CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Buenos Tardes, or Good evening as the case may be. Good evening. Hi, I'm Council Member Mark Weprin, Chair of the Zoning and Franchises Subcommittee. We are here this evening to consider Land Use numbers 256 through 266, inclusive, known as Riverside Center or Extell. This has been a -- we had the hearings already on this subject and over the last few days there has been a couple of days' worth of negotiation. I compliment both sides on the hours they put in and all the--and how it was kept

civil, even if it was protracted.

What I'd like to do first is to call the development team of the applicant to explain some of the discussions and compromises and changes that have been made to the project and. And I have Council Member Brewer, who represents the area, with me to give me the go ahead on what she thinks about this. So, Mr. Wallace. Do make sure to say your name on the record, whoever is going to speak. Mr. Lowenstein, if you speak, repeat your name and shoot.

EDWARD WALLACE: My name is Edward

Wallace. I'm a lawyer with the firm Greenberg
Traurig, representing Extell. With me is Ken
Lowenstein of the law firm of Bryan Cave. Ken is
going to do the substance, but I would be remiss
if I didn't say on behalf of our client, thank you
to all of the hard work of all of the members of
this Council's staff, including the Speaker's
staff and Council Member Brewer's staff, and all
of the community advisors. I think--I know time
is short and it's late in the day, but those thank
yous are heartfelt and really significant to the
good outcome you're about to hear about. So,
thank you.

afternoon. My name is Ken Lowenstein, with the Law Firm of Bryan Cave, and I represent Extell, the developer. Mr. Chairman, Councilwoman Brewer, members of the Committee, I will run through this fairly quickly in the interest of time. Obviously we'd be happy to answer your questions.

KENNETH LOWENSTEIN:

The modifications that we will be undertaking to the project as approved by City Planning are the following. First, we will establish a new section of the restrictive

declaration that creates two new escrow accounts

The first set of money will be used to do repairs

to the 59th St. recreation center. The second

fund will be for the provision of additional

active open recreation space--active recreation

space -- active open space mitigation fund.

payments will be made as project buildings get

their TCOs, which is how the existing restricted

declaration operates. The total amount of money

for the open space and the recreation center will

be \$20 million.

Secondly we will amend--the second item is we will amend the restricted declaration to say that the developer will supply the core and shell for a 100,000 square foot school, of which the SCA has agreed to fund 85,000 square feet--pay the fit out for 85,000 square feet. In addition, the SCA will have the option, which has to exercise within five years, to pay for the fit out of the remaining 15,000 square feet. If it does not use that space, that space could be used by the developer in accordance with the approvals by the Council and the Council Zoning Commission.

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Thirdly we will, in terms of

declaration to provide 20% of the residential

housing.

is a minimum obligation on the part of the developer. To the extent that units are provided off site, which as permitted under the Inclusionary Housing Program, the priority will be new construction over preservation. The developer will submit to a task force that will be established under the restricted declaration on an annual basis—excuse me, not on an annual basis—a summary, a plan, to HPD and copies would be sent to the Community Board and the Council Member, of its plan to provide the low-income housing.

The third, the next item is on the parking. We will amend the special permit as approved by the City planning commission, which

5 limited us to 1,260 spaces to allow 1,500 spaces.

The additional 240 spaces can only be self-park.

And finally the drawings, which as approved by the City Planning Commission did not allow us to have an auto showroom in Building 2 on West End Avenue, will be modified to allow the auto showroom to be located on West End Avenue. I believe that covers all the modifications.

CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Thank you, Mr. Lowenstein. Ms. Brewer, would you like to confirm that this is what you have been understanding and any comments you may have?

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you,
Mr. Chair. That is my understanding, and I thank
very much the team from Extell. Before I go any
further I would like two people and, and to thank
others, Community Board 7. I would like both Mel
Wymore, Chair, and Ethel Sheffer to stand up, and
Jesse Bodean [phonetic] from our office. Because
this has been a yeopersons effort. In addition on
the speakerphone constantly and in the presence

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was Richard Ash from the Community Board. He was 2 3 doing a deposition at Riker's today, so it's not so easy to deal with cell phones, but he managed. And in addition, Mark Diller, who has been the 5 education expert and who has public school 6 7 children. And certainly we are very grateful to 8 the other members who spent almost two years meeting almost every single day as part of a 9 10 Riverside Task Force. And Riverside Task Force, 11 as part of Community Board 7, including community 12 members, put together an amazing report, which I 13 think many Council Members kindly came and met with us to see this amazing report regarding this 14 15 project. So, to say that it was a lot of work is 16 an underestimated comment. And I want to thank 17 the Community Board for all of their efforts. 18 I also want to state that there 19 were many people from the Speaker's Staff.

Gail Benjamin, Danielle DeCerbo and Christian Hylton were 24/7 also. And were all here last night, but there were many hours that led up to this task. And certainly I want to thank the Subcommittee Chair and that guy, Comrie, and that

wonderful friend of mine, Inez Dickens, who are constantly sending me texts. And I'm able to answer them and say, we're doing well thanks to your input.

This has been a very challenging effort. I think the parents on the West Side will be particularly pleased. Like many of our communities, we have an overcrowded situation. I know one of the issues that we hope is that the school building where it's going to be located could perhaps be built first, because anybody moving in to any building will want to take advantage of great schools, and there's not another seat left in our current schools.

I want to also thank SCA, HPD and Parks. We have been spending a great deal of time on the phone with them and they have been very responsive. I want to thank the residents of the neighborhood, 10 West End Avenue, that particular building was endlessly supportive. And obviously the people from the unions; I think it's good to have jobs and this will be a big project and Extell has always been very supportive of good jobs, living wage, prevailing wage and union jobs.
