SERGEANT BIONDO: Thank you. Good morning,
everyone and welcome to today's New York City Council
vote for the Committee on State and Federal
Legislation. At this time, please turn on your
cameras for verification purposes. Thank you, all.
We are ready to begin, Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ABREU: Alright. Gaveling in. Good morning, everyone. I am Shaun Abreu, Chair of the Council's Committee on State and Federal Legislation. Thank you for joining us for this morning's remote vote. Today, we'll be voting on Resolution 121, sponsored by my colleague, Council Member, Natasha Williams. This Resolution calls on the New York State Legislation to pass and for the Governor to sign the Clean State Act. This act will automatically seal convictions records for formally incarcerated individuals who have completed their sentence, are off-parole or probation and have not incurred any new charges or convictions in the New York State during the waiting period where the convictions to be sealed is not a sex offense.

## COMMITTEE ON STATE AND FEDERAL LEGISLATION

In New York State, more than one in seven people has a conviction record. A criminal record creates serious hurdles for those who are trying to provide for themselves and their families. For example, background checks used during the hiring process can often impede a person's ability to find a job after they receive a conviction.

Similarly, a conviction record also impacts an individual's ability to find stable housing as some landlords are not willing to enter into a lease agreement with a tenant that has a criminal background, a practice that also contributes to segregation within housing.

Housing insecurity is also associated with an increased risk of re-offending, creating a cycle of incarceration for many. If passed, the Clean Slate Act could have a monumental impact on the successful rebuilding of many New Yorkers' lives. Additionally, we'll be voting on four state legislative Resolutions also known as "Home Rules" in support of state legislation in relation to New York City's employees' retirement system also known as "NYCERS" and New York City's Fire Department pension fund as 6980 would amend the retirement and Social Security law, in

relation to authorizing police and fire members of the New York City Fire Department Pension Fund to obtain credit for service as an E.M.T member. S6981B would address a long-standing disparity by exempting members of NYCERS and the Board of Educational or the Education Retirement system, who makes specific additional contributions but will not be in service long enough to receive the benefits from making additional member contributions, S6985B would provide automotive members of NYCERS who begin their careers later in life with the ability to receive a vested retirement benefit.

Lastly, 6988B would provide uniform fire service personnel the opportunity to retire with a full pension after 25 years of service and would grant them parity with other uniform service personnel who performed essentials tasks. As Chair, I want to know that the Committee has received letters of support for each of these four SL laws... SLR'S from organized labor. I'm proud and excited to have my name on these legis... on these state legislative resolutions as we work to give hardworking New Yorkers the retirement benefits that they deserve.

I like to thank Committee Staff Jaycee Kenapathi, William Diori, and Hector Hadman. I also like to thank my staff member, Jalisa Quigley. I'll now turn it over to Council Member Williams for her statement.

COMMITTEE MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank you, Chair uhm uh Abreu for holding this important hearing vote on the Clean Slate Resolution. Uhm as you mentioned in your statement, 80 percent of New Yorkers have conviction... conviction records are Black and Latinx and face lifelong discrimination in jobs, housing, and education.

We are here today to raise our voices and demand that New Yorkers have a fair chance not only to live but to thrive. Clean Slate will be transformative for so many New Yorkers who have been dispro... disproportionately impacted by criminalization. It still feels like six a.m. for me right now. Uhm especially those who face barriers to employment due to prior convictions or arrests that do not result in a criminal charge or a conviction but still appear on background checks or public... public record searches.

Clean Slate must be passed this year in Albany uh (coughs) Excuse me. (coughs) With just weeks remaining in this year's legislative session, we need
