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SPEAKER JOHNSON: Good afternoon and we

3 have to read the call-up vote.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Today's Land Use call-ups have a vote of 37 in the affirmative, 0 in the negatives. We will now hear from-- have communication from Speaker Corey Johnson.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you, Mr. presiding officer. Good to see you Council Member Cornegy. Good afternoon and welcome to today's Stated Meeting. Happy Thursday everyone. I'd like to again remind all members that masks are required to be worn throughout the Stated, even when speaking. Today we're voting on 13 bills, including a fivepiece legislative package related to the child welfare system in New York City. The bills are aimed at ensuring that parents and guardians of information and resources to better navigate the Administration for Children's Services. We're voting on measures that will help news stand operators, help families impacted by COVID-19, help home owners protect themselves against deed fraud, and help LGBTQ+ individuals in the City's domestic violence emergency shelters. I am proud of the Council for continuing to find ways to help all New Yorkers. This week, as

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everyone here knows, we lost a tremendous New York native who lived a life of public service and won bipartisan praise. Our deepest condolences are with the family and friends of former Secretary of State Colin Powell. He was born in Harlem, raised in the South Bronx and was a CUNY graduate. Secretary Powell was a true New Yorker and a proud American. He was 84 years old. We have some Council news to share. Our colleague, Council Member Oswald Feliz got married on Sunday. So let's wish the happy coupled a best of luck with a round of applause. Congratulations Oswald. I also want to acknowledge that Brian Crowe [sp?], our Deputy Director for the Justice Services Division is leaving the Council after seven years. Brian has been instrumental in our criminal justice efforts, including the Criminal Justice Reform Act, the Right to Know Act, the newest Abatement [sic] and Fairness Act, as well as our push to invest in diversion programs, support alternatives to incarceration, create a citywide bail fund, and close Rikers Island. Although he'll be leaving us, it was good for the citizens of Manhattan. Brian will be continuing to reform our criminal justice system by joining Manhattan's next District Attorney Alvin

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Bragg [sp?]. So I want to congratulate Brian Crowe for all of his service to the City. and I also want to acknowledge that Kate Lucadamo [sp?] who stepped in as Communications Director after Jen Vermino left the City Council. Kate has been with us for a few years. She has been incredible helping to lead the press office, just a really, really thoughtful, wonderful, talented person who I am so grateful for her service over the last many years. Kate's last day is tomorrow at the City Council, so I want to give Kate Lucadamo a big round of applause as well for everything that she has done in service to the body. And I want to acknowledge those New Yorkers, of course, who have died on the job since we last met. We mourn the death of deliverista [sic] Abu Salamiah [sp?]. He was killed during a robbery for his e-bike after finishing a shift in Manhattan for He was 51 years old, and yesterday, Achmed GrubHub. Amuluaki [sp?], a deli worker in East Harlem was killed by a customer. He was 43 years old. continue to battle COVID-19 in New York City. York has done a great job getting the numbers low, but there are still people contracting COVID, and there are still people who are suffering. In New York

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City we have lost 34,480 neighbors from COVID-19 as of October 30<sup>th</sup>. If we could all collectively stand and have a moment of silence for those New Yorkers who have died from COVID-19, those New Yorkers who have died on the job, and for former Secretary Colin Power.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you. Now on to our agenda for today. Today, the Council will vote on Introduction 1919A sponsored by Council Member Danny Dromm, the Chair of our Finance Committee which will strengthen a Department of Finance program to help homeowners protect themselves against deed fraud. The Department's notice of recorded document program sends notices to property owners any time a deed-related or mortgage-related documented is recorded against their property, this legislation will require that the notice also include information about whom to contact for assistance to file a complaint or to report a crime if the property owner believes that such recording is fraudulent. Anyone can be a victim of deed fraud from seniors to immigrants, to people of color. Those are the folks that are most at risk, and this bill will help them

This bill will extend the certification of the no harassment pilot created 6 by Local Law One of 2018 until September 27, 2026, 8 and extend the program to significantly distress buildings citywide, and I want to thank from my staff Louis Sheldon Brown [sp?] for his work on that bill. 10 11 Next we have Introduction Number 1712A sponsored by Council Member Helen Rosenthal and from the Committee 12 13 on Women and Gender Equity. This bill will require 14 the Department of Social Services review services and 15 resources -- will review services and resources it provides, specifically to LGBTQI+ individuals who are 16 17 entering the city's' domestic violence emergency 18 shelters. The Department of Social Services will be 19 required to submit to the Mayor and to the Speaker of 20 the Council and published on its website a written 21 report disclosing the total number of demographic information survey forms regarding sexual orientation 2.2 2.3 and gender identity that were distributed by the Department and the total number of individuals who 24

identified as LGBTQI+ on such forms as well as the

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description of the Department's efforts to collect data specifically about LGBTQI+ domestic violence survivors. It will also disclose information about the Department of Social Services outreach efforts, any complaints the Department received about domestic violence emergency shelter services provided to LGBTQI+ residents and recommendations for enhancing outreach efforts and services offered by DSS specifically for domestic violence emergency shelter residents who identify as LGBTQI+. Domestic violence and intimate partner violence affects many people who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, questioning, intersex, gender non-conforming, and non-binary, but little is known about its prevalence both within LGBTQI+ communities and from traditional domestic violence service providers. According to advocates, emergency shelter resources are often prioritized in a way that does not provide support to DV survivors who identify as LGBTQI+. Additionally, domestic violence programming in New York State is often sutured in a way that does not assist people outside of a heteronormative construct, which is cisgender women abused by cisgender men. Without access to competent services, LGBTQI+ DV

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survivors often endure abuse far longer and with greater intensity than the average cisgender survivor, sometimes being forced to choose between homelessness and going back to their abusive partner. Transgender survivors often face even more pervasive and unique barriers in discrimination in trying to access safety and support. IN addition, the Department of Social Services will also be required to consult with community-based organizations with culturally specific expertise in challenges faced by survivors of domestic violence who self-identify as LGBTQI+ and to develop and provide LGBTQI+ cultural competency trainings to domestic violence emergency shelter employees who work directly with shelter residents. I want to thank from the staff Bianca Pitali [sp?] and Claire [inaudible] for their work, and I want to thank Council Member Rosenthal for this really, really important bill and for her constant advocacy for survivors. Moving on. Our next two bills are form the Committee on Consume Affairs and Business Licensing. First Introduction Number 1145 sponsored by Council Member Peter Koo will excuse retail store from having to place price stickers on each item they sell, a dated requirement for which

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many New York jurisdictions have already provided exemptions. Pricing every item in the store can be time consuming. State law already requires prices to be displayed on shelves and on signs next to the items and many stores already have price scanners available. Despite this, grocery store operators have testified that violations of this law make up some of the biggest penalties they pay. Current laws enforced on a per item basis and penalties can reach \$8,000 in one inspection. To qualify for exception, this bill would require the items to be scannable [sic] by a price scanner and the store would have to place a sufficient number of price scanners around the store for consumer use. Stores will also be required to display the prices on shelves or on adjacent signs near the items. The second bill from the Consumer Affairs and Business License Committee is Introduction Number 499A sponsored by Council Member Karen Koslowitz. This bill will amend existing law to allow newsstand operators to hold their licenses as corporate entities, as long as income from the newsstand is the primary source of income for each shareholder, partner, member or principal. This ensures newsstand continue to be

this for many years. I want to congratulate Karen

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for getting this bill done. Next, is Introduction 2373, sponsored by Council Member Rafael Salamanca, and will require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene waive any fee for applicants requesting to amend a death certificate to list the cause of death as COVID-19 where health complications caused by COVID-19. And from the staff I want to thank Sarah Liss [sp?], Harbonia Husia [sp?], and Em Balkan [sp?]. Finally, we're voting on a packet-- a legislative package in relation with the City's child welfare system. Every time there is a report of neglect or abuse, the Administration for Children's Service must investigate to ensure the wellbeing of every child. These five bills provide parents and quardians with information to better work with Child Protective Specialist for the Administration of Children's Services. Introduction number 1716A sponsored by Council Member Adrienne Adams require the Administration for Children Services to report on the total number of emergency removals of children each quarter. This bill will also require ACS to provide such information disaggregated by race, community district, and primary language that each child and parent or person legally responsible for

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the child. Introduction Number 1717A sponsored by Council Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel will require the Administration for Children's Services to report on various demographic information including race, ethnicity, gender, community district, and primary language of parents and children every step of the child welfare system and to create a plan to address any disparities identified as a result of such reporting. Next, Introduction Number 1719A, sponsored by Council Member Margaret Chin, will require ACS to submit to the Council no later than July 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022, and annually thereafter, information of how long it takes for families of children in ACS custody to visit their child after a placement or transfer, as well as the number of children that are given placements in boroughs other than those which they are from, disaggregated by borough, and the last two bills of the package are sponsored by the Chair of the General Welfare Committee, Council Member Steve Levin, who has worked very, very hard on this package, Introduction Number 1729A will require ACS to provide a parent or caretaker written information about their right to request a fair hearing to challenge an indicated report made against a parent

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or caretaker during an ACS child protective investigation. And lastly, another bill by Chair Levin is Introduction Number 1727A which will require the Administration for Children's Services to report on emergency removal cases, which means the removal of a child out of a home prior to a court hearing when during the investigation of such report of abuse or neglect ACS determines that such child is not safe at home. And I really want to thank Amenta Killawan [sp?] who has worked very, very hard on this package of bills. I want to thank Council Member Cornegy, our presiding officer, for leading today's meeting, and I turn it back to Council Member Cornegy.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you so much Speaker Johnson. We will now move into discussion of General Orders. So, first we'll hear from Council Members Rosenthal and Council Member Adams, then Council Member Lander, in that order.

I'm sorry, and Council Member Koo, I apologize.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Everyone on the floor helps to make sure we're heard, but I really want to thank the Speaker for describing my bill. You know, today is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. I noticed people are wearing the lavender

masks. I really appreciate that. And what better day to acknowledge the fact that the LGBTQAI+ community, and in particular, the TGNCNB community are underserved in our domestic violence shelter The people who make the placements in the system are not educated about how to speak with these individuals. They misstep and really can make people feel terrible, which there's no reason to do that. And the placements are very challenging because shelters, for a variety of reasons, are low to take this population which is disgraceful. Our bill will seek to understand, will require Department of Homeless Services to seek to understand better the nuances of this population and make recommendations, and indeed change policies in order to serve them better. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, and I want to thank Jathrie Genapothy [sp?], Bianca Bitalli [sp?], my staff Madri Shuka [sp?], and from the Anti-Violence Project, Cat Shugrue dos Santos. She is an amazing advocate and her input was invaluable. you very much.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Council Member

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1 2 COUNCIL MEMBER ADAMS: Thank you very 3 much, Mr. Presiding Officer, Council Member Cornegy. 4 Good to see you up there in that chair, sir. 5 afternoon we are voting on a package of legislation that I believe will increase transparency and 6 7 accountability when it comes to our flawed and often harmful child welfare system. I urge all my 8 colleagues to vote in favor of this set of parental rights bills. In particular, I want to speak about my 10 11 bill, Intro 1760A, which would require the 12 Administration for Children's Services to report on 13 the total number of emergency removals of children 14 every quarter. ACS would also be required to 15 disaggregate this information by race, community 16 district, the primary language of each child, and the 17 primary language of the parent or person legally 18 responsible for the child. We already know that our 19 city's child welfare system disproportionately 20 impacts poor New Yorkers, immigrants, and families of color. ACS' own data shows that in 2019, 41 percent 21 2.2 of families investigated by ACS were black; 43 2.3 percent were Latino. However, we need to know exactly who is impacted by the agency's policy of 24

emergency removals, a separation that inflicts trauma

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on both the parents and the child alike. Once we're equipped with this detailed data and have it broken down by demographic information, it will be better informed as law makers to conduct -- we will be better informed as law makers to conduct oversight over ACS and their actions. We have to do everything we can to keep our families and communities intact and I'm sure that many of my colleagues in this room today as I do have stories to share of your constituents who've been impacted by this. starts by empowering families and making sure that they know and fully understand their rights as It's not easy when ACS investigators come parents. to your home and then take your child away. Parents, especially those who face disadvantages in their daily lives, deserve to know what their options are. We're talking about basic protections and information that should be readily available to those directly impacted by our child's welfare policies. If I may-that's why we need to pass this parental rights package of legislation to shine a brighter light on the outcomes and ACS policies and investigations. Thank you, Speaker Corey Johnson, and Chief of Staff, Jason Goldman for all of your hard work on these

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bills. I'm grateful for the leadership also of our General Welfare Committee, Chair Steve Levin, as well as all of my colleagues who have sponsored such very important legislation in this package. Thank you to the advocates and families who have shared your stories and uplifted the voices of the marginalized. Thank you, Mr. Presiding Officer.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you,
Council Member. Council Member Lander?

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: [inaudible] There Thank you to the Presiding Officer. we go. proud to be the lead sponsor of Intro 2404A which will extend the certificate of No Harassment for another five years, strengthen the program to make it work better, and also extend the program citywide. In a moment of sky-rocketing rent and expiring eviction moratoria it is a critical moment to protect tenants from bad actors who use harassment as a tool for displacement, as we see too often. This pilot program was created back in 2018 through a broad partnership of my office, HPD, the Coalition Against Tenant Harassment, and a wide range of stakeholders. We had a broad series of meetings to develop the parameters for the policy which were codified in

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Local Law One of 2018. The program builds on successful certificate of no harassment program that was adopted in the special Clinton district way back in 1972 and for single-room occupancies in 1983. What the program requires is that owners of building which are determined to be distressed, based on HPD's building quality index, or BQI, get a certification that they have not harassment tenants in order to vacate or demolish or reposition the building before they can get their building permit for significant modifications or demolition. If landlords are found to have harassed tenants as part as an effort to vacate the building, then their building permits are denied, a strong protection against that model of harassment and displacement. The renewed version of the program strengthens the 2018 version is several ways. It only applied to about a third of the city, but now it applies to distressed buildings citywide. The denial of a certificate of no harassment now constitutes per-say harassment, affording tenants the opportunity to pursue legal action in Housing Court with a higher likelihood of success. And finally, tenants who participate in the CONE process and whose building owners are denied that certificate because

business relief bill that will expand the number

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[sic] of items at retailers exempt from item pricing requirements for individual pieces of merchandise, as long as the store makes price scanners available for the consumer. The city mandates this despite a redundant state law that requires item prices to also be displayed on the shelves. My bill would eliminate the sticker gun [sic] mandates and give retail stores the option to use price scanners such as those already from a larger chain stores like Target. by using barcodes and scanners stores can more efficiently implement sales and discounts over their own goods. There's also zero evidence that this bill will result in any sort of job loss. We have asked for data, but there's none. Nassau, Suffolk, and Westchester Counties have all been utilizing this technology for decades with no reported job loss. Ιf anything, retailers are struggling to hire and keep assisting employees at this time. This bill will allow small businesses to innovate and improve their business instead of having to scramble to comply with the cumbersome [sic] and outdated over-regulation. At the end of the day, we are in a small-- we are in a retail crisis, and this is common sense step to clean up the law. The pandemic has caused a retail

2 COUNCIL MEMBER SALAMANCA: Thank you. 3 am speaking on my bill that's being voted on today, 4 Intro. 2373A. Like many New Yorkers, when COVID hit I lost a loved one. I lost my dad, just like thousands and thousands of New Yorkers throughout the 6 7 City of New York, and when I received my father's death certificate, it actually stated on the cause of 8 death that he passed of natural causes, and I didn't pay any mind to that until the Federal Government, 10 11 they opened up-- they assigned funding where individuals who had a family who passed from COVID, 12 13 you could apply so that you can get some of your 14 federal expenses reimbursed. So I started receiving 15 calls from my constituents because they too had the 16 same issue, and as a result in trying to get your 17 death certificate revised, there's a 40 dollar fee 18 that the City of New York was charging to families. 19 And so I just felt that this was a financial burden 20 to New Yorkers that we should not have to pay for. and so that is the motion of this bill which in 21 2.2 reality, what it does is it just waives the fee when 2.3 a New Yorker is trying to get their death certificate revised, and I really hope that I can have the 24 support of my colleagues today. 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COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: On December 11<sup>th</sup>, 2001, the City Council passed Intro 9068. was a bill that I introduced. On December 26<sup>th</sup>, 2001, Mayor Giuliani vetoed the legislation. Because this veto occurred five days from the end of the 1998/2001 legislative session, the Council did not have the ability to consider an override. almost 20 years later, the Council is considering Intro 499. It's essentially considering the same bill as Intro 0968. Intro 0968 contained language authorizing raising the limit on the dollar amount a newsstand operator could charge for an item. increase dollar limit -- my allergies are killing me-operator with the Chief during the Bloomberg Administration, and therefore does not appear in Intro 499. Except for the raising of the dollar amount, Intro 0968 and Intro 0499 are basically identical. Currently, only an additional -- an individual can obtain a newsstand license. This bill would permit partnerships, companies, and corporations to obtain a newsstand license as well.

I got more. I don't talk that much, so--

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COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: [interposing] Does someone have a bottle of water, though, for the Council Member?

COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: Why is this important? Because it would enhance the ability for immigrants to obtain a newsstand license and thus become entrepreneurs. There are approximately 300 newsstands in operation in our city. These newsstands are overwhelmingly operated by immigrants. That is operated but not owned by immigrants. expanding ownership to partnerships, company, and corporations, the current personal license holder would be given the ability to bring in the operator as a partner, and when the current license holder retires or passes on, because the definition of ownership is to be expanded, the immigrant operating as a partner would have the ability to become the sole owner, or the immigrant operator would have the ability to buy the license from the licensee. current rules, this is not possible. This bill is 20 years old. And today I want to thank our Speaker Corey Johnson and Jason Goldman for allowing this bill to come to the Council and be voted on. So, I
