17 18 budgets over the past weeks. Today, we're voting on Resolution 283A to call on the Mayor and Chancellor

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of the Department of Education to immediately reverse

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the DOE's reductions to school budgets. The

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resolution calls on the Chancellor to submit updated

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reflect the restoration and for a full accounting of

school budgets to the panel for education policy to

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unspent federal stimulus funds by the DOE. It calls

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on the Mayor to promptly use unspent federal stimulus

dollars and other funds to fully restore the 469

3 million dollars that the DOE has removed from school

4 budgets, which far exceeds the 131.5 billion dollars

5 | that the Administration indicated in the City Budget

6 that would be reduced from school budgets.

7 Throughout the summer, the DOE has offered piecemeal

8 restorations that would not address the entirety of

9 the gap it created for schools. The Council is

10 making it clear today with this resolution that

11 school budgets should be fully restored. The DOE

12 | should also immediately release any money it has been

13 | willing to offer to our schools over the course of

14 | the past weeks because of the act of withholding

15 money must stop. The lack of accountability and

16 | transparency by the DOE, the funding of our schools,

17 and education policy will continue to be a priority

18 | for this Council, our students, teachers, and school

19 communities deserve more support from the DOE, and

20 | it's clear that much more oversight and

21 | accountability is required. Thank you, Majority

22 Leader.

25	floor today. This vote could not be more timely.

Right now, our teachers, principals and other staff
members are preparing for the first day of school
this Thursday and they're doing so with less
resources than they had last year, and that is
unacceptable. In my district like many other
districts across the City, teachers and staff are
being removed from the schools that they taught in
last year and years prior. These are teachers and
staff who are essential to arts education,
afterschool programs, and mental health supports.
They are depended on and beloved by the students,
parents, and staff that make up our school
communities. At the Education Committee meeting
where this resolution was heard, Comptroller Lander
clearly laid out how the Mayor and the Chancellor can
reverse the 469 million dollars in cuts to our
schools in a fiscally responsible way. The DOE
budgeted approximately 3.018 billion dollars in
federal stimulus funding in the 2021-2022 school
year. However, only 2.37 billion dollars were spent,
meaning over 600 million dollars were budgeted but
not spent. This money can be and must be rolled over
to the 2022-2023 school year. Our young people and
their families are recovering from the academic

2	socio/emotional and economic impacts of the pandemic.
3	We have an influx of new students with immense needs,
4	including the approximately 1,400 new school-aged
5	asylum seekers who have arrived in recent months.
6	Now is not the time to be asking our schools to do
7	more with less. I urge the Administration to heed
8	this resolution and provide our schools with the
9	resources they need. Thank you.

And if he fails to, which I very much hope that he does not, but if he does fail to, I look forward to standing with each and every one of you in a muscular and robust budget mod fight in the weeks and months to come. we also have to acknowledge why we're in this

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position that we're in, and it's because of a dropoff in student enrollment, and that drop-off didn't just start in the pandemic. It accelerated in the pandemic. A 100,000 students left the New York City public school system, but this decline has been happening since 2015. Ten percent of our school children have left the system. some because of generationally failing schools, others during the pandemic because our school system decided unnecessarily to remain closed and to be as difficult as possible for working parents, and others because they felt that they can get a better education elsewhere. So I think-- I hope, rather, that this body would consider some of those reasons, and consider that people that do leave the public school system are still our constituent, and I would hope that we would begin looking at other alternatives such as tuition tax credits, vouchers, and the expansion of the charter cap going forward. Again, these aren't our enemies, people that leave the public school system. They're our constituents. They're parents who decide what hopefully they think is best for their children, and I'd rather be on their side than treating them as the enemy. So, I

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vote yes on this resolution happily. I think the tougher conversation might come if there's a budget mod as Councilman Restler pointed out. It'll be a very muscular debate, and I intend to hit the weight room, I guess, for that. But thank you, Madam Speaker, and with that I vote aye.

COUNCIL MEMBER POWERS: Thank you. will make remarks, sorry to Council Member Stevens. I share some of Council Member Borelli's-- Minority Leader Borelli's concerns about what is happening in the school building when it comes to declined enrollment, and I do think in the years ahead we are going to have to face some difficult choices about what that looks like for our school buildings and for our school system. Declined enrollment means that we are going to have potentially less money at some of these schools buildings, and we're going to have to tackle those questions about how to prioritize and how to spend that money. We're going to have to look as the Speaker has called on to look at the funding formulas by which guide many of the funding decisions that the school system makes. And I think we're

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going to have to look at the loss of stimulus funding and a lot of other stressed systems on our school building and our school system, and have to face some choices about exactly where to prioritize and make prioritized. But I think for many of us we saw this happen-- play out this year when we do believe there is still money left over and this-- to help sort of pad the budgets of the school system as we face that declining enrollment. Give us the opportunity and breathing room to make those choices and make those decisions, and to make sure that none of our actual schools are facing devastating cuts that could harm arts programs or afterschool programs, or any-- or teachers-- or just teachers themselves. So, I think that for many of the colleagues here we've heard very clearly from them that they want to make sure that their schools are well-- of course, all of ours wellfunded, that they have the critical programs and they don't lose those so close to the school year when principals will have very little opportunity or time to make the hard decisions that they may have to make if we don't restore the funding. So, I want to give a lot of credit to our Education Chair Rita Joseph, to the Speaker, and too all the colleagues here,

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because I know many of you have been hearing from your parents and your teachers directly, and principals, and advocating on their behalf, and that's what our jobs are, and that I don't think anybody wants to see a school building that doesn't have an arts program in it or have the teachers they need to support class sizes that make sense for our public school students. So I'm an obvious aye on this, but I do think that after this we do need to make an effort not only to keep this money in the budget, but then also have opened up discussions as the Speaker has said about what does the formula look like and what is the process going forward look like so that we don't have to face this decision again. And so I just want to say thank you to everyone who's been out there leading this discussion. I hope that we'll continue this into the school to make sure that our schools get the serious discussion that they deserve about how we should fund them in the years ahead especially with, I think, some financial challenges that might be facing the school system and the City in the years ahead. So, with that, I am voting aye, and want to thank everyone for all your advocacy and efforts. I see Council Member Narcisse?
