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This bill will require The Mayor to establish a new office for Neighborhood Safety and The Prevention of Gun Violence.

This office would address gun violence in a holistic manner. Among other things, it will administer the city's Crisis Management System, which uses a Cure Violence approach to stop neighborhood violence at its source.

Launched in 2014, this CMS grew out of a proposal from the Council's Task Force to Combat Gun Violence. As I mentioned before, I have the distinct privilege of serving as the co-Chair of the task force on site with now... Uh, and former, uh, Council Member and now Public Advocate Jumaane Williams; close together, we worked on that task force, and we're very proud of the work that the Cure Violence Programs are doing nowadays. And, I'm proud to be voting on legislation today that will enshrine The Crisis Management System in our city's charter.

So, congratulations, uh, to my colleague, Majority Leader Cumbo.

The second bill on our agenda is Proposed

Introduction Number 2117-A, sponsored by Council

Member Powers.

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This bill would require all executive orders issued by The Mayor to be published online within one business day of execution. As the city continues to adopt new policies to respond to the evolving public health crisis, this bill will ensure that New Yorkers have access to newly issued executive orders as soon as possible.

So, congratulations, Council Member Powers on this tremendous, uh, transparency bill.

The third and final bill we're voting on today is Proposed Introduction Number 2438-A, sponsored by Council Member Rosenthal.

For every election held in New York City, The Campaign Finance Board publishes a Voter Guide to inform New Yorkers about the candidates and proposals on the ballot.

This bill will implement a number of changes to ensure that The Voter Guide reaches as many New Yorkers as possible. Specifically, the bill will require The Voter Guide to be published in six additional languages, meaning it will be available to each of the top 11 languages spoken throughout the city. In addition, the bill will require the online version of The Voter Guide to include a video

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statement from each candidate, and will require each
video to include captioning in 11 languages and
translation in American Sign Language.

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Finally, the bill will require The Voter Guide to be made available in a format that is accessible to New Yorkers with print and vison disabilities.

So, Council Member Rosenthal, I see you, congratulations on this wonderful bill, uh, that is going to help so many of our voters. And, so, my hat is off to you.

And, so, with that, again, I'd like to thank
Majority Leader Cumbo, Council Member Powers, and
Council Member Rosenthal for their leadership on
these bills.

And, I want to thank our committee staff, CJ Murray and Sebastian Bacchi for their work on this hearing.

And, finally, I want to thank my own Legislator Director, Clark Peña, for his assistance.

And, today will be the last time of me chairing this committee. Yes, before we headed the last hearing, but this is going to be the last vote. So, I salute every sergeant, every staff, all of the council members who've been a part of this committee.

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You've been amazing. It's been a pleasure, uh, to
work with you. We accomplished so much through this
committee. So, thank you for being you, and thank
you for your leadership.
And, so, with that, uh, I believe Council Member

And, so, with that, uh, I believe Council Member Rosenthal, would you like to give a statement on your bill?

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Thank you so much,

Chair Cabrera, congratulations for a term well-spent
with oversight on Government Operations.

Congratulations to you on that. And... (Cross-Talk)

CHAIRPERSON CABRERA: Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: as you say, you're right, congratulations to all of the sergeants and the staff who make these hearings possible.

Switching over to Zoom is a hell of a task, and they did... have been doing an amazing job.

And, I just want to, uh, expound a little bit on your description of the bill. I really appreciate your support to expand access to voting for people with disabilities, to increase access to six more of the highest spoken languages in the city, and for video purposes to include ASL now, uh, as one of the

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2 languages, that will be required in each of the videos.

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So, uhm, I do want to mention two things: One, is that we've made a very exciting incentive for participants to provide video. And, keep in mind, the video is critical for those who, uhm, are visually impaired. And, so, uh, the incentive now is that the last, the remaining five percent of Campaign Finance Board's allocation will be withheld, uh, if somebody does not participate.

But, I want to acknowledge and thank Council

Member Yeger in particular for raising the concern

about those who cannot do their video for some reason

or another, all of which, uhm, are totally

understandable, that, uh, a waiver can be granted to

those candidates, uhm, by the Campaign Finance Board.

So, one simply applies for that waiver and then, uh,

it will be granted and, uhm, their five percent will

be given... The remaining five percent will given to

that.

So, the incentive, I think, will be very meaningful for the hundreds and thousands of New Yorkers who will get more access to information and, uh, increased likelihood of them voting.

I want to thank the advocates so much for educating all of us on not just the importance of this legislation, but to make sure that we get the language right to include access for as many New Yorkers as possible -- including English language

Uhm, so, this is very exciting, and I want to thank you, Council Member Cabrera, for your encouragement. Thanks to the staff, uhm, CJ Murray, and also thank... And, Jeff Baker... And, also thank the... And, Rachel Cordero... And, also thank, uh, the staff at Campaign Finance Board who were really excited about this legislation, who had piloted The Video Voter Guide for the last two years, uh, to great success.

Uhm, so, thank you to The City, and to you

Council Member Cabrera, we're going to be increasing

access to information for so many voters, and

hopefully getting better turnout for those with

disabilities.

So, thank you very much; I encourage my colleagues to vote yes on this bill.

And, again, thank you for your leadership. Uh, this

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Uh, you know how much I care about Full Public Matching, and, uh, working with you as The Chair of the Committee, uh, we were able to get through the Charter Revision Commission, where we put it up for a vote, uh, for a 75 percent match, which won with more than 80 percent of the votes.

Uh, after the Charter Revision, we were able to pass Local Law 1 of 2019 that applied the Public Match to the Public Advocate's Race and every special election since then.

And, then working through with you, and through this committee, we were able to pass a Full Public Match at 89.89 percent, and we've seen everything start to change.

Uh, it doesn't mean that those special interests don't still have power, but who can run is no longer dictated; it is something that anyone can do. And, with these changes ushered in by this committee, we've seen a City Council that beat 21 and 21 to get to more than 26 women, a majority a people of color that's more reflective of our City.

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And, so, this committee has an incredible amount, uh, to be proud of. And, you've done an amazing job as Chair.

And, I think the only thing that I'm slightly sad about that we weren't able to get done together, is, uh, Chair Cabrera, I know you believe in allowing people to get on the ballot by paying a modest fee, uh, I had proposed legislation about just if you make the Public Matching threshold, you should get on, but either way, I want to thank you for, during this pandemic, at a time when people were sending people out to get COVID, at the height of the pandemic, to get on the ballot, uhm, you were somebody who was willing to go against the grain -- go against the party infrastructure -- and just try to make it easier for anybody to get on the ballot and run.

So, you have a lot to be proud of. This committee has a lot to be proud of. The Council has a lot to be proud of.

And, I vote aye on all.

CHAIRPERSON CABRERA: Thank you so much, and I appreciate your partnership.

LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Council Member Maisel?

COUNCIL MEMBER MAISEL: Yes.

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COUNCIL MEMBER POWERS: Permission to explain my vote?

CHAIRPERSON CABRERA: Absolutely.

COUNCIL MEMBER POWERS: Uh, I am voting aye on all.

But, I just want to commend Chair Cabrera, who has been a, just a fantastic Chair of this committee. And, uh, I aspire at times to be as willing to let some of your colleagues be, uh, able to have the space and time to ask questions. You've always been very collegial, and you've been a good a good Chair in the sense of being able to let us, uh, be part of leading this committee as well. And, I've always really admired that about the way you run the committee, and, uh, I wish I did a better job of that, but, uh, I have something to aim for in the second term.

So, I just want to say, very, very much, thank you for the way you've, uhm, treated us as committee members, and the way that you have, uh, run this committee.

And, I imagine this is both a sad and a proud moment for you as leading your last committee. But,

Just the way you've run the meetings, the way you've

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run our hearings, uh, the way you've had just a huge amount of respect for opinions, which, uh, differed from your own, uh, to the exclusion, unfortunately, of a lot of members of this council, you've really, uh, listened to those who you don't agree with, uh, and given them as, I think, uh, Council Member Powers said, the space to have that conversation, uh, and to do it in public, and to make the record clear.

And, I'm also going to avail myself of that today a little bit. Uhm, in explaining my vote, I will vote age on all, uh, but very briefly on Introduction 2438, I just want to explain, uh, because I assume that this vote one day, uhm, my hesitation on it, will one day become truth.

Uhm, The Campaign Finance Board is very famous for taking our laws, uh, statutes that this council has passed, that previous councils have passed, and bastardizing them for their own purposes. And, uh, whenever I see a statute passed by this council, by any council, that, uh, includes phrases like, "By rule of the board," or "To the satisfaction of the board," uhm, leaving pretty much our intent up to their whim and desire, when I know, based on experience, how untruthful, uhm, deceitful they are,

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uhm, not simply, uh, by practice, but almost in policy. I mean, it's very clear. I've watched the last few weeks, they've run around the city lying about our bills. Uh, they're just not truthful.

Uhm, and they do it with class and with dignity and with grace, but they're liars. And, so, when I see a bill like this that gives them, uh, almost an unfettered ability to deny a candidate public funds based on whether or not to their satisfaction, uhm, compliance with a particular statute has been met,

On the other hand, I balance that against that, uh, if their satisfaction is not met, the taxpayers will perhaps save five percent on that particular candidate's spending, and maybe that's a good thing in balance, uhm, I don't know.

uh, it concerns me a little bit.

But, I think that we will be back one day talking about the ways that The Campaign Finance Board has hurt candidates, uh, using this rule to beat them over the head.

And, I will again say it for the record, that I am incredibly disappointed that The Campaign Finance Board insists, in advance, uhm that scripts of video statements be provided to them subject to their

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vetting, subject to their editing, subject to the discretion of what they think a candidate can say.

Candidates should be able to say whatever he or she believes to his or her voters without any editing whatsoever, without, uhm, without any censorship whatsoever by a government body. And, as long as The CFB reserves for itself the right to do that, I remain very concerned about the stick by which they beat candidates around the city.

And, I agree with Councilman Kallos, uhm, that I think that the experiment of The Campaign Finance System has proven itself, in this current session that we're in, uhm, and in the new session that's about to start in January 1st, look at the city, and look who was able to win elections, uh, because the taxpayers chipped in a little bit to help out. It's a good system. The Campaign Finance Board doesn't do it very well.

And, so, I will be voting aye on all, but I wanted to state that for the record, so that when this all happens, we can pull up the transcript, and I can do one of my favorite I told you sos.

Thank you very much Mr. Chair. Again, uh, your leadership of this committee has been incredible.
