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SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning. This is a mic check for the Committee on Parks and Recreation.

SERGEANT LUGO: Good morning, everyone.

Welcome to today's hybrid New York City Council

meeting on Parks and Recreation. At this time, place
electronic devices on silent and vibrate mode. Thank
you for your cooperation.

Chair, we may begin.

CHAIRPERSON KRISHNAN: [GAVEL] Thank you so much, Sergeant. We'll begin our hearing today.

Good morning, everyone. I'm Council Member Shekar

Krishnan, and I'm pleased to Chair the Committee on Parks and Recreation.

Today, the Committee will conduct a proposed vote on Intro 488 sponsored by myself and many other Colleagues which will ceremonially co-name 78 thoroughfares and public places throughout New York City.

We first considered this bill at a hearing held on June 7, 2022, where many Council Members and members of the public spoke in favor of various co-naming proposals. Of the many honorees

proposed by this piece of legislation, I'd like to

again call attention to a couple of co-namings that I

am proud to have sponsored in my own District, in

5 | Elmhurst and Jackson Heights.

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One would honor Dr. Sergio I. Rubio. Dr.

Rubio was a veteran, originally from Peru, who

brought his expertise and dedication to Jackson

Heights for over 40 years while expanding his

veterinary and community service to previously

underserved communities. Dr. Rubio would treat all

animals who came through his doors, help any neighbor

and resident he could in the community, and was truly

an example of a humanitarian and a veterinarian who

always placed the public interest first.

The other would name a section in my

District as Little Thailand Way to commemorate the vibrant and growing Thai community in Woodside,

Elmhurst, and Jackson Heights. Little Thailand Way reflects the incredibly vibrant Thai community that we have between so many activists, small businessowners, communities that have celebrate Thai culture on Woodside Avenue in Elmhurst who have made sure that the neighborhoods of Elmhurst, Jackson Heights, and Woodside really reflect the beautiful

2 West 237th Street in Hudson Manor Terrance in 3 Riverdale after Bill Stone. When I think about the 4 work that we do here in the Council and what everyone expects of us, everyone expects us to make good change, but we all know change really happens from 6 7 very dedicated community servants who work hard in 8 their communities to make that change, and Bill Stone was a man whose life was dedicated to serving the community and serving his country. He was in the U.S. 10 11 Army during the Korean War, he was honorably 12 discharged, was a Staff Sergeant, and earned the 13 Bronze Star. When he returned, there was a lot of 14 work he did for our community. For Community Board 8, 15 he served 3 terms as Chair of the Community Board, 16 but a lot of his work centered on advocating for 17 people with disabilities. He was the President and on 18 the Board for many years, 50 years, and President of 19 the camp that serves people with multiple 20 disabilities. As President of this camp, he was 21 appointed an Ambassador for United Way, and, at one 2.2 of our local synagogues he was the force behind 2.3 ensuring that the entire facility, everything outside and everything inside, was fully accessible to people 24 with disabilities and over the years that type of 25

East 56th Street and Linden Boulevard to Kade Ashton

Tyler Lewin Way in honor of my constituent. Kade Lewin was an innocent, intelligent, fun-loving 12year-old whose life was cut short due to yet another act of senseless gun violence in our streets. It is my hope that this memorial in the form of a street co-naming serves as a reminder to all of us that we must all work together to help out to end this public health crisis which is stealing the lives of too many of our young future leaders. It is sad for me as a mom of 4 to see a 12-year-old falling down from gun violence. It is time for us to do more than speaking and talking. We have to walk the walk. 12-year-olds should not be dying sitting a car eating their dinner and being shot in daylight. It is my pleasure to work with my Colleagues to do more that we can stop and address the inequities in our community because I always say crime issues don't occur in a silo. It's a combination of different issues, housing issues, education, opportunity, job. Those are the things that we need to pay attention to. Mental health we know is a crisis in our community all over, but, most importantly, in the high-risk areas. Thank you for listening and thank you, Mr. Chair, for giving me the

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opportunity to speak on behalf of that bill. Thank
you.

CHAIRPERSON KRISHNAN: Thank you so much,

Council Member Narcisse. We've also been joined by

Council Member Moya and Council Member Restler. I now

also ask my Colleague, Council Member Menin, to say a

few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENIN: Thank you so much, Chair Krishnan. I'm so excited that today's vote has so many important co-namings including a street conaming in my District for Jimmy Neary. Jimmy was a cherished individual who founded Neary's Restaurant and Pub in 1967 at the intersection of 57th and 1st Avenue. Today, Neary's remains a landmark Restaurant and Pub, and it's a lasting reminder of Jimmy's impact on the neighborhood. It wasn't just a restaurant for so many people in the neighborhood and in the city at large; it was a home. Jimmy passed away last October at the age of 91. Yet, countless people have beloved memories of speaking with Jimmy who spent virtually every single day at Neary's. He knew so many people that he was known as everyone's friend. Neary's was a special place for people because of Jimmy warmth and generosity. It's a

War 1, became a police officer in the motorcycle unit

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of the NYPD, and then volunteered. By the way, the Mayor La Guardia didn't allow the NYPD to enlist or reenlist during World War 2 because there was a shortage of police officers, but Mayor La Guardia gave him special permission, Captain Thomas Abbey, because they needed pilots and they needed to train new pilots because we had a shortage during World War 2 so he volunteered. He served during World War 2 as a pilot. He also trained pilots and then volunteered for a special mission during World War 2. His commanding officer was lost so he volunteered to go out alone and look for his commanding officer. Unfortunately, he perished. He gave his life, he served in 2 World Wars and outstanding person. I thank the Newtown Historical Society for coming up with this, and we're going to honor Thomas Abbey with

about the 3 street namings that we have in our
District. One has local implication, one has
national, and one actually intergalactic

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2 implications, and, if you know the Beastie Boys, you know what I'm referring to.

Harold Lui Way. This gentleman was part of almost every single community organization in Chinatown. First starting out with Hamilton Madison in his youth, later being one of the founders of the Chinese American Planning Council. He was also one of the founders of the Chinatown Health Clinic which later became Charles B. Wang. He was on the Board twice of Chung Pak Senior Housing, and he also was one of the founders of the Chinatown History Project which later became MOCA. If you know any of those organizations, they are the cornerstone of Chinatown, and this guy helped lead the way in founding them so it's with great honor that we're able to give him the street renaming which is long overdue.

Second street renaming is for Edie
Windsor and Thea Spyer Way, 2 LGBTQ activists who
were the lead plaintiffs allowing for same-sex
marriage to become the law of the land and so we're
really excited. We worked with Eric Botcher's team so
hopefully in the next few months we'll be able to
have a great celebration, especially in these times
that our nation is going through.

4	was the block of Rivington and Ludlow Street and so
5	this has been in the works for a really long time.
6	It's great to honor hip hop. It comes in a lot of
7	different colors, and I think the Beastie Boys were
8	the first hip hop artist group that was allowed to be
9	on MTV which helped publicize and universalize hip
10	hop in every community so that's going to be a fun
11	party. Going to invite everyone to come to that
12	because it's going to be really cool. Thank you.
