CHAIRPERSON AYALA: Good morning. My name is Diana Ayala and I am the Chair of the Committee on Consumer Affairs and Business Licensing. Today, we will be voting on a proposed introduction number 2448-A by Council member Gibson in relation to providing paid time to employees who accompany a child to receive a COVID 19 vaccination injection or care for a child with COVID 19 vaccine side effects. The development and efficacy of COVID 19 vaccines

COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS & BUSINESS LICENSING4 have been miraculous in their prevention of infections, hospitalizations, and deaths from the virus. Epidemiologists at EL University estimated that New York City's vaccination campaign has prevented about 250,000 COVID-19 cases, 44,000 hospitalizations, and over 8,000 deaths from COVID-19 infections since the start of the vaccination campaign through July 1, 2021. For those vaccinated, life in the city has begun to return to normal. theater and arts have reopened, our restaurants are operating at 100percent capacity, and the vibrancy and vitality of our city has reemerged. Unlike this time last year, next week, families will gather for Thanksgiving without -- this week, families will gather for Thanksgiving without the same fear of endangering loved ones. For those that remain unvaccinated, however, COVID-19 has continued to spread the impact and impact their daily lives. is especially true for children. During the early months of the pandemic, children were considered very low risk of contracting, spreading, and becoming sick with COVID-19. However, as new strains of the virus have developed and as new research has been analyzed, it is clear that children are not only carriers and

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COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS & BUSINESS LICENSING5 spread the virus, but may also fall sick due to COVID-19 even if that happens less frequently than it does for adults. Children's ability to carry and transmit the virus is concerning as well as it will hamper the ability of the city to return to normal. In the past week, two schools in Queens were closed due to COVID-19 outbreaks. The closure of the schools due to COVID-19 outbreaks impede student learning and forces parents to provide childcare on a moment's notice. Thankfully, children can now access safe and effective vaccines. The FDA issued an emergency use authorization and the EUA for children between the ages of 12 and 15 this past May. On October 29th, 2021, the FBI issued a EUA for the use of vaccines for children between the ages of five and The vaccine safety was studied in over 3000 children ages five to 11 who received the vaccine and no serious side effects have been detected in the ongoing study. The nearly 2 million residents under the age of 18 who can now get vaccinated will be a major boost to the city's recovery from the pandemic and will further protect those most vulnerable to serious illness and COVID-19. Nonetheless, parents accompanying their children to get a vaccine should

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COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS & BUSINESS LICENSING6 not have to choose between the vaccination of their child and having a workday unpaid. More than 1000 sites will open this month at schools across the city to offer vaccinations to children. However, there have already been reports of extremely long wait times. Outside Public School 40 on East 19th Street, a child reported waiting six hours in line to get the shot. Not every parent or quardian has the luxury of taking six hours out of the day to accompany their child to get the vaccine. As the Mayor has said, you shouldn't have to choose between your paycheck and the health of your family. We must ensure that every city parent and guardian has the ability to get their child vaccinated. The Mayor has provided the ability for all city employees to receive four hours of sick leave to accompany their children to a COVID-19 vaccination. This same right must be extended to private workers, as well. Proposed Intro 2448-A, which we are voting on today, would update the earned [inaudible 00:04:36] and sick time so that employees are required to provide their employees-- employers are required to provide their employees with paid COVID-19 child vaccination time for each child they take to get a vaccination and for any temporary side

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COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS & BUSINESS LICENSING7 effects. I urge my colleagues to also vote yes on this important bill. I will now turn it over to Council member Gibson to deliver a statement on proposed Intro 2448-A.

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COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: Well, thank you, Chair Ayala. Good morning, colleagues. The Chair said everything I wanted to say, but I simply am grateful for the committee. I am introducing Intro 2448 on behalf of Mayor Bill de Blasio in recognizing the ability to give many New Yorkers private workers the ability to get their children vaccinated and have the actual time to do so and also taking care of those children that may have been affected by COVID. I think as we continue to rebound as a city, and heal, and return to normalcy, we have to continue to look at creative and innovative approaches that really provide access and opportunity for so many New Yorkers to remove any barriers that New Yorkers may be faced with getting their children vaccinated. although we know when we start these efforts, there are always hitches. There are long lines, this is not the availability that we expect, but as we continue to work with all of our providers, our schools, the Department of Ed, we will continue to

COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS & BUSINESS LICENSING8 make sure the vaccine is available to New Yorkers for their children. As someone who has a nephew who has debilitating issues -- and underlining issues. is really important for me on a personal level to make sure that my nephew, my niece, and all the children in my family get the vaccine, but all New Yorkers that really decide to do that for their children. So, thank you, colleagues. I'm hoping that everyone can support this bill, Intro 2448-A, so that we can continue to make progress in our overall effort to get children vaccinated between five and 11 and continue to stay safe and healthy as a city. Thank you, Chair Diana Ayala. Thank you to the Committee and the staff for all of your work and I hope that you will vote in favor and I look forward to working with all of you. And, again, during this season, as you can see by my hat -- during this season of Thanksqiving, I wish you and your families a healthy and happy Thanksgiving holiday. Thank you so much, Chair.
