Uh, 14 hold on one second, let me get a gavel here. 15 [GAVEL] 16 Uh, good afternoon, and welcome to the last vote 17 of this session on The City Council's Committee on General Welfare. 18 19 Today the committee will consider a bill that I 20 introduced Proposed Intro 1358-A, aimed at creating transparency around the use of psychiatric medication 21 2.2 for youth in foster care. As well as Proposed Intro 23 2081-A, sponsored by Council Member Moya, which would

enhance the application for and the transparency of

The One Shot Deal Program.

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Studies have found significantly higher rates of psychiatric medication use for children of foster care than in the general population.

News reports has also highlighted disturbing accusations of the use of sedation for children from Nicholas Scoppetta Children's Center when brought to Bellevue for misbehaving.

Proposal Intro 1358-A will shed some light on the use of psychiatric medication by children in ACS's care.

The bill would require ACS to submit a report identifying problematic prescribing trends within foster care agencies including: information on how many youths are prescribed a psychiatric medication or medications, disaggregated by various categories of medication such as anti-depressant, anti-psychotic, anxiolytic or hypnotic medication, long-acting anti-psychotic medication, medication to treat opioid use disorder, and mood stabilizers.

ACS would be required to review the reports and submit a description of actions it took to promote best practices for use of psychiatric medication for youth in foster care.

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This holistic approach to medication transparency will let us know if ACS and foster care agencies that properly rely on medications to change children's behaviors, and require ACS to create a plan of action to address identified harmful practices.

The committee will also vote on Propose Intro 2081-A sponsored by Council Member Francisco Moya to improve the application for and the transparency of The One Shot Deal Program.

The bill would require The Commissioner to post information on emergency assistance grants including rental and utility arrears grants on the HRA website and to enhance applications for such grants including creating an informational sheet for prospective benefit applicants in plain language.

The bill would require DSS to report quarterly on the administration of emergency assistance grants.

The bill offers an opportunity to improve client experience and benefit applications in alleviating some of the hardships faced in navigating city services.

Both bills will provide greater transparency to the process of serving children of foster care and clients who are seeking One Shot Deals. I'd like to thank the advocates and providers, and those with lived experience, who informed and helped shape this legislation.
