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## COMMITTEE ON WOMEN AND GENDER EQUITY

SERGEANT LEONARDO: Check, check, this is a prerecorded sound test for The Committee on Women and Gender Equity. Today's date is July 14th; it's being recorded by Mike Leonardo in the Council Chambers.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON CABÁN: Thank you.

[GAVELING IN] [GAVEL SOUND]

Good morning, and thank you for joining us. I am
Council Member Tiffany Cabán; my pronouns are
she/her, and I am Chair of The Committee on Women and
Gender Equity. We are voting on nine items today -part of the New York City Abortion Rights Act.

First, this includes four bills:

Intro 475-A, sponsored by myself, a local law to amend the administrative code of the City of New York in relation to a report on the provision of medical services related to reproductive health care.

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Intro 466-A, sponsored by myself, Public Advocate Jumaane Williams, and Council Member Hanif, a local law to amend the administrative code of The City of New York, in relation to prohibiting the use of City resources to enforce abortion restrictions.

Intro 475-A, sponsored by Council Members Hanif, myself, Public Advocate Jumaane Williams, and Council Members Lewis, Rivera, Hudson, and Farías, a local law to amend the administrative code of The City of New York, in relation to a cause of action related to interference with reproductive or endocrine medical care.

Intro 507-A, sponsored by Council Members River, Gutiérrez, and Joseph, a local law to amend the administrative code of The City of New York in relation to requiring the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to make medication abortion available at no cost to a patient at its health clinics.

As well as five resolutions:

Resolution 195, sponsored by Council Members

Brewer and Menin, a resolution calling upon The New

York State Legislator to pass and The Governor to

sign, The Reproductive Freedom and Equity Program,

which would establish a grant program to provide

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funding to New York abortion providers and nonprofit

organizations to increase access to abortion care.

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Resolution 196-A, sponsored by, Majority Whip,
Brooks-Powers, a resolution calling upon The New York
State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign,
S.9137/A.10356, which would allow out-of-state
physicians to provide reproductive health services in
this state while awaiting full licensure.

Resolution 197, sponsored by myself, Council
Member Velázquez, Public Advocate Jumaane Williams,
and Council Member Crystal Hudson, a resolution
declaring New York City a safe city for all those in
need of abortion-related care.

Resolution 200, sponsored by Council Member Menin, a Resolution declaring January 22, 2023 as Roe v.

Wade Day in the City of New York to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the landmark United States

Supreme Court decision.

Resolution number 245, sponsored by Public

Advocate Jumaane Williams, a Resolution calling on
the United States Senate to pass, and the President
to sign, the Women's Health Protection Act.

I'd like to recognize all present council members for the record, uh, committee members, Council Member

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Gutiérrez, Council Member Gennaro, Council Member

Stevens, and Council Member Riley as well as, uh, we

have Council Member Hanif in attendance.

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And with that, I am going to pass it to sponsoring council members who would like to provide remarks, and we will start with Council Member Hanif.

COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Thank you so much, I am

Council Member Shahana Hanif, I represent the 39th

district in Brooklyn. Thank you to The Committee on

Women and Gender Equity, and to Chair Tiffany Cabán

for holding this hearing and for bringing my bill,

Intro 475-A up for a vote this morning.

I want to express gratitude to the co-prime sponsors who introduced this bill alongside me, Chairperson Cabán, Public Advocate Jumaane Williams, Council Members Lewis, Rivera, Hudson, and Council Member Farías. I also want to thank a majority of council members, including Speaker Adams, for signing on as sponsors.

As we know, the Dobbs decision will result in severe restrictions or outright bans on abortion in states governed by far right extremists. This means that many people seeking abortions will be traveling to New York City given our strong protections around

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a sanctuary for abortion rights. It would be a statement to people saying our doors are open; we

reproductive rights. However, despite support from the City, these folks are vulnerable to being subject to civil suits for accessing care that is legal in New York City, but illegal in their home state or municipality. For example, and abusive partner or the Executive Director of a quote, unquote "Pro-Life" group, could sue someone from say, Missouri, who comes to this city to receive and abortion.

Intro 475-A addresses this issue by first, establishing these suits as interference with medical care, an appropriate designation given that these suits intimidate and dissuade people from obtaining care that is legal in our City. Notably, this would also apply to Trans affirming endocrine care, in addition to reproductive care.

Second, it establishes a right to private action around interferences with medical care allowing people to counter sue under New York City law. If the counter suit prevails, the plaintiff shall be awarded \$10,000 in damages, and may also be awarded costs of litigation.

If passed, this bill would cement New York City as

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will provide you with the care you choose, and we
will do everything we can to protect you from those
who would try to get in your way.

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I urge my colleagues to vote to yes on Intro 475-A. I also support all of the other legislation on today's agenda. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON CABÁN: Thank you. And, now, I am going to pass it over to Council Member Brooks - Powers.

MINORITY WHIP BROOKS-POWERS: Good morning,
everyone, and thank you. Thank you, Chair Cabán, for
allowing me to speak briefly on my bill being heard
today, Resolution 196-A calling on to pass
legislation that will allow out-of-state physicians
to provide reproductive health services in New York
while they await full licensure.

By officially moving to take the right to a safe abortion away from millions, The Supreme Court has callously criminalized health care for millions of women and torn at the fabric of our democracy. Dobbs will endanger the lives and health of countless people. New York has long been a sanctuary for women seeking abortions and other reproductive care services, even before Roe was the law of the land,

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and we will continue to be. That is why we must fight to protect abortion access for people across this country. As demand for reproductive health care services is poised to shift significantly, we will need to act quickly and enable as many medical providers as possible to begin serving people seeking abortion in New York State, and we cannot delay. I am honored to join my colleagues on the suite of bills being voted out today, and I look forward to discussing this further. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON CABÁN: Thank you.

Finally, I would like to thank my staff including
Stephanie Silkowski, my Chief of Staff, and Madhuri
Shukla my Legislative Director. Additionally, thank
you to committee staff for their work in preparing
this legislation and hearing including Brenda

Legislative Policy Analyst, uh, and Miss Eisha Wright,
Finance Unit Head.
