Today, our Committee will be voting on

Intro. 1408, related to a study and report on burial
capacity at Hart Island. Hart Island has served as
the New York City Municipal Cemetery since 1869.

That's almost the Civil War. It's approximately 100
acres and more than one million New Yorkers, one

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million New Yorkers are buried there. There is concern among advocates and bereaved family members about the capacity for the island to continue to serve as a cemetery for New Yorkers. This bill would require the Commissioner of the Department of Social Services, in collaboration with the Commissioner of the Department of Parks and Recreation and any other relevant New York City agency head, to conduct a study to analyze Hart Island's capacity for future public burials under existing burial procedures. The agency heads would have to assess whether the procedures should be changed and develop recommendations if any changes are determined appropriate. Finally, DSS would have to submit to the Mayor and the Speaker of the Council and the respective agencies would have to post online a report containing the study findings and recommendations. When enacted, this bill will take effect immediately.
