5	done. Good afternoon, everyone. Welcome to today's
6	remote New York City Council vote of the Committee on
7	Civil and Human Rights. At this time, would all
8	panelists please turn on your video? To minimize
9	disruption, please place all electronic devices to
10	vibrate or silent. Thank you for your cooperation.
11	Chair, we are ready to begin.
12	CHAIRPERSON EUGENE: Thank you so very
13	much.
14	[gavel]
15	CHAIRPERSON EUGENE: Good afternoon. My
16	name is Mathieu Eugene and I am the Chair of the
17	Civil and Human Rights Committee. Thank you for
18	joining our vote on Intro 1208-B and Resolution 8374.
19	Today, the committee will be voting on Intro 1208-B,
20	sponsored by Council member Rosenthal in relation to
21	[inaudible 00:01:10] employers from posting job
22	listings job minimum and maximum salary information.
23	Pay disparity based on race and gender is something
24	we, as a society, have been working to address for
25	generations. Despite many efforts made to end the

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2	wage gap and achieve pay equity, this gap still
3	exists. In fact, research shows very little change
4	over the years and, as of 2020, women still earn 84
5	percent of what men earned. The movement to increase
6	pay transparency seeks to increase fairness for job
7	applicants while otherwise [inaudible 00:02:11] their
8	salary expectations in a vacuum. Intro 1208 would
9	have an increase in pay transparency by disclosing
10	salary ranges for advertised positions. On December
11	2nd, 2021, the committee held a hearing on Intro 1208
12	and heard the testimony from representatives from the
13	New York City Commission on Human Rights, advocacy
14	and community organizations, and members of the
15	public. This testimony was used to advise amendments
16	to the bill. Additionally, the committee will hear
17	Resolution [inaudible 00:03:03] vote on Resolution
18	8734, sponsored by Council member Paul Vallone by
19	request of the Mayor, declaring December 8th Sri Guru
20	Tegh Bahadur Jee Day I'm sorry for the
21	pronunciation if I didn't do it right in the city
22	of New York. Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Jee was the ninth
23	guru of the Sikh religion. During his time as a
24	guru, he worked an extensive [inaudible 00:03:40] of
25	India to not only teach [inaudible 00:03:48] but to
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2	create awareness of human rights, social justice,
3	secularism, and national unity. I'd like to thank
4	committee staff Jayasri Ganapathy committee counsel,
5	[inaudible 00:04:10] policy analyst, and Jack Cann
6	[sp?] finance analyst. And I would like to thank all
7	the staff from the City Council and all of the
8	wonderful people who have worked on those
9	legislation. And I want to also thank my staff
10	[inaudible 00:04:30] and I want to extend my
11	congratulations also to Council member Rosenthal and
12	Paul Vallone. Now, I will turn it over to my
13	colleague, Council member Rosenthal, to give her
14	opening remarks.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Thank you so
16	much, Chair Eugene. Good afternoon. I'm Council
17	member Helen Rosenthal and my pronouns are she and
18	her. Thank you, Chair Eugene, for including my
19	bills, Intro 1208 now B, for pay range transparency
20	and Intro 2020-A for open captions in movie theaters.
21	Both bills are groundbreaking. On average, women
22	make roughly 85 centers for every dollar white men
23	make. Black and brown women make roughly 50 to 65
24	percent of what white men are paid. This bill
25	requires that all job postings and promotions include

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2	the minimum and maximum salary offered. Pay
3	transparency brings us one step closer to pay equity.
4	In particular, this bill requires that advertisements
5	for private or public sector jobs, promotions, or
6	transfer opportunities in New York City include a
7	minimum and maximum salary. Employers who do not
8	disclose a salary range for open positions will be
9	engaging in unlawful discriminatory practices.
10	Salary transparency is an actionable way to create a
11	more equitable workplace, both leveling the playing
12	field for job applicants and helping to identify
13	systemic pay inequities. Lack of upfront pay range
14	disclosure necessitates a salary negotiations in
15	which the employer always has the upper hand. This
16	often results in lower wages for women, people who
17	are black and brown, and those with disabilities
18	upholding decades of systemic inequities and bias in
19	hiring. Studies show that women net seven to 25
20	percent lower pay rates than men when the rate is
21	arrived by negotiation. Lack of upfront pay
22	disclosure can also be especially harmful in the case
23	of low wage jobs. New Yorkers desperately seeking
24	employment learn only at the end of a lock process of
25	applications and interviews their salary and, at that
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1 COMMITTEE ON CIVIL AND HUMAN RIGHTS 7 2 juncture, are more likely to accept poor terms than 3 had they known the terms in advance. Let's face it. 4 Lack of salary transparency is both discriminatory 5 and anti-worker. Every New Yorker should have the right to determine whether they will be able to 6 7 support themselves and their families when they apply 8 for a job. It is time to level the playing field and 9 restore some dignity to New Yorkers seeking employment. 10

11 Intro 2020-A requires New York City movie theaters offer open captioning on screen captions for 12 13 25 percent of showings of each film up to four 14 showings per week. Half of those showings must be 15 during peek times -- on weekends and in the evenings. Roughly one in five New Yorkers suffers from 16 17 deafness, ranging from moderate to total. Such a 18 significant segment of the population deserves to 19 fully enjoy movies with ease. While the Americans 20 with Disabilities Act currently requires closed 21 captions systems in movie theaters, long term experience has shown that the equipment needed fails 2.2 23 far too often and, even if they do work, using these devices take away from the enjoyment of the movie. 24 This unfairly burdens users of viewing devices. 25

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2	Provided open captioning is an easy alternative for
3	cinema operators and does not diminish overall movie
4	attendance when scheduled along with uncaptioned
5	screenings which, of course, the movie theaters can
6	do. Open captioning in movie theaters also greatly
7	benefit the many New Yorkers who have limited English
8	language proficiency. Thank you and I'll pass it
9	back to Chair Eugene.
10	CHAIRPERSON EUGENE: Thank you so much,
11	Council member Rosenthal. And, again,
12	congratulations and thank you for your advocacy. And
13	I just want, before I turn it back to the counsel, I
14	want to acknowledge Council member Barron, Council
15	member Lander, and Council member Dromm. I don't
16	know if there are other Council members attending?
17	If not, with this, I turn it back over to the counsel
18	of the committee.
19	COMMITTEE CLERK: Good afternoon. This is
20	the Committee on Civil and Human Rights roll call
21	vote on proposes Introductions 1208-B, 2020-A, and
22	one preconsidered Resolution. Chair Eugene?
23	CHAIRPERSON EUGENE: I vote aye.
24	COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. Council
25	member Barron?

1 COMMITTEE ON CIVIL AND HUMAN RIGHTS 9 2 COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you. I vote 3 aye. COMMITTEE CLERK: Council member Dromm? 4 5 UNIDENTIFIED: Oh. You can go ahead. 8 9 Thank you. 10 COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Can I vote aye with 11 the exception of the one on the movies where I 12 abstain. 13 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. Council 14 member Lander? 15 COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: I vote aye. 16 COMMITTEE CLERK: Committee counsel. The 17 one-- That is 2020-A? COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Yes. 2020-A is the 18 19 movies. 20 COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: I believe so. 21 Thank you. 2.2 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you, kindly. 23 Thank you very much. Chair Eugene, proposed--CHAIRPERSON EUGENE: I vote aye. 24 25 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you, sir.

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2	CHAIRPERSON EUGENE: I'm sorry.
3	COMMITTEE CLERK: That's okay. Proposed
4	Intro 1208-B and the preconsidered Resolution were
5	adopted by a vote of four in the affirmative, zero in
6	the negative, and zero abstentions where Intro 2020-A
7	was adopted by a vote of three in the affirmative,
8	zero in the negative, and one abstention. Thank you.
9	COMMITTEE COUNSEL: I believe we have
10	Council member Rosenthal with her hand raised.
11	COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Thank you very
12	much. I just want to mention for the record that
13	there is misinformation that is going around about
14	the cost to movie theaters and it's unfortunate that
15	that is happening, but I have worked very closely
16	with all of the stakeholders I should say we have
17	worked closely. I really appreciate all the support
18	of the committee counsel and central staff on this,
19	but, you know, I am assured that I feel assured
20	that this is not causing undue burden on the movie
21	industry. Important to remember that the number of
22	open caption shows will be capped at four per week
23	two of which would be during peek times and two
24	during non-peek times. There is a very complicated
25	algorithm that is used in this bill and so it could

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2	be easy for one to say the language is just so
3	complicated that I'm voting no or I'm abstaining and,
4	just to be clear, that complicated algorithm is there
5	to make sure that smaller movie theaters are not
6	overburdened by this new law. And, again, for the
7	larger movie theaters, the maximum number of open
8	caption showings will be four. Thank you so much for
9	giving me that extra minute. I appreciate it.
10	CHAIRPERSON EUGENE: Thank you very
11	much. I think this is the last interventional
12	statement about these legislations. With that, the
13	meeting is adjourned. Thank you.
