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CHAIRPERSON SANDERS:

This hearing

will now come to order. Good morning and thank you for coming. My name is Councilman James Sanders, Jr., and I am the Chair of the Committee on Civil Service and Labor. Today we are voting on two important resolutions, which we held a hearing on last week, both calling upon our elected officials to pass legislation that will help protect New York City's citizens, particularly its workers.

resolutions and the legislation that they discuss, are no-brainers. They were no-brainers then and they are less today. The first resolution, which is preconsidered, calls upon the United States Senate to pass the James Zadroga 9/11 Health and Compensation Act of 2009. This bill should not be partisan, nor controversial. It would provide many of the people exposed to toxins at Ground Zero as a result of the 9/11 terrorist attack, with the right to treatment for illnesses that they have contracted because of their exposure.

It would also expand care to the whole community

exposed to toxins as a result of the attack,

As I said last week, both of these

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including those who came to New York City to help with the rescue and recovery effort. Finally, it would also provide compensation for those hurt economically by the attack, by reopening the 9/11 Victims Compensation Fund.

I will pause for a moment and say that I have a picture of one of the people opposed, Kentucky Senator Mitch McConnell, who is willing to vote for a very similar bill for his nuclear workers, but when it comes to New York City workers he believes that we're either not Americans or not American enough. I would like him to know that in the dreaded event, and may it never happen, that Kentucky is ever attacked, we New Yorkers will come to their defense, and we're not going to ask how American are Kentuckians. So we're going to be there. We understand that an attack on one is an attack on all.

I have been told that all 56 democrats and both independent senators support the bill, but because of senate rules, they require 60 votes to pass. So it only needs two republicans to support it. I don't see why all 40 republicans are not in support of this bill, which

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again is not a partisan issue. We urge the senate
to pass this bill during this lame duck session.

It seems to me that the Tea Party and others
should join in. Maybe they should stop long

enough to do something for all of America.

We are also hearing Proposed
Resolution 245-A, which will help New York City's
workers and, indeed, workers statewide. The Wage
Theft Protection Act would enhance criminal and
civil penalties against employers who violate
state wage laws. These are employers who don't
provide mandatory overtime and sometimes don't
even give their workers the minimum wage, among
other violations. The bill is also non-partisan
and non-controversial, and it has even passed both
houses of the state legislature, but with
different versions of the bill.

The resolution calls upon the assembly and the state senate to reconcile these bills and send it to Governor Patterson for his signature. I want to call upon the sponsor of 245-A, my Council Member Mark-Viverito, to speak more of this issue.

COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO:

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2	Thank you, Mr. Chair. And I think you've just
3	indicated that, obviously, this is of concern and
4	there have been reports that have come out with
5	regards to employers that, unfortunately, do steal
6	from their own workers. And is something that
7	it's basically just calling upon the state
8	legislature to exercise some level of leadership
9	in reconciling the two bills and making sure it
10	gets passed. So hopefully this is a strong
11	message that is coming from this body, the City of
12	New York, that we believe and support our workers.

And so, I thank you for the hearing, I thank you for the support and obviously I urge all my colleagues to vote in favor.

CHAIRPERSON SANDERS: I think that it's shameful in the sense that we even have to have at this day and age, where we're speaking at something that seemingly was resolved in the last century where we spoke of mandatory overtime and we spoke of minimum wage. And we're still battling this battle. So, I commend you for pointing this out to the City Council, and I urge my colleagues also to make sure that we bring justice, help bring further justice to New York
