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RABBI BARRY DOV KATZ: "Today is pregnant with eternity", that is how Rabbi Gerson Cohen, who was the Chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary in Manhattan and a member of my synagogue in the Bronx, translated a phrase that jews repeat over and over again as we start the new year. Today is pregnant with eternity, hayom harat olam. At the beginning of a new year we judge our actions against the yardstick of nothing less than forever. We see every moment as full of promise and possibility. And in a city as dynamic and everchanging as New York, we understand the notion of being pregnant with eternity. Every day in our great city, artists create cutting edge creations, athletes achieve incredible heights, individuals incubate ideas, and the future leaders of our city, the future city council members and leaders of our nation, and leaders of the world are being born right now in this great city.

"Today is pregnant with eternity," is a beautiful translation of the Hebrew, but it can be pretty overwhelming. I would like to get through this invocation, getting through eternity feels like a lot. Getting through a day, getting through a week feels like a lot. It is a lot of time of

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uncertainty, eternity. Something new is being born right now, but we don't exactly know what that is. We don't know what challenges we will face, and whether we will rise to meet them in ways that will be judged well against the standards of eternity. All of you, people in this room, have chosen communal service. You know the heavy weight of seeing each moment as pregnant with eternity.

Under the leadership of Speaker Adrienne Adams, you watch over the everyday, the countless decisions that will echo for good or bad.

Eternity asks us to take a long view of our work. Will we raise our heads and hearts above the partisan and petty to build a city that it is environmentally responsible? Eternity wants to know. A society where people go to sleep at night secure that they have enough to eat and a roof over their heads? Eternity asks. A community where the promise of education and the protection of health care is assured? Eternity asks us. Cities might seem very solid, but they are delicate. They take years to build, but much of what holds us together can fall apart if we are not vigilant. Will we live in a city that is divided and violent and full of prejudice and 2 hatred, or will we live in peace? Will we be decent

3 and kind? Will we, in every conversation and

4 deliberation and vote recognize the divine image in

5 | every human being?

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President John F. Kennedy said, "Democracy is never a final achievement, it is a call to an untiring effort." Cities, especially ones as vibrant as New York City, require similar untiring effort.

In the Jewish tradition we say, "You are not required to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it." Eternity asks us to get to work.

When the challenges of eternity of the moment feel overwhelming, I pray to God, who exist for eternity, to give me strength. And I pray that God will give each one of you strength.

I pray to the God who exists for eternity to give me wisdom. And I pray that God gives each one of you wisdom. I pray to the God exists for eternity to remind that we need not meet challenges alone. We can join together and be God's partners in lovingly creating the better world that is being born right now. I pray to God who exists for eternity that you do not feel alone or lonely in your work, and that when you look for partners, you will find them in

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people, in eternal values, and in God. Today really is pregnant with eternity. And let us meet today and every day with faith and hope.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. I will now ask Council Member Eric Dinowitz, I believe someone you know very well, to spread the Invocation upon the Record.

COUNCIL MEMBER DINOWITZ: Thank you. I am very excited for you to be here, Rabbi. Rabbi Barry Dov Katz serves the Greater Riverdale community and the Conservative Synagogue Adath Israel building a vibrant community that leads into the values that you spoke of in your invocation. But, I know him very well, he was the rabbi who took me on my first trip to Israel, I think shortly after my teenage years, and through there, ushered me through many life cycle events, and, then, eventually, my family. But, that relationship is just one in the many that Rabbi Katz built throughout the entire Bronx. Building relationships within the Jewish community, outside of the Jewish community, to build a better Bronx - work that speaks to the interfaith work we so desperately need in our city; the interracial work we so desperately need. And you do the work, and you

SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you very much, Majority Leader. And, good afternoon, everyone.

I want to begin by taking a moment to address the tragic death of a one-year-old child at Bronx daycare center in Council Member Sanchez's district. Our hearts go out to the family of Nicholas Dominici who are experiencing unimaginable pain from losing their baby, as well as to the children who are still recovering today from opioid exposure and their families.

We entrust our precious children to daycare centers with the expectation that they will be safe. To lose a child in any circumstance is profoundly devastating, but for it to occur in a place that is depended upon for care is an unacceptable betrayal, and no parent should ever have to endure this. As a

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grandmother of small children myself, I cannot fathom the immense pain that Nicholas's family and the families of the children hospitalized are going through right now. Our children deserve to be safe. The circumstances that allowed this incident to take place are reprehensible, and it is critical that a tragedy like this never happens again.

I also want to address the ongoing disciplinary process related to the killing of Kawaski Trawick by two NYPD officers. NYPD Deputy Commissioner Maldonado's recommendation that no disciplinary action be taken against the officers is disappointing, and it is unjust. The NYPD failed to hand over key evidence to the CCRB, including body worn camera footage in a timely manner, causing unnecessary delays that impeded the CCRB's ability to do their job. And, yet, these delays caused by the NYPD were the reason for the Deputy Commissioner's recommendation, which is totally unjustifiable. Trawick family has been forced to fight and wait for years to attain some form of accountability for Kawaski's killing; this is far too long and has only added to the suffering of losing a loved one.

Commissioner Caban can still do the right thing by

2 holding the officers accountable for their actions.

3 And that is what the Trawick family and our city

4 deserve. Accountability is critical to our public

safety.

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Over the past month, our city has been mourning the loss of Dale West, who fell to his death last month in Council Member Mealy's district while repairing a home. He leaves behind a nine-year-old son and a loving family, and we express our condolences to them during this very difficult time.

On Sunday, our Jewish communities observed the start of Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the year. I hope that everyone who observed had a meaningful and reflective holiday. And for all those celebrating Sukkot, I wish you all a Chag Sukkot sameach. Have a wonderful and joyful holiday.

Tomorrow is the start of the Mid-Autumn Festival, a traditional festival celebrated in China according to the lunar calendar. Countries across Asia who also observe the lunar calendar are celebrating their own holidays including Chuseok, which is South Korea's Thanksgiving, and Tsukimi, which is Japan's version of the Mid-Autumn Festival. Have a happy and healthy celebration.

Last Thursday was National Opioid Awareness Day.

More than 3,000 people died from an overdose in 2022,
the highest number since the City began reporting
such deaths in the year 2000. We can keep each other

But, there were some very funny portions of this particular wording, and I would like to share it. Obviously we talked about his distinguished career, City business, [INAUDIBLE] approvement districts city, worked on the Expense, the Capital Budget, making sure that the lobbyists did the right thing, working on the Retiree Health Benefits Trust Funds, all of the legal review of council legislation, paring his deep knowledge with creativity. He earned a reputation of being one of the hardest working attorneys, burning the midnight oil and working on weekends, catching sleep when he could. 2 First we will vote on the following Finance 3 Items:

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A Preconsidered Resolution to authorize an Article XI Exemption for two new buildings in Council Member Farías' district.

A Preconsidered Resolution to renew an Article V Exemption for one building in Council Member Abreu's district.

Four Preconsidered Resolutions to act on recently granted state authorization to allow the Council to amend the required formula for calculating the Fiscal Year 2024 property tax rates. Passing this package of resolutions will result in lower property tax rates for class 1 and class 2 residential properties in this fiscal year compared to what was adopted in the budget in June.

Next, we will vote on the following Land Use items 1460-1480 Sheridan Boulevard will facilitate three new mixed-use buildings with 100 percent affordable housing in Council Member Rafael Salamanca's district. It will include approximately 970 housing units, nearly 140,000 square feet of commercial space, and bike, and automobile parking spaces.

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244 East 106th Street Article XI Disposition will facilitate the development of 10-story shared supportive housing building under HPD's ShareNYC pilot program. It will create approximately 32

761 Plumb 2nd Street Rezoning will allow an existing restaurant to continue operating without renewing its BSA special permit every five years in Minority Whip Inna Vernikov's district.

affordable units in Deputy Speaker Ayala's district.

125 Greaves Lane will facilitate the conversion of an existing community facility into commercial use in Minority Leader Borrelli's district.

Next, we will vote on the following pieces of legislation:

Introduction 743-A, sponsored by Council Member Rafael Salamanca, would require City employees who can issue summonses or notices of violation to provide a pre-printed, handwritten, or electronic business card with identifying information to members of the public upon request. The business card would include the employee's name and agency, a telephone number, and email address that could be used to contact the agency and the relevant 311 customer service number. The City Employee will indicate that

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this contact information may be used to submit
comments about the encounter. Employees who are
engaged in agency approved undercover activities, who
must take immediate action, or are providing
identifying information through other forms of
documentation, like a Certificate of Inspection or
Notice of Violation are exempt. Thank you to staff
members Jayasri Ganapathy, Erica Cohen, CJ Murray,

Rachel Cordero, and David Seitzer.

Introduction 906-A, should not have been Justin

L. Brannan, would require an agency or office

designated by The Mayor, to offer off street parking

for tractor trailers and commercial trucks at three

or more location citywide by 2025. This is especially

important in our outer borough residential

neighborhoods, where overnight truck parking has

taken up curbside space and often blocks car traffic,

bus lanes, and/or bike lanes. Thank you staff

members Samuel Breidbart, Mark Chen, John Basile, and

Kevin Kotowski.

Next, we will vote on Introduction 349 sponsored,
by Public Advocate Jumaane Williams. This
legislation would require the Department of
Correction to create a dyslexia screening process for

individuals in custody and offer treatment programs for those who are identified. Thank you to staff members Natalie Meltzer and Jeremy Whiteman.

Introduction 279-A, sponsored by Majority Leader Keith Powers, would require the city to only purchase zero emissions light— and medium—duty vehicles after 2025, and zero emissions heavy duty vehicles after 2028. It would also require the City to ensure that its entire fleet of municipal vehicles is converted zero emissions... zero emissions vehicles, by 2038 with earlier goals for some vehicle types.

Introduction 279-A also requires the training of City workers on the repair and maintenance of these new vehicles and reporting on workforce development to ensure that we are protecting both the environment and our city's workers.

We are also voting on a Preconsidered Resolution, sponsored by Majority Leader Powers, calling on The Mayor to procure on the basis of best value when contracting for the purchase, operation, and maintenance of zero emission vehicles. Thank you to our staff members Brad Reid, Andrew Bourne, Samara Swanston, and Clara McLaughlin.

And Introduction 1190, sponsored by Council

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Member Gale Brewer, would create a one-time exception to the maximum age requirement for employees of the FDNY's Bureau of Emergency Medical Services who are seeking to take the next Civil Service Promotion exam to become fire fighters. Under existing law, in order to become a fire fighter for the FDNY an individual may not have passed their 29th birthday when applying to take to the Fire Fighter Exam. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, FDNY hiring cycles were delayed for several years and civil service exams were not offered at their usual frequency. As a result, a group of nearly 300 EMS workers, who would have otherwise been eligible to take a promotion exam in 2020, have now reached an age where they are ineligible. This legislation creates a one-time waiver to allow those EMS workers who missed this opportunity to take the upcoming promotion exam in 2024. Thank you to our staff members Josh Kingsley, William Hongach, and Rachel Cordero.

We thank you all for your attention. Now, I turn it back over to our Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Speaker Adams.

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We are now going to move into the Discussion of General Orders on today's Agenda. We will begin with Council Member Gale Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much. I am here to introduce this legislation that the speaker was just talking about to create a one-time waiver from existing age requirements for becoming an FDNY fire fighter for EMS workers who would have otherwise been able to take the promotional exam had it been given at its usual frequency - but couldn't because of the pandemic -- and it is usually given every four years.

We all know that fire fighters and EMS workers are some of the bravest and most dedicated public servants. They put their lives on the line every day to protect all of us. And during COVID, they continued to be on the front line sacrificing their health to keep doing the job, and we owe them gratitude. This legislation is a small way to show our appreciation for their service and to give these heroes a fair chance to compete for promotions in The Fire Department. They really have the skills and expertise necessary to be successful fire fighters, they should not be barred from taking the promotion

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exam simply because they are over the current maximum age, and COVID prevented the City from administering the exam in 2020. There are around 300 of them in this situation. I know that this one-time exemption will not cover everyone who wants to take the exam; although, I thank The Speaker's Office and The Mayor's Office, because people were added. confident that we have maximized an opportunity that is consistent with the law, and it is the right thing to do. Most, most, most thank you, Chair Ariola, head of The Fire Committee, thank you for your support and also for your great appreciation for these amazing civil servants. I want to also thank Andrea Vazquez, Rachel Cordero, Josh Kingsley, William Hongach, and in particular Cynthia Hornig from my office, and I think in the stands Haley Saydle (phonetic), Micheal Kavanaugh and his amazing dad, who also supported this at the hearing when they testified at The Fire Committee, Christopher Nigro, Dominick DeFranco, Jordan Tymony, [TIMER CHIMES] you are fabulous presenters of the best of New York. Thank you very much.

I am proud to be introducing a pair of bills today support taxi and for hire vehicle drivers. The

3 driver licenses to receive medical clearances from

first of these bills would allow applicants with taxi

4 TLC approved physician assistants and nurse

5 practitioners. Currently they can only receive such

6 clearance from physicians. Health care visits in the

7 United States are increasingly conducted by non-

8 physicians. From 2013 to 2019 the number of visits to

9 | nurse practitioner and physician assistants increased

12 | will make obtaining a clearance for a license less

13 burdensome for potential drivers.

The second bill will return the duration of taxi cab licenses to two years, back from one year. The change to one year was a technical mistake, and was not intended by the Council, but it has real implications for drivers who must now go through the process of renewal each year. By reverting to the prior licensing regime, the bill will reduce the regulatory burden on drivers. I encourage all of my colleagues to sign on to these bills, and I look forward to holding a hearing on these introductions in the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure

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2 to talk to about how we can continue to uplift New 3 York's TLC drivers, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will now go to Council Member Riley.

COUNCIL MEMBER RILEY: Thank you, Majority Leader. I am proud to introduce three pieces of legislation today that seek to improve the overall well-being for New York City families by reducing light pollution near some NYC residential buildings; expanding healthy meal options for our youth; as well as providing a means of support for incarcerated individuals to successfully reenter society. I am happy to partner with my colleagues in the state government, Assemblyman Benedetto and Senator Bailey to push a resolution on the city level that calls on the New York State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign, A.7456A/S.1931B, which prohibits residential and commercial properties from operating digital billboards or with excessive light near certain Mitchell-Lama housing. With my district being home to Co-Op City, the largest Mitchell-Lama development in the nation, Resolution 797 is vital to protecting New Yorkers in Mitchell-Lama housing from the disparities of excessive night lights, making

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them more susceptible to disruptive sleep cycles and elevating risks of cancer and poor overall health.

Next, Introduction 1202 will establish citywide nutrition standards and beverage options for childrens meals in restaurants and food establishments. I would like to thank the American Heart Association, all advocates, my colleagues who are planning to sign on, and parents for their partnership in the rally today and continuing the groundwork to promote an healthier lifestyle for our future generations.

As we applaud the call to serve all New Yorkers,

I introduce Introduction 1203, which would require
the New York City Department of Correction to provide
all individuals with discharge papers upon their
release from custody specifying the date a person
entered and was released from custody. These jail
release papers promote transparency and
accountability in our criminal justice system by
providing an official record of individual time
served, whether they were held [TIMER CHIMES]
pretrial or sentenced in an order of commitment. I
would like to thank you, Majority Leader, for the

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time, and I would like to urge my colleagues in government to sign on to these bills, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we will go to Council Member Lee, followed by Council Member Sanchez.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEE: Thank you, good afternoon, Madam Speaker, Majority Leader, and Colleagues. Today I am proud to be introducing Introduction 1197. This bill fine tunes Local Law 97 to protect the housing affordability of working and middleclass condo and co-op residents many of whom are seniors and retirees living on fixed incomes. Our city's goals for climate and sustainability are necessary, which was the original intent on Local Law 97. However, sometimes in the legislative process unexpected consequences can arise. The bill I am introducing today focuses on the disadvantaged few whose buildings do not have the recourses to get in compliance as quickly as the current schedule of fines demands. These buildings are expected to make costly upgrades and renovations but cannot do that if they are being drained by penalties. My legislation aims to buy those buildings additional time to It would create a more gradual schedule of comply.

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penalties for those buildings that fall under a certain value. It would improve the method for calculating emissions limits by factoring in open, green spaces, and prior upgrades. And it would also consider median property value when deciding penalties. This Council can reduce the City's carbon footprint while also doing everything in its power to protect and maintain housing affordability for its working and middleclass residents. Thank you to those who are already cosponsors, and I hope the rest

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will go to Council Member Sanchez, followed by Council Member Restler.

will join me in this effort, thank you so much.

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: Thank you, Majority

Leader, and thank you, Speaker, for beginning your

This is a painful time for 6 7 our community, but most importantly, in honor of Nicholas and what his family is requesting today, it 8 is a call to action for our city, the state, and the country. Over and over as I have visited the parents 10 11 Nicholas Feliz Dominici in the days since the 12 tragedy, they have asked, what are we going to do? 13 What is government going to do -- city, state, 14 whoever is in charge, to make sure that this never 15 happens again to another child in our city or 16 anywhere in our country? And to them I say that we 17 are going to do everything that we can as a Council, 18 but we are also going to make sure that we are 19 calling on the federal government to strengthen 20 international interdiction efforts, to strengthen 21 efforts against the ruthlessness of the drug dealing operations that we see in our communities. And, so, 2.2 2.3 as we here in New York City pursue better and stronger harm reduction strategies and improve 24 protocols to keep our children safe, there is just so 25

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much to do, and I am thankful for our speaker who cares so much about this situation, and all of you who have reached out, thank you.

And regarding Kawaski Trawick, I just want to join the Speaker's remarks and ,you know, emphasize that Kawaski should be alive today. He was a 30+ year-old young man who was in his home in a supportive housing facility when the NYPD broke into his home - illegally entered...

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time expired.

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: as substantiated by the CCRB. And it is just very clear that Commissioner Caban has a responsibility to pursue disciplinary actions. Thank you, Majority Leader, and I look forward to that accountability follows four years of inaction by the NYPD.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will now go to Council Member Restler, followed by Council Member Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: I just firstly want to express my profound sorrow to Council Member Sanchez and to her community with the horrible passing of the one-year-old in a daycare center due to exposure to opioids, and of course the killing of Kawaski

2 Trawick. And I strongly echo the speaker's

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3 sentiments that we need accountability from the NYPD.

4 Commissioner Caban needs to do the right thing and

hold the officers who killed Mr. Trawick accountable.

I wanted to just mention a few bills we are introducing today. We all remember too well the apocalyptic air quality incident that we experienced a few months ago. And, unfortunately, they are a part of the new climate realities that we are facing. And we need to make sure that the City of New York is far, far, far better prepared than they were to handle these types of incidents. I was shocked by how inadequately prepared the Adams Administration was for this incident, the lack of communication with the public, it has to change. And, so, we have introduced three bills, one to create "Spare the Air Day,", that include specific policies to reduce emissions on days when we are experiencing particularly bad air quality, and ensure that street homeless New Yorkers have the opportunity to enter any shelter in the City of New York to get safe. have also introduced bills that would require the New York City Emergency Management Office to create a

public notification plan for informing New Yorkers

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about days when we have poor air quality, and an emergency protocol for how they and other agencies must respond to keep New Yorkers safe. We have seen these types of air quality incidents with frequency in other parts of the country, and we have taken best practices from what folks have been doing out west and have applied them to Local Law here in New York. And I hope that we will be able to see these bills advance and get them passed, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. And, finally, we have Council Member Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much. Uh, two issues, one Resolution 791, talks about supporting legislation in Albany that would provide for annual adjustments of the maximum income threshold eligibility for SCRIE and DRIE and SCHE, and DHE, all of which we know need to be increased in order for those... more people to be able to obtain in this very competitive rental world.

The second thing I want to mention is that we talk a lot about smoke shops, with school back, every single - I won't say every single - but, too many high schools are experiencing vaping in the school.
