3	CHAIRPERSON AYALA: Good morning. Good
4	morning, everyone. My name is Diana Ayala and I am
5	the Chair on the Committee on Consumer Affairs and
6	Business Licensing. I would like to welcome you to
7	our vote today on two bills that will improve the
8	regulatory landscape for businesses in New York City.
9	We will be voting on proposed Introduction 499-A by
.0	Council member Koslowitz. News stands Quiet,
.1	please. Thank you. We will be voting on proposed
.2	Introduction 499-A by Council member Koslowitz. News
.3	stands on some of the smallest businesses that we
. 4	have in New York City with some of the hardest
.5	working owners. Within the industry, newsstand
. 6	operators typically operated there newsstand for up
.7	to 12 hours a day for often modest revenues. Most
. 8	newsstands are owned by immigrants and, as consumers
. 9	have increasingly preferred digital over print media,
20	the job of a newsstand operator has become less
21	lucrative. The pandemic and resulting stay-at-home
22	orders have made it even more challenging for
23	newsstand operators to turn a profit over the past 18
24	months. In response to the difficulties facing this
25	industry, this committee will take action today to

pass a bill to improve the conditions of those operating newsstands. Currently, newsstand operators are unable to operate their news stands as a corporate entity such as a corporation or LLC which means that newsstand operators must run their business as sole proprietors. This set up exposes their assets such as their homes or college savings accounts to personal liability if they are sued, for example, and the Annabella data form partnerships also prohibits them from bringing a family member or an employee into the business or sharing the cost of the stand itself. An employee who has worked at a newsstand for decades is unable to, under the current law, to become a partner at the newsstand and takeover for the existing operator after they retire. Existing newsstand operators have, therefore, advocated for the right to incorporate as business entities, which is an essential component of Intro

The law requires these items with few exceptions to be individually labeled with a price sticker. item pricing requirement is a massive burden for retail stores. In supermarket, for example, one of the thousands of items in the store must have their prices correctly labeled. Of course, labeling tens of thousands of items and a store perfectly is nearly impossible. Human error can lead to a few items being labeled incorrectly. These mistakes, however, leaves stores vulnerable to findings from DCWP. According to one aggregate, creating an exception for the item pricing requirement was eliminated at one of the biggest finds this industry sees. Intro 1145-A modernize this the item pricing requirement without sacrificing consumer protection. Under the proposed introduction, stories can only make use of the bills exception if they provide product scanners that consumers can use to check the price of the item. The number of the scanners needed in each store would be based on the size of the store as determined by the Commissioner of DCWP. Each shelf in the retail store will also me to list the prize of the corresponding item. In recent years, jurisdictions across New York State have taken action to enable

Similar 4 legislation has passed in Westchester, Nassau, [inaudible 00:04:17] Rocklin, Eerie, Ressler, and St. Lawrence County. I am glad that New York City would 6 7 join these other jurisdictions in taking commonsense 8 steps to amend outdated laws will, at the same time, not sacrificing consumer transparency. I urge my colleagues to vote yes on the use of important 10 11 introductions. Before I asked the clerk to call the 12 roll, I would like to turn it over to Council member 13 Koo to deliver an opening statement on his bill. Council member Koo? 14 15 COUNCIL MEMBER KOO: Thank you, Chair 16 Today we are voting on my bill, Intro 1145. Ayala. 17 This is a small business relief bill that will expand 18 the number of items that retailers that are exempt 19 from item pricing requirements for individual pieces 20 of merchandise as long as the store makes prize 21 scanners available for the consumer. For years, retail stores have been forced to waste time and 2.2 2.3 money on the labor-intensive task of using sticker guns on every single individual piece of merchandise 24

have had do it for more than 20 years. The city mandates, despite a redundant state law that requires item pricing to also be displayed on the shelf. My bill will eliminate the sticker gun mandates and give retail stores the option to use prize scanners such as those already found at large stores like Target. This is one of the DCWP's most common violations and right now, those bigger change stores are already ignoring this law and just paid the fine. They see it as a cost of doing business, but hours smaller, often minority owned businesses are not as lucky and by using barcodes and scanners, stores can more efficiently implement sales and discounts over their own goods. There is also zero evidence that this bill would result in any sort of [inaudible 00:06:40]. We have asked for data, but there is none. Nassau, Suffolk, and Manchester counties have all been utilizing this technology for decades with low reportage of job loss. If anything, retailers are struggling to hire and keep a system of employees this time. This bill will allow small businesses to innovate and improve their business instead of having to scramble to comply with cumbersome and outdated overregulation. At the end of the day, we are in a

2 retail crisis and this is a common sense step to

3 clean up the law. The pandemic has caused a retail

4 crisis that we have never seen before. Supermarkets

5 and small business retailers continues to shut their

6 doors and this is one tangible action we can take to

7 | support them. We have all thought about wanting to

COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: The Council, in considering Intro 499, is essentially considering the same bill as Intro 0968. Intro 0968 contains language authorizing raising the limit on the dollar amount a news stand operator could charge for an item. This increased dollar limit was achieved during the Bloomberg administration and, therefore, does not appear in Intro 499. Except for the raising of the dollar amount, Intro 0968 and Intro 0499 basically identical. Currently, only an individual can obtain a newsstand license. This bill would permit partnerships, companies, and corporations to obtain a newsstand license, as well. Why is this important? Because it would enhance the ability of immigrants to obtain a news stand license and thus become entrepreneurs. There are approximately 300 news stands in operation in our city. These news stands are overwhelmingly operated by immigrants. That is, operated, but not owned by immigrants. By expanding ownerships to partnerships, companies, and

3	thing now and I support that bill and I vote aye. On
4	1145, I've spoken frequently on the floor of this
5	Council over the last four years about how the
6	Department of Consumer Affairs monetizes and
7	weaponizes our statutes for the purposes of punishing
8	small businesses in this city. And this is a
9	righteous means to somehow take away their punishing
10	tyrant behavior on the small businesses in New York.
11	I would actually do this a little differently in the
12	portion that we are adding to the statute. The
13	language that said, as determined by role of the
14	Commissioner, I would delete that and put in our own
15	rules being because when we pass these blank check
16	statutes and give them over to the department to pass
17	the rules that they thereupon weaponize for purposes
18	of tormenting small businesses, that leads to the
19	place where we are today and trying to fix what they

have done. So, I command very much my colleague,
