this body, and that is why I'd like to discuss a number of bills dedicated to ending homelessness for those who have risked their everything for our country.

Introduction 465 which would require an annual report

from the Department of (TIMER CHIMES) Housing

Preservation and Development on the amount of

Mitchell-Lama Developments an amount of veterans

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you, I would now like to recognize Council Member Hanif, followed by Council Member Hudson, them Council Member Zhuang.

COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader.

Today I'm introducing the Affirm Act,

Introduction 1201 alongside Bottcher, Rivera, Ossé,

Restler, Hudson, Nurse, and De La Rosa, and Brooklyn

Borough President Reynoso.

In the 1990s and 2000s, the Council responded to violent protests at reproductive health clinics by passing and strengthening the Clinic Access Law, which established protections for reproductive health patients and the providers who serve them.

The Affirm Act would expand these protections to also cover facilities that provide gender affirming care. If passed, the bill would prohibit unsafe

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activities that impede physical access to facilities providing gender affirming care, including blocking doors, harassing patients within 15-feet of entrances, and interfering with facility operations.

This bill will be heard at tomorrow's Women and Gender Equity Committee hearing. I encourage my colleagues to join as a sponsor and champion access to essential health care.

I would also like to take a moment to thank my outgoing Education and Land Use Director, Mia Perez, who has served District 39 with distinction for more than three years. Mia has led an impressive array of infrastructure projects including five rezonings, the Gowanus Oversight Task Force, the Litch Task Force, the Brooklyn Marine Terminal Task Force, the Brooklyn Queens Expressway Visioning, the NYCHA Comprehensive Modernization, and the Ninth Street Bike Lane, just to name a few.

Mia has been a tireless advocate for our students and families, touring every school in our district with me raising funds for the for Title I schools through our Annual Fun Run and organizing against budget cuts. Her work has strengthened our

communities and will leave a lasting impact on
District 39 for years to come.

Mia, thank you for everything you've done.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Recognizing Council

professionals can provide high-quality and ethical

treatment for individuals with gender dysphoria.

The federal government is making consistent and aggressive efforts to undermine the rights of the trans community. And as a member of the New York City Council's LGBTQIA+ Caucus and its former co-chair,

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2 I'm proud that our body is matching its solidarity with real action.

I'd like to thank speaker Adams for her fierce allyship and unwavering leadership, as well as Council Member Lewis for holding Friday's hearing and her support of the LGBTQI+ community.

This legislative package works to improve standards for trans health care, strengthen privacy measures, protect access to gender affirming care, and takes crucial steps to uphold fundamental human rights at both the city and state level. And these bills will not only protect our trans, gender nonconforming, and nonbinary neighbors, but will also safeguard all New Yorkers, because when our most vulnerable communities are protected, everyone benefits. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Recognizing Council

I stand before you today to once again urge everyone to support Introduction 907, legislation that could require NYPD, HPD, 311, and other relative

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city agency to track and publish data on homes with squatters. This is critical information we need to prevent future deviations.

As our Speaker just mentioned today, I had a fire in my district. This is a house with squatters there. This is sixth fire in just three years. A squatter died in the fire. And then the fire spread to neighbor's house. This left the 16 innocent neighbors homeless — hardworking immigrant families with small children. Some of them live in their cars now. These families did everything right, yet they lost everything because the dangers and the illegal squatting.

Sadly it's not an isolated instance. Illegal squatting is a citywide crisis, and it can happen in any one of our districts. Squatters often restore unsafe method of heating or electric, putting entire community at risk. How many more fires? How many more families left homeless? How many more lives lost before we act?

The solutions start with better data. We need to equip the city agency with the tools to understand and address this issue. Without access tracking, we

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Resolution 775 calls on New York State to raise the funeral cost limit of burial services for low-income residents of New York from \$3,400 to \$6,000.

In this day and age, families already struggling financially are left without the means to provide a dignified burial for their loved ones. This issue became West Indian American Day Carnival Parade when Denzel Chan, a resident of Council District 45 was

2 tragically killed by gun violence. His family,

already grieving the loss of their loved on, was

4 denied full burial assistance because their funeral

5 expenses exceeded the current cap.

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Despite months of effort to secure support, they were left struggling to cover the basic cost of laying him to rest. No family should have to choose between honoring their loved one and financial ruin.

By increasing this limit, we can ensure that all New Yorkers regardless of income have access to the dignified borough services they deserve.

Resolution 776 urges CUNY to collect and publicly report data on its associate degree apprenticeship programs co-sponsored broken down by gender, race and ethnicity, and income.

Apprenticeships are proven pathways to stable careers, but must ensure that access is equitable. Women, students of color, and low income students deserve the same opportunities to build meaningful careers in growing industries. Transparency is the first step in closing these gaps.

As we push for these changes, we must also fight back against the dangerous ideologies being forced upon our communities by the federal administration—

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whether it is dismantling DEI initiatives that help
level the playing field for marginalized groups or
stripping education, the rights and freedoms of
immigrants or communities of color. So I urge my

colleagues to support Resolutions 775 and 776.

I also want to give a shoutout to Joy-Ann Reid,

(TIMER CHIMES) the first Black woman to anchor

primetime tv news on a major cable network, who was

removed, and we stand with her. Thank you.
