6 will now have today's invocation which will be  
7 delivered by the legendary Cardinal Timothy Dolan,  
8 Archbishop of New York of St. Patrick's Cathedral  
9 which is located on Fifth Avenue in Manhattan.

10 CARDINAL TIMOTHY DOLAN: Let us pray.

11 God is for us a refuge and strength, a helper close  
12 at home and time of distress, so we shall not fear.  
13 Though the earth might rock, though the mountains  
14 fall into the depths of the sea, even though its  
15 waters rage and foam, even though the mountains be  
16 shaken, the Lord of Hosts is with us. The God of  
17 Jacob is our stronghold. The waters of a river give  
18 joy to God's city, God's city, that holy place where  
19 the most-high dwells. God is within here. That city  
20 cannot be shaken. God will help it at the dawning of  
21 the day. Nations are in tumult, kingdoms are shaken.  
22 The Lord lifts his voice. The earth shrinks away,  
23 because the Lord of Hosts is with us. The God of  
24 Jacob is our stronghold. Consider those works of the  
25 Lord. He puts it in towards all the earth. The

1 spear he snaps, he burns the shields with fire. Be  
2 still and know that I am God, supreme among the  
3 nation, supreme on the earth. The Lord of Hosts is  
4 with us, the God of Jacob is our stronghold, and he  
5 lives and reigns for ever and ever. Amen. Amen.  
6 Thanks, Madam Speaker, for the honor of leading  
7 prayer, and thanks to all of you distinguished  
8 leaders of this city that I've come to love over my  
9 past 17 years as Archbishop, and please, be as good  
10 to my successor who will be installed a week from  
11 tomorrow as you have been to me. A deal? Right.  
12 Thank you. God bless, alright?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you. I will  
16 now ask Council Member Joann Ariola to spread the  
17 invocation on the record.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER ARIOLA: Thank you,  
19 Majority Leader. First, I would like to wish the  
20 Cardinal an early happy birthday which will happen on  
21 February 6<sup>th</sup>. Happy birthday to you. Many and more  
22 happy and healthy. Cardinal Timothy Dolan served as  
23 the Archbishop of New York from 2009 to 2025 and  
24 served as the Archbishop of Milwaukee for nearly  
25 seven years before that. He was made a Cardinal by

1 Pope Benedict XVI in 2012, and in that capacity has  
2 worked hard to spread the Catholic faith in an  
3 increasingly secularized world. Cardinal Dolan has  
4 served as a strong voice for persecuted Christians  
5 across the globe and has repeatedly advocating what  
6 he calls Christophobic [sic] terrorism, a major  
7 foreign policy priority. In his own words, when it  
8 comes to the persecution of Christians, we are  
9 talking about an international emergency, and we  
10 should never apologize for keeping the issue alive in  
11 public discourse. A major facet of religious life in  
12 New York City for almost 17 years, Cardinal Dolan has  
13 truly been New York's shepherd. Thank you again,  
14 Majority Leader, Speaker Menin. I would like to  
15 thank Cardinal Dolan for being here today, and I make  
16 a motion for unanimous consent to spread the  
17 invocation in full upon the record.

18

1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 12

2 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you, Council  
3 Member. Messages and papers from the Mayor?

4 COMMITTEE CLERK: None.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Communication from

13 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you. We  
14 will now have communication from Speaker Julie Menin.

15 SPEAKER MENIN: Thank you, and I really  
16 want to thank everyone for being on time. So,  
17 really, it's great. Thank you. So, before we talk  
18 about today's Stated Meeting, I first of all,  
19 Cardinal Dolan, want to thank you for everything you  
20 have done on behalf of our city. During times of  
21 crisis and times of pain, you have brought our city  
22 together in a true interfaith way that has affected  
23 every single one of us, and we can't thank you enough  
24 for your service and your leadership. And we're  
25 really, really going to miss you. Thanks, Cardinal.

1 Thank you so much. Thank you for being here. So,  
2 before we talk about today's Stated Meeting, I want  
3 to start with a few brief acknowledgements.  
4

5 Obviously, over the last several days we witnessed a  
6 truly historic snowstorm, the worst we've seen  
7 honestly in five years, and dangerously cold  
8 temperatures that tragically claimed the lives of 10  
9 New Yorkers. A storm of this magnitude required a  
10 comprehensive all-government, hands-on-deck response.

11 I want to first thank the Sanitation Workers who  
12 worked around the clock toiling away in often times  
13 very dangerous conditions to keep our streets clear  
14 and clean, and I want to thank City Hall, the first  
15 responders, and all the city agencies for their hard  
16 work in keeping New Yorkers safe. I also want to  
17 briefly acknowledge events happening beyond New York  
18 City that have understandably caused concern here at  
19 home. What is unfolding in Minnesota is more than  
20 merely disturbing. It flies in the face of what  
21 government and law enforcement are entrusted to do  
22 which is protect the public. In the past several  
23 weeks, we have seen that two individuals have been  
24 fatally shot, and there have been multiple reports of  
25 children being taken into custody. These actions are

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2 endangering the public, and they are eroding trust in  
3 government institutions. This is untenable. It's  
4 unsafe, and it's an unacceptable situation, and the  
5 public deserves full transparency and accountability.  
6 And while I'm not able to discuss details to protect  
7 the privacy and integrity of the ongoing process, our  
8 Council employee Rafael who remains in ICE custody,  
9 despite having all of his legal work authorization  
10 papers is totally and wholly unacceptable. We are  
11 working around the clock for his safe return, and I  
12 will have more to say on that in the coming weeks.  
13 With that, turning to this afternoon's Stated  
14 Meeting. I first of all want to begin by  
15 acknowledging the Rabbi in Council Member Schulman's  
16 district who was verbally and physically assaulted on  
17 Tuesday in an abhorrent anti-Semitic attack. And  
18 just last night in Council Member Hudson's district--  
19 I know we were on the phone last night about this. A  
20 vehicle struck the entrance to 770 Chabad World  
21 Headquarters in yet another deeply disturbing  
22 incident that is under investigation by the NYPD, and  
23 we've been in close contact last night and today with  
24 the NYPD. These have become almost daily occurrences  
25 now and it is intolerable in every way. I was in

1  
2 Borough Park, Brooklyn just a few days ago where 73  
3 swastikas were painted on slides, on children's play  
4 equipment. It's truly horrific, and we are taking  
5 action to put an end to that. January 27<sup>th</sup> was  
6 Holocaust Remembrance Day when we honor the memory of  
7 millions of Jewish people and other victims who were  
8 murdered during the Holocaust. I really want to say  
9 as the daughter and granddaughter of Holocaust  
10 survivors, I would not be here today without their  
11 courage and their strength, and it is critical that  
12 we ensure that this history is shared, and I want to  
13 thank so many colleagues who went this week to the  
14 Museum of Jewish Heritage to visit the permanent  
15 Holocaust exhibition. Thank you so much for  
16 attending. On a lighter note, I want to wish a very  
17 happy birthday to Council Members Shahana Hanif and  
18 Harvey Epstein who share the same birthday, February  
19 5<sup>th</sup>. Birthday twins. And I also want to welcome our  
20 Majority Leader's father, Juan Abreu, to the Council  
21 Chambers today. Juan, thank you so much for joining  
22 us today. We really appreciate you being here. And  
23 now with that, we're going to move onto our stated  
24 agenda. So, today, the New York City Council is  
25 taking action that is both rare and it's incredibly

1 consequential. We are going to override more vetoes  
2 in one day than this City Council has done in the  
3 past decade. That-- yes.

4 [applause]

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6 SPEAKER MENIN: And these last-minute,  
7 late-night vetoes that we received from Mayor Eric  
8 Adams, again, stood in the way of the progress of  
9 this Council in terms of worker protection, street  
10 vendor protection, so many important issues, taxi  
11 drivers-- so many-- so many different issues that we  
12 were legislating, and so that is why I'm so thrilled  
13 that we are doing these overrides today. These  
14 overrides reflect legislation that's been debated  
15 thoroughly, refined carefully, and supported by a  
16 clear super majority of elected representatives from  
17 across our city. When the Council acts with that  
18 level of consensus, we have an obligation to follow  
19 through. The Council will vote to advance the  
20 following bills that promote good government and  
21 transparency, because that is what New Yorkers expect  
22 and deserve. So I'm going to read through them.  
23 Introduction 1279B, sponsored by former Deputy  
24 Speaker Diana Ayala, would limit rules issued by the  
25 Department of Sanitation prohibiting supplemental



1 sanitation service providers from placing refuse or  
2 recycling by public litter baskets and further  
3 requiring them to set material out for collection by  
4 DSNY in rigid receptacles with tight-fitting lids.

5 Thank you to the staff, Morganne Barrett [sp?].

6 Introduction 125A, also sponsored by our former

7 Deputy Speaker, would require that in most

8 circumstances, the NYPD must obtain the consent of a  
9 parent, legal guardian, or attorney before collecting

10 a DNA sample from a minor. We want to thank our

11 staff, Jeremy Whiteman [sp?], who worked on this.

12 Introduction 1391A, also known as the Aland Etienne

13 Safety and Security Act, sponsored by our former

14 Speaker Adrienne Adams, would direct security guard

15 employers to provide their employees with minimum

16 wage, paid vacation time, and supplemental benefits.

17 This legislation was inspired by the heroic of Aland

18 Etienne, a former 32BJ security guard who literally

19 put his life on the line, closing down the elevator

20 banks, saving lives so additional people were not

21 harmed in that fatal shooting over the summer. Thank

22 you to the staff, Sarah Swaine [sp?], to Natalie

23 Meltzer [sp?], to Rachel Cordero [sp?]. Introduction

24 479A, sponsored by Council Member Julie Won, would  
25

1 require the City Chief Procurement Officer to  
2 establish standards and procedures for contractors to  
3 determine the existence of conflicts of interest and  
4 misconduct concerning city contracts valued over  
5 \$100,000. Thank you to Alex Paulenoff and Alex  
6 Yablon for their work on this. Introduction 1412A,  
7 also known as the Safer Sanctuary Act sponsored by  
8 Council Member Tiffany Cabán, would bar federal  
9 immigration authorities from maintaining offices on  
10 land under the New York City Department of  
11 Correction's jurisdiction. It would also man the  
12 city's sanctuary city laws to account recurrent  
13 federal immigration enforcement practices. Thank you  
14 to Nicole Cata [sp?], Rebecca Barilla [sp?], and  
15 Nicholas Widzowski for your work on this.  
16 Introduction 1297A, sponsored by Council Member  
17 Selvena Brooks-Powers, would create a civil cause of  
18 action for crimes of violence motivated by gender  
19 that occurred prior to January 9<sup>th</sup>, 2022. It would  
20 allow such claims against any part who committed,  
21 directed, enabled, participated, or conspired in the  
22 commission of a crime of violence motivated by gender  
23 to bring a civil claim against that party. Thank you  
24 to Jahari Fraiser [sp?], Juanita John [sp?], Julie  
25

1 Goldsmith-Pinkum [sp?], Sarah Liss [sp?], Sahar  
2 Moazami and Smita Deshmukh [sp?] for their work on  
3 this. Introduction 1120B, sponsored by Council  
4 Member Amanda Farías, would set timelines for  
5 decisions regarding the sale of co-op apartments.  
6 Thank you to Natasha Bynum [sp?], Sierra Townsend  
7 [sp?], Austin Malone, Billy Eck [sp?], Dirk Spencer,  
8 Jose Conde [sp?], and Brad Reid [sp?]. Introduction  
9 570B, sponsored by Council Member Gale Brewer would  
10 create a New York City Land Bank to acquire and  
11 manage vacant, abandoned, tax-delinquent and  
12 foreclosed properties for the goal of promoting the  
13 preservation of homeownership and home equity,  
14 prevention of displacement , and putting properties  
15 to productive community use. Introduction 1407A,  
16 sponsored by former Speaker Adams would authorize the  
17 City to sell tax liens past 2028, but only to a City  
18 Land Bank and add additional protections for primary  
19 resident homeowners. Introduction 149A sponsored by  
20 Council Member Sandy Nurse would require the  
21 Commissioner of Finance to report annually on  
22 properties encumbered by chronically unresolved tax  
23 liens that remain unsatisfied for 36 months or more  
24 after being sold. And introduction 1420 A, also  
25

1 sponsored by Council Member Nurse, would require the  
2 Commissioner of Finance to require purchasers of tax  
3 liens to make best efforts to transfer the liens to  
4 the City Land Bank upon certain triggering events.  
5 Thank you to Nick Connell and Emre Edev [sp?], for  
6 their work on this. Introduction 1443A, also  
7 sponsored by Council Member Nurse, would require that  
8 starting July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2027, 50 percent of newly-  
9 constructed rental units financed by the city be  
10 affordable for very low-income households, and at  
11 least 30 percent for extremely low-income households.  
12 And Introduction 958A, sponsored by former Speaker  
13 Adams, would approximately double the production of  
14 affordable homeownership opportunities, financed by  
15 the city by requiring that at least four percent of  
16 all newly constructed affordable units be for home  
17 ownership. Thank you to Ann Mconney [sp?], William  
18 Vidal [sp?], Brian Paul [sp?], Deborah Kerzhner  
19 [sp?], and Kaitlin Greer [sp?]. Introduction 431B,  
20 sponsored by Council Member Pierina Sanchez, would  
21 expand business licensing for food and general  
22 vendors by making 2,200 additional supervisory  
23 licensed applications available to prospective mobile  
24 food vendors annually from 2026 until 2030, and  
25

1 10,500 new general vending licenses in 2027. It would  
2 also expand street vendor training and increase  
3 inspections of street vendor setups to ensure  
4 compliance with new requirements. Introduction 251A  
5 sponsored by Council Member Amanda Farías would  
6 authorize the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene  
7 and the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection  
8 to issue license applications to mobile food and  
9 general vendors until the license is issued reached  
10 the capped amount. And Intro 408A, sponsored by our  
11 Public Advocate who's here, Jumaane Williams, would  
12 create a Division of Street Vendor Assistance within  
13 the Department of Small Business Services to assist  
14 street vendors. Thank you to Sarah Swain and Natalie  
15 Meltzer. Finally-- okay, finally. Introduction  
16 276A, sponsored by Council Member Shekar Krishan,  
17 would prohibit--

18 [applause]

19 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Please, no  
20 clapping in the chambers, please. Use your hand  
21 gestures. Thank you.

22 ASSISTANT VICE PRESIDENT MERRILL: Would  
23 prohibit high-volume, for-hire vehicle services from  
24 de-activating drivers unless you'd just cause a bona  
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1  
2 fide economic reason or if required by law. Thank  
3 you to Ricardo Licea [sp?] and Mark Chen. Okay, that  
4 was a mouthful, but those are the overrides. It's  
5 important that I also speak about another urgent  
6 issue before the Council today, and that is anti-  
7 Semitism. As I mentioned, last week, 73 swastikas  
8 were graffitied across a children's playground in  
9 Borough Park. It's disgusting. It's deplorable, but  
10 unfortunately and sadly it is not new. Jewish New  
11 Yorkers make up roughly 10 percent of our city's  
12 population, yet last year they were the victims of  
13 more than half of all reported hate crimes. That's  
14 the reality we cannot normalize and we cannot ignore.  
15 We also are-- and I'm very happy about this new  
16 Committee to Combat Hate chaired by Council Member  
17 Yusef Salaam that I know is going to do amazing work  
18 combatting all forms of hate across the city. So  
19 thank you for chairing that very, very important  
20 committee. So, today, we are taking action on  
21 antisemitism. As part of the Council's five-point  
22 action plan to combat antisemitism, we're introducing  
23 the following legislation to address this crisis  
24 head-on. Introduction 731 which is sponsored by me  
25 will require police to submit a plan to establish

1 security perimeters at places of worship. This bill  
2 will fully-protect first amendment rights to protest.  
3 And I really want to emphasize that. We are not doing  
4 anything in the bills to penalize protests. We want  
5 to make sure that people have the right to peacefully  
6 protest. What we're trying to do is protect houses  
7 of worship and schools. Introduction 751, sponsored  
8 by Council Member Dinowitz, will require police to  
9 submit a plan to establish security parameters at  
10 educational facilities. Introduction 726, sponsored  
11 by Council Member Narcisse, will build upon an  
12 existing security guard reimbursement program for  
13 non-public schools. Introduction 722, sponsored by  
14 Council Member Maloney, will require the Mayor to  
15 designate an agency or office that in consultation  
16 with NYCEM and NYPD would support all religious  
17 institutions in establishing emergency plans. Intro  
18 796, sponsored by Council Member Restler, will  
19 establish a hotline for receiving reports from the  
20 public regarding incidents motivated by anti-Semitic  
21 and anti-Asian, LGBTQ, and other hate bias. And then  
22 finally-- two more. Introduction 757, sponsored by  
23 Council Member Abreu, will require the DOE to  
24 distribute age-appropriate materials to middle and  
25

1 high school students regarding the risks and dangers  
2 associated with social media for youth. Introduction  
3 2066, sponsored by Council Member Dinowitz, will  
4 require the NYPD to report on the status of all hate  
5 crime cases so that each member will get that  
6 information up to date within their district. In  
7 addition, the Jewish Caucus voted today to appoint a  
8 bipartisan taskforce chaired by Council Member  
9 Dinowitz and Vernikov to combat anti-Semitism. And  
10 lastly, on the veto overrides, I do want to mention  
11 we're going to be doing some work moving forward  
12 bills that we did not override. There are a number  
13 of different paths forward for them, so I look  
14 forward to working with the bill sponsors on that so  
15 that we can take the policy goals at play and try to  
16 really work them forward in a way where we can get a  
17 super majority of support and address some legal  
18 issues. So, with that, I'm going to turn it back  
19 over to our majority leader.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you, Speaker  
22 Menin. We will now move into discussion of general  
23 orders beginning with Council Member Brewer followed  
24 by Pierina Sanchez.



1  
2 COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very  
3 much. I'm talking about the Land Use bill for an  
4 override. That's 570B in its old rendition. As the  
5 Speaker said, this is going to be run as a Land Use  
6 Land Bank Board comprised of the Mayor, the Finance  
7 Commissioner, the Commissioner of HPD housing, three  
8 people appointed by the Speaker, and one person  
9 appointed by the Mayor with advice and consent of the  
10 Council. This Land Bank-- and there are Land Banks  
11 all across the country and in our state-- would be  
12 empowered under state and local law to purchase tax  
13 lien from the City to enforce that there would be  
14 policies and procedures to promote the goals of yes,  
15 collecting outstanding revenues-- and that was a  
16 concern of the previous administration. We still  
17 want to collect revenues, but we also want to  
18 preserve ownership and equity interest in homes. We  
19 want to prevent the displacement of residents from  
20 their dwellings. We want to promote proper and  
21 effective management of residences, and we want to  
22 prevent recidivism among properties with tax liens.  
23 Basically, this Land Bank will replace New York  
24 City's private sector-driven high-bidder tax lien  
25 sales with a public-focused non-profit approach. I

1 want to thank Emra Edev [sp?] from the Finance  
2 Division for his incredible amount of work on this  
3 bill, and I hope that this is one of the tools in the  
4 toolbox that we will be able to tax liens that would  
5 normally go to the highest bidder, turn them into  
6 affordable housing, and it's a great tool in the  
7 toolbox for affordable housing. Thank you very much.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you.

9 Council Member Pierina Sanchez, followed by Council  
10 Member Nurse.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER P. SANCHEZ: Thank you,  
12 Majority Leader, and thank you Speaker Menin for your  
13 leadership and for standing with vendors first as the  
14 Chair of Consumer and Worker Protection and now as  
15 Speaker. 431B replaces decades of dysfunction with a  
16 system that is more just for vendors, more  
17 predictable for brick and mortar businesses, and that  
18 delivers safer, cleaner and more orderly shared  
19 spaces for all New Yorkers. I want to be clear.  
20 Today, 70 percent of food vendors citywide and up to  
21 90 percent in neighborhoods like mine are unlicensed,  
22 as are nearly 40 percent of general vendors. This  
23 bill is not about increasing the number of vendors on  
24 the street. It is about bringing existing vendors  
25

1 into regulation. Intro 431B expands access to  
2 licenses and strengthens enforcement, creates clear  
3 suspension and revocation standards that will mean  
4 something when you have a license, and establishes  
5 new responsibilities around cleanliness and illegal  
6 dumping. Thank you to the indefatigable and members  
7 of the Street Vendor Project, the many brick and  
8 mortar businesses, the bodegas, supermarkets, the  
9 mercados, restaurants who did not stop taking my  
10 calls, the agency staff who worked with us in good  
11 faith, the new mayor and his leadership who have said  
12 they're committed to good implementation of these  
13 reforms and to all of our colleagues who will vote to  
14 override this bill today. As a daughter and  
15 granddaughter of street vendors, this historic moment  
16 is also deeply personal. We are ushering in a new  
17 era in how this city treats its smallest businesses  
18 and manages shared public space. I, and I know this  
19 Council, will fight tooth and nail to ensure every  
20 part of this law is fully and fairly implemented so  
21 that these reforms can deliver on their promise.  
22 Thank you.

23  
24 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member  
25 Nurse followed by Public Advocate Jumaane Williams.

COUNCIL MEMBER NURSE: Thank you,

Majority Leader. It's often said that the Council focuses too much on the 70 percent of New Yorkers who rent their homes and not enough on the 30 percent who own. While I'm proud to be pushing for stronger tenant protections and real affordable housing, I've also spent the last four years trying to change the tax lien sale, the primary way our city collects and enforces city tax debt since Giuliani created it in 1996. Working with the Coalition to Abolish the Tax Lien Sale, we spent countless hours helping to create offramps for relief and ultimately saved homeowners from displacement. Last session we passed Local Law 82 which reformed the cruel way our tax lien sale accelerated foreclosures, particularly in the Black community. Even with this historic change, people were falling through the cracks. Filmore Brown lost his home to foreclosure for just \$5,000 in water debt. A constituent of mine, Mr. Lopez, was paralyzed by fear and confused about how to get out of debt until outreach workers, including my staff, repeatedly called him and pushed for him to get help. In December we passed four bills to finally put a nail in the coffin of Guiliani's privatized debt

1 collection system. Intros 570, 1407, 1419, and 1420  
2 will once and for all end the system that has enabled  
3 the sale of tax liens to investor-backed trusts and  
4 better protect the Black and Brown homeowners who  
5 feel like the city is abandoning them. I ask for your  
6 support on these bills. And just lastly, just to  
7 take a point of privilege, I just want to thank  
8 everyone who supported our good faith effort to pass  
9 COPA these last few months, and particularly I'm  
10 especially grateful to members of the Progressive  
11 Caucus. Thank you for going to bat. At the heart of  
12 it, COPA is modest strategic intervention in our  
13 housing crisis, and we are losing our working-class  
14 New Yorkers while faceless LLCs and private equity  
15 investors are scooping up our buildings and our  
16 neighborhoods and flipping them for profit. That is  
17 a fact. COPA is good policy. Our government should  
18 be intervening--

19  
20 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: [interposing]

21 Council Member, sorry.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER NURSE: in every way, and  
23 I thank you.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: This is not an  
25 item on the General Orders Calendar.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER NURSE: Thank you,  
3 Majority Leader. I'm looking forward to working with  
4 all you, introduce it and get it done.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Public Advocate  
6 Jumaane Williams followed by Council Member Brooks-  
7 Powers.

8 PUBLIC ADVOCATE WILLIAMS: Thank you, Mr.  
9 Majority leader. I want to thank Speaker Menin,  
10 Chair Epstein, and members of the Committee on  
11 Consumer and Worker Protection for your work on  
12 getting Intro 408 out of committee onto the Council  
13 floor to override a bunch of bills that we're  
14 overriding the veto by former Mayor Eric Adams in his  
15 parting gift to many of us. I definitely want to say  
16 on this record, I really, really like the sound of  
17 the word former. Last month, this council together  
18 as a united body got together with advocates and so  
19 many who were affected to address the reality of the  
20 stresses that New York City street vendors face,  
21 including substantial fines for operating without a  
22 requisite permit, unnecessary violence from  
23 enforcement officers. Highly-publicized ICE raids in  
24 New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, and now Minneapolis  
25 have instilled fear upon the members of New York's

1 most iconic and renowned industry, street vending.  
2  
3 Until recently, the number of available licenses to  
4 sell food and merchandizing on a city sidewalk were  
5 capped for decades until Local Law 18 of 2018. One  
6 can spend decades on a waiting list hoping to get  
7 approved for license and Local Law 18's increase in  
8 license was not sufficient to address this problem. I  
9 spoke to some vendors today. Just last week, all of  
10 their equipment, merchandise was taken in the middle  
11 of the night while they were sleeping right outside  
12 of this building. The legislation I have alongside  
13 Council Member Sanchez's and Council Member Farías is  
14 designed to help establish a more supportive  
15 infrastructure for vendors. It will create a  
16 division of street vendor assistance within the  
17 Department of Small Business Services to provide this  
18 smallest of small businesses, primarily Black and  
19 Brown and immigrant communities who need protection,  
20 and the ability to have some kind of recourse and  
21 some guidance. So, I thank this council for their  
22 leadership. I'm looking forward to the override of  
23 this and many other bills. And thank you to our  
24 street vendors who feed us, clothe us, provide so  
25 many services in some of the most affordable ways in

1 a time when we are talking about affordability.

2 Thank you so much.

3  
4 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you, Public  
5 Advocate. We'll now turn it over to Council Member  
6 Brooks-Powers followed by Council Member Restler.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you.  
8 Colleagues, today's override vote is a reaffirmation  
9 of who we are as a council. Intro 1297 exists  
10 because survivors were told incorrectly that the law  
11 meant to protect them might-- that meant to protect  
12 them no longer applied. Because an appellate ruling  
13 introduced confusion, and because a veto threatened  
14 to shut the courthouse doors altogether. This  
15 legislation restores what was always intended, a  
16 gender-motivated violence act that is clear,  
17 enforceable, and durable. A law that allows  
18 survivors to pursue accountability, not just from  
19 abusers, but from the institutions that enable harm  
20 or failed to act. Our vote today makes something  
21 else clear as well. When survivor's rights are at  
22 risk, this council does not hesitate. We do not look  
23 away, and we do not allow legal loopholes to replace  
24 justice. This override is necessary. It is  
25 principled, and it is the right thing to do. Thank



1  
2 you, Speaker Menin, for your leadership, and I urge  
3 my colleagues to support this veto override. I'd  
4 also like to thank my Deputy Chief of Staff, Julian  
5 Martin [sp?] for his tremendous work and labor of  
6 love on this piece of legislation. Thank you.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member  
8 Restler followed by Council Member Gutiérrez.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: Thank you very  
10 much, Majority Leader. And I want to commend my  
11 colleagues and this council for overturning 17 vetoes  
12 today. That's more vetoes that have been overturned  
13 in the last 12 years combined. Former Mayor,  
14 thankfully, Eric Adams went on a veto spree at the  
15 end of his term in his very final hours at City Hall.  
16 But I'd be remiss to not say that I'm disappointed  
17 that we are failing to override two vetoes in  
18 particular related to--

19 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: [interposing]  
20 Council Member, sorry, you have to be speaking on  
21 matters regarding to the General Orders Calendar.  
22 COPA and CCRB is not--

23 COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: [interposing] It  
24 should have been on the agenda today.

COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: on the General Orders Calendar.

COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: But if this is our opportunity to override the veto--

COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: [interposing] Council Member, you have to stick to General Orders Calendar. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: Okay. I will come back. Thank you very much.

COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member Gutiérrez?

COUNCIL MEMBER GUTIÉRREZ: Amen. Okay, thank you so much, Majority Leader. I want to take this time to uplift my colleagues and our Speaker who worked so incredibly hard last session to pass important legislation. I also just want to shout out the entire Ledge [sic] team, many of who are still here and who really threw down at that last month's-- and have been throwing down. So, just want to acknowledge the work that it has taken to even do the overrides today. It's unfortunate that we have to spend as much energy as we are, but I just want to uplift Council Members Brooks-Powers for her survivor's bill, Council Member Krishnan for his

1  
2 deactivation bill, Council Member Pierina Sanchez on  
3 her vendors bill, and of course, Council Member Nurse  
4 on her tax lien sale, and want to express my same  
5 sentiment about hoping to get to a good place with  
6 COPA down the line. And before you cut me off,  
7 that's it. I'm going to say, I just want to uplift  
8 my Council Members, my colleagues and the Speaker for  
9 doing this extra work to override these important and  
10 necessary bills to protect workers and survivors.  
11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member De  
13 La Rosa?

14 COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: I'll explain  
15 my vote later. Thank you.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Seeing no one else  
17 signed up to speak. Report of special committees?

18 COMMITTEE CLERK: None.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Report of standing  
20 committees?

21 COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee  
22 on Consumer and Worker Protection, Intros 408A, 431B,  
23 1251A, 1391A and their accompanying mayoral vetoes  
24 M5, M6, M12, and M15.  
25

1  
2 SPEAKER MENIN: The vetoes will be filed  
3 and the bills coupled on General Orders.

4 COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee  
5 on Contracts, Intro 479A and M7, its mayoral veto.

6 SPEAKER MENIN: M7 will be filed and the  
7 bill coupled on General Orders.

8 COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee  
9 on Finance, Intros 570B, 1407A, 1419A, and 1420A and  
10 their corresponding mayoral vetoes, M8, M16, M18, and  
11 M19.

12 SPEAKER MENIN: The vetoes will be filed  
13 and the bills coupled on General Orders.

14 COMMITTEE CLERK: Pre-considered Reso 34,  
15 Penn South [sic].

16 SPEAKER MENIN: Coupled.

17 COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee  
18 on Housing and Buildings, Intro 1120B and M11, its  
19 mayoral veto.

20 SPEAKER MENIN: M11 will be filed and the  
21 bill coupled on General Orders.

22 COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee  
23 on Immigration, Intro 1412A and M17, its mayoral  
24 veto.

2 SPEAKER MENIN: M17 will be filed and the  
3 bill coupled.

4 COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee  
5 on Land Use Intros 958A and 1443A and their mayoral  
6 vetos, M10 and M21.

7 SPEAKER MENIN: The vetoes will be filed  
8 and all bills coupled on General Orders.

9 COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee  
10 on Public Safety, Intro 125A and M3, its mayoral  
11 veto.

12 SPEAKER MENIN: M3 will be filed and the  
13 bill coupled.

14 COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee  
15 on Rules, Privileges, Elections, Standards and  
16 Ethics, Pre-considered Resos 144 and 145, committee  
17 changes.

18 SPEAKER MENIN: Coupled on General  
19 Orders.

20 COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee  
21 on Sanitation and Solid Waste Management, Intro 1279B  
22 and M13, its corresponding mayoral veto.

23 SPEAKER MENIN: M13 will be filed and the  
24 bill coupled.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, Intro 276A and M4, its corresponding veto.

SPEAKER MENIN: M4 will be filed and the bill coupled.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Report of the Committee on Women and Gender Equity, Intro 1297A and M14, its mayoral veto.

SPEAKER MENIN: M14 will be filed and the bill coupled on General Orders.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Resolution appointing various persons, Commission of Deeds.

SPEAKER MENIN: Coupled on General Orders.

COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member Krishnan, I failed to recognize you earlier, you may - you may have two minutes to speak on General Orders.

COUNCIL MEMBER KRISHNAN: Thank you, Mr. Majority Leader. I appreciate it very much. Today is a historic day under leadership of Speaker Menin where we are overriding a record number of vetoes, marking a sharp departure from a very troubling chapter in our city's history when it came to the

1 last mayor and his administration. Today, we are  
2 taking on Uber, Lyft, and corporate corruption. In  
3 the last hours of Eric Adams' term, one that was rife  
4 with corruption and selling out our city, his legacy  
5 was further tarnished by his last-minute attempt to  
6 betray 100,000 workers, Uber and Lyft drivers, many  
7 of whom are immigrants in our city. Today, we are  
8 righting that wrong and overturning his anti-  
9 immigrant and anti-worker vetoes. My legislation to  
10 end unfair firings of Uber and Lyft drivers is the  
11 largest due process protection for these workers in  
12 the nation. As we stand here today, I know the  
13 nation is watching New York City. When drivers see  
14 the New York City Council override this veto, they  
15 will look to their state legislatures and City  
16 Councils across the country to pass the same  
17 protection for them. These past two years, Uber and  
18 Lyft drivers have been scared knowing that this bill-  
19 - sorry, Uber and Lyft have been scared knowing that  
20 this bill has the ingredients to start a driver's  
21 rights movement. They've used their billion-dollar  
22 war chest to spread fear and false information to New  
23 Yorkers, because that is the only thing they know how  
24 to do, waste money and make people afraid. The  
25

1  
2 stance we are taking today will make our nation  
3 better and bring more rights to the workers who make  
4 our city run. Our drivers are often the first people  
5 we meet in the city, taking us from the airport to  
6 our homes, bringing us to a new Broadway show, or  
7 simply helping us get up from one part of the city to  
8 the next safely. They are workers who because of our  
9 winter storm this weekend lost critical hours to earn  
10 money to pay rent next month. We all know how  
11 essential and unrecognized drivers are. Drivers  
12 deserve dignity and fundamental rights, notice, due  
13 process, and a chance to appeal when they've been  
14 wrongfully fired. Today, we will deliver those  
15 rights. I'm thankful to my staff, Chanel Martinez  
16 [sp?], Victoria Opperman [sp?], Hunter Divinagracia  
17 [sp?], Greg Clark [sp?], to our Legislative Counsel,  
18 Mark Chen to where we've gotten today, and to our  
19 Speaker Julie Menin. Driver power, union power.  
20 Thank you everybody.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you, Council  
22 Member. Before we move into the vote on General  
23 Orders, we will now considered the bills vetoed by  
24 former Mayor Adams. These bills are Introductory  
25 numbers 125A, 276A, 408A, 431B, 479A, 570B, 958A,



1120B, 1251A, 1297A, 1279B, 1391A, 1407A, 1412A,  
1419A, 1420A, 1443A. The question before the Council  
now is shall these bills pass. The objections of the  
Mayor notwithstanding.

SPEAKER MENIN: Thank you. I'll now call  
on the Clerk to conduct a roll call vote only the  
bills that were vetoed by former Mayor Adams.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Aldebol?

COUNCIL MEMBER ALDEBOL: Permission to  
explain my vote?

COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
granted.

COUNCIL MEMBER ALDEBOL: Colleagues,  
today, I proudly vote to override all these vetoes;  
17 is amazing. But I especially want to speak on the  
Intro 1391A. I'm especially proud to veto-- override  
this veto. This is a bill about public safety,  
dignity, and basic fairness. Before I came to City  
Council, as many of you know, I was an organizer and  
leader within 32BJ. I walked picket lines with  
security officers. I know many of them and their  
families, and I certainly know the risk that they  
take every single day. These workers are on the  
front lines of almost every type of emergency, and

1 often before other first responders arrive. Yet, too  
2 many are paid poverty wages, lack health care, and  
3 are forced to cycle in and out of jobs in order to  
4 survive. New York City's private security industry  
5 has over 70 percent turnover rate. That is not just  
6 bad for workers, it is dangerous for all of us. The  
7 Aland Etienne Safety and Security Act begins to  
8 address this, but there's way more work to be done.  
9 This sets citywide standards for wages, benefits, and  
10 paid time off for roughly 60,000 security officers,  
11 standards that already exist for officers working on  
12 city contracts. This bill doesn't reinvent the  
13 wheel. It simply says if you protect New Yorkers,  
14 you deserve to live with dignity. This is a historic  
15 bill. It is necessary, and it will make us all  
16 safer. I proudly vote yes to override this veto and  
17 all the other vetoes. Thank you.

18 COMMITTEE CLERK: Ariola?

19 COUNCIL MEMBER ARIOLA: Permission to  
20 explain my vote?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
22 granted.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER ARIOLA: I would just like  
24 to take a moment to wish another birthday boy, Peter  
25

1  
2 Spencer, a happy birthday. We don't know what we  
3 would do without you, Peter. He oftentimes goes  
4 unnoticed, but he is definitely appreciated. On that,  
5 I am voting no on 125A, 276A, 431, 570, 1251, 1391,  
6 1407, 1412, 1420, 1443, and aye on all the rest.

7 COMMITTEE CLERK: Avilés?

8 COUNCIL MEMBER AVILÉS: Permission to  
9 explain my vote?

10 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
11 granted.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER AVILÉS: So, I am very  
13 proud to support my colleague Tiffany Cabán in  
14 successfully overturning this veto around the Safer  
15 Sanctuary Act. The bill will strengthen our  
16 sanctuary city protection apparatus and make sure  
17 that no future mayor can bring ICE operations back  
18 onto Rikers Island to engage in well-documented  
19 illegal behavior. I also want to thank my colleague  
20 Pierina Sanchez for shepherding the street vendor  
21 reform package. It is the first time we are taking  
22 meaningful steps to try to address what is a very  
23 complex issue, but what is clearly important to New  
24 York City and to so many of our communities. I would  
25 also like to note on the issue of sanctuary city

1 policies that what we are seeing across the country  
2 is escalating violence and attacks on the right to  
3 protest, and we are witnessing ICE murder U.S.  
4 citizens, hurt families and other individuals, and it  
5 is purely unacceptable. I'm deeply disappointed that  
6 we did not vote on CCRB reform nor COPA. Thank you.

8 COMMITTEE CLERK: Banks?

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BANKS: Aye on all, and  
10 happy to override these bills.

11 COMMITTEE CLERK: Bottcher?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER BOTTCHEER: Aye.

13 COMMITTEE CLERK: Brewer?

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Aye on all.

15 COMMITTEE CLERK: Brooks-Powers?

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: I vote  
17 aye.

18 COMMITTEE CLERK: Cabán?

19 COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Permission to  
20 explain my vote?

21 COMMITTEE CLERK: Permission granted.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Thank you. As the  
23 lead sponsor on Intro 1412, the Safer Sanctuary Act,  
24 I am proud to vote to override a former Mayor Eric  
25 Adams veto and urge-- and I'm happy that my

1 colleagues are joining. Urge the rest to do so.  
2  
3 We're at a crossroads in the history of our country.  
4 The brutal assault on Minnesota is just the  
5 beginning, and it is our duty to protect our  
6 communities. The Safer Sanctuary Act was designed  
7 precisely to protect New York City from the Trump  
8 administration's authoritarianism. This legislation  
9 introduces critical expansions to our existing  
10 sanctuary city framework. It extends New York City  
11 sanctuary city limitations on local cooperation,  
12 federal [inaudible] enforcement to include all  
13 agencies and laws being used by the Trump  
14 administration to threaten our communities. And this  
15 means that regardless of which agency is enacting the  
16 horrific Trump/Vance agenda, be it the FBI, the IRS,  
17 the U.S. Marshals, or DHS, our communities are  
18 covered by our sanctuary policies. And second, it  
19 bars any future mayor from re-establishing an ICE  
20 office in our jails as former Mayor Eric Adams tried  
21 to do last year, and these are critical measures to  
22 protect our communities from an increasingly violent  
23 and authoritarian federal government. So, overriding  
24 this veto will demonstrate that the City Council  
25 stands with the people of New York City, the people

1 of Minneapolis, the people of the world, and it will  
2 demonstrate that this body was striving to meet the  
3 moment. So, in the memories of Renne Good, Alex  
4 Pretti, Keith Porter [sic], Severo Digas Gonzales  
5 [sp?], Jamie Garcia [sp?], and every person who has  
6 lost their life in ICE custody, we override this  
7 veto. I vote to override this veto. And I want to  
8 also note my disappointment as well that we will not  
9 be overriding the vetoes on COPA and the critical  
10 bill to give the CCRB direct access to officer body  
11 camera footage. I urge my colleague not to give up on  
12 these housing and safety issues, and I vote aye on  
13 all. Thank you.

14 COMMITTEE CLERK: De La Rosa?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: Permission to  
16 explain my vote?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
18 granted.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: Thank you. I  
20 want to thank Speaker Menin for swift action in  
21 overturning the vetoes by former Mayor Adams. Today,  
22 with these overrides we're uplifting vendors. I want  
23 to thank my colleagues for their leadership. We're  
24 uplifting vendors. We're uplifting drivers, working-

1  
2 class people, security guards, immigrants as we  
3 strengthen our sanctuary cities, and I am proud to  
4 vote in favor of this override. I also must say that  
5 I am disappointed that we will not be overriding  
6 Mayor Adams' veto on COPA today, but this is not and  
7 should not be the end of this conversation. With any  
8 great legislation comes resistance, and also the need  
9 for modifications and amendments, and we will  
10 continue to support the prime sponsor, my colleague  
11 Council Member Nurse, who I believe did an amazing  
12 job trying to listen to all sides as we negotiated  
13 this meaningful piece of legislation. We owe it to  
14 tenants who have lived in dilapidated conditions for  
15 far too long to give them another tool for affordable  
16 housing preservation, and COPA is that tool. So, I  
17 look forward to working with this council to make  
18 sure that we continue that conversation, and I vote  
19 aye on all. Thank you.

20 COMMITTEE CLERK: Dinowitz?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER DINOWITZ: Aye on all.

22 COMMITTEE CLERK: Encarnación?

23 COUNCIL MEMBER ENCARNACIÓN: Aye on all.

24 COMMITTEE CLERK: Epstein?  
25

1 COUNCIL MEMBER EPSTEIN: I'd like to  
2 explain my vote.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
4 granted.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER EPSTEIN: I want to thank  
6 the Speaker for today's historic moment of overriding  
7 17 vetoes. Obviously, the mayor on the eve of his  
8 leaving office too a step to, I believe, harm  
9 vulnerable New Yorkers. Over 20,000 street vendors  
10 in the next few years will get small businesses  
11 because of our vote today. Nearly 100,000 app ride  
12 for-hire vehicle drivers won't be arbitrarily  
13 deactivated. We're going to create opportunities to  
14 expand more of affordable housing for over one  
15 million low-income New Yorkers, further protect our  
16 city against ICE and terrorizing communities, not  
17 just in our city but across our country. This  
18 oversight at the NYPD protecting victims of sexual  
19 assault and sexual violence, improving worker  
20 protections for the security guards who work across  
21 our city. I look forward to also working with the  
22 sponsors of the bills that we aren't moving today, to  
23 COPA, making sure that we have oversight at NYPD, and  
24 creating more larger affordable housing, the stuff  
25



2 that we need to do in this city. New York is  
3 watching us today. People care what we decide. This  
4 is the moment to override these vetoes. This is what  
5 the city needs to do to move forward. I want to thank  
6 the Speaker again for her leadership, and I vote in  
7 the affirmative.

8 COMMITTEE CLERK: Farías?

9 COUNCIL MEMBER FARÍAS: I vote aye on  
10 all.

11 COMMITTEE CLERK: Felder?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER FELDER: I vote no on  
13 Intro 276, 1412, 1443A, 431B, and 1251.

14 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. Feliz?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER FELIZ: Permission to  
16 explain my vote?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
18 granted.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER FELIZ: Proud to vote aye  
20 on all, including on the 17 bill overrides. I'm  
21 especially proud to vote to override vetoes related  
22 to street vendor reform. Great job, Council Member  
23 Sanchez. And also, the bill to protect Uber and Lyft  
24 drivers. Congratulations to Council Member Krishnan.  
25 A few words on that bill. Drivers are some of our

1 most essential workers. If you have an emergency, if  
2 you need to visit a family member or need to get from  
3 point A to point B in the cold, in the rain, in the  
4 snow, or even worse, in the middle of a blizzard, our  
5 drivers are always there for us at all hours, always.  
6 Drivers are essential, but they're also vulnerable.  
7 They can be terminated for no reason, receive very  
8 little to no notice, and even worse, be provided with  
9 very little to no real system to contest accusations.  
10 This is unacceptable. They deserve better. So, I'm  
11 proud to vote yes to override the 17 vetoes. We with  
12 these 17 overrides, we're sending a crystal clear  
13 message that when it comes to protecting the lives  
14 and the hard work and the safety of New Yorkers, this  
15 City Council does not play any games. So, I want to  
16 thank all my colleagues in the City Council. I  
17 especially want to thank our Speaker Menin for making  
18 this a priority and for making this historical day  
19 possible. Thank you so much. Yes on all.

20 COMMITTEE CLERK: Gennaro?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARO: I vote aye on  
22 all with the exception of 125A and 1412A on which I  
23 vote no.

24 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. Gutiérrez?

2 COUNCIL MEMBER GUTIÉRREZ: I vote aye on  
3 all.

4 COMMITTEE CLERK: Hanif?

5 COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Permission to  
6 explain my vote?

7 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
8 granted.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Thank you. And  
10 aye on all. Today's historic day with one setback.  
11 The Council failing to override the veto to support  
12 COPA is going to be a project that this council I  
13 know is committed to. At a time when corporate  
14 landlords and private equity firms are rapidly buying  
15 up our housing stock, this council must stand firm in  
16 protecting tenants and preserving affordability.  
17 COPA gives nonprofit organizations and tenants a  
18 meaningful opportunity to purchase their buildings  
19 when they go up for sale, keeping homes in community  
20 hands, and preventing displacement before it happens.  
21 It's a common-sense bill. It's moderate in scope,  
22 and it's been voted by this body before. We look  
23 forward to making COPA law this year and commit to a  
24 housing system that puts people before profit.

25 COMMITTEE CLERK: Hankerson?

2 COUNCIL MEMBER HANKERSON: In the  
3 strength of the legacy of my predecessor, former  
4 Speaker Adams, I vote aye on all, and I look forward  
5 to working with Council Member Nurse on the COPA bill  
6 in the future.

7 COMMITTEE CLERK: Hanks?

8 COUNCIL MEMBER HANKS: I vote aye.

9 COMMITTEE CLERK: Hudson?

10 COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Permission to  
11 explain my vote?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
13 granted.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Thank you.  
15 Today, I proudly vote aye to override former Mayor  
16 Adams' veto on 17 bills, including landmark  
17 legislation to strengthen job and safety standards  
18 for security personnel in honor of 32BJ member Aland  
19 Etienne and a monumental package that would bring  
20 equity and justice for our street vendors among many  
21 others. But what's most glaring is what is not on  
22 our agenda. This Council has made a decision to cede  
23 its power to a former mayor, one embroiled in  
24 corruption and deeply unpopular with our constituents  
25 by not voting to overturning vetoes on three bills

1 this body passed just one month ago. After a  
2 November election in which our land use authority was  
3 weakened, we are telling the other side of City Hall  
4 that we will not stand firmly behind the legislation  
5 we pass, including common sense legislation to allow  
6 the agency that oversees the NYPD to access body cam  
7 footage, and a second bill that will protect tenants  
8 in dangerous buildings and help preserve affordable  
9 housing. Thank you, Council Member Nurse for your  
10 steadfast leadership on COPA. I look forward to  
11 working with you and Speaker Menin on a new version  
12 of COPA and the CCRB bill. Thank you.

14 COMMITTEE CLERK: Joseph?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: Aye on all.

16 COMMITTEE CLERK: Krishnan?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER KRISHNAN: Thank you to  
18 the New York Taxi Workers Alliance and all my  
19 colleagues, and I proudly vote aye.

20 COMMITTEE CLERK: Lee?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEE: Aye on all.

22 COMMITTEE CLERK: Louis?

23 COUNCIL MEMBER LOUIS: Permission to  
24 explain my vote?

2 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
3 granted.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER LOUIS: Thank you, Mr.  
5 Majority Leader. First, I proudly vote aye on the  
6 override. I want to thank Speaker Menin for her  
7 leadership. I wanted to quickly just highlight two  
8 bills that we are voting to pass today with the  
9 former Mayor's vetoes notwithstanding. I am proud to  
10 stand with survivors, advocates, and my colleagues as  
11 we make the case once again for the passage of Intros  
12 1297 and 1120. It is absolutely unacceptable that the  
13 Gender-motivated Violence Act which would address a  
14 looming crisis in our criminal justice system  
15 continues to languish while countless survivors are  
16 left without a fair path to justice. The former  
17 mayor's veto was a deliberate attempt to silence both  
18 women and youth of their rights we promised them.  
19 Passing this bill is about providing accountability  
20 and healing to survivors, and it is our  
21 responsibility to ensure that protections we enacted  
22 are preserved and strengthened. Additionally, Intro  
23 1120 is an essential bill to address disparities in  
24 the way our cooperative apartments are bought and  
25 sold in this city. With a high large number of co-

2 ops in my own district, this is not an infringement  
3 on their rights, but a simply safeguard against  
4 discrimination and will truly provide a more  
5 inclusive pathway towards ownership for many New  
6 Yorkers. I want to thank Council Members Brooks-  
7 Powers and Farías for advancing these pieces of  
8 legislation, and I vote aye on all. Thank you.

9 COMMITTEE CLERK: Maloney?

10 COUNCIL MEMBER MALONEY: Aye.

11 COMMITTEE CLERK: Marte?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER MARTE: Aye on all.

13 COMMITTEE CLERK: Mealy?

14 COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: May I explain my  
15 vote?

16 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
17 granted.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Yes. I vote-- I  
19 abstain on 431B, no on Intro 570B, no on Intro 12BA  
20 [sic], no on Intro 1407A, and no on Intro 1420A, and  
21 aye on all the rest. And I just want to thank the  
22 Speaker for doing this override from the last mayor.  
23 And I just hope that-- I was against COPA, and I just  
24 would like to say, this body need to think before  
25 they take private owner's homes and give it to a

1  
2 nonprofit. A nonprofit that we, our-- this body give  
3 them funding. So, how could we give a private owner  
4 home to a nonprofit. Then, we going to give them,  
5 the nonprofit money to help them build this house up.  
6 So, I just hope that we keep that in mind, and I'm  
7 looking forward to a great discussion, but I feel we  
8 have to keep our hands off of people's property. And  
9 I vote aye on all, and happy birthday, Peter, and to  
10 all my colleagues. Thank you.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Is that aye on  
12 all, or just the rest?

13 COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: I said the ones  
14 that I was against, and aye on all the rest.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Okay.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Thank you.

17 COMMITTEE CLERK: Council Member, may you  
18 please restate your vote? Thank you.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: I abstain on 431B.  
20 No on Intro 570B. No on Intro 1251A. No on Intro  
21 1407A. No on Intro 1420A. And I vote--

22 COMMITTEE CLERK: [interposing] Thank you,  
23 Council Member.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: aye on the rest.  
25 Thank you.



2 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you.

3 COMMITTEE CLERK: Morano?

4 COUNCIL MEMBER MORANO: Permission to  
5 explain my vote?

6 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
7 granted.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER MORANO: Thank you,  
9 Majority Leader. I wanted to briefly explain my no  
10 vote on Intro 1391A. Let me start by saying  
11 something that should not be controversial in this  
12 chamber. Security guards perform difficult, often  
13 dangerous work, and they deserve respect. They keep  
14 buildings safe, protect workers and customers, and  
15 are often the first people to deal with emergencies.  
16 Nothing in my vote should be read as dismissing that.  
17 But good intentions don't always make good law, and  
18 this bill would have the City step into a private  
19 industry and mandate wages, benefits, and enforcement  
20 regimes modeled on city contracts, even with the City  
21 is not the customer. That's a major expansion of  
22 municipal authority into a sector that's already  
23 heavily regulated at the state level, and that's  
24 where my first concern lies. New York State already  
25 licenses security guards and governs standards in

1  
2 this industry. When City Hall begins layering its  
3 own compensation systems on top of that, we run  
4 straight into questions about overlap, conflict and  
5 litigation. I don't think workers are helped when we  
6 pass laws that may spend years tied up in court.  
7 Second, I worry about cost, and where that cost  
8 ultimately lands. Building owners, small businesses,  
9 BIDs, nonprofits have told us plainly what they  
10 expect: higher security contracts, fewer posts, and  
11 in some cases, the elimination of guards altogether.  
12 I represent a working and middle class district, and  
13 when costs go up, they don't vanish into thin air.  
14 They show up in higher rents, higher maintenance  
15 charges, and higher prices for customers. And while  
16 I admire optimism, I've been around long enough to  
17 know that when government mandates a new benefit  
18 package, someone writes that check. Lastly, I'm  
19 uneasy with turning the Department of Consumer and  
20 Worker Protection into a wage setting and enforcement  
21 agency for an entire private industry. So, for those  
22 reasons I'm voting no on Intro 1391. I'm also voting  
23 no on Intro 125, 276, 431, 570, 1251, 1297, 1407,  
24 1412, 1420, and 1443, and aye on all the rest. Thank  
25 you.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Narcisse?

COUNCIL MEMBER NARCISSE: Permission to explain my vote?

COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission granted.

COUNCIL MEMBER NARCISSE: It's so funny, that what's democracy is about. For me, I want to say thank you to Speaker Menin to bring it back to veto all the mayor's that trying to-- to override all the vetoes that the mayor think that he was cute before he left office to put us through that. But I want to say thank you for doing all the bills. But one particular one, I want to thank my colleagues as we are thinking-- I mean, taking an important step by overriding the mayoral veto to enact the Aland Etienne Act. This bill honors my constituent whose life was tragically taken in a mass shooting, and strengthening [sic]-- this is what we call protection for private sector security officers by guaranteeing fair wages and basic benefits. We're not asking for a lot. We're not asking for a million of dollars. We thank those folks that get out of their home every day to have a fair-- I mean, something to take care of their family, and Piola [sic] that I get to know personally and the son that I had to take to school

1 on the first day of school, and making sure-- and  
2 thanks to Bishop Dylan [sic] and everyone that doing  
3 amazing work in the Catholic aspect. I was-- I was  
4 able to get scholarship for that young man for years  
5 to come until high school. So, having said all that,  
6 I want to say thank you to my colleagues, and thank  
7 you our Speaker Adrienne Adams that looked forward to  
8 put that, and I want to say thank you again to  
9 Speaker Menin for the pre-considered bills of-- what  
10 is it, five, for the cameras to make sure our  
11 children, our folks that serving in our community  
12 that praying, they're praying safe, and they don't  
13 have to worry about anything. So, for all those  
14 vetoes, I want to say aye on them. Thank you so  
15 much.

17 COMMITTEE CLERK: Nurse?

18 COUNCIL MEMBER NURSE: Permission to  
19 explain my vote?

20 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
21 granted.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER NURSE: I just wanted to  
23 take a moment to thank a number of people who worked  
24 on the tax lien package of bills. These ideas go  
25 back all the way to the days of Tish James in the

1 City Council. The mantle was taken up by former  
2 Speaker Adrienne Adams, and I was really grateful to  
3 work with many, many talented individuals. I just  
4 wanted to uplift Richard, Emra, Delaria [sp?] from  
5 Council Finance who are just smart, dedicated people,  
6 like 5,000 times smarter than me. Thank you to my  
7 team members, Ryan who really held down that work in  
8 our office, and Patricia [sp?] for helping to tell  
9 the story, and my District team, my small but mighty  
10 district team who has spent hours supporting  
11 constituents through the tax lien process. And I  
12 also want to thank members of the coalition who are  
13 just relentless people, Take Root Justice, NYCLE  
14 [sic], the New Economy Project, Center for New York  
15 City Neighborhoods, the Coalition for Affordable  
16 Homes, Brooklyn Legal Services-- there's a ton of  
17 folks out there. The work here will stop  
18 foreclosures and will help people keep their  
19 generational assets. So, just wanted to thank them.  
20 I also want to thank Council Member Brooks-Powers for  
21 her work to get the Gender-Motivated Violence Act  
22 over the finish line. Our city owes these survivors  
23 not only an apology, just as a basic level of  
24 respect, but real resources and care moving forward.  
25

1  
2 I want to congratulate Council Members Cabán and  
3 Sanchez on their incredible work to support our  
4 street vendors and fully keep ICE out of our city  
5 jails. And congratulations to the taxi workers who  
6 represent some of the best in our city and show up  
7 and provide solidarity across a number of fights.  
8 Obviously, I'm disappointed we did not override the  
9 CCRB veto. I do think that the CCRB needs to be  
10 empowered. It needs real attention, and I hope that  
11 the council this year can put real attention on this  
12 issue and work to help them out. So, I vote aye.  
13 Thank you.

14 COMMITTEE CLERK: Ossé?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER OSSÉ: Permission to  
16 explain my vote?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
18 granted.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER OSSÉ: I'm proud that this  
20 council is voting to override 17 bills that the  
21 former very disappointing mayor, Eric Adams, chose to  
22 veto. In that same breath, I am disappointed that  
23 COPA and the CCRB bill is not being voted to be  
24 overridden [sic] today. Though I am hopeful in the  
25 future of getting these bills passed, because we only

1 needed 34 votes to override both of these bills  
2 today, but in the future when they're introduced  
3 we'll only need 26 to get them passed. So, I'm  
4 looking forward to getting both of those bills passed  
5 alongside my colleagues in government. Thank you  
6 very much, and with that, I vote aye on all.

8 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. Council  
9 Member Marte?

10 COUNCIL MEMBER MARTE: Permission to vote  
11 on all items on the General Calendar?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Yes.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER MARTE: I vote aye. Thank  
14 you.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you.

16 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. Paladino?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER PALADINO: Permission to  
18 explain my vote?

19 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
20 granted.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER PALADINO: Thank you. I  
22 want to explain why I am going to vote against 431.  
23 This is about our vendors. Now, I have nothing  
24 against vendors at all. I just don't agree with it  
25 giving blanket coverage all over our city, because it

1  
2 punishes so many law-abiding small brick and mortar  
3 businesses that pay rent, taxes, and comply with  
4 strict rules while rewarding street vendors expansion  
5 that undercuts them. Promises of better enforcement  
6 spring hollow when enforcement is already  
7 inconsistent and overwhelmed. Expanding permits  
8 before fixing enforcement, sanitation and sidewalk  
9 crowding is reckless. Until the city can control  
10 what exists today, adding thousand more vendors is  
11 irresponsible in my opinion and harms the quality of  
12 life across New York City. Our small businesses are  
13 struggling terribly to keep their heads above water,  
14 and in my district to see a vendor right out in front  
15 of a restaurant selling the same food he is inside  
16 just doesn't float well with me. And here are my  
17 votes, my no votes, Intro 570, Intro 1407, Intro  
18 1420, Intro 125A, Intro 1391, Intro 431, Intro 1251,  
19 and aye on all the rest. Thank you.

20 COMMITTEE CLERK: Restler?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: Permission to  
22 explain my vote?

23 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
24 granted.



1  
2 COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: Thank you so  
3 much, Majority Leader. I really do want to thank  
4 Speaker Menin and all of my colleagues today, and  
5 especially the bill sponsors for overriding these 17  
6 vetoes, for protecting some of the most vulnerable  
7 workers in our economy like security guards, vendors,  
8 Uber and Lyft drivers. There are many really  
9 transformational bills that we are passing today that  
10 we are overriding Eric Adams really poorly thought-  
11 through vetoes. But I do wish that there were two  
12 additional bills that we were overriding, and that's  
13 the CCRB bill that would have ensured seamless  
14 sharing of information between the NYPD and the body-  
15 worn camera footage that officers gather every day  
16 with the CCRB which is the entity that provides  
17 oversight when there are allegations of misconduct. I  
18 hope that we will bring that bill back as soon as  
19 possible, and I also hope that we will bring back the  
20 COPA bill. Speaker Menin has been clear that she's  
21 committed to working with the lead sponsor Sandy  
22 Nurse, Council Member Nurse, who did a phenomenal job  
23 in pushing this and working with the Law Department  
24 and cleaning up technical issues. And I really hope  
25 that we'll get this bill back on the floor for a vote

1 as soon as possible, because this is a critical  
2 preservation tool that we need. When we have bad  
3 landlords that are leaving buildings in disrepair and  
4 those buildings go up for sale, I welcome qualified  
5 nonprofits from our communities taking them over and  
6 preserving the affordable housing that we so  
7 desperately need. We're seeing private equity firms,  
8 speculators, bad landlords coming in and really  
9 causing harm in our communities. Folks like  
10 Greenbrook Partners and others are pushing out long-  
11 time neighbors in my district and in many districts  
12 across the city, and we need to protect these  
13 tenants. We need to preserve our affordable housing  
14 and COPA is a critical tool to make that happen. So,  
15 I really do look forward to working with the Speaker,  
16 Council Member Nurse, and all of the members of this  
17 body to get COPA back to the floor as soon as  
18 possible, because we need it. Thank you so much.

19 COMMITTEE CLERK: Riley?

20 COUNCIL MEMBER RILEY: Aye.

21 COMMITTEE CLERK: Salaam?

22 COUNCIL MEMBER SALAAM: I vote aye on  
23 all.

24 COMMITTEE CLERK: Justin Sanchez?  
25

COUNCIL MEMBER J. SANCHEZ: Aye.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Pierina Sanchez?

COUNCIL MEMBER P. SANCHEZ: Permission to explain my vote?

COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission granted.

COUNCIL MEMBER P. SANCHEZ: Thank you again to all colleagues for supporting vendors in your votes. Congratulations to all my colleagues overriding vetoes. Over the weekend during the bitter cold that unfolded during the winter storm, yet another fire took yet another life in District 14. May she rest in peace. Thank you, Speaker Menin, for being on the ground with me. The building had over 100 open violations. The landlord is a known bad actor. And as a representative of a district with more deteriorating housing stock than most and as Chair of Housing and Buildings for the last four years, and thank you for the reappointment, Speaker, I can confidently say that we need more tools in our arsenal to preserve affordable housing against deterioration and over-speculation. I look forward to advancing COPA in this council and additional measures that give our city new tools to

1  
2 preserve and protect affordable housing. Thank you.  
3 Thank you, Majority Leader. I vote aye on all.

4 COMMITTEE CLERK: Santosuosso?

5 COUNCIL MEMBER SANTOSUOSSO: Permission  
6 to explain my vote?

7 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
8 granted.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER SANTOSUOSSO: As a council  
10 staffer, one of the most painful things I had to do  
11 was inform people that they risked losing the homes  
12 they owed-- because they owed money to the city and  
13 were on the tax lien sale. This unfortunately  
14 included a good friend of mine who recently passed  
15 away from breast cancer and who spent her last  
16 several months while in chemo terrified that her home  
17 was going to be sold out from underneath her.

18 Council Member Nurse's tax lien bills and Council  
19 Member Brewer's Land Bank bill put us on a new  
20 course, one that will offer people hope and  
21 stability. Instead of destroying people's  
22 livelihoods, we will instead strengthen communities  
23 who need it most. I commend them for the work they  
24 have done to get this over the finish line and past  
25 the veto. And in that same spirit, I also want to

1  
2 take a moment to thank Council Member Nurse, her team  
3 and coalition partners for the tremendous work they  
4 did on COPA. The important goals of affordable  
5 housing preservation must be carried through. I look  
6 forward to working with my colleagues, and to get  
7 this-- and to get this session, to get this bill  
8 passed, particularly those of you who have been  
9 asking for amendments. Let's get this done. Let's  
10 not waste hard work, which is one of my least  
11 favorite things to do, and let's make it happen this  
12 year. I vote aye on all. Thank you.

13 COMMITTEE CLERK: Schulman?

14 COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: Permission to  
15 explain my vote?

24 COUNCIL MEMBER STEVENS: I vote aye on  
25 all, but like every one else and my other colleagues,

2 very disappointed that we're not voting on CCRB and  
3 COPA. Hope Council we can figure out how to  
4 strengthen CCRB and get a COPA bill passed. Thank  
5 you.

6 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you, Council  
7 Member. Thomas-Henry?

8 COUNCIL MEMBER THOMAS-HENRY: Aye.

21 COMMITTEE CLERK: Wong?

22 COUNCIL MEMBER WONG: Permission to  
23 explain my vote?

24 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Permission  
25 granted.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER WONG: Thank you. I  
3 believe the Council made the right decision not to  
4 override the COPA veto which in its present form is  
5 government overreach. My vote is-- I vote yes on all  
6 except for Intro 1251, Intro 570, Intro 1407, Intro  
7 1420, Intro 1412, Intro 1443, Intro 431, and the  
8 occupying [sic] resos. Thank you.

9 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. One moment.

14 Introduction and reading of bills.

15 SPEAKER MENIN: All bills have been  
16 referred to committees indicated on today's agenda.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: There are no items  
18 on our resolution calendar, so we will now move into  
19 General Discussion beginning with Minority Leader  
20 Carr followed by Brewer.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER CARR: Thank you, Majority  
22 Leader. I want to begin by thanking and commending  
23 our Speaker for the early and aggressive action she  
24 has taken since getting elected earlier this month in  
25 the fight against anti-Semitism. I know this is a

1 mission that is deeply personal to her, and over the  
2 last 22 days she has certainly showed it, from her  
3 five-point agenda issued at the Museum of Jewish  
4 Heritage earlier this month, the legislative package  
5 being introduced today, and the Jewish Caucuses  
6 creation of the bipartisan taskforce against anti-  
7 Semitism. As the Speaker indicated in her remarks  
8 earlier, the data is deeply troubling, but these  
9 early efforts of her speakership give us all cause  
10 for hope and that's desperately needed. And I'm  
11 particularly proud to see that this taskforce will be  
12 co-led by strong, powerful voices prompted by good  
13 hearts and the former Minority Whip Vernikov and our  
14 Jewish Caucus Chair Council Member Dinowitz, and I  
15 look forward to the good work that they will be doing  
16 in the future, and I thank the Speaker once again for  
17 all of her support in this effort. Obviously,  
18 January is coming to an end, and February is about to  
19 start, and that means it's budget season. I'm sure  
20 our Finance Division staff is thrilled to beginning  
21 anew the work coming for fiscal year 2027, but we are  
22 already starting to hear dire grim news about the  
23 budget deficits we're facing. \$2 billion for the  
24 current fiscal year, over \$10.5 for the one coming--  
25



1 \$12 billion hole that we need to figure out. And  
2 just yesterday Mayor Mamdani said that the only way  
3 out of this crisis is to raise taxes and that's he's  
4 not too worried that this may lead to an exodus of  
5 businesses. But there already is an exodus of  
6 businesses from our city. As recently reported in  
7 the New York Times-- sometimes we in the Republican  
8 aisle read that-- roughly 8,400 businesses closed in  
9 the second quarter of 2025 according to recent city  
10 data. That wiped away all of the post-pandemic gains  
11 we have seen, and then some. On top of that, the  
12 private market added just 18,500 jobs through  
13 November, down a startling 80 percent from the nearly  
14 90,000 of the year before. We already have the  
15 highest combined tax burden of any city and a myriad  
16 of onerous and cost regulations that are keeping  
17 businesses afloat--

18  
19 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: [interposing] Thank  
20 you, Council Member.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER CARR: Traditionally, the  
22 Minority Leader gets five minutes, Majority Leader?

23 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Can we please  
24 correct-- give him and extra three minutes, please?  
25

COUNCIL MEMBER CARR: Thank you. Tax burden of any city and a myriad of onerous and costly regulations--

COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: [interposing] Excuse me, my apology. It's not during General Discussion. It's only during General Orders.

COUNCIL MEMBER CARR: Okay. I'll wrap it up if I can. Thank you. So another--

COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: [interposing] Please wrap it up.

COUNCIL MEMBER CARR: tax increase is not the way out of this budget crisis, and so we should be trying to find ways to attract and keep businesses here in our city, and I urge my colleagues to look at that as well. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member Brewer followed by Vernikov.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much. I want to speak in terms of how wonderful interns are in our office. We have Phoebe Adler [sp?] who's here today. She's a student starting at Middlebury College. She's been amazing person during the last semester here. I also want to thank John-- James Lieu [sp?] who is a Van fellow, and he is an

1  
2 extraordinary addition to our office. We appreciate  
3 the Van program. Thank you very much, James. And  
4 Mohammad Elumiami [sp?] who is a Colin Powell Career  
5 Fellow at the City College, and that's a wonderful  
6 program. He comes originally from Senegal, and we  
7 really, really enjoy working with him. I love  
8 interns. Thank you very much.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Before we go to  
10 Council Member Vernikov, we'd like to issue a  
11 correction on a vote tally on Intro 1412A. It is  
12 actually 44 in the affirmative and 7 in the negative.  
13 Council Member Vernikov.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER VERNIKOV: Thank you,  
15 Majority Leader. Jewish New Yorkers account for  
16 approximately 11 percent of New York City's  
17 population, yet make up approximately 57 percent of  
18 all hate crimes. As the Speaker mentioned, anti-  
19 Semitic incidents have become normalized and are a  
20 daily occurrence in our city. That is why I am  
21 grateful to Speaker Menin and the Jewish Caucus for  
22 creating a taskforce focusing on combatting anti-  
23 Semitism. I am honored to be co-chairing this  
24 taskforce with Council Member Eric Dinowitz, and I  
25 look forward to working side by side with the Chair

1 and the entire taskforce in a bipartisan fashion.  
2 This is a crisis that requires both action beyond  
3 just condemnation, investigative oversight, and  
4 legislative solutions. As part of those efforts, I  
5 am proud to be a co-sponsor on Introduction 1 with  
6 Speaker Menin which will establish a 100-foot  
7 perimeter around houses of worship so that worshipers  
8 can attend prayer services without fear of being  
9 harassed. And I'm also reintroducing my bill,  
10 Introduction 491 related to installation of panic  
11 buttons at houses of worship. Thank you, Speaker  
12 Menin, for your leadership and making combatting  
13 anti-Semitism a priority of your speakership. I look  
14 forward to working side by side with the Chair and  
15 the entire taskforce. Today, I am also reintroducing  
16 several other bills, Introduction 488 related to  
17 accountability in the Mitchell-Lama Veterans Housing  
18 Preference to make sure our veterans are receiving  
19 the housing opportunities they deserve. Introduction  
20 492 will provide a discount for seniors at municipal  
21 parking lots, and Intro 489 will establish a database  
22 for towed vehicles, aimed at saving New Yorkers time,  
23 money, and the hassle in locating their cars after  
24 they've been towed. Thank you.  
25

2 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member  
3 Joseph followed by Banks.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: Thank you,  
5 Majority Leader. Thank you. Today, I speak not only  
6 as a Council Member, but as a daughter of Haitian  
7 immigrants, and as an immigrant myself and have  
8 someone who knows firsthand what it means to build a  
9 life in this city while holding tightly to your  
10 roots. TPS is not just a policy, it is a promise. It  
11 is a promise that when a nation is facing  
12 extraordinary hardship, we will not turn our backs on  
13 the people who have already given us so much to our  
14 communities, our economy, and our shared future. For  
15 Haitians, TPS is a lifeline. Haiti continues to  
16 endure political instability, devastating natural  
17 disasters, and a humanitarian crisis that makes  
18 returning unsafe [inaudible]. Yet, here in New York  
19 City, Haitian TPS holders are essential workers,  
20 educators, health care professionals, small business  
21 owners, caregivers, and parents. They are the  
22 backbone of our neighborhoods across Brooklyn and  
23 beyond. They pay taxes, raise families, worship,  
24 organize, and contribute every single day to the  
25 vitality of this city. Ending TPS would not only

1 destabilize families, it would destabilize  
2 communities. It would force parents to live in fear,  
3 children to question their future, and workers to  
4 lose the very protection that allows them to  
5 contribute fully and openly to our society. That is  
6 not who we are as a city and it should never be who  
7 we are as a nation. Preserving TPS is about dignity.  
8 It's about fairness. It's about recognizing the  
9 humanity of people who have already endured  
10 unimaginable hardship, yet still choose hope,  
11 resilience and service. As a city built by  
12 immigrants, we must raise our voice to lead with  
13 moral clarity. We must raise our voice loudly,  
14 unapologetically to demand that the federal  
15 government extend and strengthen TPS for Haitians,  
16 not temporarily but with a pathway towards lasting  
17 stability. Our vision must be bigger than survival.  
18 It must be about opportunity. It must be about  
19 ensuring that Haitian families can plan for the  
20 future, invest in their communities, and know that  
21 they belong here without question or fear. As a proud  
22 Haitian American, I will always stand with the  
23 Haitian community. I will fight for policies that  
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1 honor our contributions, protect our families, and  
2 reflect our shared values of compassion--

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4 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: [interposing] Thank  
5 you, Council Member.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: and justice. I'm  
7 wrapping up. Because protecting TPS is not just  
8 about protecting Haitians, it's about--

9 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: [interposing] Thank  
10 you, Council Member.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: protecting the  
12 soul of our city and the fundamental promise of  
13 America itself.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: [gavel] Council  
15 Member? Your time is up, Council Member. Thank you.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: Thank you, sir.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member  
18 Banks followed by Hanif.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER BANKS: Thank you, Mr.  
20 Majority Leader. First of all, I wanted to take time  
21 to thank the Speaker for your amazing leadership, and  
22 I first want to reintroduce Intro 61. Its focus is on  
23 a NYCHA residence, and this bill requires that the  
24 city create a formal business directory for NYCHA  
25 tenant-owned businesses coupled with a robust

1 marketing campaign. Our NYCHA communities are full  
2 of talented entrepreneurs, and by giving them a  
3 platform and visibility, we are not just supporting  
4 small businesses, we're investing directly in the  
5 economic mobility of the public housing residents. I  
6 want to also reintroduce Intro 62 which addresses the  
7 hurdles faced by those seeking to serve our city. It  
8 mandates a study to assess the feasibility of a  
9 reimbursement program for civil service applicants  
10 who paid for exams, but saw their eligible list  
11 number expire before receiving an offer. It is simply  
12 unfair to New Yorkers, many of whom are struggling  
13 already to pay into a system that fails to provide  
14 them an opportunity. We must make the path to city  
15 employment more accessible, and Resolution 32 calls  
16 on Albany to support our children. We're also  
17 calling for the state to set aside a portion of  
18 sports betting revenue to fund youth sports programs  
19 and to upgrade community infrastructure. Our kids  
20 deserve modern fields, safe gyms, accessible  
21 recreational programs, and it's time we leverage  
22 these new revenues to ensure every young person  
23 regardless of their zip code has a chance to play and  
24 thrive. I want to thank all my co-sponsors and co-



1  
2 prime sponsors and sponsors who sponsored these  
3 bills. Thank you so much.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member  
5 Hanif followed by Council Member Lee.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Thank you,  
7 Majority Leader. I wanted to speak about a few of my  
8 bills that are being introduced today that I urge my  
9 colleagues to support. First, Intro 171, Ban the  
10 Scan, protects New Yorkers from invasive surveillance  
11 by prohibiting the use of biometric recognition  
12 technology in places of public accommodation and  
13 safeguarding sensitive biometric data. Intro 169, a  
14 fertility access awareness bill ensures New Yorkers  
15 can easily access clear, accurate information about  
16 fertility treatment options and insurance coverage so  
17 they can make informed decisions about their  
18 reproductive health. Intro 172, a parks  
19 accessibility bill strengthens accountability by  
20 requiring annual reporting on Parks' compliance with  
21 ADA accessibility standards so our public spaces are  
22 truly usable by everyone. Intro 168, a bike safety  
23 bill that I introduced on behalf of the Parks Slope  
24 Civic Council improves safety for everyone on our  
25 streets by requiring micromobility share companies to

1 clearly display rules of the road for safe operation.  
2  
3 And finally, Intro 157, the Trust Act creates a  
4 private right of action to enforce our sanctuary city  
5 laws, protecting immigrant New Yorkers from unlawful  
6 detention and abuse. Thank you.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you, Council  
8 Member. Council Member Lee followed by Bottcher.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER LEE: Good afternoon,  
10 Madam Speaker, Majority Leader and colleagues. It is  
11 my honor to introduce legislation to strengthen the  
12 city's capacity to deliver early childhood education  
13 services for our youngest New Yorkers. Currently,  
14 many of the CBO pre-k programs are experiencing  
15 significant staffing challenges because certified  
16 teachers and classroom staff receive lower pay and  
17 less comprehensive benefits than similarly situated  
18 DOE employees. As dependable staff leave these  
19 programs, classrooms become more difficult to staff,  
20 providers struggle to retain enrolled students and the  
21 city's broader effort to realize its vision for  
22 accessible, high-quality childcare and early learning  
23 become harder to achieve. My legislation, Intro 281,  
24 would require DOE pre-k contracts to provide pay and  
25 benefits comparable to DOE positions for covered

1 classroom staff and equivalent roles, enabling  
2 providers to retain qualified staff without being  
3 required to absorb additional costs. This measure  
4 represents the straightforward and targeted retention  
5 strategy that supports stable and reliable pre-k  
6 services for working families, including families  
7 whose children require consistent educational  
8 support. The legislation also reflects years of  
9 advocacy by organizations such as Daycare Council New  
10 York, Citizens Committee for Children of New York,  
11 and Advocates for Children of New York, along with  
12 partners across the early childhood and disability  
13 communities. I hope that you join me all in this  
14 effort. Thank you.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member  
17 Bottcher followed by Morano.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BOTTCHEER: Today I'm  
19 saying goodbye to two staff members of mine who are  
20 moving onto other pastures. My Legislative and  
21 Budget Director, Marisella Cano [sp?], is moving on  
22 to be Ty Hankerson Chief of Staff. So, great job,  
23 Ty. Marisella, thank you so much for all the great  
24 work you've done in our office. And my Chief of  
25 Staff, my longtime Chief of Staff, my righthand, Carl

1  
2 Wilson is moving on. Carl, I want to thank you so  
3 much for everything you've done. We've been through  
4 so much together, major rezonings, many, many things  
5 we've worked through in the district, so much  
6 legislation. Carl was my appointee, the Chair of the  
7 Casino Community Advisory Committee. And the thing  
8 about Chiefs of Staff is you actually-- you really  
9 have to actually like your Chiefs of Staff, because  
10 you talk to them all day long, and Carl's sense of  
11 humor has really kept me afloat during many of the  
12 issues that we've worked on. So, Carl, thank you so  
13 much for your service to our district, to the people  
14 of New York, and you've got a bright, bright future  
15 ahead, and we've been so lucky to have you. And good  
16 luck on your future endeavors.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member  
18 Morano followed by Pierina Sanchez.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER MORANO: Thank you,  
20 Majority Leader. Today, like a lot of you, I  
21 reintroduced a number of bills that I'm very proud of  
22 and I hope my colleagues will take a close look at  
23 all of them in the days ahead, but I want to briefly  
24 focus on one in particular because of its urgency and  
25 because of the thoughtful discussion it just received

1 this week in the Health Committee under the  
2 leadership of Chair Schulman, and that's Intro 323.  
3 This legislation would provide paid leave for city  
4 employees who step forward to donate bone marrow or a  
5 living organ, and it would establish an official city  
6 honor roll to recognize those extraordinary acts of  
7 service. These are not abstract policy questions.  
8 These are New Yorkers who volunteer to undergo  
9 painful medical procedures so that someone else can  
10 live. Sometimes it's a family member. Sometimes  
11 it's a complete stranger. Either way, this is civil  
12 heroism in its purest form. No city employee should  
13 have to weigh saving a life against losing a  
14 paycheck. Now, the administration has suggested that  
15 the Council may lack authority, because paid leave is  
16 traditionally a subject of collective bargaining. I  
17 respectfully and totally disagree. This bill doesn't  
18 alter wages, titles, or work rules across the  
19 workforce. It sets a narrowly tailored humanitarian  
20 minimum for a rare and extraordinary circumstance,  
21 one that aligns with public health goals, saves  
22 lives, and ultimately reduced long-term medical costs  
23 borne by the public. We already legislate baseline  
24 employment standards when there is a compelling  
25

1 public interest. We do it for family leave. We do  
2 it for workplace safety. We it for health  
3 protections. Ensuring that a city worker is not  
4 financially penalized for donating an organ fits  
5 squarely within that tradition. Collective  
6 bargaining can and should build on that floor, but  
7 the existence of labor contracts shouldn't prevent  
8 this body from saying clearly and unanimously that  
9 life-saving generosity deserves protection and  
10 recognition. So I hope you'll look at 323. Thank  
11 you.  
12

13 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member  
14 Restler followed by Mealy.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: Thank you so  
16 much, Majority Leader. And I am very pleased to  
17 reintroduce today legislation to create the  
18 Department of Community Safety. We asked the NYPD to  
19 deal with every single issue under the sun, many of  
20 which they don't have the training for and distracts  
21 from their core work. We've seen NYPD response times  
22 go up by nearly 40 percent during the Eric Adams  
23 tenure to the most serious and violent crimes. We  
24 need the NYPD to be focused, laser-focused on  
25 preventing and solving violent crime, and we need to

1  
2 deploy social workers, mental health professionals,  
3 and other experts to reduce and prevent violent  
4 incidents and quality of life-- and address quality  
5 of life issues across our community. I am very  
6 pleased that 23 of my colleagues have co-prime  
7 sponsored this legislation, and I'm hopeful that many  
8 others will sponsor the legislation with me as well  
9 today. This legislation was of course a major  
10 priority for the Mayor on his campaign, but I  
11 actually campaigned on a similar idea four years ago,  
12 and it's long overdue that we invest in high-quality  
13 real-time response that can provide tangible  
14 solutions, connections to quality services,  
15 treatment, housing for the New Yorkers who  
16 desperately need it, and I'm hopeful we'll be able to  
17 get this bill moving as quickly as possible. Thank  
18 you.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: I don't see  
20 Council Member Mealy, so I'll move on to Council  
21 Member Dinowitz followed by Justin Sanchez.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER DINOWITZ: Thank you, Mr.  
23 Majority Leader. First, I want to thank the Speaker  
24 and my colleagues who recognize anti-Semitism for the  
25 scourge that it is on our society, and we often look

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2 at the data. Anti-Semitic hate crimes make up more  
3 than every other group combined, but for so many of  
4 us in the Jewish community that, you know, the  
5 feelings of anti-Semitism go beyond what the data  
6 show us. Like, the students I've spoken to who want  
7 to take their yamakas off before going into class. Or  
8 not go to school at all. The young girls who don't  
9 want to wear their Star of David, and my family is  
10 not immune from it. My wife and I were attending an  
11 event at our Shul just a couple of weeks ago, and she  
12 had pause about going to it for fear of being  
13 intimidated, harassed, or God forbid something  
14 happening like that happened in Council Member  
15 Hudson's district, the 770 in Chabad. And so I'm  
16 grateful today that along with Council Member  
17 Vernikov, we were elected by the Jewish Caucus' co-  
18 chairs of the Taskforce to Combat anti-Semitism.  
19 Going beyond just words of condemnation or words of  
20 discouragement for anti-Semitic words or behavior,  
21 but importantly not just about things we're going to  
22 do, but things we are going to-- things we are doing  
23 now. And that's the package of legislation that  
24 Speaker Menin has already spoken about, creating--  
25 making sure there are safe perimeters around our



1 schools and around our houses of worship so our kids  
2 are safe, making sure that the status of hate crimes,  
3 not just whether someone was arrested or not, but the  
4 status of where it is in the process is publicly  
5 reported so people know that they can walk around  
6 their neighborhood safely. And I'm proud to  
7 cosponsor legislation with Council Member Maloney  
8 about providing support to our houses of worship, and  
9 I encourage my colleagues to sign onto this entire  
10 package of legislation that will not only keep our  
11 Jewish brothers and sisters safe, but our entire city  
12 safe from hate crimes. Thank you.

14 [applause]

15 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Quiet in the  
16 chambers, please. Thank you. Quiet in the chambers,  
17 please. Thank you. Council Member Justin Sanchez  
18 and Maloney is my last speaker.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER J. SANCHEZ: First and  
20 foremost, I want to thank Speaker Menin and to my  
21 colleagues on the Council from the 17<sup>th</sup> Council  
22 District, 17 looks really good on you. Moving on.  
23 At the-- wow, no laughs. Okay. We're tired. Well,  
24 as the Chair of the Sanitation and solid Waste  
25 Management Committee, I just want to take a moment to

1  
2 acknowledge the hard work by all of our crews  
3 throughout the city that have been working around the  
4 clock to keep New York running through over a foot  
5 snowfall since this last time this past week. You  
6 know, while our kids were outside playing and we're  
7 playing in Central Park and families are at home, and  
8 folks like my Coms Director were very excited about  
9 the Patriots advancing to another Super Bowl, I was  
10 not as happy. Our snowplow drivers and our salt  
11 spreaders were hard at work clearing our streets,  
12 salting our roads post snowfall, they've continue to  
13 work in collaboration with our other agencies, with  
14 our BIDs clearing our sidewalks, our bike lanes,  
15 other pedestrian right of ways. Now, I know looking  
16 at the snow on the ground, and no thanks to Mother  
17 Nature, there is still a lot more work to do, but I  
18 really want to just commend them for the work that  
19 they have done so far. Taking a moment to  
20 acknowledge all of them and the work that they  
21 continue to do. And just a reminder to all of my  
22 colleagues, we'll be having oversight hearings on  
23 this now coming up in February. I know there's been a  
24 lot of discussion. I look forward to partnering with  
25 all of you and your committees to make sure that we

1  
2 are showing New Yorkers that we know how to clean the  
3 streets. Thank you, everyone.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Council Member  
5 Maloney?

6 COUNCIL MEMBER MALONEY: Thank you very  
7 much, and thank you, Speaker Menin, for your focus on  
8 addressing anti-Semitism with these package of bills.  
9 I am co-sponsoring with Council Member Dinowitz Intro  
10 297, my first bill. In the immediate aftermath of a  
11 deeply disturbing incident here in New York City  
12 where a vehicle was deliberately rammed into the  
13 Chabad World Headquarters in Brooklyn. While no one  
14 was injured, the intent is unmistakable and the  
15 threat is real. This bill is not about one incident  
16 or one community. It reflects a troubling reality of  
17 our time, that religious institutions here in New Yor  
18 City and around the world are increasingly exposed to  
19 danger in an era of anger, misinformation, and  
20 division. Too often, synagogues, churches, mosques  
21 and temples have been become symbols of conflict,  
22 rather than sanctuaries for peace. Houses of worship  
23 are places where people go to gather and trust, to  
24 reflect, to pray, to seek meaning, and to be  
25 together. And they should not be left to navigate

2 emergency preparedness in isolation or without  
3 support. This legislation ensures that religious  
4 institutions can access support or develop emergency  
5 plans so that when the unthinkable happens, there is  
6 clarity, coordination, and protection of life.  
7 Preparedness is not an act of fear. It reflects our  
8 responsibility to one another. Thank you very much.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER ABREU: Thank you. Seeing  
10 no one else signed up for General Discussion, I'll  
11 now call on Speaker Julie Menin to close today's  
12 Stated Meeting.

13 SPEAKER MENIN: Thank you. The Stated  
14 Meeting of January 29<sup>th</sup>, 2026 is hereby adjourned.  
15 Thank you.
