2 SPEAKER QUINN: If I could get 3 everybody's attention, we are going to start. 4 Ssh. So we have three ceremonials, except the first two we are going to do together, so if I 5 could ask the folks from Global Action Project and 6 7 the Heart of Brooklyn to come up, and we'll start 8 the first ceremonial, which is being led by Council Member's Jimmy Van Bramer and Brad Lander 9 10 and Tish James. Oh, there's Tish. I only see you 11 now out of the corner of my eye. So come on 12 forward, Global Action Project and Heart of 13 Brooklyn. And why don't folks fall in, just kind of can line up behind Tish, Jimmy and Brad. If we 14 15 can clear the way for the folks to come on up, and 16 photographers, if you can step to the right or the 17 left until the little ones get up. Let's get the little ones up front. I thought they were adults, 18 19 maybe step back a little bit. Adults behind, 20 children in front. There you go, there you go, 21 there you go. All right, so we're going to start 22 first with ... if I can get guiet. So both of the 23 groups that we are recognizing today were 2010 24 National Arts and Humanities Youth Program award

winners. Let's give them a big round of applause,

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and they received an award from none other than

Michelle Obama. So we are very honored, you are

gracing us with your presence, the New York City

Council. But let me turn the mic over first to

Jimmy Van Bramer and Brad Lander and then to Tish

James, and then we'll read the proclamations and

hear from the groups.

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thank you so much, Madam Speaker, it's wonderful to see you guys here. We're so incredibly proud of Global Action Project and Heart of Brooklyn, two dynamite arts organizations that work with young people all over the city, and have been appropriately recognized with the 2010 National Arts and Humanities Youth Program award, what used to be called the Coming Up Taller award, but you guys can see that these guys are coming up great. And we wanted to make sure that national honor was recognized at the local level as well. Global Action Project brings together youth development, media arts and social justice. Kids through the project have done over 160 videos on immigrant rights, criminal justice, gender and sexuality and educational reforms, and the Brooklyn Cultural

2	Adventures program of the Heart of Brooklyn, which
3	these great young people are a part of, is a
4	partnership of six cultural organizations in
5	central Brooklyn, Prospect Park, the Brooklyn
6	Museum, the Brooklyn Children's Museum, the
7	Brooklyn Public Library, Brooklyn Botanic Gardens
8	and the Zoo, and they do a whole series of after-
9	school and summer programs that help young people
10	develop their whole selves, something that the
11	Council has put a lot of energy into making sure
12	that arts education is part, a deep part of our
13	city. Thank you so much to Speaker Quinn, to
14	Council Member Van Bramer, to Tish and all our
15	colleagues for supporting these organizations. At
16	Heart of Brooklyn to Ellen Salpeter and Essie
17	Lash, at the Global Action Project to Meghan
18	McDermott. We're excited to have four members of
19	the President's Committee on Arts and the
20	Humanities who gave this award, some esteemed folk
21	with us today: Ed Norton - you can clap - thank
22	you for being here, Traci Slater-Rigaud, Margo
23	Lion and Liz Mann are all here from the
24	President's Council because it's important enough
25	not just to do the recognition in the White House,

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but to come do it here in the City Council. I

want to thank Caron Atlas for inspiring this idea
and Michael Freedman-Schnapp and Mave Johnson,
there's a lot of information, not just on them but
on all of the other New York City-based winners of
this award in the past, a whole great series of
groups, too many for me to list, but we have some
information about every past New York City awardee
of this honor, and we're thrilled to have all of
you here and really grateful to these
organizations and the young people. And now I
will introduce Council Member Letitia James, who
represents the Heart of Brooklyn.

very much. So the Global Action Project, thank you, and the Heart of Brooklyn were 2010 winners of the 2010 National Arts and Humanities Youth Program award, which is given out by the President's Committee on the Arts and Humanities. The organizations were honored at a ceremony with the First Lady, Michelle Obama, in late October at the White House. Heart of Brooklyn is a unique partnership among six of Brooklyn's most treasured cultural institutions, of which I am proud to

represent most of them. The Botanic Brooklyn
Botanic Gardens, Brooklyn's Children's Museum,
Brooklyn Public Library, the Brooklyn Museum,
Prospect Park and the Prospect Park Zoo. Heart of
Brooklyn sponsors a summer program for youth
called the Brooklyn Cultural Adventures Program,
BCAP. The focus of BCAP is to encourage youth to
interact with their local environment and
community in enriching ways. Youth engage in
creative projects, experimentation and tours that
weave dramatic connections through art, culture,
literature, history and science. All lessons are
consistent with New York State learning standards
and are led by members of the educational staff of
each institution. I am proud that as the
representative of the $35^{\rm th}$ district and I would
like to say the best district in the city, is home
to such rich cultural institutions and home to the
Brooklyn Cultural Adventures Program, and it's
wonderful to be here with the young people. Let's
just, let me give you a shout out to some of my
good friends in some of these great organizations,
Scot Medbury, representing the Brooklyn Botanic
Gardens, Georgina Ngozi, Georgina is up here,

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representing the Brooklyn Children's Museum, Linda

Johnson, representing the Brooklyn Public Library,

Denise McClain, representing the Brooklyn Public

Zoo and a representative from the great borough

President, Marty Markowitz, Mr. Jason Otano,

welcome all of you to City Hall, the people's

institution. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: Thank you very much. I want to congratulate Tish James and Brad Lander for having the good sense to have these wonderful organizations in your districts. It is very, very shrewd of you to have such wonderful institutions in your districts, and I want to congratulate all the organizations and all of the big mackas (phonetic) behind me, some of whom we've seen in very, very prominent movies, but most of all we want to congratulate the children who participated in these programs. at the City Council have always understood the importance of culture and the arts, particularly as it relates to young people. We know that young people do better in school, they perform better academically, when their lives are enriched through the arts and culture. I'm so proud to be

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the Cultural Affairs Chair of the New York City
Council and so proud of the young people here
today, let's give them a round of applause.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you, Jimmy,
Tish and Brad, and now we would love to hear from
folks representing some of the programs and also
folks representing the panel that made this
decision. So I don't know who wants to go first.
All right.

MR. NORTON: Okay, good afternoon, I'm here representing the President's Committee for the Arts and Humanities, and really excited to be here with the New York City Council to celebrate these amazing programs and artists who were awarded the National Arts and Humanities Youth Award Program. Our committee is a committee that advises the President and the administration on matters related to the arts and humanities, and works to support the arts and humanities nationwide. I want to acknowledge our committee chair, Margo Lion, the great theatrical producer and impresario. It's an honor to serve under someone as illustrious as Margo, who's been a force in the New York theater for the 20 years

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I've been in this city and beyond, and our great staff, Liz Manne and Traci Slater-Rigaud, and we have an amazing committee and an amazing staff. The National Arts and Humanities Youth Program award is one of our really signature initiatives with the committee, and it's something that every year is one of the fixtures of what we do that we're most proud of. It's a program that's very close to our heart for, mainly because of the kids that you see here, and the inspiration that they provide. We really, really love having the opportunity to use our platform serving the President to highlight and shine a light on these really excellent after-school arts and humanities programs. Because we want to create awareness and appreciation, not only of the incredible example, the really inspiring example that these educators and kids are setting for all of us, with their commitment and their tenacity, but also because these programs on a national level really are proof positive that the arts is not just, you know, a bonus feature of our society, it's a really integral part of our drive to create educational success and in fact it's an integral

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part of our economy. People don't think of the arts often as one of our economic underpinnings, but the young people coming out of these programs really are proof positive of the central role that the arts play in effective education programs and in developing a strong economy, especially in times like these. So even though you're local, you guys have ... you're an inspiration to the whole country, because you're really, really showing us how important it is to make investments in the arts for the long-term future of our country. So this is the highest honor in the nation for such programs and we're very, very thrilled to celebrate these guys back home in New York. So these two groups, which are making an enormous difference in the lives of these young people have, as already been noted, are joining a long line of really outstanding youth programs that have won this award from New York, since the inception of the award, which was thirteen years ago, 24 programs from New York City and the surrounding boroughs have received this national honor. So on top of everything else, one of the things you guys are doing is you're helping New

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York continue to claim its place as the cultural
capital of the world and of America, and show them
that even our kids and teachers are, you know, the
maddest, most doped, most wild, madcap, hairy-
headed, hipster artists in all of America. Yeah,
so congratulations to all of you guys, we're
really, really excited to get, to celebrate you
back on home turf

MS. SALPETER: All right, we'll be very quick. It's hard to follow Edward Norton.

I'm Ellen Salpeter from the Heart of Brooklyn, and this is.

MS. McDERMOTT: I'm Meghan McDermott with Global Action Project.

MS. SALPETER: So we're going to be really quick. Thank you, Speaker Quinn, thank you Council members Lander, Tish James and Van Bramer, for having us. We're delighted, and on our part, on behalf of the 4,000 campers and BCAP adventurers, thank you. We also want to offer a special note of gratitude to Commission Kate Levin and her staff and the Department of Cultural Affairs, for their steadfast support. And we're so delighted to have the President's Committee,

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all of you here today. We know you're not all based here and we're really, really grateful for your support and the award.

McDERMOTT: We want to take this moment to just say thank you to everyone and to really let you know that programs like BCAP and like Urban Voices at Global Action Project do something really important, and that's that they introduce critical thinking skills developing a new generation of innovative leaders, artists, educators, organizers, activists, visionaries, you name it, it's here in New York and it's with our young people, they're our future, they're our now. So to succeed in a world that's increasingly diverse and complicated, we know that arts are a universal language, that they create connections across cultures, across communities, and across continents.

MS. LION: I too, being a producer, 3 4 know I'm not going to try to say too much after 5 Edward Norton and also the two women who just spoke, they're fantastic. I know when to get off 6 7 the stage. But I will say I want to bring 8 greetings and real congratulations from Michelle Obama, the First Lady of the United States and to 9 10 say to all of you in these programs, to the staff 11 and to the people who had the ideas and to the 12 children, how much these programs mean to the First Lady, they are truly inspirational and they 13 are central to her idea of giving children a 14 15 greater opportunity to succeed in our country. So

SPEAKER QUINN: Do any of you guys want to say anything? No? No? All right. Well, congratulations. Yea! Thank you all very much, thank you. Thank you all, congratulations. All right, we're going to move on to our next ceremonial, but let's give these guys a big round of applause as they ... you're going to step to the back, sweetie. Okay, thank you, congratulations. All right, if we could just have pictures step to

the side, because our next ceremonial, the gentleman needs to come down in a wheelchair, so we need to clear the aisleway please. And if Council Member Dromm and the next ceremonial could come down. And if folks could exit to the left or the right, please? All right, and as Council Member Dromm is here, I'm going to turn the mic over to him, but he has ... so we're really going to ask for a little quiet. The first ceremonial spoke to the importance of children in the City of New York, and the next ceremonial is going to speak to the importance of veterans in the City of New York. So let me turn the mic over to Council Member Danny Dromm.

very much, Madam Speaker. I would like to invite up the members of the Veterans Committee in particular, or anybody else who would like to join us to make this presentation to Captain George M. Vujnovich. All right, ladies and gentlemen, if we could have some quiet because of the seriousness of this presentation, I would be most grateful. Last week our nation recognized Veterans Day, and although we took from our schedules to recognize

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the contributions of the heroes that have fought for this country and laid down their lives for this country, oftentimes our veterans are overlooked in terms of the contributions that they have made. So we certainly did not want to let this Veterans Day pass without honoring a man who was not up until now able to be given an honor because of the nature of the secret mission that he led for this country during World War II. And this story was initially brought to my attention by Congressman Joseph Crowley, who made arrangements to give Mr. Vujnovich a bronze star medal just about three weeks ago. And Mr. Vujnovich in 1944, I just want to get the name ... served with the United States Office of Strategic Services. Now this was the predecessor to the CIA, so it was a secret mission. And what he was assigned to do was to go in and rescue 512 airmen who had been stranded in Yugoslavia, his native country that he knew something about, because they were there to destroy a pipeline, an oil pipeline that Nazi Germany depended on in order to try to win that war. And Captain Vujnovich went in there, he freed the men, he got all 512 of them

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out safely, there was not one single casualty at all. However, because of geopolitics this mission was not allowed to be known until just recently. This is stuff, my friends and colleagues, that movies are made of. So today we wanted to take this opportunity to commend Captain Vujnovich for his tremendous contributions to our country. called the veterans of World War II the greatest generation ever, and indeed those types of sacrifices are sacrifices that we rarely call people to make in this country. So with grateful recognition for all that you've done, sir, we hereby present you with this proclamation, and we're going to have Speaker Quinn. Okay Captain, did you want to say a few words?

MR. VUJNOVICH: I'm very happy to be here before such a loyal patriotic crowd. In my years of service I only had one thought, it was country, the people and God. I hope that that will remain with all the people, especially the young ones, I see them here. It was a difficult job, it was very trying, and I'm glad I got them out. Today I am besieged with letters, donations and whatever from various people who want to come

and visit me, interview me, and right now I've got about 100 letters I've got to answer, and it's from people I haven't seen for 30, 40 and 50 years. But I must say I'm grateful that you're all well and good, and I'm glad to be here. Thank you very much, especially Councilman Daniel Dromm, and all those who assisted me, and I thank you for attending.

COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Thank you very much, and you should know that the Captain is 95 and a half years old. Clerk, would you please read the proclamation?

New York, proclamation. Whereas each year the Council of the City of New York observes Veterans Day to pay tribute to the brave men and women from all walks of life who have answered the call to serve our nation, and defend the ideals we hold so dear, on this occasion it is a great privilege to recognize one of our country's most heroic veterans of World War II, Captain (Ret'd) George M. Vujnovich, and whereas in 1944 Captain Vujnovich served with the United States Office of Strategic Services, a predecessor of the CIA,

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while attempting to destroy Nazi Germany's most important oil pipeline in occupied eastern Europe, 512 airmen were downed, trapped and in dire straits. As a result, Mr. Vujnovich was called upon to plan and execute the largest air rescue in history for American soldiers behind enemy lines. Under his leadership a secret air strip was created inside a corn field, to allow cargo planes to land and rescue the Americans. The entire rescue operation, known as Operation Halyard, took place without a single casualty. And whereas, after World War II Captain Vujnovich became a salesman in Queens, while his courageous mission was kept hidden and out of our history books, due to geopolitical reasons, Operation Halyard remained secret until the records were declassified in 1997. And whereas on October 17th, 2010, 66 years after his triumphant rescue operation, Captain Vujnovich was awarded the Bronze Star medal, the prestigious military honor of decoration awarded for bravery, acts of merit or meritorious service. Now therefore be it known that the Council of the City of New York most gratefully honors George M. Vujnovich for his

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extraordinary service and heroism during World War

II. Christine Quinn, Speaker for the entire

And you actually lived it, and then had to keep it secret for most of your life, and that really is a further statement about what a true patriot you are and how you put your country first in every way. So I just want to thank you so much for honoring us with your presence today, and wish you all the best. Thank you very much, Captain.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very We have a number of important bills we're much. voting on today. The first is Intro 195A, that's a piece of legislation merging the Department of Juvenile Justice and the Administration for Children's Services. I want to thank Lisette Camilo, Alix Pustilnik, Molly Murphy and Rob Calandra who worked on this piece of legislation. 195A follows up on a goal Mayor Bloomberg articulated in his State of the City last year. He put out the proposal to merge these two agencies with the goal of saving the city and these agencies administrative funds, but also in having a more coordinated focus on children in need that the City of New York is charged with This at its face seemed like a good serving. idea, but obviously the devil can always be in the details. And that's why we are very lucky that Council Chairs Annabel Palma of our General

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Welfare Committee and Chairperson Sara Gonzalez conducted aggressive oversight to review the provisions of 195A to make sure in fact that these savings were not at the expense of services to needy children in the City of New York, and I want to thank Chairs Palma and Gonzalez very, very much for their work on Intro 195A, and I want to call on Chair Gonzalez to say a few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER GONZALEZ: you, Speaker. In the Mayor's 2010 State of the City address he said, "We recognize that we're not going to keep every young person out of trouble, but we believe we can do more to prevent a troubled kid from becoming a hardened criminal." Since that time, which is approximately ten and a half months ago, I have been involved in meetings, discussions, hearings and fact finding with respect to this merger. What were the concerns? Our concerns were continuation of services, specifically alternatives to detention, discharge planning. A plan that will insure that a child can return to his or her community and never return to this detention. Other services such as education, the family collaborative, mental health

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and of course sensitivity for certain populations like the LGBTQ. I invite my colleagues to step to the plate and join me in this important work to rehabilitate our troubled youth to become productive members of our society and our potential future leaders. Let's work together to tackle issues of disparity in arrest and conviction rates, and let's look at police admits and court protocols. Moving forward, I would like to say to Mayor Bloomberg and Commissioner Mattingly, we hold you to your commitment to close Spofford. I fully support my Bronx colleagues' plans for housing, educational, or any other community usage where Spofford stands today, and I acknowledge the expertise of Commissioner Mattingly, his Executive Deputy Commissioner Bushing and their new team for their continued innovative approach, and I look forward to our partnership. I listened carefully to unions and advocates, I met with Local 371 President Faye Moore and we heard clearly from the Commissioner this merger will not warrant any loss of employment. I'd like to thank a lot of folks, I want to say thank you to Speaker Quinn, thank you

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to the legislative staff Rob Newman, Lisette
Camilo, who's been incredibly instrumental, our
counsel. William Hongach, Andy Grossman, Isha
Moore, all the folks that made this possible. And
I want to say to Chuck, here and now, Chuck, I
won't call you for a few days and tell you it's
urgent. I assure my colleagues, the advocates and
the unions, we will remain vigilant. I urge my
colleagues to vote yes to Intro 197A. Thank you.

411A. Last week we celebrated Veteran's Day.

become an excuse for sales. Reso 411A calls upon

veterans. That would be something tangible and
real to show our appreciation to those who have
laid their lives on the line for this country in

2	military service. Frankly, because NYCHA is an
3	authority, we don't have the power to mandate that
4	that preference be given. They used to give it,
5	they need to give it again. That would be a
6	gesture of real, true and meaningful and tangible
7	support for our veterans, and I hope NYCHA I
8	hope we pass this resolution and NYCHA takes it to
9	heart and implements that preference. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thanks very

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I'd like to urge my colleagues to vote in favor of Resolution 414A, calling on the United States Congress to pass HR 5967, sponsored by Congressman Nadler, which would enable our ports to implement environmental and labor solutions to some essential problems that we're facing, at a time when our roads, bridges and tunnels are gridlocked and overburdened, we need to look to alternatives for moving freight, moving those by bulk, and water is one of the greenest and most efficient modes that we have, it does a lot economically for the region. But we also need to make sure that we have sustainable practices, so that the folks living in the neighborhoods near the ports aren't breathing in toxic truck fumes, and so that the drivers themselves of those trucks have both environmental quality and job quality. We've heard in hearings on this resolution from a number of truck drivers improperly classified as independent contractors, making less than \$30,000 a year, but expected to act as though they can buy new environmental trucks. This Congressional legislation would go a long way to help fix that, and I want to thank Chair Nelson and Speaker

2	Quinn, Jeff Baker, Colleen Pagter and Jeff
3	Haberman, Heather Bodena and Rebecca Lynch who are
4	here, and a broad coalition for healthy ports. We
5	look forward to working with the Port Authority
6	and EDC to make our ports the greenest and most
7	productive on the East Coast. Thank you.
8	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you
9	very much. Anyone for 245-A? Council Member
10	Melissa Mark-Viverito.
11	COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO:
12	Thank you. I sponsor Resolution 245-A, and I
13	would ask my colleagues to support this resolution
14	which is in support of the Wage Theft Prevention
15	Act. This bill is currently in the state
16	legislature and will increase penalties on
17	employers for underpayment and nonpayment of wages
18	earned by our state workers. Unfortunately, New
19	York City is home to a number of unscrupulous
20	employers
21	SPEAKER QUINN: (Interposing) I'm
22	sorry, if we could get quiet for the resolutions,
23	please.
24	COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO: New

York City is home to a number of unscrupulous

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2 employers that do not respect wage and hour laws. 3 According to recent studies by the National 4 Employment Law Project, 2/3 of New York City's low-wage workers are working 60 to 70 to 80 hours 5 a week and not getting paid overtime. Altogether 6 7 the report estimates that New York City workers 8 lose over \$1 billion to wage theft each year, and you know, during these times, you know, as workers 9 10 seek to hold on to their jobs in this economy, 11 they might be afraid to speak up, or not their 12 rights. This act at the state level will increase 13 the penalties associated with these practices, further disincentivizing the flouting of our 14 15 state's labor laws by employers. And so we really 16 need to implement this, and I want to ask my 17 colleagues to support this resolution. 18 COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you 19 very much. Anyone on Resolution 541? Council Member Chin. 20 21 COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you.

Pre-considered Resolution 541, I co-sponsored it with Speaker Quinn, and I urge my colleagues to support it. This resolution calls upon the United States Senate to vote and pass the James Zadroga

2	9/11 Health and Compensation Act of 2009. It is
3	such a crucial time for, there's an urgency to get
4	this act passed, and I was down in Washington
5	yesterday with a group of first responders and
6	community members. I wanted to thank Council
7	Member Nelson for sending a staff along with us.
8	And it's really heartening to hear the stories of
9	the first responder who was suffering from the
10	health effects of 9/11 and from the community
11	member who is still suffering, who stayed behind
12	to rebuild the community. Over almost a thousand
13	people, first responders, have died from illness
14	because of cleaning up and working at the 9/11
15	site. So I urge my colleagues to pass this
16	resolution, and I thank Council Member Sanders and
17	his Committee for voting on this resolution, and
18	also legislative director Rob Newman for working
19	on this with us, and we just got to get everyone,
20	if all my colleagues
21	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA:

(Interposing) Council Member.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: ... if you could reach out to your friends and family members who live across the country to call their senator

9	enforce innovative environmental solutions for
10	truck pollution, and upon the Port Authority of
11	New York and New Jersey to adopt a comprehensive
12	program modeled after the Los Angeles Clean Truck
13	program, to ensure that the ports of New York and
14	New Jersey are eligible are able to reach the
15	highest standards of efficiency, sustainability
16	and safety, amended and adopted by the Committee
17	on Waterfronts. All in favor say aye.
18	VOICES: Aye.
19	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: All opposed
20	say nay.
21	(No response)
22	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Any
23	abstentions? The ayes have it. Finally, we'll be
24	voting on Pre-considered Resolution 541, a

resolution calling upon the United States to vote

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2	for and pass the James Zadroga 9/11 Health and
3	Compensation Act of 2009, adopted by the Committee
4	on Civil Service and Labor. All in favor say aye.

abstentions? The ayes have it. At this point in time we'll be moving on to general discussion.

First we have Council Member Fidler.

COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: You know, a few things. I mean, first I understand that some of my colleagues who voted no on the preconsidered resolution took exception to my remarks, and I do want to indicate that I understand that their vote was a protest to lower taxes. I was only meant to point out, as inartfully as I did, that we were doing everything within the power that we have today to keep those taxes down, and if they took exception, I want them to know I apologize for it. Second, I want to acknowledge the passing of a great community leader from my neighborhood, Jeremiah, 'Jerry',

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2	O'Shea, who chaired Community Board 15 for a
3	number of years, and I believe was the founding
4	director of Brooklyn Housing and Family Services,
5	certainly served in that capacity for decades, and
6	he will be greatly missed, and his service is
7	greatly valued. And last I want to thank those of
8	my colleagues in both the city and state
9	government who joined Council Member Williams
10	across the street to speak out about what I
11	consider to be the outrageous and appalling
12	appointment of Cathie Black to be the next
13	chancellor of New York City schools. Frankly,
14	this, you know, mayoral control is one thing,
15	absolute control is one thing. But to select
16	someone in the manner in which she was selected
17	SPEAKER QUINN: (Interposing) If we
18	could just sorry, Council Member, just quiet
19	again, please. Thank you. If you could put a
20	little time back on the clock for Council Member
21	Fidler.
22	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: To select
23	someone whose resume is so absolutely devoid of

educational experience, so absolutely devoid of

public service, to do so in a Mississippi minute,

is really an insult to everyone who works on
behalf of the 1.1 million children in our school
system. The children of this city do not have the
time for a chancellor to get on-the-job training,
and it's my belief that this Council needs to
speak, needs to speak very loudly, and very
clearly, in asking the state Education Department
not to grant her the waiver. I also have a
resolution before this Council supporting
Assemblyman Maisel's bill, saying that the next
chancellor should be subject to the advice and the
consent of the Council, and frankly I think we
ought to move that, because I think it really
speaks to the abuse of authority that this
appointment represents.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you very much, Council Member. Next we'll move on to Council Member Jackson.

COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: Thank you,
Majority Leader. My colleagues, I rise to you
about two particular matters. One, I support
Jummaane Williams' resolution calling on the State
Education Commissioner to deny the waiver
submitted by our Mayor, Mike Bloomberg, to allow

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Cathie Black to be the next chancellor of the City of New York (sic). And I say that because there's been no public vetting of her as an individual, and what her qualifications are, what her visions are for education, or what does she feel about the current curriculum or about the current situation with labor relations, nothing whatsoever. And in fact, as you know, up until yesterday she's basically been in hiding. And in fact you know that when the reporters were asking the tough questions of Mayor Bloomberg, he said there was a public process for this selection, and you know in fact there was no public process. So I ask you to sign on to Jumaane Williams' resolution, and also to Council Member Lewis Fidler's resolution in which on both, I signed on to both of those. second item that I rise is because our colleague Inez Dickens, who's getting ready to go to Washington D.C. in support of our Congress member, Charles Rangel, she is submitting, has submitted an LS request basically protesting the gross injustice and denial of due process to our senior statesman, Congressman Charles B. Rangel, and to petition the full Congress to vote down any and

all punishments being handed down by the Ethics

Committee against our Congress member. Now some

of you know about him, some of you don't. But I

tell you as a representative and as a member of

the 15th Congressional district, Charley Rangel

stands for all of us, and he's done a great job on

behalf of not only the 15th Congressional district,

but all of the people of New York City and New

York State. And I ask you to sign on to our

colleague's resolution, which will be coming out

soon. Thank you very much.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you very much, Council Member. Next we have Council Member Williams.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank

you. My colleagues, I'm still sitting, but I hope

my voice rises, to ask you to support Resolution

556. This is not about whether the Mayor has the

right to appoint whomever he wants to appoint. We

concede that fact. But the same law that gives

him that power also says that if there's

exceptional circumstances, he has to apply for a

waiver, and the fact is, there is no exceptional

circumstances when it comes to Cathleen Black.

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That's why he has to apply for a waiver, and I think we should demand that he does not get that waiver, because I believe he had to work really hard to find someone who is the antithesis of all of the things that we have been suggesting is wrong with the school system. She has no experience in the union and labor, she has no experience in the public sector, she has no advanced degree. She went to parochial schools, her kids go to private schools. All of which are okay, but although she has an impressive resume, this is a long list of nothing when it comes to what she is actually applying for. So it's not one or two issues, it's five or six issues, that's a package. I wish it was only the fact that she had no educational experiences, but the fact of the matter is, it is a package of things that are wrong with her, and I don't know her from a hole in the wall, but the process was terrible, there was no public process. I think at bare minimum we deserve the right to speak on who is going to represent 1.1 million students. I am a former public school baby, from pre-school to masters, and I am appalled that this is what we would do.

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When we looked for a leader of the NYPD or the FDNY, we look at their backgrounds. We should hold the 1.1 million students in New York City to the same highest regard, and that was not done by any means or any stretch of the imagination, and I wish and hope that all of my colleagues sign on to the resolution. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you very much. Next we'll move on to Council Member Gentile.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: Thank you, Mr. Majority Leader. I think everyone can agree that illegally cutting a curb, i.e. illegal curb cuts are a scourge in all five boroughs of this city. When a person makes an illegal curb cut, they violate zoning regulations, they reduce available street parking spaces and they risk decreasing neighborhood property values. laws and regulations for a reason, and enforcement is needed to deter the violators and remedy violations. That's why my new two intros seek to do just that, they're on ... they're being introduced today, Intro 414, Intro 415. The first bill calls for a survey of existing curb cuts, and

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2	by knowing where the cuts already exist, the DOT
3	will be better equipped to determine when a new
4	cut is made.

SPEAKER QUINN: Again, could we get a little quiet for the Council Member, please? COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: Whether it is illegal or legal. Thank you, Madam Speaker. It also ends self-certification of curb cuts, so when a permit is made, the city must verify that the placement of the curb cut is in compliance with applicable laws and regulations. This bill also provides for community board notification of applications for new curb cuts, and a second bill, 415, gives DOT the authority to order a property owner to restore an illegal curb cut, so that when a property owner fails to restore that illegal curb cut, DOT can do the work at the cost of the property owner who violated the regulations in the first place. Those are Intros 414 and 415, I invite your review of it, and your support. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you very much. Next we move on to Council Member Lander.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thanks very		
3	much, I just want to add my voice in support of		
4	Council Member Williams' resolution. I'd like to		
5	be inspired by Ms. Black's substantial business		
6	success in the male-dominated world of magazine		
7	publishing, but she's entirely unqualified for		
8	this job, with no background in education, no		
9	track record of public service, no involvement in		
10	government and no demonstrated commitment to our		
11	public schools. I think both the nomination and		
12	the process are disrespectful to our educators, to		
13	our kids, and to our local democracy, and I hope		
14	people will sign on as well. Thank you.		
15	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you		
16	very much, Council Member. Next we'll move on to		
17	Council Member Halloran.		
18	COUNCIL MEMBER HALLORAN III: Thank		
19	you, Mr. Majority Leader. I want to address three		
20	issues that were brought up in these that were		
21	brought up today. First, I salute Jumaane		

issues that were brought up in these ... that were brought up today. First, I salute Jumaane
Williams' efforts to call the Mayor to
accountability. I will of course support Council
Member Fidler's request to have the Council of
this city have review and oversight power over

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appointments that involve this quasi-mayoral entity called the Department of Education. However, we should not do as the Mayor did and rush to judgment and act unilaterally, and I think Cathie Black should be afforded the opportunity to stand before this Council, particularly before Robert Jackson, the Chair of our Education Committee, and answer his questions, answer the questions of his Committee, to make sure that the person who is going to be at the helm of our school system is someone who understands what she is getting into. And I apologize to those who feel that I have left the ship on not being on board with the Reso, it is my sincere belief that we should not judge the person until we've heard from the person, and that we should have an opportunity to confront her with these questions before we ask the state to deny her the ability to have this waiver. The second thing I'm speaking to is the comments made with regards to Council Member (sic) Rangel. I understand he has a long and distinguished service record at Congress, I understand he served his country bravely in the military, but he ran as a reformer, he ran against

2	corruption, and there is no doubt that four		
3	Democrats and four Republicans found him guilty of		
4	having violated rules of the House. I doubt Mr.		
5	Rangel will be expelled, he will probably be		
6	censured. I think the House has done its job and		
7	the full Congress will vote accordingly. I think		
8	it is ridiculous for us to sit here without the		
9	facts in front of us and issue any form of		
10	condemnation of the process he was afforded in a		
11	currently Democratically-controlled Congress. And		
12	finally with regards to Intro 410, I think it is		
13	absurd this Council is entertaining		
14	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA:		
15	(Interposing) Council Member.		
16	COUNCIL MEMBER HALLORAN III: the		
17	notion of having people who are not citizens of		
18	this country vote in its elections.		
19	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you		
20	very much, Council Member. Council Member		
21	Rodriguez.		
22	COUNCIL MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Thank		
23	you. I would like to speak on Reso 547, which I		
24	am introducing today, calling on Governor Paterson		

to immediately rescind the Secure Community

Member Nelson.

Memorandum Agreement. We believe that by
maintaining your state to participate in a secure
community, many working people they will be
affected, especially many families will be
divided. So we call on Governor Paterson to use
his last day as the governor to stop unjust
deportations that can take place by many, big
numbers with Secure Communities. Also Reso 548,
calling on New York State Governor-elect Andrew
Cuomo to continue the pardon panel that also
helped many immigrant families. I also would like
to call my colleagues on joining the Introduction
375 that I already have introduced, and we also
had a hearing in the Transportation and Sanitation
Committee. Intro 375 calls for allowing drivers
to park the car after Sanitation cleans the
streets. All New Yorkers from all the boroughs,
they're expressing their view on support of this
Introduction, so I call to all those colleagues,
that if they haven't joined this Introduction, to
please sign in. Thank you.
COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you
very much, Council Member. Next we have Council

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COUNCIL MEMBER NELSON: Thank you.

Two things: one, Resolution 545, if we don't get the Bayonne Bridge height issue resolved, we're going to lose a lot of jobs in the metro area, and there would be a tremendous loss of funds as well. And so the PA really has to move ahead with this, because in five years, the Panama Canal will be completed and the supertankers will not be able to come to this port. So New York is going to be much, much poorer for it. So it's 545, sign on everybody, for the good of New York City and the vicinity. Secondly, I'm going to speak up also, I'm going to address my friends, the Progressive Caucus, being the loyal opposition here. I think that Cathleen Black of the DOE would be a good idea, and I'll tell you why. I served as a schoolteacher for a couple of years, I was a school board member as well. And I've seen chancellors come and go, of all religions, colors, stripes and everything. And the educational system has not really seen much of a significant improvement, but all indications are, when Klein got there, it seems to have gotten better in terms of results. And that leads me to believe that, if

2	you have another executive and a business person,	
3	and with having, being surrounded by people in the	
4	educational system, of course, I think that we	
5	will only continue to go up. Of course, we won't	
6	know this until we get there, but I don't think we	
7	should just be condemning outright and give Ms.	
8	Black a chance, thank you.	
9	COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Point of	
10	order, it was not the Progressive Caucus pushing

15	(Interposing) Council Member.	
16	SPEAKER QUINN: You don't no.	
17	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: We	
18	apologize.	
19	SPEAKER QUINN: He mentioned the	
20	Progressive Caucus, so the Progressive Caucus does	
21	not exist as a member, it does not get a point of	
22	order. No disrespect to it. Go ahead.	
23	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you	
24	very much, Madam Speaker. Next we move on to	
25	Council Member Chin.

Next week thousands of New Yorkers will take to the skies traveling around the globe to spend Thanksgiving with their loved This year, however, the already trying ones. Thanksgiving travel experience will be even more unpleasant. Both of our city's airports, John F. Kennedy and LaGuardia International airports in Queens are now using advanced imaging technology, aka 'naked body scanners', an intrusive method of screening passengers that produces an instant naked image of the passenger standing in front of That's right, a naked image of you, your spouse or even your small children. Before you start saying, "Well, I'm certain this is necessary for the security of passengers", I would caution

that the world's foremost expert on airport
security, Ben Gurion Airport in Tel Aviv, has
rejected this scanner as ineffective and their
former head of security has publicly warned that
he could get enough bomb-making materials through
this brand-new scanner to take down a jumbo jet.
What's more, the firm that manufactures this
scanner machine hired former Senator Al D'Amato's
lobbying firm to push through this contract, just
four days after last year's Christmas Day bomb
attempt. But the GAO has since said that they're
not even sure this scanner would have stopped the
bomber. Which is why I ask that all of my
colleagues who share these concerns and the
concerns of government trampling on our basic
constitutional rights of privacy join me on the
steps of City Hall tomorrow at noon to call for a
ban of these machines in New York City. Thank
you.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you very much. Council Member Rose.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Thank you. I just wanted to say to Council Member Nelson's remark about this being a Progressive Caucus

issue, this is not a Progressive Caucus issue, it		
is an issue of transparency, and it is an issue of		
having the best and the brightest hired when it		
comes to taking care of our children and our		
educational system. When the Mayor has been		
confronted previously with hiring choices, he has		
always said that he has hired the best-qualified,		
best-prepared person, and that is not what has		
happened in this particular instance. And the		
fact that member Halloran spoke to having her come		
before this body before she should have been		
appointed, there is nothing in law that compels		
her to do so. And so that's just wishful		
thinking, this would never she would never have		
the possibility of coming before this body to		
discuss anything, much as the whole process was		
flawed because there was no public information,		
and there was no public notice, that this position		
was even being applied for. Thank you.		
COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you		
very much. Last but not least, Council Member		

Dromm.

COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Thank you very much. I would like to say that I was a New

York City public school teacher for 25 years, and
this time last year I was still in the classroom.
And I would like to say that Cathie Black would
not even be allowed in front of a classroom based
on her qualifications alone, because you need
student teaching credits before you can get in
front of a class. Then you have to have a
master's degree, and in order to hit the top
salary in the Department of Education, you need 30
credits above the master's. so this is a very
discouraging message to send to those people who
have strived so hard in the New York City public
school system to achieve those goals to educate
our children. In addition, the problem here is
really a matter of transparency, and it's a matter
of knowing who it is, and the public knowing who
it is, who is about to receive the job of
overseeing the education of 1.1 million school
children. It's a huge job with a \$20 million
budget, I don't know that it should just be turned
over without some public vetting. Thank you.
COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you
very much. Speaker Quinn will have the last word.
SPEAKER QUINN: I just wanted to
