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SERGEANT AT ARMS: This is a microphone check for the Committee on Children and Youth, located in the Chambers; recorded on March 12, 2025 by Pat Cuzner (phonetic), check, check.

COUNCIL MEMBER STEVENS: Good morning, welcome to today's vote for Children and Youth Committee. I am Council Member Althea Stevens, Chair of the Committee.

Today, we're voting on three critical bills that aim to strengthen the accountability and transparency within the foster care system ensuring that voices and experiences of foster care youth are heard and acted upon.

These bills recognize the fundamental responsibilities we have to young people in the city and care that their representation is important and steps towards a more just and responsive child welfare system (sic).

Introduction 56-A, sponsored by Council Member

Ossé, this bill would require expansion of the foster

youth experience survey that the Administration for

Children's Services (ACS) is required to distribute

annually to foster youth, by requiring surveying

foster youth as to their LGBTQIA+ and racial

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identities, and requiring ACS to report annually on such responses as they relate to placement of foster

youth into permanent homes.

Introduction 81-A, sponsored by Council Member Riley, strengthens oversight by requiring ACS to conduct annual audits of foster care placement notifications. This bill ensures that any placement changes are permanently communicated to the court and the attorney representing foster care/foster youth as required by state law. Timely and complete information is critical for those advocating on behalf of these children and these bills reinforce that obligation.

Introduction 1052-A, sponsored by Council Member Hudson, expands the ACS foster care youth experience survey to include all vital questions about how foster youth are treated by their foster parents and ACS provider. By centering the lived experiences of foster youth, we identify gaps in care and work towards a foster care system that truly respects and affirms young people.

Together these bills uphold the data and oversight and must serve a greater purpose, ensuring that no young people in foster care are left without
