SERGEANT LEONARDO: Good morning, and welcome to today's remote New York City Council Hearing for the Committee on Fire and Emergency Management. At this time, we ask that all council members and staff please turn on their video for verification purposes.

To minimize disruptions, please place cell phones and electronic devices to vibrate or silent. We thank you for your cooperation. Chair, we're ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON BORELLI: Good morning. This begins today's Committee Hearing on the Committee of Fire and Emergency Management. This is my last Committee Hearing as Chair, and it's been an honor to serve the people in this regard over the past four years. It's been exciting and challenging and fun, and the culmination of that work is what we're doing today, which is Proposed Intro 2430-A, which I am sponsoring at the request and cooperation with the Mayor of the City of New York. Passing this bill will complete the most recent revision cycle to the New York City Fire Codes. Amendments within this bill are

COMMITTEE ON FIRE AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT 3 based on the 2015 edition of the International Fire Code as well as provisions to address issues unique

4 to the New York City environment.

Among a host of upgrades to fire safety measures, the amendments include a comprehensive revision to requirements related to energy storage systems with the goal of establishing a regulatory framework to open the door to using lithium ion batteries and other new battery technologies to power buildings and building systems inside of the buildings while assuring appropriate fire safety.

The bill also establishes a regulatory framework for New York City's emerging distilled spirits industry. Booze. That's right. We're doing it today. We also authorize the use of hydrogen fuel cells to further the city's clean energy efforts and hundreds of other substantive and technical amendments.

I think the most important takeaway from this piece of legislation is that this is probably the most piece of legislation the City Council is passing in this term, and I say that because this is what will allow energy storage systems to finally be placed inside of buildings, whether they're Swell

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Homes or high rises or apartments, and this will
change fundamentally the City of New York's clean
energy policy for the better.

I want to thank the Fire Department and other city agency as well as all the stakeholders and Council Staff for all the work they've done in finalizing this very important legislation, which has undergone extensive review and reflects a myriad of input from various industries and members of the public. Specifically, I want to thank Will Hongach (SP?) and Josh Kingsley for their work both on our behalf on the Council but also negotiating with the Fire Department. Most significantly, I welcome all of you to celebrate the passage of this bill in my backyard around my campfire with some distilled spirits because now all this is legal and possible in New York City so with that we will call the roll for our vote.

LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Thank you and good morning. This is the Committee on Fire and Emergency Management roll call vote on Proposed Intro 2430-A. We'll start with Chair Borelli.

8	very proud of the Chair and look forward to working
9	with him in the next term and I thank him for his
10	good service to the city with this historic
11	legislation. I vote aye for the third time.

13	Borelli, by a vote of five in the affirmative, zero
14	in the negative and zero abstentions, the item is
15	adopted.

17	Distilleries are now legal. Hooray. This closes
18	today's hearing. I thank you all, and I'll see you
19	all tomorrow. [GAVEL]
