4	SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Quiet, please.
5	CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Good morning
6	and, and welcome. I'm Councilman Jim Gennaro,
7	Chair of the City Council's Committee on
8	Environmental Protection. Today we're having a
9	vote on a Resolution, calling on the Delaware
10	River Basin Commission to refrain from issuing
11	regulations governing gas exploration and
12	production using hydrofracking and for water
13	withdrawal for the purpose of hydrofracking within
14	the Delaware River Basin, until a cumulative
15	impact study is completed to assess the risks and
16	inform the development of adequate regulations for
17	hydrofracking in the Delaware River Basin. I have
18	spent almost two decades of my professional
19	careerlooking at that on the page, I guess
20	that's right, it seems likebut when you see it
21	like that [laughter] it gets a little scary. So,
22	am I more afraid of fracking or the two decades?
23	But for the purpose of today's meeting it would be
24	the fracking, okay? Although the two decades is
25	looming. I spent almost two decades of my

2	professional career working to protect the New
3	York City Watershed and I plan to continue my
4	efforts. The New York City Watershed provides
5	potable water for more than nine million residents
6	of New York City and millions of others who work
7	here, as well as those who provide, who reside in
8	communities whose water comes from our system,
9	which represents about half the people in New York
10	State. Previously, the New York City Council
11	passed Resolution 1850-A, which was authored by
12	me, calling on the, on the U.S. Congress to adopt
13	legislation removing the exemption for
14	hydrofracking from the Safe Drinking Water Act,
15	and on the U.S. EPA to apply stringent regulations
16	to protect drinking water supplies from any risks
17	due to hydrofracking, and on the New York State
18	Department of Environmental Conservation, the New
19	York State Legislature, and the New York State
20	Governor, David Patterson, to, to prohibit natural
21	gas drilling within the boundaries of the New York
22	City Watershed. I'd like to believe that, you
23	know, we here in the Council were very helpful in
24	getting the Environmental Protection Agency to
25	take a closer look at gas drilling using

2	hydrofracking, and its impact on drinking water,
3	and I've held several public hearings and meetings
4	on this important issue. The EPA's study is
5	expected to last until the end of 2012. Now it
6	is, now we know that the Delaware River Basin
7	Commission is likely to fast-track the issuance of
8	regulations authorizing gas drilling using
9	hydrofracking even before the EPA's study, even
10	before the EPA study is complete, and even before
11	a cumulative impact study, already authorized by
12	Congress, is completed by them, you know, meaning
13	the, the DRBC, to assess the risks and inform the
14	development of adequate regulations for
15	hydrofracking in the Delaware River Basin. No
16	regulation should be issued allowing hydrofracking
17	until we have had an opportunity to review the
18	results of the scientific research being conducted
19	at the, paid for by the taxpayers, to make sure
20	our decisions are sound and fully informed. By
21	this Resolution we have asked Delaware River Basin
22	Commission to refrain from precipitously using
23	regulations permitting gas drilling, using
24	hydrofracking in the Delaware River Basin, until,
25	in the Delaware River Basin Watershed, until we

2	are certain that we're not placing our drinking
3	water and environment at risk. New York City has
4	spent more than \$2 billion to protect its
5	watershed. We do not want to waste the \$2 billion
6	we invested, nor be required to filter our water
7	after its polluted by others for their profit, at
8	a great cost to City residents. The bottom line
9	is that nothing should be allowed to jeopardize an
10	unfiltered and pure drinking water source for half
11	the State, that is able to serve the drinking
12	water needs of this and future generations. We're
13	very happy to be joined by Council Member, Council
14	Member Levin, Council Member Koppell, Council
15	Member Crowley, Council Member Lander, where's
16	Council Member Lander.
17	FEMALE VOICE: He's, he'll be back.
18	CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Oh, yeah,
19	okay. And I think I mentioned Councilman Vallone,
20	but I'll mention him again because, you know,
21	he's, he's my buddy. Andso don't say I never
22	did anything for you, you know, He would never
23	say that anyway. And it's people reading this
24	record 50 years from now will be able to, you
25	know, read this discourse and [laughter] try to

2	figure out, like what was going on? Right, okay.
3	[laughs] Yeah, but I'm getting looks, so that
4	kind of, you know, is part of the discourse, you
5	know. And, and we're also joined by a fellow
6	elected official, Susan Zimet, from the Ulster
7	County Legislature. Thank you for being here,
8	Susan, she's been a real driving force on making
9	sure that, you know, good things happen regarding
10	fracking, or rather that bad things don't happen.
11	And Julia Walsh and Claire Sandberg, both I think
12	cofounders Frack Action, along with Susan. Okay,
13	so we have the, the three that have really made a
14	mark, and we're very grateful for that. So, we
15	have this Preconsidered Resolution, we're doing
16	it, you know, via the Preconsidered method,
17	because this is an urgent and timely matter. We
18	want to send the signal to the DRBC that they
19	should not proceed. I had, you know, read some
20	documents on this that there was a member of the
21	DRBC that was pushing for these regulations to be
22	finalized by September $30^{th}$ , which is not going to
23	happen, which would be tomorrow, but this just
24	goes to show the speed at which they once upon a
25	time, or at least one member of that body, wanted

2	to proceed, and so we, on behalf of the City of
3	New York, want to send the strongest message
4	possible that they should not do that. And it's
5	also been brought to my attention that some of my
6	fellow members of the Committee wish to sign on as
7	cosponsors. I'm very grateful for that. I'd be
8	happy to call the roll, but I just want to give my
9	colleagues an opportunity to make any comments
10	that they may wish to make before we proceed with
11	the vote. Would anyone like to make a comment or
12	a statement? Seeing none, I'll ask the Clerk to
13	call the roll, and I would ask for a yes vote on
14	this very important resolution. Clerk, please
