1	COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 3
2	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Good morning
3	ladies and gentleman and welcome to the Committee
4	on Rules, Privileges and Elections. My name is
5	Joel Rivera and I chair the committee.
6	Before we begin, let me introduce
7	the members who are here with us today. To my
8	left, we have Council Member Rosie Mendez. We
9	have Council Member Minority Leader Jimmy Oddo.
10	We have Council Member Erik Dilan, Council Member
11	Elizabeth Crowley. To my right, we have Council
12	Member Jimmy Vacca, Council Member Karen
13	Koslowitz, Council Member Vincent Gentile and
14	Council Member Lew Fidler.
15	Today, the Rules Committee will
16	consider one appointment to the New York City
17	Board of Health. Dr. Joel Forman, a resident of
18	Queens, Mayoral appointment to the Board of
19	Health. If appointed, Dr. Forman will fill the
20	vacant position formerly held by Dr. Thomas Sang
21	and serve for the remainder of a six-year term
22	that expires on May 31st of 2012.
23	I will briefly describe the
24	functions of the Board of Health. The board is
25	part of the New York City Department of Health and

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2	Mental Hygiene. The board's chairperson is the
3	commissioner of the department.
4	The main function of the board is
5	to promulgate the New York City Health Code, which
6	encompasses any matter within the jurisdiction of
7	the department. The department has jurisdiction
8	to regulate on all matters affecting health in the
9	city, including, but not limited to mental health,
10	mental retardation, alcoholism and substance abuse
11	related needs of the city residents.
12	The scope of the department's
13	jurisdiction includes such diverse disciplines as
14	communicable diseases and environmental health
15	services, radiological health, food safety,
16	veterinarian affairs, water quality, pest control
17	and vital statistics. New emerging pathogens and
18	biological warfare are the most recent additions
19	to the department's roster of concerns.
20	The board also is charged with
21	certain administrative responsibilities such as
22	the issuance, suspension or relocation for food
23	vendors' permit. The board may declare a state of
24	great and imminent peril and take appropriate
25	steps subject to mayoral approval and can declare

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2	certain conditions as nuisances and such
3	conditions be abated or otherwise corrected.
4	Besides the chairperson, the board
5	consists of ten members, five of whom shall be
б	doctors of medicine who must have at last ten
7	years experience in any or all of the following:
8	clinical medicine, neurology, psychiatry, public
9	health administration, or a college university
10	public health teaching.
11	The other five members need not be
12	physicians but shall hold at least a master's
13	degree in either environmental, biological,
14	veterinarian, physical or behavioral health or
15	science or rehabilitative science or in a related
16	field and with at least ten years experience in
17	their respective fields.
18	The chairperson of the Mental
19	Hygiene Advisory Board is required to be one of
20	the ten board members, provided that such
21	individual meets the requirements for the board
22	membership.
23	The nine board members, other than
24	the chairperson and the member who shall be the
25	chairperson of the Mental Hygiene Advisory Board

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2	serve without compensation and are appointed by
3	the mayor of a term of six years. At this point,
4	I want to welcome Dr. Forman. Will you please
5	raise your right hand and be sworn in?
6	MALE VOICE: Dr. Forman, do you
7	solemnly swear or affirm that your foregoing
8	statements will be truthful to the best of your
9	knowledge? Thank you.
10	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Perfect. Just
11	make sure the microphone is on.
12	DR. JOEL A. FORMAN: It's on.
13	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Do you have an
14	opening statement?
15	DR. JOEL A. FORMAN: Just very
16	briefly. I just thought first I'd say thank you
17	very much to you, Chair and all the Council
18	Members for this opportunity. It's actually very
19	exciting for me.
20	I thought I'd just very briefly
21	just tell you who I am and what I do. I grew up
22	in Southern New England. I went to medical school
23	in the University of Vermont and been a New York
24	City resident since 1990, for 20 years, always in
25	Queens, even when I was training. I've worked at

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2	Mt. Sinai Hospital and Medical School since then,
3	ever since the beginning of my training, straight
4	through.
5	I currently am an associate
6	professor in pediatrics and preventive medicine
7	under two chairs, Dr. Satlin for peds and Dr. Phil
8	Landrigan, who is very well known in children's
9	environmental health. I run the peds training
10	program. So I train pediatric residents and then
11	I oversee all of our sub specialty training like
12	gastro neurology, cardiology and things like that.
13	I have a great interest in health
14	policy and actually my first opportunity was with
15	the city to help develop the guidelines for lead
16	exposure in pregnant and lactating women back in
17	2004. It was sort of my first dip into it. It
18	was a great experience. It led to doing the same
19	work nationally for CDC.
20	Then I now have two other major
21	responsibilities that involve policy work. One is
22	with the National Network of Children's
23	Environment Clinics that's partially funded
24	through the CDC and EPA but also partially
25	independently funded. We do all kinds of

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2	consultations and policy work around environmental
3	exposures. It was through that actually that I
4	got involved in working with some of the schools
5	affected by 9/11 and some other things that have
6	happened in schools and other things around the
7	city.
8	Then lastly, I'm on the Committee
9	on Environmental Health for the American Academy
10	of Pediatrics. We primarily do policy related
11	work. Actually, those two groups work together a
12	lot. Some of the bigger projects we've done have
13	been really guidance for professionals and
14	families around disasters.
15	Actually the most recent, which was
16	not in my statements because it hadn't happened
17	yet, was the Gulf oil spill. We actually recently
18	got out about three or four weeks ago, some pretty
19	good FAQ sheets for providers. But we've done the
20	same with Hurricane Katrina, with the wildfires in
21	California and then the very first ones were
22	actually after September 11th here.
23	So that's sort of my experience. I
24	think I bring both pediatric and environmental
25	health and some policy expertise to the committee.

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2	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Perfect. Do
3	any members of the committee have any questions
4	for Dr. Forman? Seeing none at this point in
5	time, the chairperson recommends an aye vote.
6	Will the clerk please call the roll?
7	WILLIAM MARTIN: William Martin,
8	Committee Clerk, roll call in the Committee on
9	Rules, Privileges and Elections. Council Member
10	Rivera?
11	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: I vote aye.
12	Congratulations.
13	WILLIAM MARTIN: Dilan?
14	COUNCIL MEMBER DILAN: Just a
15	second to explain. I heard the gentleman's
16	opening and he mentioned that he was from southern
17	New England, so it gave me a little pause that I
18	might be voting today to approve a Red Sox or
19	Patriots fan, which aside from his professional
20	qualifications, which he's definitely to serve in
21	the capacity. I vote yes, but with a little
22	reservation that he might be a fan of some Boston
23	area teams. But I vote yes.
24	WILLIAM MARTIN: Fidler?
25	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Councilman

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2	Dilan speaks like a typical Yankee fan. Met fans
3	have no such compunctions about Boston. Since we
4	disclose everything on the record, I noticed in
5	your CV that you attended Penn Undergrad. I
6	should disclose I'm the proud parent of a Penn
7	undergrad student now, in case that's a conflict.
8	I know that the New York Post finds conflicts in
9	everything. I vote aye on all, having disclosed
10	that.
11	WILLIAM MARTIN: Gentile?
12	COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: With
13	congratulations, aye.
14	WILLIAM MARTIN: Crowley?
15	COUNCIL MEMBER CROWLEY: I vote
16	aye.
17	WILLIAM MARTIN: Koslowitz?
18	COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: I vote
19	aye and congratulations. I'm happy to see that
20	you live in Queens.
21	WILLIAM MARTIN: Oddo?
22	COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: Yes.
23	WILLIAM MARTIN: By a vote of seven
24	in the affirmative, zero in the negative and no
25	abstentions, item is adopted.

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2	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: We're going to
3	leave the vote open for a few moments so other
4	members will have the opportunity. The Speaker is
5	on her way down. Will the members please sign the
6	committee reports?
7	[Pause]
8	WILLIAM MARTIN: Speaker Quinn?
9	SPEAKER QUINN: I vote aye. See
10	you later.
11	WILLIAM MARTIN: The vote now
12	stands at eight in the affirmative, zero in the
13	negative and no abstentions.
14	[Pause]
15	WILLIAM MARTIN: Council Member
16	Comrie?
17	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: I vote aye
18	on the appointments for Rules, Privileges and
19	Elections.
20	WILLIAM MARTIN: Jackson?
21	COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: I vote
22	aye.
23	WILLIAM MARTIN: Dickens?
24	COUNCIL MEMBER DICKENS: Aye.
25	WILLIAM MARTIN: Vote on the

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2	Committee on Rules is now at 11 in the
3	affirmative, zero in the negative and no
4	abstentions.
