24	Sophomore Cross-Country Champions, and the Staten
25	Island Junior Varsity Borough Champions. These

But I bet my colleague Vinnie Gentile, who--he represents Fort Hamilton. last night -- it was a great game, Lincoln against Fort Hamilton, Fort Hamilton won 8-6, and we lost the high school championship. But more importantly, it was at Yankee Stadium. There was over 15,000 people there last night, and there was over--between 15 to 20 college scouts to look at our children in New York City for full scholarships. And there are about 8-15 kids who are going to get full rides to division one

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SPEAKER QUINN: So ladies, I mention that to let you know we take our high school sports seriously in the New York City Council. And thank you ladies for being a great example of that, and great scholar athletes. And we look forward to hearing about all your successes in the future. So thank you all very much. Congratulations.

All right. We're going to have this team move out and we're going to have Gale Brewer and her team come up. Let's have a round of applause for the Lady Raiders as they make their way out.

All right. And as the Lady Raiders are making their way out, we're going to have Council Member Gale Brewer and the Blue Demons, the Boys and Girls Soccer team from the Beacon School. So if they could make their way up while the Lady Raiders are leaving, that would be great.

That's all I'm saying. You were late, but you look very cute in your fleece. Domenic, that's a better shirt. Put that on over.

15	captains and the coach up by Council Member
16	Brewer, please, that would be great.
17	COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Captains
18	and coach. Thank you, Madam Speaker. Thank you,
19	City Council. We're here with the Blue Demons,
20	which is Beacon High School Soccer Teams, Girls
21	and Boys, won Citywide PSAL.
22	[Applause]
23	COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: And Beacon
24	High School is located on 61 St. with young people
25	from all over the City. They don't have a field,

they don't have a gym, and they still won. And that is a credit to traveling and schlepping to fields all over the city. We need more fields in Manhattan.

But I'm here to congratulate all the students. Coach Kevin Jacobs of the girls' team and Assistant Coach Rachael Radcliffe and two amazing players, who are also captains and spokespeople, Sela Brown and Sophia Kligler on the girls; and the boys, Coach Alec Mahrer, Assistant Colin McTreague [phonetic], and Captain Joseph Nikic . I want to congratulate you all for the amazing, amazing effort, for winning. I hate to tell you, but the girls beat Tottenville and the boys beat Francis Lewis. I hate to tell you that, but that's what happened. We can ask the clerk to read the proclamation, please. But don't mention Tottenville.

THE CLERK: Council, City of New
York, proclamation. Whereas the Council of the
City of New York is proud and pleased to honor the
Beacon High School Boys and Girls Soccer Teams,
recognizing their historic double win of the New
York City Public High School Boys and Girls

Championship, and thanks all players, coaches,
staff, teachers and parents for the support they
have shown to the team members in all facets of
their lives; and whereas the Beacon Boys team has
been competitive and experienced heartbreaking
losses in the past, but triumphed over the Francis
Lewis Patriots to win their first PSAL
Championship since the Fall '05 season, both under
the direction of Coach Alec Mahrer. After no
goals in regulation time and two overtime periods,
the game ended in a shootout. The Blue Demons
were able to take the championship in a final
penalty kick by Captain Joseph Nikic to end with a
4-3 victory, a truly exciting and historic win for
the Beacon School Boys team; and whereas the Girls
Soccer Team defeated Tottenville High School 2-0
to become PSAL Class A champions, finishing the
season undefeated in league play, the Blue Demons
continued their unbeaten streak through the
playoffs, culminating in the championship. Under
the guidance of Coach Kevin Jacobs, the team
played with accuracy and fluidity throughout the
season. The leadership of the team seniors, who
last won the championship during their freshman

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2	year helped carry the team through the title game.

23	space both teams were able to be so successful.

was to happen to you, your organs can be us	sed to
save other peoples' lives, and there's real	lly no
more valuable thing you could do. 18 peopl	le each
day die waiting for a donation and it's so

SPEAKER QUINN: [Interposing] Mark, if we could just--shh. I know the teams are exiting, but if we could get a little... Thanks, Mark.

COUNCIL MEMBER WEPRIN: Thank you,

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Madam Speaker. We are delighted to have some very special guests here tonight -- today. It feels like tonight--today. People from the National Kidney Foundation, The Eye Bank for Sight Restoration, The New York Organ Donor Network--and we'll have someone speak on their behalf. We're also joined by Jeffrey Davis, who those of you who don't know--James Davis, who was your colleague of many of the people in this room. His family donated his corneas when he was killed and those corneas are helping two people to see right now in this City. Also, we are delighted and honored to be joined by Mandy Patinkin, who is--where did he go? Here you go, Mandy Patinkin, star of stage and screen, winner of a Tony and an Emmy in the past, as well as an accomplished musician and singer, and star of Elmo in Grouchland and other famous movies as well. One of my kids was a big fan of that one in particular. Of course he played the bad guy, but that's another story.

But let me first call on Julia
Rivera, who is going to speak on behalf of all the
networks and the organ donation people to say a
few words. Julia?

JULIA RIVERA: Thank you so much

everybody for being here. As was said before,

there are nearly 110,000 people awaiting a life
saving organ transplant. And in New York it's

over 10,000 people. Every 18 minutes, somebody

dies in America awaiting an organ transplant. And

every 11 minutes, another name is added to the

every 11 minutes, another name is added to the

9 list. This is a cause that we're not coming to

10 the City Council to ask you for money. This is a

11 cause that you can support.

We all have our family members, our neighbors, our extended family. We all can be part of living life after death by enrolling on the New York State registry. The New York State donor registry is behind the rest of the country in enrollments. Now, New York is a very proud city. We want everybody in New York to sign up on the New York State registry. So, I encourage you to help us. I want to acknowledge Doris Novello Suda [phonetic], Donor Family Member as well, whose father passed away. And she'll tell you at any point that having her father be an organ donor was the best thing that happened to them. Because when he no longer could live he could allow

somebody else to live through the gift of eyesight, through the gift of tissue or through the gift or organ donor. Thank you.

very much. And I'd like to call on Mandy

Patinkin, who is here not only through all the accomplishments that I mentioned and the fact he's making Karen Koslowitz swoon, but also the fact that he is a double cornea recipient. And I'd love to have you say a few words, Mr. Patinkin.

MANDY PATINKIN: Thank you. First of all, thank you so much for including organ donation in your event today. I can't think of any single cause, any cause, not just in New York City, but anywhere in America or the world, that is more important than saving a single life.

Because that single life tomorrow may create the cure for cancer, peace in the Middle East, peace for all humanity all over the world. And you can be instrumental in saving those lives.

I want to encourage you--I'm not even sure whether or not this kind of event takes place every year at the City Council, but it

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should. And I would like you, however you make this City Council work, I would like to make sure that there is at least a major event where organ donation becomes a focus every year. And we at the New York Organ Donor Network will find a way to help you focus that attention.

I received two cornea transplants, one from a little girl in 1997, another, my left eye, from a little boy in 1998. I would be blind without this gift of sight. And I just have to tell you a little personal story. I started doing national work for organ donation awareness immediately after I received this gift. And on Thanksgiving, the CBS was doing a piece about my second eye transplant. And the widow of my best friend who we just lost that year turned to me and said, what did we do with our loved one's organs? And I was working for it, for organ donation awareness, and we did nothing because we were in the midst of our grief and our sorrow and our The time to think about organ donation is pain. on a beautiful day like today, when we're all healthy and well and alive. The time to think about it is at Hanukkah and Christmas and New

donors.

Years, and everyone's birthday and on

Thanksgiving, and when you're sitting with your

gorgeous families at the table, bring up this gift

of life that you can save up to eight lives with

one donor, and god knows how many others with skin

donations. If you have complications in the

individual, often many people can still be cornea

And I just, I want to give you the facts, you can get them easily by googling, but just right down for New Yorkers, because this is our family right now, but for New Yorkers, just write down these simple words: DonateLifeNY, D-O-N-A-T-E-L-I-F-E-N-Y.org, .org. And become an organ donor. You can do it yourself. You don't need to have a family member do it. You can take care of this yourself. Do it. It will be the singular greatest gift you have ever given. And I encourage you to do it. It is a privilege to be a part of this event today and I hope to see you every year at a similar event. Thank you.

takes about two minutes, so I encourage everybody to do it after the meeting today. I would like to ask the clerk to read the proclamation.

organizations and many New Yorkers who promote the
gift of life through their commitment to tissue
and organ donation; the impact of opting in to be
a donor cannot be underestimated.

THE CLERK: One single person who donates organs including hearts, lungs, livers, kidneys, pancreas and intestines can save up to eight lives, while someone who donates tissues like corneas, bones, skins, heart valves, tendons veins and more, can improve the lives of 12 or more people by restoring eyesight, helping fight infections in burn patients, and preventing the loss of mobility and disability.

The late New York City Council

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Member James E. Davis generously donated his corneas to the Eye Bank for sight restoration, which has allowed two men to regain their sight. And whereas today there are 73,239 candidates on the active waiting list for such donations, including more than 8,000 New Yorkers, and a new name is added to the national list every 11 Tragically the need for organ donations minutes. far exceeds the supply. Every day the shortage of donated organs results in the deaths of 19 people awaiting transplants. With very few exceptions, people of all ages and background should consider themselves potential organ and tissue donors. Many families of donors say that knowing other lives have been saved lightens their grief and helps them cope with their tragic loss.

Now therefore be it known that the Council of the City of New York honors the Eye Bank for Sight Restoration, the National Kidney Foundation and the New York Organ Donor Network for promoting organ and tissue donation in New York City. Christine C. Quinn, speaker for the entire Council; Mark Weprin, Council Member, 23rd District, Queens; and many other members of the

First, Intro 396-A, a piece of legislation introduced and passed out of our Civil Rights Committee, by our Civil Rights Committee Chair, Debbie Rose. This is her first piece of legislation, so congratulations for her. to thank Julene Beckford, Damien Butfig [phonetic] and Alix Pustilnik for their work on this. is a piece of legislation that will assist our oversight of the Human Rights Commission and add transparency to the Human Rights Commission by setting a date certain every year by which we and the Mayor will receive the annual report on the Human Rights Commission's activities, and also add greater specifics about what is to be reported in that document. And our goal here is really to get a better sense on the level of discrimination complaints that are being brought to the commission and whether or not or how efficiently or not the commission is dealing with them. So I want to thank Debbie Rose for her work on this,

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and let me call on the Chair. And if we could get
a little quiet in the chambers for the Chair,
please.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Thank you,

Madam Speaker. Thank you. I'd like to extend my

thanks to Julene Beckford and to Damien Butfig for

all of the work that they did and the Human Rights

Committee for all the hours they put in.

I want to express to you that we all know that it's no secret. Over the years advocates and civil rights activists have voiced frustration regarding the Human Rights

Commission's effectiveness in investigating and addressing discrimination and civil rights abuses here in the City. As the Chair of the Civil Rights Committee, I developed my own concerns based on the difficulty I faced obtaining what I thought would be basic information regarding the work of the Commission.

This bill is an important step in the right direction because its provisions will guarantee greater transparency within the Human Rights Commission. And I believe that transparency will lead to greater accountability.

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Even the Human Rights Commission embraces the new
reporting requirements established by this bill.
These new requirements offer the Commission an
opportunity to demonstrate to the public that it
really is conducting the work in a focused and
comprehensive manner. I urge all of my colleagues
to support this bill when it comes up for vote.
Though the City's financial woes dominate the news
cycle, it is important for us to remember that the
fundamental purpose of government is to guarantee
and protect the peoples' rights. Intro 396 will
help ensure that we are able to fulfill this
essential mandate. Thank you.
SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very
much, Chair Rose. I also want to thank the Chair

much, Chair Rose. I also want to thank the Chair of our Housing and Buildings Committee, Council Member Dilan, for passing Intro 343-A, a piece of legislation that deals with the energy conservation code and continues the Council's commitment to energy conservation and sustainability. I want to thank Jeff Haberman, Baaba Halm and Ben Goodman for their work on this.

I also want to thank our Land Use Committee Chair, Leroy Comrie and his staff for

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their work. Today we are voting on Intro 428-A, which is a piece of legislation that co-names 67 thoroughfares and public places. I want to thank Council Member Melissa Mark-Viverito, Chair of the Committee, for her work. And Lyle Frank, Patrick Mulvihill and Jeff Haberman for their work on this as well.

Lastly in Transportation we are passing a piece of legislation, Intro 257-A, which was introduced by Council Member Diana Reyna. I want to thank her and Jimmy Vacca, the Chair of the Committee for their work. I want to thank Lyle Frank and Terza Nasser and Jennifer Wilcox for their work as well, as well as Phil Hom for their assistance. And very simply, 257-A will assist the City, particularly the Department of Transportation on cracking down on a neighborhood nuisance, which is unlawful ATM on sidewalks. We've all seen them. We've all wondered how they got there. We've all wondered if they're legal. They're not legal. They are obstructing sidewalk access. They're often a magnet for crime and tremendous levels of vandalism. When they're put out on the street illegally like that, they

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actually don't stand for ATMs, they don't actually stand for Automatic Teller Machines, they stand for Asking for Trouble Machines, and we want to do everything we can to get them off of our streets and deal with this quality of life issue. And I want to thank the Council Member for her work on this. Let me first call on the sponsor, Council Member Reyna, and then the Chair of the Committee, Council Member Vacca.

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: Thank you so much Madam Speaker. I'd like to thank you and the Transportation Chair Vacca for this diligent process in ensuring that Intro 257-A was going to be heard and processed for a vote quickly in this council, in this body. I want to urge my colleagues to vote yes on this bill. Intro 257-A is an enforcement bill. Currently there is no enforcement addressing the safety, visual pollution and traffic concerns posed by sidewalk ATMs. Vandalized sidewalk ATMs blight communities and impair the walking corridors of heavily trafficked sidewalks. They're an impediment for business improvement districts who have complained to my office within my district, asking for

2	assistance. And today I am proud, especially to
3	say thank you to Max Javier [phonetic] the BID
4	director who of course is going to be moving on to
5	his next endeavor. But I wanted to thank him
6	amongst us here today. A functioning City must
7	enforce legislation that reduces crime and
8	improves the quality of life issues. Today we are
9	strengthening the City's ability to enforce
10	against ATMs that unlawfully encroach on public
11	sidewalks. 257-A will remove discrepancies and

so much, Majority Leader. We were all horrified on October of this year when it was reported that several young men were kidnapped and brutally tortured by the Latin King Goonies because of their sexual orientation. This story, as you know, went nationwide and prompted wide condemnation for the heinous nature of the crime. And as many of you know, however, this incident is neither the beginning or the end of the gang problem present in our city, as we have experienced a surge in violent crime in our city.

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And as difficult economic times exacerbate social conditions like poverty and inadequate education opportunities, it is imperative that we attack gang related issues with comprehensive community This is why I strongly urge you to join me in sponsoring a resolution calling on congress to pass HR 3526 which seeks to develop a comprehensive gang violence reduction strategy. It also calls on the United States Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention to award grants to non-profit community-based intervention agencies for reducing and stopping gang-related violence. Recent reports have indicated that gang membership has grown over the last decade with OJJDP putting the latest estimate at nearly 800,000 members countrywide. We have a responsibilities to our youth and communities all around the City to do all we can to help mitigate this problem. Please join me in sponsoring resolution 593 as we work together as a city to battle gang violence and inspire our youth to have a positive impact on their community. Thank you so much.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you

so much, Council Member. Next we have Council

Member Greenfield.

COUNCIL MEMBER GREENFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Leader. I'm excited today to introduce two pieces of legislation, and an important resolution and to ask that all of you sign on as co-sponsors. My first piece of commonsense legislation, Intro 441, would require that red line be painted on curbs adjacent to fire hydrants throughout New York City in order to clearly mark where cars may and may not park. This will ensure that the FDNY is able to access the hydrants in an emergency, while also helping motorists avoid tickets based on an often arbitrary standard enforced by traffic enforcement agents.

My second piece of legislation,
Intro 440, would increase penalties to owners of
properties in which radio towers are illegally
constructed, and the owners of those radio towers.
Illegal radio broadcasts put lives at risk by
interfering with emergency radio frequencies.
They also interfere with the signals of legitimate
radio stations, and drive business away from
taxpaying radio stations who are struggling to

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stay on the air in this economy.

3 And finally, I'm introducing a 4 resolution, Reso 594, that would call on DCAS to 5 waive competitive civil service exam fees for our military vets. The men and women who serve in our 6 Armed forces write a blank check to the United 7 8 States of America for an amount up to and including their lives when they enter the 9 10 military. Yet, when these soldiers return home 11 from far-flung lands and war torn countries, they 12 are often met with little to no support and even 13 fewer job opportunities. In New York State 20% of 14 our veterans are under the age of 30 and returning 15 from Iraq and Afghanistan, 20% are unemployed. 16 Affording the men and women who sacrificed so much 17 for our country a cost-free opportunity to reenter civilian life is a simple way for us to address 18 19 the systematic problems facing our veteran 20 community and to show gratitude for their 21 sacrifice. Thank you very much. 22 COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you. 23 Next we have Council Member Gentile. 24 COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: Bay Ridge,

wanted to congratulate Council Member Rose before, so I'll do that now. I want to extend my congratulations to Council Member Gentile and Gonzalez and the other Ft. Hamilton graduates. I would have liked to have been in on the wager, except the Bloomberg Administration seems to have closed all the large high schools in my district, so.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you very much. Council Member Levin.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you very much. I would like to take this opportunity to call attention to two instances of assault in the South Williamsburg Community, one occurring on Thanksgiving Day and one occurring just this past Sunday evening. In both instances a person of the Hasidic Jewish community of Williamsburg was viciously assaulted for no apparent reason. In

one of these instances, anti-Semitic slurs were spewed while the assailants were beating the victim, and his religious garments were torn.

After Sunday's assault, the Shomrim Community Patrol and the 90th Precinct in Brooklyn apprehended the assailants and upon extensive interviews charged two young men in both assaults, and another charge of harassment regarding another recent incident targeting another Hasidic Jewish individual.

These types of acts have no place in our society and undermine religious tolerance and community throughout the City of New York.

So, I want to recognize the Shomrim Community Patrol, the 90th Precinct and its Commanding Officer, Michael Kemper, Brooklyn North and its Chief, Gerald Nelson, the NYPD Hate Crimes Unit, and Speaker Christine Quinn and all the Speaker's staff for taking this issue so very seriously and for everyone's collective efforts. We can verify that we have assailants in custody and charges have been issued and the South Williamsburg Community can sleep a little easier tonight, but this has been an example of everyone coming

2	together and saying unequivocally that we will not
3	tolerate hate in our city. So, I want to thank
4	Speaker Quinn and I want to thank everyone else
5	that was involved for all their great work. Thank
6	you so much.
7	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you
8	very much, Council Member. Seeing no others
9	Council Member Recchia.
10	COUNCIL MEMBER RECCHIA: I just
