riist, we have intio 1320 of which I am
the sponsor. The bill would require the Department
of finance to report on the operations of the Parking
Violations Bureau, including specific information
about the number and types of parking violations and
camera violations issued, the Bureau's efficiency of
collection of penalties, the adjudication efficiency
and outcomes, and separate nation about violations
subject to any program of the department that allows
for the payment of a reduced fine by waiving a right
to a hearing. We heard this bill back on April 29,
2019 and the Department of Finance gave testimony in
support of the bill then which is reflected in the

CVU Estates at 201 and 217 Hamilton Avenue and 80 and 90th Street Marks Place in Council member Rose's district is the site of a 316 unit affordable housing preservation project. Today's action would provide a partial 40 year article 11 property tax exemption. Each Council member is supportive of the proposed exemption for the projects

Next, we have the transparency resolution. The transparency resolution sets forth the new designation and the changes in the designation of certain organizations receiving local, aging, antipoverty, and youth discretionary funding and funding pursuant to certain initiatives in the budget. As with all transparency resolutions,

Finally, we have the BID item. Last week, the Committee heard a resolution setting today for a hearing on Intro 2458 which would increase the amount to be expended annually for two business improvement districts retroactive to July 1, 2021. The lower East side BID would increase its annual budget from \$1.3 million to \$2 million and the Hudson Yards BID would increase its annual budget from \$3 million to \$6 million. A representative from SBS is here to testify and representatives from the two

Chair Dromm and members of the Finance Committee. I am Michael Blaise Backer, Deputy Commissioner of Neighborhood Development at the Department of Small Business Services. It's nice to see all of you in person. I am joined by Roxanne Early and Steven Lee, Director and Senior Program Manager for the Business Improvement District Program. They are up on the balcony. We wish to express our support for the law providing an increase in the amount to be expended in two Business Improvement Districts, or BID's. At SBS, we are working hard to open doors for New Yorkers across the five boroughs, focusing on creating stronger businesses, connecting New Yorkers to good jobs, and fostering thriving neighborhoods.

Throughout the pandemic and now into recovery, SBS 2 3 has been a key provider of program services and critical information to small businesses and 4 commercial corridors alike. We provide guidance to 5 BID use to help businesses comply with key NYC 6 7 requirements, as well as information on how 8 businesses can ensure safe reopening for employees and customers. In addition, we have coordinated hundreds of hours of interagency response through 10 11 regular program calls and partnerships with DOT on Open Streets, and the Office of Recovery on 12 13 commercial districts safety and cleanliness. believe BID's are central to these efforts and as 14 15 valuable and proven partners in fostering vitality of 16 the cities neighborhoods and commercial districts. 17 Due to the lingering effects of the COVID 19 pandemic 18 and recovery in our neighborhoods, BID's have been 19 called upon to deliver an increase level of services 20 and support to the small business community. 21 additional supports address the public health and 2.2 economic impacts of the pandemic and subsequent 2.3 recovery in every single BID has been scouring their budget for savings and efficiencies. Part of our 24 role in overseeing and supporting the city's existing 25

network of 76 BID's includes guiding them through 2 3 legislative processes, including increases to their 4 assessment. To propose an assessment increase, BID's must complete a multi step review process overseen by The BID Board of Directors, which includes 6 7 local property owners, merchants, and residents, as 8 well as representatives from the city Comptroller, Borough Pres., city Council, and SBS, must review and approve the proposed assessment increase. 10 11 Additionally, SBS requires all BID's to submit a 12 five-part justification outlining how the increase 13 will be allocated, minutes from the board meeting when the increase was approved, and letters of 14 15 support by all city Council members represented in 16 the BID boundaries. SBS then reviews these 17 justifications and determines whether they are 18 sufficient to bring to city Council. As required by 19 law, each of the two BID's published a notice of this 20 public hearing at least once in a local newspaper having general circulation in the district specifying 21 the time and place of today's hearing and stating the 2.2 2.3 proposed amount to be expended annually. Each BID is also certified that they have mailed a letter to 24 property owners informing them about the proposed 25

assessment increase in the time and place of this public hearing. It is a priority of SBS that assessment increase proposals focus on enhancing programs and services provided to the district. two BID's proposing assessment increases are doing so to address vital needs and changing conditions on the ground. For example, the Lower East Side will provide community programming and public art installations to open streets and public plazas, restore its marketing budget trend in recent years to deliver sanitation and public space maintenance services, and higher a full-time operations manager to oversee and maintain its public assets. Hudson Yards, the increase will provide sanitation, security, marketing, holiday lighting, streetscape enhancements, and beautification to a service area doubling in size as construction projects are completed. The BID will also implement capital projects proposed in its recently completed streetscape plan and deliver programs and maintenance to Bella Abzug Park. The proposed increases will begin in FY 23 and very according to budget size, district size, and propose changes in programs and services. The proposed increases are for the Lower

East Side from \$1,300,000 to \$2 million and Hudson Yards from \$3 million to \$6 million. The cities 76 BID's invest over \$170 million into neighborhood economies in the form of supplemental services and programs that serve more than 93,000 businesses across the city. BID's have been valuable and proven partners in ongoing initiatives and neighborhood revitalization and economic development across the five boroughs, making New York City neighborhoods cleaner, safer, and more vibrant. BID's are also advocating for small businesses and their districts, helping them to navigate government, facilitating networking among fellow business owners, providing business retention support, and attracting shoppers to the area. Currently, BID's have been critical partners in executing the cities pandemic response and reopening. They have been advocates for small businesses, boosting marketing efforts and pushing new programs for those businesses that are open, and remained an important liaison between government and their commercial corridors distributing accurate and up-to-date information and providing direct technical assistance helping businesses apply for grants and The height of the pandemic and distributing
