SGT. BIONDO: Recording to the cloud has begun, and good morning and welcome to today's remote New York City Council's vote for the Committee on Veterans. CHAIR ERIC DINOWITZ: Thank you. Good morning and welcome to this hearing of the City

Council's Committee on Veterans. Today, the

committee will vote on Purposed Introduction 479-A,

sponsored by Council Member Dromm which would require

the Department of Veteran Services, or DVS, to offer

discharge status upgrade assistance and extend city

veteran benefits to service members who were

discharged due to their sexual orientation, gender

identity, or expression or for veterans who identify

as LGTBQ, untreated trauma including that resulting

| from sexual assault which occurred during military    |
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| service. The committee will also vote on legislation  |
| that I sponsored, Proposed Introduction 2354-B which  |
| would amend the definition of the term veteran in the |
| city charter to additionally include persons who      |
| serve or have served in the active military service   |
| regardless of discharge status or time served. This   |
| legislation aims to make city benefits and services   |
| available to those service members who may have been  |
| adversely discharged as a result of unrecognized or   |
| untreated physical or mental condition related to the |
| military service. This Bill would also expand the     |
| veteran's advisory board from 11 to 13 members, two   |
| of whom must be immediate family members, spouses, or |
| domestic partners, survivors, or caregivers of        |
| veterans. A veteran's character of discharge can      |
| have a profound effect on their entire life after     |
| military service. Service members who leave the       |
| military with anything other than an honorable        |
| discharge, commonly referred to as a bad paper        |
| discharge, are often ineligible for many veteran's    |
| benefits and services, and may struggle looking for   |
| work as dishonorable discharges often suggest to      |
| emplovers the history of crime or unreliability.      |

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| 2  | Upgrading an unjust discharge may lead to greater   |

COUNCIL MEMBER DANIEL DROMM: Thank you very much. Last month in San Diego, the United States Navy ship, USNS Harvey Milk was christened and launched. LGBTQ plus rights pioneer Harvey Milk, who was, by the way, a New Yorker before moving to San Francisco, served in the Navy during the Korean War and held the rank of Lieutenant Junior Grade, at the time he was forced to accept an other than honorable discharge rather than a court martial for his sexual orientation. Like Milk, so many lesbian, gay,

2 bisexual, and transgender Americans have given so 3 much for this country. Our country responded to 4 their sacrifice in the most disgraceful way. For decades, the military discharged and barred from future service these heros simply for being who they 6 were. The collateral damage went well beyond the loss of a job. Lives were upended, families were 8 torn apart, victims of witch hunts, driven to suicide and worse. Having anything less than an honorable 10 11 discharge on their record, prevented many veterans from accessing benefits that could have helped them 12 advance their education and achieve financial 13 stability. Intro 479-A aims to bring a measure of 14 15 justice to New Yorkers who are LGTBQ Plus veterans. Our city must ensure that no city services are denied 16 17 to these veterans. My legislation will thus require 18 the New York City Department of Veteran Services to 19 issue certificates of eligibility to guarantee that 20 unjustly discharge of LGTBQ Plus service members can 21 access all city services that they should be able to 2.2 Despite the end of don't ask, don't tell in 2.3 2011, many LGTBQ Plus New Yorkers do not realize they can and should rectify their service records. 24 legislation will require the department of veteran 25

- services to provide discharge upgrade assistance to those negatively impacted. Critically, the department will be required to widely publicize both this legal help and their certificate of eligibility. I want to thank Speaker Johnson and of course, Chair Dinowitz for recognizing the importance of this issue and for helping to move Intro 479-A forward. Most important, to all the New Yorkers who served this country and then had to fight to have their service and indeed, full surgeonship recognized, I dedicate this legislation. Thank you very much, Chair
