2 CHAIRPERSON PALMA: Good morning.

My name is Council Member Annabel Palma, Chair of the General Welfare Committee. Today the General Welfare Committee will be voting on Resolution Number 0477 which calls on the State Legislature to override the Governor, Governor Paterson's veto of A. 2565 and S. 2664, both of which were passed in the Assembly and the Senate, respectively. Ιf enacted, this legislation will provide that person's living with clinical, symptomatic HIV/AIDS who are receiving shelter assistance or emergency shelter allowance shall not be required to pay more than 30 percent of their household monthly income towards shelter costs, including rent and utilities. HASA is one of the most comprehensive government programs in the country for the HIV and AIDS population. HASA provides an array of specialized services to thousands of New Yorkers, such as intensive case management, helping applying for benefits, like food stamps and Medicaid, and rental assistance. However, it is clear that more needs to be done. According to New York City's Department of Health, HIV/AIDS remains a severe health crisis in New York City.

We have seen an upward trend in homelessness among people living with HIV and AIDS over the past three years. The number of HASA clients in commercial SROs, which is a form of emergency housing has increased with approximately 17 percent from August 2007 to June 2010. We must do everything we can to ensure that people living with HIV and AIDS stay healthy and housed. State Legislation that was passed by both houses of the State Legislature supports this goal. Unfortunately, this legislation was recently vetoed by Governor Paterson. Resolution Number 0477 that will be, that we will vote on today, 14 supports an override of Governor Paterson's veto, so that this vital legislation can be enacted. The State legislation would cap HASA clients' rent contribution at 30 percent, bringing it in line with other programs like Section VIII and public housing. A key component of HASA it is its rental assistance program, which provides assistance at various levels. However, because of current state budget rules, HASA clients who have income such as 24 SSI or SSD, veteran's benefits or earned income routinely find themselves paying well over half of

their income toward rent. Many are left with only \$11 per day to live on. Over 10,000 people are currently in this situation. These people are often forced to choose between paying for medication, food or shelter. They are also at greater risk for falling behind on their rent or being evicted. HASA clients are under severe health constraints and these type of stressors can negatively impact their health. A growing body of research suggests that people who have stable housing are one, less likely to use drugs and less likely to engage in high risk sexual activities; and two, more likely to adhere to medical regimens and more likely to receive proper healthcare. The Paterson and Bloomberg Administrations are concerned that a rent cap would cost the City and State approximately \$35 million. However, alternative analysis suggests that this legislation will actually result in reduced costs of certain services. For instance, providing stable housing decreases the need for future costly emergency room visits and hospital stations, HRA would avoid paying rent arrears for clients, and fewer people will need to be housed

in costly emergency SROs. Both A. 2565 and S. 2664 were passed in the Assembly and the State Senate this year, by wide margins. As set forth in Resolution Number 0477, we call upon the State Legislature to override Governor Paterson's unfortunate veto of this legislation that will provide financial relief to over 10,000 HASA clients who are severely burned by high rents and utility costs. The City Council's passage of Resolution Number 0477 will be important, an important step toward making this economic relief a reality for the HASA clients throughout the City. And I want to thank my colleagues who joined and signed on to the Reso yesterday. As I stated yesterday, this Council and my colleagues here know the importance of what it means to be able to have these rent caps for the HIV/AIDS population, and I want to also thank you for your quick turnaround in making sure that you were here today, so we'll be able to vote on this Resolution, I know you were eager yesterday to vote it out of committee. So, with that, I will ask the Clerk to call the roll.
