Number 97, sponsored by Council 24 Member and Committee Member Sandra Ung, in relation

to increasing the civil penalty for repeated

The Committee previously heard Introduction Number 97 at a hearing on February 27, 2024, where it received testimony from representatives of the Department of Sanitation, environmental advocates, and interested members of the public.

I would like now to pass it over to Council Member Ung to speak about her bill.

COUNCIL MEMBER UNG: Thank you, Chair Abreu and my fellow Committee Members, for giving me the opportunity to speak on behalf of Intro. 97. This legislation is an important step toward ensuring our city remains clean and vibrant for all who live, work, and visit here. The primary objective for Intro. 97 is clear, to address the persistent issue of litter and debris in front of commercial, manufacturing, and industrial businesses by increasing the fines for chronic violators of our City's sanitation laws. I want to emphasize that this legislation is not designed to place additional burdens on small businesses, which are the backbone of our economy. We all know that the majority of business owners are responsible and conscientious members of our community. However, we cannot deny

there are some business owners who continually flout these rules, undermining our collective effort to keep our city clean. It is for these repeat offenders that Intro. 97 introduces stricter penalties. I am pleased to report that Intro. 97 has the full support of the Department of Sanitation. They agree that higher fines for repeat offenders will be available too in their mission to keep our city clean. Finally, I want to thank my fellow Committee Members. I know the negotiations with this bill have been a trying time for both you and your hardworking staff members, and I appreciate your patience and your support as we prepare to move this legislation out of the Committee and before the full City Council vote. Thank you.

just want to speak briefly on Introduction 97-C. I'm absolutely sympathetic to the needs of communities who have really bad actors littering their streets and neighborhoods. Bad actors is maybe an understatement. Some of the pictures I've seen from places across the city are outrageous. However, I remain concerned, despite improvements at the bill since introduction, that it could be that actors who do not deserve to be punished to the degree envisioned by the legislation could end up being

1 COMMITTEE ON SANITATION AND SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT 7 2 punished as such along the same lines as those who 3 are the truly bad actors, and that's why I'm hoping 4 that at some point down the line we could pass other measures that will protect business owners, not from 5 this Commissioner. I think this Commissioner and her 6 7 team are phenomenal, but we have to pass legislation 8 that envisions the agency at some point being in less capable hands, and so that's why I'm hoping that we have some kind of photographic evidence requirement 10 11 adopted down the line, and that's why I'll be voting 12 no on Introduction 97-C and aye on the rest. As the gentleman from Staten Island said, we 2.3 want a cleaner city and there are a lot of things that we can do to get a cleaner city. The bill that 24

we're voting on today doesn't penalize the people who

It penalizes the victims, the store owners, the business owners in front of whose business the perpetrator, the litterer, walked and dropped their coffee cup or Kit Kat wrapper, and the argument that I've heard is, well, there are businesses that say, look, in a great city like New York, it's cost of doing business, we'll take the fine and have a great day, but we're not going to bother cleaning, and I don't think that represents the majority of business owners in the city. What I do believe, though, is that argument is belied by the language of the bill. What we're doing is we're raising the third violation so, in other words, somebody got one violation, they got a second violation the same year, they got a third violation in the same year, we're raising that by 50 bucks. If somebody is inclined to say that they don't care about getting a ticket, the 50-dollar difference from 450 to 500 is not going to make them start caring, but what it does do is it penalizes the store owner that happens to be unlucky enough to have their store in front of a bus stop and, for the extra 50 dollars, I think there is a point in time that we have to say, what are we doing to New Yorkers in this Council?
