Open our eyes to see those who are in need, those who are hungry, those who are alone, 10 11 those who are oppressed. Open our hearts to show 12 compassion and mercy. Open our mouths to cry for 13 justice and to speak of peace. Bless our city. Grant wisdom and courage to those who govern. 14 15 Comfort all with your shalom. Amen. 16 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much 17 for that very beautiful prayer. I'd now like to call 18 on Speaker Johnson to spread the invocation onto the

20 SPEAKER JOHNSON: Ah, thank you, Madam 21 Majority Leader. I want to thank, ah, Reverend Mark 22 E. Erson for being here today, and I make a motion of 23 the invocation be spread in full upon the record. 24 Ah, Reverend Mark Erson is the ninth pastor to serve 25 St. John's since its founding in 1855. He has been

2 at St. John's since 2011. He is both a cradle 3 Lutheran and a native New Yorker, having been born on Staten Island while his father was serving as pastor 4 5 of Messiah Lutheran Church. While serving as an assistant to the pastor at St. Luke's in Devon, 6 7 Pennsylvania, Pastor Mark earned a masters of art and 8 theater at Villanova University and began combining 9 his interest in theology and theater, writing and producing plays and musicals with the willing and 10 11 supporting, supportive members of St. Luke. He then 12 spent several years as an actor and a theater teacher 13 before joining St. John's. Pastor Mark is an 14 integral figure in the West Village, leading St. 15 John's with acceptance and optimism, with an emphasis 16 on programming to engage the LGBTQ community. He has 17 worked tirelessly on behalf of homeless LGBTQ New 18 Yorkers, especially LGBTQ youth and, ah, this is not 19 the first time we have had Pastor Mark here, but it 20 is always a pleasure to have someone of his stature 21 and compassion to join us. He is really what makes 2.2 New York, ah, great. His compassion and love that he 23 shows every single day, he is a towering figure in the community and anyone that you talk to would say 24 the same thing, how grateful they are that he serves 25

2	our West Village neighborhood and community. So I
3	want to thank you, Pastor Mark, for being here.
4	We're so lucky to have you, and we're honored to have
5	you here today. So, again, Madam Majority Leader,
6	with that I ask the invocation be spread in full upon
7	the record.

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2 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you. We 3 will now have communication from Speaker Corey 4 Johnson.

5 SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you all, Madam Majority Leader. Ah, today is a, ah, sad day for the 6 7 New York City Council. Just about a year ago we here 8 and voted to suspend Council Member King for behavior 9 which, I said at the time, was intolerable and unacceptable. At that time it was the second 10 11 determination against Council Member King of violations of the council rules and policies, and we 12 are back here today considering his expulsion. 13 Section 45 of the City Charter requires us to judge 14 15 and sanction our own members. We cannot abdicate 16 this legal duty. However, we used a highly regarded 17 outside firm with Kerry Cohen as our special counsel 18 to both investigate and bring the current as well as 19 prior cases against Council Member King. This case 20 was brought before our Standards and Ethics 21 Committee, whose members have demonstrated over the 2.2 last three years how rigorous, impartial, and 23 professional they are in carrying out these chartermandated duties. Last year we debated between two 24 25 options: One, the harshest penalties we had ever

imposed on a council member, including a 30-day 2 3 suspension, a \$15,000, and mandatory training at the 4 council member's expense, and a permanent monitor in his office, and the second, expulsion. The Standards 5 and Ethics Committee, after months of work, had 6 7 unanimously agreed that suspension, a substantial 8 fine, training, and a monitor were the appropriate 9 course of action at that time. The committee's decision a year ago was based in no small part on a 10 11 reluctance to overturn the will of the voters of the 12 12th District, unless all reasonable alternatives had 13 been exhausted. The committee in recommending the sanctions short of expulsion hoped that a significant 14 15 punishment with specialized training and the permanent monitor could get Council Member King to 16 17 change his ways and correct the toxic environment he 18 had created in his office. I pubically called on 19 Council Member King to resign at that time, but I 20 believed we had an obligation to do everything we 21 could to attempt to remedy the situation before 2.2 taking a drastic action of expelling a member of this 23 legislative body. Unfortunately, all reasonable alternatives have been exhausted and drastic action 24 25 is now our only option. As we debated the

appropriate sanction in 2019 and in the aftermath of 2 3 our imposition of the monitor in Council Member King's office, something happened which I believe 4 speaks volumes about the council and the trust people 5 have had in this process. Other staffers and former 6 7 staffers of Council Member King came forward after that last sanction occurred to our Standards and 8 9 Ethics Committee staff, to our special counsel, and subsequently to the monitor that was put in his 10 11 office. These staffers raised both complaints of 12 discrimination and harassment, as well as ethics 13 complaints against Council Member King that had 14 occurred prior to the imposition of the monitor. The 15 truth is, had these claims been raised and 16 substantiated before our Stated Meeting last October 17 the outcome may very well have been different. The 18 vote to expel Council Member King very well could 19 have happened last year. But the important thing is 20 how heartening and encouraging it is that the courage 21 of the complaints, the witnesses, and our actions at the time made other brave staffers and former 2.2 23 staffers feel they could safely come forward. All these staffers and former staffers are really the 24 heroes of this sad case and we owe them our 25

Based on these new allegations, almost 2 gratitude. 3 immediately after Council Member King's suspension, 4 our Standards and Ethics Committee began its third investigation of Council Member King. The results of 5 that investigation are before us today in the report 6 7 that was sent around, and I have to say they disgust 8 I will let Chair Matteo outline the charges, me. 9 which were unanimously substantiated, and include discrimination, conversion of council funds, and 10 11 complete disregard of much of our 2019 resolution 12 imposing corrective actions and sanctions on Council Member King. But before I turn it over to the chair 13 14 of our Standards and Ethics Committee, who has worked 15 so hard and to whom we all owe a debt of gratitude, I 16 want to emphasize two things that really disturbed me 17 that are contained in this report, even among all the 18 disturbing evidence outlined therein. It almost goes 19 without saying that, first, telling a staffer with 20 menstrual bleeding to "put a Band-Aid on it" and, 21 second, taking \$2000 of city funds, are conduct is 2.2 disqualifying for public office. But what also 23 appalled me are these two things. After we put a monitor in Council Member King's office and charged 24 him with doing these awful things, first he treated 25

employees who were cooperating with the committee and 2 3 the monitor poorly and, second, he raged and cursed 4 at the monitor for refusing to let him fire yet another employee who had just requested a medical 5 accommodation. I am grateful that the monitor, who 6 7 has been amazing, has been there and worked 8 tirelessly to protect staff. Nevertheless, this 9 conduct, along with all of his other behavior, provides, to me, that Council Member King's behavior 10 11 is unfixable and that if we do not take the action 12 recommended by the committee we are likely to be back 13 here again in a few months. By our rules, which 14 Council Member King has voted repeatedly to approve, 15 it was the Committee on Standards and Ethics that was 16 charged with hearing and weighing the evidence and 17 ensuring that the recommended sanctions were 18 commensurate with the violations. They held a four-19 day hearing, at which Council Member King appeared 20 with counsel, and was afforded every opportunity to make his case and challenge the evidence against him. 21 The committee deliberated for days after that and 2.2 23 meticulously reviewed all the evidence, including witness testimony and documents. There is no 24 question as to the amazing caliber and care and 25

diligence they exercised and I cannot thank them enough. So now I want to turn it over to the chair of Standards and Ethics Committee, Chair Matteo, and after Chair Matteo is done we will provide Council Member King time to speak as well. I want to turn it over to you, Chair Matteo.

8 CHAIR MATTEO: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. 9 Let me begin by saying how deeply upsetting it is that we are here debating the expulsion of one of our 10 11 colleagues. We had hoped at the last hearing from 12 the sanctions imposed from the previous disciplinary matter would have been the last time the committee 13 14 and the council would have to respond to Council 15 Member King's unacceptable and impermissible 16 behavior. We hoped the council member would have 17 taken the last chance we afforded him and made 18 changes, that he would have learned from suspension, 19 that the monitor's oversight would have resulted in an office free from intimidation and mistreatment of 20 staff, and that the voters of the 12th District could 21 2.2 continue to be served by the council member they 23 elected. Unfortunately, this is not what happened and we are here again, consistent with the duty and 24 authority set forth in Section 45 of New York City 25

Charter, which requires us to punish our members for 2 3 disorderly behavior and to expel any member if the 4 charges in the hearing were the concurrence of twothirds of this body. Subsequent to the hearing and 5 issuance of the report on our last matter, we learned 6 7 of further disturbing conduct that occurred between 2017 and 2019 that we had not known about and that 8 9 resulted in our needing to bring yet another disciplinary proceeding against Council Member King. 10 11 We learned about additional discriminatory and harassing acts he committed against a female staffer 12 13 prior to the imposition of the monitor. We learned 14 of a corrupt kick-back scheme that he engaged in 15 while we were investigating him in 2019. And we learned that from the beginning of his return from 16 17 suspension he refused to comply with the most basic remediation terms of the resolution. As I indicated 18 19 last October, I still believe expulsion was reserved 20 for those instances where there is no other viable The conduct that underlies the 21 alternative. substantiated charges, which constitute Council 2.2 23 Member King's third strike before the Standards and Ethics Committee, leaves us with no alternatives to 24 expulsion. I have already summarized the charges in 25

my statement following the committee vote and they 2 3 are detailed in the committee's report, but I will 4 briefly review them again now. The first charge against the council member of discrimination and 5 harassment was based on conduct that occurred from in 6 7 or about September 2017 through in or about January 2018 and was substantiated based on testimony and 8 9 evidence that revealed that he treated a female staffer's medical condition as a joke and told her to 10 11 put a Band-Aid on it when she informed him that she 12 needed to seek emergency medical treatment for 13 menstrual bleeding, that he forced the staffer to go out unnecessary, indefinite, and unpaid medical leave 14 15 which he described as putting her [inaudible], and 16 that he refused to return her to work for almost 17 three months even after she submitted a doctor's 18 letter that she should return immediately, which 19 eventually resulted in her resigning to pursue other 20 paid employment. This additional discriminatory and harassing conduct should be sufficient basis for 21 2.2 expulsion, but there was more. The second and third charges related to conduct that occurred during our 23 last investigation from in or about July 2019 through 24 in or about August 2019 concerning conflicts of 25

interest and disorderly conduct. These charges were 2 3 substantiated based on evidence and testimony that 4 demonstrated that Council Member King engaged in a corrupt kick-back scheme where in exchange for 5 providing a one-time payment of \$9500 to a staffer, 6 7 he directed the staffer to return \$2000 to him to be 8 misappropriated for his own personal financial gains. 9 Finally, the fourth charge against the council member was substantiated based on his recent conduct, which 10 11 violated the terms of the resolution. The testimony 12 and evidence demonstrated that he failed to comply 13 with the most basic terms of the resolution. He has not paid any of \$15,000 fine, despite being sent a 14 15 payment plan, and then a second, more favorable payment plan, and multiple requests for payment. 16 Nor 17 has he completed or paid for mandated training. And 18 perhaps most disturbing, he was willfully and 19 [inaudible] made every effort to circumvent the 20 monitor as well as undermine and verbally abuse her. 21 He attempted to make hiring and firing decisions, 2.2 which she successfully blocked, attempted to 23 intimidate his staff, and treat them adversely when he believes they were cooperating with her, refused 24 to meet with her, and ignored her attempts to 25

2 communicate with him and subject her to profanity, 3 yelling, and sexist remarks. In flouting the 4 requirements of the resolution Council Member King has made a mockery of the imposed sanctions and there 5 can be no more chances. Council Member King's 6 7 conduct has forced us to take this drastic but 8 necessary action of recommending his expulsion. Ι 9 reiterate that we substantiated the charges and arrived at our recommendation gravely and solemnly 10 11 after a lengthy four-day hearing in which Council 12 Member King was afforded full due process and after 13 lengthy deliberations where we painstakingly reviewed 14 all the evidence. The committee was unanimous in all 15 charges. With these considerations in mind, I submit 16 to you the committee's recommendation on expulsion 17 with a heavy heart. Neither I nor any of the members 18 of committee ever wanted to be in this position. As 19 much as we would like to respect the will of those 20 who elected him we have a duty and obligation under 21 the charter to judge accused members with whom we 2.2 serve. Unfortunately, we have concluded the Council 23 Member King is unreformable and urge the council to vote in favor of expulsion. Thank you. 24

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2	SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you, Chair
3	Matteo. I now want to provide Council Member King an
4	opportunity to speak during this portion of the
5	meeting. Council Member King.
6	COUNCIL MEMBER KING: Thank you, Mr.
7	Speaker, um, and thank you, Madam Chair, um, for the
8	opportunity to share, ah, a number of things that,
9	ah, that are disturbing to me as well as just having
10	us all placed in this position that we have to have
11	this conversation, let alone vote against one of our
12	own. Um, you know, last week, um, was the Day of
13	Atonement, Yom Kippur, um, as people asked for, um,
14	making [inaudible] meant to atone for their sins.
15	Um, many of us do that, um, and I am no exception to
16	making amends. Um, but what we are going to discuss
17	right now, what you're gonna hear from me, ah, is
18	something that lays to the truth and what we all have
19	to understand is that while we are, we are all
20	elected to do a job, and when it came down to 36,000
21	folks I made a commitment to serve. My commitment
22	has never waivered and I've continued to serve.
23	However, I've gone through a number of things since
24	being into the council and I'm gonna ask as we
25	continue to have this conversation that you hear what

I share, um, feel what I share, and understand what I 2 3 share. I first start, um, with a letter that I 4 received that was sent out from a resident of the 12th District of the Bronx. And it reads as this. 5 Ι am a resident of the 12th District of the, in the 6 7 Bronx, currently represented by Council Member Andy King. I have been following the reports surrounding 8 9 the accusations against him. I am very confused about what is going on and why. From October 2019 to 10 11 November 2019 I believed Mr. King was scrutinized for his actions and behavior. Ultimate that resulted in 12 13 a vote amongst his peers to have him suspended for 30 days with no pay and require him to pay a \$15,000 14 15 fine. Now it appears that Mr. King has made the news 16 for the same accusations that were outlined in 2019, which he has already disciplined for. I do not 17 18 believe the public is getting all the information 19 surrounding our council member. We voted, voted him 20 in, and we should know exactly why he is being voted 21 out by his peers. The ones who make up the ethics 2.2 committee, it is very unethical, unfair, completely 23 biased, and unjust for an in-house committee of peers to come together and decide against their coworkers 24 if he should be let go or suspended as of they are 25

judge and juror to bring someone's career to an end. 2 3 How many of the City Council members make up the 4 ethics committee? According to my Google search, I see five members make up the ethics committee, Steve 5 Matteo, Margaret Chin, Karen Koslowitz, and Steve 6 7 Levin, fellow Bronxite Vanessa Gibson. I find it 8 alarming and again unethical for peers to be allowed 9 to vote against their peers when the outcome is severe as expulsion. Even in a classroom setting, 10 11 this would be unfair for students to vote to get 12 other students expelled. This is not a minor vote. 13 You're allowing five people to make a recommendations on someone's career, life, ability to provide for 14 15 their family, and above all their character. If for 16 any reason unbeknownst to the public or press there is a member of the council who may be envious of our 17 18 council member, don't like our council member, or 19 have any political motive to have him removed from 20 the council, would it be fair, just, or ethical for 21 them to say on the outcome of these privilege 2.2 proceedings. What if another member of the council 23 was facing expulsion for any reason? Could it be possible that they have a buddy sitting on the ethics 24 committee and that friendship could influence votes 25

go against the motion on the table, expulsion? 2 Of 3 course, this is not a popularity contest. This is the character and life of a public official. 4 If the accusations are serious enough for recommendation of 5 expulsion then it should be serious enough for a more 6 7 formal setting, a third or neutral party, to address 8 the hearsay surrounding Andy King. This is hearsay. 9 Where is the evidence of Mr. King? This is not OK for his friends or his foes to have a vote on a 10 11 motion recommended by five members, his peers, to 12 lose his job based on what's said by anyone. You've 13 punished him in 2019 and now you're going to move for 14 expulsion. How is this an example we're setting for 15 New Yorkers and how we want our families to be 16 treated and judged fairly via just the court system. 17 The vote seemed rushed against Andy King back in 2019 18 to suspend him and it wasn't, and if it wasn't then 19 why did the investigation continue to uncover more 20 evidence or hearsay to move to expulsion in 2020? Shouldn't the committee have taken time to get all 21 the information and evidence in 2020, and hearsay? 2.2 23 Excuse me. Shouldn't the committee have taken time to give all information, evidence, and hearsay and 24 then move forward with a reasonable punishment as 25

they've done, as they have done in the past with 2 3 other members? Sounds like double punishment to me. 4 In fact, this is the first time that an ethics 5 committee has moved to expulsion of [inaudible] that member being convicted of a crime. Sounds unethical, 6 7 unjust, unfair, and wrong to me. Our council member 8 may have arguably broken some rules that were put in 9 place for city members, but up to now he has not broken any laws. Any former member of the council 10 11 that was expelled was convicted of a crime. I find 12 it to be extremely forced, extreme force of 13 punishment to have his peers vote to expel him from 14 the City Council. His term is up in December 2021, 15 just like the majority, if not all members of the council. Based on that fact, some members may overly 16 17 care about the outcome of the vote depending on their 18 next venture in public service, while for other 19 members it may not matter at all how the outcome 20 turns up, because they are out, out of there in over 21 little a year. But for our community, our district, and our council member it is a major deal, a major 2.2 23 decision, and should not be taken lightly. The process to move to expulsion of any member is 24 unethical, unjust, and unfair, and completely biased 25

with the City Council. Any motion to be expelled 2 3 should be coupled with a criminal charge or conviction. The Committee on Standards and Ethics in 4 the, of the City Council has too much power over any 5 member's faith and public service. 6 That is 7 unethical. What happens when accusations against a 8 particular member of the ethics committee is brought 9 to the City Council? How would the internal ethics committee be able to fairly judge and recommend a 10 11 disciplinary action against the specific ethics 12 committee and council member? For example, how would this ethics committee treat accusations of Council 13 Member Matteo, the chair of said committee? Food for 14 15 thought. The ideal and role of this makeshift committee [inaudible] bias and designated to be a 16 17 fake court with four jurors placed on, placed to 18 decide to demise any bad behavior of his friends or 19 forecasts. Expulsion is extreme and important for 20 the public, for all constituents, of New York City know about the unofficial internal procedures and the 21 2.2 [inaudible] implicated system within the City Council 23 that is corrupt and unethical. This should be brought to light in attempt to stop any defamation of 24 character of Council Member Andy King and other 25

2 future council members that may be at the mercies of 3 the ethics committee in the City Council. The 4 bullying has to stop somewhere. Just like cover-ups 5 have to stop somewhere. As a New Yorker and a proud Bronxite, I want any system in place to recommend any 6 7 kind of disciplinary action to be fair, just, and 8 unethical. I'm asking, urging New Yorkers and the 9 New York City Council to stop the vote on Monday, 10/6/2020, to expel Council Member Andy King. 10 11 Respectfully submitted by concerned 12th District resident. While I thank the resident for submitting 12 13 that letter to me and to others, I applaud the 14 committee who's, for their work, but I also thank my 15 community who I've served, worked, and lived in all 16 my life. I start with my story of coming to become a 17 council member in 2014 when I got, 2013, 36,000 18 people voted me into the City Council, and I took 19 them down to City Council and I've worked tirelessly 20 each and every day to make sure that I do all I can 21 to make sure our seniors, our children, schools, 2.2 infrastructures, and be a team member in the City 23 Council to do what's best in legislation and budget responsibilities for the City of New York. But 24 25 politics do kick in. When the politics kick in and

someone doesn't find faith or flavor with you, then 2 3 you are at the mercy of those politics. So I say to 4 you, my hits started back in 2014 when there was a 5 vote for the speaker of the City Council. And at that point in time Carl Heastie was the county chair 6 7 and I gave my word and my commitment to stand with 8 the del Bronx delegation whoever becomes the speaker 9 I would support. The Bronx delegation was with Dan Garodnick at that time, um, and then we all ended up 10 voting Melissa. After that troubles, headaches 11 While I stand true and dedicated to 12 started for me. 13 serving, serving, I still didn't get a committee at 14 the start, and then I either lost [inaudible] 15 committee the way I was treated from time to time, 16 being ignored by the speaker, Melissa. Um, then I 17 became the chair of the BLAC where I fought 18 tirelessly to stand up for causes for black, Latinos, 19 and Asians communities. And then, then there was a 20 struggle there as then speaker again, um, tried to 21 organize, along with another member with me out of 2.2 being the chair of the caucus. Then I was thrown 23 underneath the bus when that didn't work by a quote that someone was terminated by me, ah, because they 24 25 dispute my sexual advances. That started the whole

campaign against me to make my life challenge in the 2 3 City Council. And during that time I stayed strong 4 and stayed fast to protecting the house and doing the 5 job that the residents of the 12th District elected me to do. I also came up with legislation, fought 6 7 legislation each and every day, to only get my heart 8 shattered and broken as legislations were taken care 9 of, taken away from me, and to be called a nigger by a white colleague. I went and reported that in to 10 11 Melissa and Ramon and nothing was done, only for that 12 council member to come to me and apologize at the 13 steps that lead up into the chambers, and then later 14 on in the speaker's race come to my campaign office 15 and apologize for what he said he didn't do, but if he did it he apologized. 16 That's been my reality. 17 Ramon Martinez would call me into his office 18 regularly to say are you OK, because he knew what I 19 was going through. Even Margaret Chin, I would 20 complain to her about what I was going through being 21 the chair of this caucus, but still showing up every 2.2 day, showing up to City Hall, doing my job, fighting, 23 and saying what I had to do for the residents of the 12th District in the Bronx and beyond. That's just 24 the start of my, all of the stuff I've been trying to 25

2 manage at City Hall. So, yeah, in 2017 when I, in, 3 in those years I become the chair of the committee 4 of, Subcommittee on Libraries with Jimmy Van Bramer, we did historical work, and getting the most money we 5 could for libraries for the first time ever. 6 But 7 that all went south and sour when I was accused of 8 shaking somebody's hand and then inviting them to my 9 wedding anniversary and telling them to smile. While it was never proven, I was found quilty of shaking 10 11 someone's hand, inviting them to my wedding 12 anniversary, and someone wants to constitute that as 13 sexual harassment. I say that's unfair, but if you consider me a nigger then I guess it doesn't matter 14 15 what, what strategies you put together to make my life miserable. So my heart is breaking right now 16 17 because after I went through that I was sent for 18 training, for sensitivity training. I went through 19 the sensitivity training. I come back out and I 20 continue to do my work in this council. I continue 21 to fight for New Yorkers. I continue to fight for 2.2 Bronxites. This has been my reality each and every 23 day. Only to come to a place that a staffer, a staffer in 2017 gets suspended by the City Council 24 and I have no reason to understand why they were 25

getting suspended 'cause I didn't suspend them, to 2 3 only to find out that later on because there was some 4 anger management issues that he was suspended, that staffer was suspended. So he's suspended and then 5 all of a sudden I get charged again with instructing 6 the investigation, not talking to anybody, and I'm 7 8 saying I didn't even do anything wrong. So now in 9 this place and time I'm being charged for something that somebody else did as the chair, ah, ah, as the 10 11 principle of my office, OK, I have to accept 12 responsibility, I'll accept responsibility. But 13 don't say that I sexually harass people. Don't use 14 terms and words that move people emotionally that are 15 incorrect, 'cause all that does is character 16 assassination. It poises my colleagues against me. 17 It poises the public and certain communities against 18 me. For what reason? Is it political or is it fair? So, again, here I stand because last time I was in, 19 20 having this conversation with you all in regards to 21 discrimination and unfair treatment of staff, you 2.2 know, I went before the, the Standards and Ethics 23 Committee, they hired an outside entity to investigate. And that outside investigator, I 24 watched. I watched from the transcript how Cohen 25

2 made lies, finagled the, the, the, not only the 3 report that she submitted back from the last 4 investigation, but she lied to, to Chair Matteo. When they told Matteo that I did not engage in this 5 process it was a falsehood, because my attorneys 6 7 reached out to Ben Smith, who was then at the 8 council, and they were going back and forth with 9 communications to set me up to have a conversation with about all those allegations. Well, you know 10 11 what ended up happening? Twice they reneged on the 12 meeting that they were supposed to meet with me. The 13 first time they said the person who was coming to 14 meet me went on vacation so they canceled that 15 meeting. This was back in May of 2019. And then on 16 June, June of 2019, they scheduled another meeting 17 with me, and they make me and my attorney wait for 18 two-and-a-half to three hours. My attorney's going 19 back and forth with Ben Smith. Where is this person, 20 where is this person? They never showed up, never 21 showed up, so they never got my side of what, what 2.2 the accusations were. So I would have to ask the 23 question of, of Helen Rosenthal or Carlina Rivera, I would like to ask you all the question. If someone 24 was to say that you did something how could they come 25

2 forth and say that you, you wore a red shirt and you 3 did a blue shirt and you kicked somebody when no one 4 ever talks to you to say that you actually did this. 5 Well, this is what Cohen did. Cohen put out a whole, a whole report together and gave it to the Standards 6 7 and Ethics Committee that said this is what happened 8 with Councilman King. This is what he did. He was a 9 [inaudible] but they never talked to me about any of They never had a conversation with 10 the allegations. 11 I spoke to judges outside of this and they said me. 12 there's no way the court, court of law, would ever come to a conclusion without talking to both sides. 13 But the City Council Standards and Ethics was put in 14 15 a position to vote on a document that was flawed and 16 that was untrue, but, more importantly, that City 17 Council voted on those, voted on, um, Cohen's report 18 to the Standards and Ethics Committee. And in turn there were a number of things if the Standards and 19 20 Ethics and if Cohen would have talked to me would 21 have cleared things up and they wouldn't even, we 2.2 wouldn't even be here today because there wouldn't 23 have been a second conversation about me violating But again, if you look at me as, as the N 24 ethics. word then it doesn't matter, because it's all about 25

2	hurting me, it's not about finding truths, it's about
3	hurting me. So we end up here today again right
4	after I returned back to work. I was suspended for
5	30 days. So let's talk about the suspension of 30
6	days. I sat down. I was told by Chuck Davis when I
7	got back that I was responsible for my office. I sat
8	down with him and the monitor. He said I was
9	responsible for my office. The only thing I'm not
10	responsible for is for hiring and firing, nothing
11	I've ever done. But I do want to back up and talk a
12	little bit about how I feel that I'm being mistreated
13	again. I have, I have a document here. This
14	document is from 2017 after there was a complaint and
15	I went through this whole process again with y'all
16	and people said I did this and I did that and I did
17	this. So I'm gonna read what it says. This is a, an
18	email that went to the Office of General Counsel from
19	a staffer, from one of my staff, in 2017 after I was
20	revealed that I was the one that was allegedly
21	sexually harass and did all this other stuff, and it
22	reads this. It reads to Ms., Mr. Davis, cc Peg Toro.
23	I want to formally inform my member as well as Ms.
24	Toro of the conversation I had with you, Charles
25	Davis, on Tuesday morning, which I made it, made a
complaint against whatever individuals, individual or 2 3 individuals, if any, chooses to inform members of the 4 press that Council Member King was the subject of a committee of ethics hearings last Friday. This email 5 serves as that purpose. As discussed, I'm concerned 6 7 that the disclosure to the press of my council 8 member's identity or potentially discriminatory 9 towards the council member, myself, or any other members of the council member staff or family and as 10 11 such want to feel comfortable as a City Council 12 employee that, that appropriates investigative 13 measures are taken to ensure that no employees or the 14 council or members of the council choose to target 15 our office for any reason, either personal as a 16 result of any controversial vote or policy decision, 17 I express to you my passion for my work etcetera. 18 and the need for me to feel I can do my best work every day. And how dismayed I was that the council 19 20 member was forced to miss two youth services votes 21 early this week as a result of what to my knowledge 2.2 was a meeting or meetings with Office of General 23 Counsel and other central staff. I am tasked with supporting the member to represent the people and I 24 felt that actions of the central staff compromised 25

both of our support, compromised both of our 2 3 professional responsibilities at this moment. And if 4 any staff member or member of the council went to the press despite the confidential and closed-door nature 5 of the committee hearing this, this, too, can be 6 7 potentially seen as actions to make it more difficult 8 for me to do my job in service to the people of the 9 City of New York. If done maliciously this is unacceptable behavior. I choose to disclose this 10 11 information at this time because I did not 12 [inaudible] the meeting with my member at any prior 13 moment and while it is my understanding I did not need to do so, need to, I do not want anyone to think 14 15 the member asked me to make this complaint or any way 16 put me up to it. The member as well as myself, as 17 members of a protected class and as such complaint 18 does not imply I actively asserted a Title VI 19 violation has occurred, I feel it appropriate to ask 20 for a reasonable investigation, investigative 21 measures, to ensure the rights of Council Member 2.2 King, myself, and any other member of our staff was 23 not violated. Thank you. This was sent January, excuse me, 12, December 21, 2017. As of this date 24 there never was any investigation, no follow-up to 25

the complaint that went to the Office of General 2 3 Counsel. However, the minute that someone says 4 anything about me my name is dragged through the mud, 5 it's dragged through the papers, all kind of adjectives attached to my name, you know, and it's 6 disheartening for my family, my mother, my daughters, 7 my children, my granddaughters, and my community. 8 So 9 I move forward to we are here today again with a number of allegations and I ask everyone, there are 10 11 transcripts, and I continue to ask everyone to read 12 the transcripts because, again, as what Cohen did the 13 first time, the transcripts do not equal what the 14 report, summary of the reports. That's all I'm 15 asking, people to read the transcripts. And I'll go 16 into the weeds right now because it's unfair to have 17 cross-examination that brings out information and 18 then in a summary report those things are not 19 included. So let's touch on the first one that was 20 brought to light. Let's bring on the, the \$9500 21 that, that a staffer was, that received. So I say to all of you, we all know that end of a budget session 2.2 23 if you have any funding left over the only thing that we can do with that is give bonuses. So while they 24 25 present to you that a staffer got \$9500 and I

2 demanded that they give me \$2000. No, for what the, 3 that report does not tell you is that four other 4 staffers received large bonuses as well. One received for \$9500, one received for \$8000, one 5 received for \$7000, and one received for \$3000. 6 That 7 was all I was able to do. There was no kickback 8 schemes involved at all. So also in this report it 9 says that this, this staffer who received the \$9500 had no incentive or reason to do this. They had no 10 reason to come forth and have a conversation with 11 12 Well, I remind you what I said to you before. you. 13 When there was a staffer that was suspended for anger management, upon his return to keep his job he was, 14 15 he had to sign an agreement, the staffer had to sign 16 an agreement if there was any other violations or 17 fractions he would be terminated from his job. There was another infraction. This infraction happened in 18 January. Now, I was not privy in our office when it 19 20 happened, but he created a hostile work environment, and when I returned to the office after being in the 21 2.2 field I inquired because the staff was in a buzz and 23 I asked that staffer what happened. And they, they told me what did happen and they created a, and they 24 25 told, he told the staff, that staffer told the rest

of the staff not to let one staffer into the office, 2 3 creating a hostile work environment. Ironically 4 enough, that information went to the monitor and the monitor then had the responsibility to report it in. 5 Did it get reported in? You would have to ask the 6 7 monitor where's that report. You will have to ask the Office of General Counsel where is that report. 8 9 But what I do know is after listening to the, to the hearing and listening, reading the transcripts, his 10 11 conversation with Cohen, that this staffer's 12 conversation with Cohen happened in January, during the time, I reckon after that violation had occurred. 13 So if you want to find out a motivation, well there's 14 15 your motivation right now to come up with a story. 16 And then as it was proved that the time, the time 17 that the counsel's, the general counsel, the, the, 18 Cohen determined this happened, this happened on this 19 date, this is how the incident went down, only to 20 find out from my on cross-examine, I was in the 21 Virgin Islands at the time that the time that this, 2.2 this [inaudible] was happening. But yet the report 23 doesn't say any, any of all of that, it just says that I, I attempted to extort a staffer. That's not 24 fair to me and that's not right because it's all 25

about proven, proving something that's not true just 2 3 to say you won a case as opposed to getting to the truth. Well, let's move to the second thing. Let's 4 5 talk about the staffer that had the, the, the menstrual condition. Well, I will tell you what 6 7 I do recall the day vivid. We're at an happens. 8 event, we're setting for [inaudible] outside, we're 9 doing our stuff. So I ask you as members, how many times have you been at an event, community is coming 10 11 to you, asking questions, people trying to get your 12 card, people want to take a picture with you, and 13 people are just around you. I recall, I recall. 14 Staffer comes up to me and says these words, Council 15 Member, I'm bleeding. I said, put a Band-Aid on it, 16 and I walk away [inaudible] she waves her [inaudible] 17 in my hand, in, in the air, and tells me she's 18 bleeding. I only come to find out in a report come 19 February 14 that she says she companies that she 20 pointed to her vagina. Now I'm saying this to you 21 all as a father who raised a daughter who's, we had 2.2 to go through, as a granddaughter, witnessed as she 23 has to go through, as a brother, as a father, as, as a son, there's no way in the world if a, if a mother 24 25 comes to me and a sister comes to me and say in my

2	ear privately and says I'm having some women issues,
3	[inaudible] issues, that I am insensitive. So it's
4	unfair for them to pick and go back to 2017 and say
5	that, and say that I did this three years ago. So I
6	am, I'm blown away again. My heart breaks because as
7	a father I would never do anything like to any women.
8	To someone who respects my momma, my, my
9	grandmothers, my aunts and uncles, why, why would I
10	do anything like that? But if you consider me again,
11	you start figuring out how kind of ways you can spin
12	a story to say how that I'm gonna hurt this black
13	man. So let's move forward to the, to the next
14	thing. The next thing that we have is that the
15	monitor says that I impeded her ability to do her
16	job. Well, during cross-examination it's on the
17	record, that's why I asked everyone, please, you
18	gotta read the transcripts, you gotta read the
19	transcripts. One staffer was asked did Council
20	Member King ever direct you not to talk to the
21	monitor. The answers was no. He even asked the
22	monitor was she ever asked, was the Council Member
23	ever told you couldn't talk to the staff? No. The
24	Council Member permit you from checking emails? No.
25	I never got in the way of her communicating with my

2 staff, never communicating any way that she wanted to 3 communicate. I never got in the middle of it. Even 4 the transcripts will tell you that I was rarely in 5 the office. So I don't understand how I got in the middle of her communicating and doing her job with 6 7 the staff. And getting what information she wanted 8 to get, she was able to get, and she was privy to any 9 information that she wanted to have. Secondly, and you, if those, if those had the opportunity to read 10 11 that report they said that I had hired folks without 12 her permission. Well, Chuck Davis told me if I was 13 going to hire anybody I would have to talk to the 14 monitor. The two times I considered, I was going to 15 on last base to hire somebody I said to the monitor I 16 have somebody I would like hire for legislative 17 director. I never hired him. We never got to that 18 point. But prior to that they kept telling me that I 19 hired people. Well, Camille Francis from HR 20 testified and told everybody that Council Member King 21 never hired anybody. But in a report it says that I hired somebody. I tried to circumvent and I hired 2.2 23 two people. I didn't hire anybody. And even in the transcripts the monitor said at the end, well, he 24 25 didn't hire anybody. But it leads you all to believe

that I was out there running amok, running afoul, 2 3 acting like I'm this angry black person running 4 around the world, mad at the world, and mad that I had a monitor in my office. The monitor, as we 5 all know, staff do what they do to work in an office and 6 7 as council members we're in, where we're in having 8 meetings and we move around in the district. So it's 9 just unfair to, to paint me as this vicious person. And so I go, I, I, get into the point of talking 10 11 about the \$15,000 that they said that I'm fined for. 12 Well, let's talk about the \$15,000. When I sat in 13 front of the general counsel, my attorney and I, we 14 spoke about the resolution and what it means. And I 15 mentioned to Ben Smith at that time, who was still 16 the counsel, I said something's not right here, 17 because you, you're asking me for \$15,000, but when 18 you're suspending me for 30 days you got \$16,000 from 19 It's double dipping. So actually you're fining me. 20 me \$30,000. I said, well, you already got the money. 21 Why I'm still, why I still got to give another 2.2 \$15,000? He looked at me with no answer. So in the 23 process of that my attorney at the time, my attorney [inaudible] OK, let's figure how to negotiate again 24 25 how that we can come up with to pay, pay this bill.

So in the middle of the negotiations they charged me 2 3 with not paying the \$15,000. I, I don't understand 4 it. If someone's in negotiation how do you say that they're in violation if, if their lawyers are 5 negotiating with your lawyers? And then again if you 6 7 don't care about me doing everything to come at me 'cause consider me [inaudible] I don't know. But it 8 9 breaks my heart because I've done nothing but work. You know, I get up, I work, I read the papers, and 10 11 there are so many ugly terms and names that are 12 attached to my name, and I say to each and every one 13 of you, have you been walking the road that I've been walking in this council? I've been discriminated 14 15 against. I've got legislations stolen against me. Ι 16 got slander thrown at me. I got reports that, that 17 don't, that contradict testimony and then you all are 18 left with saying how do we vote to create what 19 history is never been done before and anybody who's 20 been voted out of, expelled out of council, there was 21 a criminal act attached to, and the last person to 2.2 actually get expelled was in 1949, a Communist who 23 tried to take over the country. So that makes sense. But I haven't done anything, anything that warrants 24 this, especially when none of the stuff has been 25

2 rightfully proven. Because people say things you 3 gotta prove stuff. You know, I'm dragging a lot of 4 weight from every two years to keep coming at me. 5 You know, some of you have said to me, you know, who did you piss off? You know, you got a big target on 6 7 your back. You know, these are the things that 8 you've said to me, and even when the vote came in 9 last time some of you came to me and said, listen, I apologize, but you know he's vindictive. So I know 10 11 I'm up against politics, but I'm just asking us as 12 smart, educated, independent thinkers who got elected to the council look at the facts. Look at the 13 transcripts. I, I sent, I asked everybody to look at 14 15 a press conference that we did that clearly laid out 16 there's flaws here. So I'm asking you all, if you're 17 looking to vote, if you have not read any of the 18 transcripts, if you haven't read any of the stuff, 19 there's no way that you can make a solid informed 20 decision on the report that was given to my 21 prosecutor whose only job was, was hired to make sure 2.2 that she wins. Not for [inaudible] any troops. How 23 do we figure out how do we hurt a council member. You know, 'cause one day's it me. The next day, you 24 25 know, the next day it's somebody else. Someone

doesn't like your politics and someone decides, you 2 3 know, we don't like, as I was told by one [inaudible] we don't like your swag. And I'm like why I am being 4 attacked like this? All I wanted to do is serve my 5 residents when I got voted. That's all I was looking 6 7 I do not want to be a martyr. I just want to to do. 8 continue to serve the residents of the 12th District. 9 My heart breaks that any one of us would ever have to go through what I've gone through. But you've heard 10 11 my story and it's not an easy story to share. As a 12 dad, as a daughter, as a husband, as a mom, before my 13 dad passed away, you know, that was one of the 14 challenges that I had when it came to bringing back 15 one of the ladies, um, who was having, the, the, the 16 sister who was having the challenge, what the 17 transcripts do not tell you is that in the time that 18 she was trying to get her job back and [inaudible] my 19 So when my dad died my focus was going to dad died. 20 Colorado, trying to help my mom, bury my dad, fly my 21 dad back to New York. I was no good for the money of 2.2 October, all the way to the middle of November. And 23 then when I found myself getting it back together, I reached out to the staffer and asked her if she was 24 OK around the, Thanksgiving time, if she needed help, 25

2 a turkey or anything. She declined. Then I invited 3 her back again a couple weeks at a holiday event to 4 talk about bringing her back to work. She left the event before she could talk to me to, to get her job 5 Then when I finally get her back, call her 6 back. 7 back again, I offer her back her job. She said, you 8 know, she's working someone else. But you know what? 9 The report doesn't tell you that. But the transcripts tell you all of this. That's why I'm 10 11 saying to us we cannot just blindly go on this report 12 that's favorable based on what Cohen put together, 13 but Cohen's only job is to win. Cohen's only job is figuring out how to, that's what she did with the 14 15 last report. Her only job was to figure out how I 16 slant the narrative to hurt a guy who I care nothing 17 about, but again consider me other than me being a 18 father and, ah, and, and a brother and anything else, 19 then you would do things to right things up. You 20 know, I, you know, some of my neighbors and 21 constituents say, you know what, you know, you won't 2.2 be the only black man, the first black man, that 23 they've accused of something and then only to find that he didn't do something later on. So I don't 24 want to be in opposition right now because I have a 25

family and I don't need my family to go through this, 2 3 you know, because I haven't done anything wrong. You know, if we're, if we're talking about finding our 4 truths, I ask us to look and search for truth. 5 I ask us to ignore any politics that might be in the room. 6 7 I ask us to ignore any slander that's been out there 8 because the newspapers have been horrible and I know 9 many of us watch the news, see the news. The news the news gets [inaudible], you know, and then when 10 11 they look at the transcripts, and I'm begging 12 everybody to look at the transcripts, the only way we 13 can vote is, you know, logically and smartly, is to, 14 is to look at the transcripts. I'm asking you all 15 if, if you haven't read the transcripts you only can 16 vote, you can only vote no to this resolution. I made 5 a motion to expel him. It failed. Today's report contains more damaging, substantiated claims. 6 But a 7 year ago we knew about Andy King. We knew that he 8 had already had a case of harassment substantiated 9 against him. We also knew, as a result of the second investigation, that members of his own staff were 10 11 detained and prevented from leaving his house until 12 they shared a loyalty oath and reveal who had been 13 talking to investigators. We also knew he used 14 council funds inappropriately, forced a staff member 15 to work on personal matters, repeatedly abused and 16 tormented members of his staff, and accepted 17 intolerant, violent behavior in his office. Knowing 18 all of this, the body failed a test of leadership 19 when it was clearly needed. When the staff of the 20 council looked to us, to use our power to protect 21 them, instead the body voted to punish and monitor 2.2 him. Last year before I made the motion to expel I 23 asked many people if they believed that Andy King would stop abusing his staff and office if he 24 25 continued to serve. No one said yes. But he was

2	left in a position to continue to do this. There are
3	no excuses, just an abdication of leadership. Last
4	year as we gathered in chambers to consider Andy
5	King's actions, Chloe Rivera was seated in the
6	balcony. I saw her sitting there. Chloe has bravely
7	come forward and talked about how she was harassed by
8	Andy King. I believe her. She's given me permission
9	to talk about her case. Chloe began her career as an
10	intern in my office and then worked on my committee
11	for years. I knew that Chloe was in the chambers
12	that day to challenge
13	SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time.
14	COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER:all of us
15	to do the right thing and take a stand against sexual
16	harassment and violence in the workplace. I would
17	not let Chloe down that day, nor the hundreds of
18	staff members watching us in their cubicles. Today's
19	vote to expel Andy King isn't a victory or triumph of
20	any kind. It's an indictment of our failure to act
21	when we knew what was the right thing to do. Thank
22	you.

To the staff members, to our 12 city, please accept my apology. I understand that 13 may not be good enough if you faced unconscionable 14 conduct that occurred after our lateral vote. Today 15 I do my best to correct that mistake, past mistakes. 16 It ends now. It stops today. However, having 6 7 spoken with some of Council Member King's current and former staffers and given the revelations in the 8 9 committee's most recent report, I now see that we could have and should have acted much earlier, and 10 11 for that I sincerely apologize. This ugly chapter in 12 the council's history has demonstrated that the 13 process by which we attempt to protect our workers is 14 broken and it is time to correct this mistake. We 15 must address the failures in our process for 16 reporting and adjudicating misconduct, which enabled 17 corruption and abuse to persist, and our failure to 18 act continues to hurt our employees and constituents, 19 and it must end. Fierce advocates, like Harassment-20 Free NYCC and Sexual Harassment Working Group, have 21 put forward recommendations as to how to reform our 2.2 policies and procedures. I support that platform, 23 and we should all listen to them. We need to immediately begin a process to evaluate and implement 24 real changes, including having a public hearing. 25 Ι

We must use this as 11 12 an opportunity to revisit and deeply analyze the 13 effectiveness of these programs. As a body, we have 14 to act quickly and decisively when it comes to sexual 15 harassment. This council and the mayor came together 16 at the beginning of 2018 in response to the Me Too 17 movement to pass our historic Stop Sexual Harassment 18 in the Workplace Act, which is a package of bills 19 aimed at addressing and preventing sexual harassment 20 in the workplace, private and public sectors. Implementation of several of these bills has been a 21 2.2 disappointment. The climate survey was so mediocre 23 that the findings and the next steps were irrelevant. We need to aim higher and to do so immediately to end 24 workplace harassment in New York City. I look 25

This moment in our history is not just defined by a single council 6 7 member's misdeeds. It will also be defined by our 8 institutional ability to implement our own policies 9 in a meaningful way and to ensure a workplace free from harassment and discrimination. This vote is 10 11 long overdue, but we will miss the moral urgency of 12 the moment if we treat the expulsion of Andy King as 13 the sole corrective measure needed to overcome what 14 is fundamentally an institutional problem. This is 15 not a criticism of my colleagues on the Standards and Ethics Committee who did the best they could within a 16 17 broken system. Unfortunately, our colleague's 14 15 consistent pattern of a harmful work environment that he created and allowed to happen in his own office is 16 17 unacceptable. We all, colleagues, have a 18 responsibility to treat our constituents and staffers 19 with dignity and respect, and when we lose sight of 20 that it's a dangerous thing. I apologize to all the staff and all the witnesses who came forward for what 21 2.2 you endured. I pray for your healing and your 23 strength as you all attempt to move forward in your careers and put this ordeal behind you. I pray for 24 our colleague and his own family. There is a real 25

2	problem facing the truth and accepting responsibility

3	comments of Council Member King, um, was the fact	
4	that he, um, went to great lengths to require her to	
5	go out on unpaid leave and then essentially ghosted	
6	her and would not return her calls, um, set up an	
7	expectation that she would return to work potentially	
8	within two weeks, and three-and-a-half months went	
9	by, um, without her being offered her job back, um,	
10	nor any indication that she would or wouldn't be able	
11	to return to work and therefore	
12	SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time.

14	she lost out on those wages. So, um, if I may just,	
15	ah, ah, just a couple [inaudible] concluding remarks.

18	other charge, um, both of which, by the way, I just	
19	want it for the record, um, occurred prior to us
